Robin Proffit Turns Down Time into Craft Time

The coronavirus pandemic changed Robin Proffit's summer plans. The job she loves, providing meals for the kids at Clearbrook-Gonvick School, was on hold. She also planned to spend at least part of her summer managing Kloster Park, Clearbrook's location for summer recreation programs for kids. But summer recreation activities were delayed, then limited to daytime gatherings. With so many of her normal activities on hold, Robin found she had a lot of down time,

something she just wasn't used to having. In some of this extra time, Robin started exploring on the internet. One site especially caught her attention. A woman was creating some interesting craft projects and selling them in her on-line shop. Robin discovered that she could purchase the supplies to produce the same type of crafts while bringing her own unique style to the process.

So Robin began making keychains and other crafts as a way of coping with the extra down time. To fashion her keychain designs, Robin starts with acrylic blanks. She creates her design with vinyl shapes she cuts with a Cricut machine. She then embellishes the design with glitter. Once her design is complete, Robin covers

it with an epoxy resin that gives the project its glossy look. The final step is adding keychain hardware, and her project is complete.

Robin has been experimenting with lots of different ideas, making designs in a variety of themes. Many of her designs are sports-related. She has basketball, football, and volleyball shapes as well as jerseys. These can all be personalized with team or player names or jersey numbers. She has made animal designs for 4-H members. To fit the 2020 election, she has elephant and donkey designs. Robin also has designs for Minnesotans, moms, and teachers. Because Robin makes each project individually, she can personalize them with names, words, and colors.

Robin is not only making keychains. She recently made a batch of car cozies and t-shirts to fit a bridal shower theme. She is also creating coasters that fit in a vehicle's cup holders.

"I'm usually not this crafty, I usually have no time," Robin said.

Robin began this new craft as a fun way to pass time. For her it's also been a stress reliever. When she posted her designs on Facebook, she found that other people liked what they saw and started placing orders. She is working on several orders right now. Robin is heading back to school soon to prepare for her favorite job, feeding kids. So, her crafting time will be more limited, but she will continue to craft and take orders. Unorganized Township Board Meeting held

November Election results expected to take extra time

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on August 18, 2020 for the Unorganized 143-36 Township Board Meeting, and the regular meeting of the Board.

Unorganized 143-36 Township Board Meeting was called to order by Chairperson Dean Newland. All commissioners were present. The last meeting was held on October 8, 2019, for which minutes were read and approved.

County Auditor-Treasurer Al Paulson presented a motion to approve the 2021 16-305 Unorganized Township Budget.

"It is about the same as in the past years," he stated. "Except there was \$20,000 spent for gravel they didn't tell us about, as they always did before, leaving a \$9,000 bill."

Following is a summary of the Department Budget Summary for the 16-305 Unorganized Township:

Expenditures included Blad-ing in the amount of \$400; Snow-plowing in the amount of \$600; and Road Maintenance/Gravel in the amount of \$400; for a total of \$1,400. Under the Revenues category, there was a Balance Forward of \$1,800, and In Lieu amount of \$600; the Total Current Revenue was in the amount of \$2,400; Operating Revenue in the amount of \$2,400; and a Year End Balance in the amount of \$1,000.

This budget was approved, with a motion by Commissioner John Nelson, and seconded by Commissioner Neal Illies.

The application for the 2021 Seasonal Beer and Wine License for Douglas Lodge at Itasca State Park was approved by the Board of Commissioners.

Commissioner Mark Larson made a motion to adjourn the Unorganized 143-36 Township Board Meeting, which was seconded by Commissioner Mark Titera, and the regular meeting

of the Board was called to order.

Primary Election Results: Board Coordinator Emily McDougall reported that there was a 23% voter turnout for the primary election, including 330 absentee ballots.

"We have seven days to receive absentee ballots to count them. They must be postmarked on time, by election day to be counted," County Auditor-Treasurer Allen Paulson said. "We must notify any whose ballot is not counted."

"We usually pride ourselves on knowing the outcome of the election the same night, but that isn't possible now. It will more likely be at least a week or two before knowing the final results."

He was authorized to pay the submitted invoices of \$102,665 for the County Revenue Fund and \$3,559 for the Nursing Service Fund.

All Commissioners were present at the meeting.

Clearbrook-Gonvick plans to start school with regular classes

Clearbrook-Gonvick School staff continue to plan and prepare for the return of students to their regular classes for the start of the school year. Superintendent Jeff Burgess provided updates to the school board members at the regular meeting held on Monday, August 17th.

"The safety team met again to address the numbers and our recommendation has not changed as far as starting back in full. The positive count in Clearwater County is right now at zero. It's fourteen on the website, but the active case number is zero, so that's a positive sign for us," Burgess said. Burgess went on to explain that while numbers of COVID cases are on the rise in Beltrami County, the active cases are not located where students from the district reside.

As part of the plan to return to school, Burgess shared a new mask policy with the board members. The school is waiting for updated information from the Department of Health that will be necessary for preparing a plan that addresses how staff respond to positive cases in the school.

While school staff is planning to return to school, preparations are also needed for the possibility of a change to hybrid or distance learning if active case numbers begin to affect the district. Parents have been surveyed to select their preference of Monday/Tuesday or Wednesday/Thursday schedules if the district must move to hybrid learning. As they plan for a possible move to the hybrid model, the administration is addressing issues that include keeping class sizes even and managing bus capacities.

District administrators are providing communications to school families through social media. Zoom sessions are also

being held with parents to provide more details on this year's changes.

One change for the 2020-2021 school year has been in the planning for several years. With the new early childhood building addition nearly completed, the school is going ahead with plans to offer a five-day week at school for four-year-old children. In the past, the school has offered the School Readiness program three half-days each week for the young students. This School Readiness program can now expand to two and one-half days per week. In addition, the four-year-old students can attend an optional extra two and one-half days each week for a structured day program. In this new program, students will participate in breakfast, circle time, and other activities to help them learn about being in school and prepare them for kindergarten. There are fees for participation in some of the early childhood programs. The school will continue to offer Early Childhood and Family Education programs.

Superintendent Burgess told board members that once in-

spections are completed, the staff will be able to move into the new early childhood classrooms. This could be as early as next week. In other building issues, a leak has been located in the geothermal system. Repairs to this system have been scheduled for October.

The annual financial audit has been completed and Burgess expects the report to be available by the October meeting. The district's response to the coronavirus pandemic has brought extra expenses for technology and safety items. The administration hopes to use relief funds from the state to help cover some of the extra costs. At this time, the relief bill is in draft forms at both the House and Senate.

The board approved monthly payments including \$40,597.79 to Hill River Electric, \$6,154.64 to Clearwater-Polk Electric, \$4,399.71 and \$2,244.05 to Mar-co, \$3,260.00 to Dyrdaahl Construction, Inc., and \$1,929.65 to Garden Valley Telephone.

The next meeting of the Clearbrook-Gonvick School Board is scheduled for Monday, September 21, 2020 at 7:00 p.m.

Become an Extension Master Gardener

McIntosh, MN: (August 21, 2020)- Do you have an active interest in gardening? Do you have a desire to share your gardening interest with others? Are you willing to learn more about gardening and other horticultural topics? Are you able to communicate with groups of people? If you answered yes to any of these questions, you have the qualities we look for in the Extension Master Gardener program. The Polk County Master Gardeners is looking to grow. Apply today at z.umn.edu/mg2021app

In 2019, 2,408 certified Extension Master Gardeners volunteered across the state of Minnesota contributing over 140,000 volunteer hours and reached over 195,000 Minnesota residents. These volunteers are extremely dedicated and put in time and effort towards continuing education. If you believe that you have the skills and passion it takes to be an Extension Master Gardener, applications are open now until October 1, 2020.

The process of becoming an Extension Master Gardener begins with a Core Course which will be taken online for 2021. The core course takes approximately 50 hours to complete and cost \$320. Financial assistance is available on a case by case basis. You can talk to your local program coordinator if this is a barrier to your ability to join the program. We are happy to work with you to find a solution that works for all of us.

Extension Master Gardeners work hard to give back to their communities each year. As a first year Extension Master Gardener you will put in 50 hours of volunteer time. Each year after that the required amount is just

25 hours. Many volunteers far exceed this number, because they are excited and passionate about the program. Your local program coordinator and fellow volunteers will help you discover volunteer opportunities in your county. These opportunities may be tailored to your specific areas of interests.

This is an active set of cases, we cannot divulge much other than to say we need citizen eye witness statements to build a case we don't see ourselves. As you all know, it is difficult to be everywhere at once and there are only so many hours in a day. Please help us. Third party reports don't help the court case, hearing from a "reliable" source doesn't help us. We have chased down several leads that did not pan out. If you know something, talk to an officer. Date and time of the crime or incident you observed, your full information and a willingness to testify in court.

Most misdemeanor crimes are non-arrestable if they do not happen in our presence. This means it may be a citeable crime that takes up to a month or more to even have a first appearance in court. We are frustrated with the time it takes to process these kinds of thing, trust me, we are. That is why I am asking for your help. None of us want to spend hours building a case only to have it thrown out because it is incomplete or there isn't enough evidence or statements.

If you've seen something and are willing to testify in court, private message us and we will see what we can put together. Thanks Clearbrook!

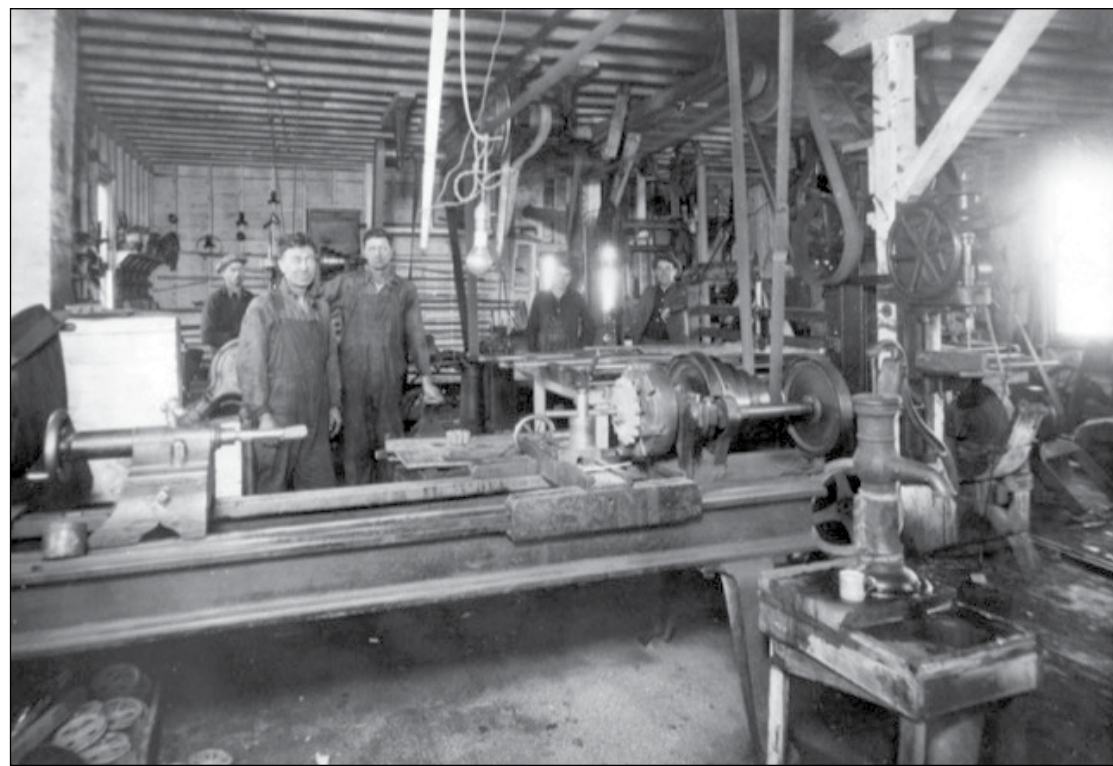

Gonvick City Council meets August 13

The Gonvick City Council at their monthly meeting in August had invited Clearwater County Sheriff Darin Halverson to their meeting to discuss police protection and policy in the county. He was accompanied by Vern Wittenberg also with the county. He informed the council of the hours that the department covers the northern part of the county. There are eight people in the sheriff department that covers the county. Each week Halverson supplies a report on the activity in the townships and the towns that the sheriffs department responds to. Last week in the paper there were 141 records. Council members wanted to be better informed as to what is going on in the local towns both from the sheriffs department and the Clearbrook-Gonvick Police Department.

The council received a letter from David Bakke, a land owner in the City of Gonvick with suggestions for improvements to the city. He has also been helping Gonvick City Maintenance man Dan Johnson with fixing up the water main breaks and trucking asphalt from Knife River near Bemidji.

Blight issues were discussed with Dan Gazelka. He provided a complaint form that could be filled out and he would then proceed with notifying the person about the blight.

Disposal of the spoilage that has piled up at the city shop was discussed. It was materials that had been taken up from the water main breaks that would not be put back as it was mixed with various materials. Jon Watne will remove it in exchange for the plowing he did last winter when there was a huge amount of snow piled up.

Pumpkin day was discussed. There will be a car show with the pumpkin weigh off. With the COVID19 restrictions there will not be any kids games or drawings.

The Fire Department did not have any issues except that they will be having a fireman retiring and they will be looking for another one to fill David Eries place.

Police report was given with 35 incidents. They include: 911 Hang Up 2; Alarm 1; Assault 1; Assist 1; Burglary 1; Disorderly 1; Fireworks 1; Information Only 4; Medical 5; Missing/Lost Person 1; Motor Vehicle Crash 1; Motor Vehicle Theft 1; Officer Detail 1; Sexual Conduct 1; Suspicious Activity 1; Theft 1; Traffic Stop 7; Vehicle Lock Out 1; Warrant - Attempt to Arrest 1; Welfare Check 2.

Bills were paid for General \$29,708.37; Water and Sewer \$4,452.05; Fire \$1,552.52 for a total of \$35,742.93.

machine was built in Bagley and sold all over the Red River Valley. He sold this business in 1925 and went into the building material business. He perfected a method of building houses with vertical grooved logs. The old hospital and many houses throughout the county are built with this method.

Gilbert was a charter member of the Farmers Co- Op Elevator, building its first structure. He helped organize Dist. 30, and he organized the first mail route out of Bagley. He

also helped establish the first county fair. He recalled that before the Depot was built, he telegraphed to Fosston for a Doctor so he probably sent the first telegraph from Bagley. Gilbert was at work in his shop when he suddenly died on May 11, 1942 at the age of 78.

The History Center in Shevlin is currently closed due to the Covid19 pandemic. While you can't visit the museum, the staff will provide stories from our county's past. "The ABC's of Clearwater County" in the meantime.

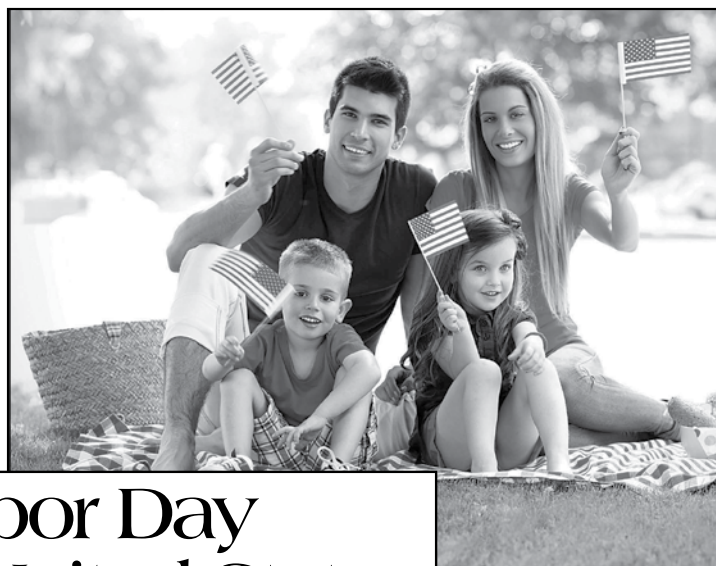

His final regular appearance on 60 Minutes aired on October 2, 2011; he died a month later at the age of 92

Andy Rooney and his prayer:

I don't believe in Santa Claus, but I'm not going to sue somebody for singing a Ho-Ho-Ho song in December. I don't agree with Darwin, but I didn't go out and hire a lawyer when my high school teacher taught his Theory of Evolution.

Life, liberty or your pursuit of happiness will not be endangered because someone says a 30-second prayer before a football game. So what's the big deal? It's not like somebody is up there reading the entire Book of Acts. They're just talking to a God they believe in and asking Him to grant safety to the players on the field and the fans going home from the game.

But it's a Christian prayer, some will argue.

Yes, and this is the United States of America, founded on Christian principles. According to our very own phone book, Christian churches outnumber all others better than 200-to-1. So what would you expect -- somebody chanting Hare Krishna?

If I went to a football game in Jerusalem, I would expect to hear a Jewish prayer.

If I went to a soccer game in Baghdad, I would expect to hear a Muslim prayer.

If I went to a ping pong match in China, I would expect to hear someone pray to Buddha.

And I wouldn't be offended. It wouldn't bother me one bit.

When in Rome

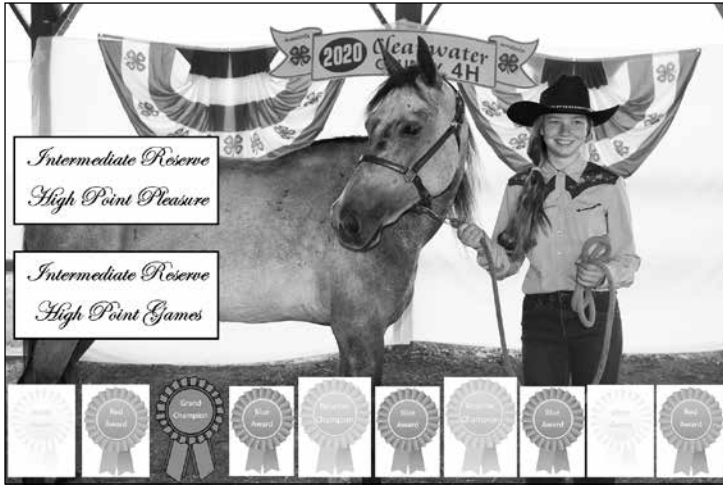

If you think that recycling isn't worth the bother, think about what it costs you to throw your recyclables in the trash. Clearwater County pays tipping fees by the ton for trash hauled to the Fosston Incinerator. As the tonnage increases, the costs also increase. A state-of-the-art Materials Recov-

ery Facility (MRF) recovers recyclables from trash, but the MRF operates more efficiently if it's separating mixed recyclables only, rather than recyclables from trash. Some of the recyclables aren't pulled out and end up in the landfill. Not only that, but the tipping fee for mixed recyclables is ZERO, which saves the county money!

You can reduce the volume of rubbish by recycling your paper, cardboard, plastic food and beverage containers, steel cans and, of course, aluminum and glass containers!
