Trail on private land not for public use until December 1st

Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR), Parks and Trails unit, have issued a public reminder to all winter trail users that pre-season use of snowmobile and cross-country ski trails in rural areas may be a violation of state and local trespass laws.

The Clearwater Trail Blazers Snowmobile Club Inc, along with the DNR, would like to remind the public that much of Minnesota's winter recreation trail system is actually built on private land, except for those trails within state parks and public forests.

Most snowmobile trails are

Grant-In-Aid Trails and are developed and maintained as cooperative, cost-sharing projects between the DNR and private snowmobile clubs or local trail associations.

Minnesota's Grant-In-Aid Trail legislation allows trails to be designated for public use by licensed snowmobiles between December 1 and March 31 each season.

The rest of the year—from April 1 thru November 30—any trail segment on private land is not considered a public trail; and use of the trail by unauthorized persons is a violation of state and local trespass laws.

Unauthorized use occurs primarily on agriculture land in our area when we receive early season snowfall, anyone using a snowmobile trail in off-season should make sure they are on public land and not trespassing on private property. If you ever wonder why we have trails in the ditches, this is the reason!

Please remember the trails are open for use starting December 1, if and when snow permits. We must respect the rights of our landowners or we may lose our right to use their lands. Thank you for your cooperation.

- BATHROOM – There is a porta potty available to give guests an option to use a restroom while in line.
- There is no registration necessary for this month's distribution.
- To limit our volunteer's exposure to germs, have exact change ready (\$20 cash per bundle) to give at the front of the line. No change will be given.
- Do NOT bring your own totes or boxes. Everything will be packaged and ready to go for you. Sorry there will be no choices or requests honored.
- BE PREPARED - Be sure your trunk/cargo area is emptied and ready to fill. We will NOT put your bundles inside the

passenger area of your vehicle. Make sure your trunk or hatch is open and ready to receive your bundle while you're in line (prior to you getting to the front of the line). Trucks are preferred for ease for our volunteers and to limit contact between our volunteers and guests.

- Please be patient, there may be wait times. All of this is new to us and we are doing the best we can. If everyone follows the above guidelines, things should flow quickly and smoothly.
- We have the right to refuse anyone who does not follow these instructions.

Thank you so much for your understanding and patience during this time. We know this is a difficult time for so many and want to be able to bless as many people as possible. God bless you, see you on the 2nd.

Send Packages Early This Holiday Season

Postal Service Sunday Package Delivery will Expand to Select Major Markets

MINNEAPOLIS, MN — It is expected that more holiday gifts and greetings will be sent through the mail this year, as families and friends will hold virtual celebrations instead of opening gifts in person. The Postal Service always encourages customers to send their holiday gifts and cards early. This year is no different.

This has been an extraordinary year of unprecedented challenges given the Covid-19 pandemic and the Postal Service is expecting significant volume increases which are difficult to predict. We thank our customers for their continued support, and we are committed to making sure gifts and cards are delivered on time to celebrate the holidays.

The Postal Service begins planning for peak holiday season every January. To help handle the expected volume increase, the Postal Service has the ability to flex our network to meet the significant volume in-

creases expected this year. This includes making sure the right equipment is available to sort, process and deliver the expected mail and package volumes. We also have 644,000 employees dedicated to ensuring gifts and greetings are delivered in time for the holidays.

Seasonal workers are hired when and where needed, and technology has been expanded to enhance package tracking throughout the USPS processing and transportation networks. Sunday delivery will be expanded beginning Nov. 29 to locations with high package volumes. USPS already delivers packages on Sundays in most major cities. Mail carriers will also deliver packages for an additional fee on Christmas Day in select locations.

Busiest Mailing and Delivery Days

The busiest time of the season peaks two weeks before Christmas, when much of the last-minute shopping starts. Customer traffic is expected to increase beginning Dec. 7, with the week of Dec. 14-21 predicted

to be the busiest mailing, shipping and delivery week.

Skip the Trip and Ship Online

Consumers don't have to leave home to ship their packages. In these socially distant times, they can simply visit usps.com or use the Click-N-SHIP feature for help shipping that holiday gift, ordering free Priority Mail boxes, printing shipping labels, purchasing postage and even requesting free next-day Package Pickup. And usps.com is always open.

Former County Sheriff Marcell Goodwin honored; Commissioners discuss employee safety - courthouse doors will remain open

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on November 17, 2020 beginning with a moment of silence to honor Marcell Goodwin who recently passed away. He was a former County Sheriff from 1983 to 1990.

Dan Hecht, Environmental Services Director opened a discussion with the Commissioners regarding the requesting of visitors to wear a mask while in the Courthouse, and how this affects employee safety.

"Most business can be done by phone," he said, "but one out of four or five who come into the courthouse seem to be unwilling to wear a mask. The rule here is to wear a mask."

Comments he has heard from some Drivers License Department employees included that there is a need to see something more done to protect employees (regarding possible spread of covid), and brought up the possibility that it may be time to consider once again closing the courthouse and have visitors call in to make appointments, in spite of the inconvenience.

He said there are people on both sides, who wish for more or less restrictions regarding wearing of masks, both in the courthouse and at the landfill. "By bringing this up, I did not mean to suggest we shut down services," Dan said.

"I would prefer to have the doors open," stated Commissioner Mark Titera. Commissioner Dean Newland agreed.

"This would be a hard time for closing the courthouse down again," stated Commissioner Newland. "Maybe we could put more on the signs regarding the

mask mandate," they concurred, suggesting putting signs out further from the door.

The question was presented as to how to enforce the mask requirement, and that it is hard for most employees to ask visitors to put on a mask.

It was stated that there is a need to be careful, either that or close everything down. If the courthouse were to be closed down, Al Paulson stated that employees would still be working in the courthouse, but that some people have been working from home.

Commissioner Mark Larson pointed out, "Most people are not picking it (the virus) up here, but in social settings." He thought they should take one step, and if need be to shut things down later.

"We can put up a couple more signs on the door, in the hall, and another and see if that helps," Commissioner Neal Illies said. He also stated that the ones getting it are getting it at home.

Dan Hecht thought that each department needs to be flexible, department by department.

Board Chairman Illies presented the question as to whether or not the Board wanted to make a motion to shut down the courthouse at this time. The consensus of the commissioners is to not shut down the courthouse. They will rather use some covid Cares funds to acquire additional signs, to take it meeting by meeting, and to keep the doors open.

"No one can fix everything, whether we want to or not," concluded Commissioner Larson.

County Auditor-Treasurer Allen Paulson received approval

from the Board for the 2019 Financial Statement.

He was authorized to pay the submitted invoices of \$66,545 for the County Revenue Fund and \$28,184 for the Nursing Service Fund.

It was decided that the county will not be doing the drones motion which was previously discussed, and the motion be taken off the list.

The county expects to be interviewing for the County Attorney and Veterans Service Officer positions in the near future.

Commissioner Titera stated that the County Land Ordinance has been tabled.

Truth in Taxation meeting will be held on December 1 at 5:00 p.m. at the Courthouse.

All Commissioners were present at the meeting: John Nelson, Neal Illies, Dean Newland, Mark Titera, and Mark Larson.

Correction

In last week's Leader-Record and Farmers Independent, it was incorrectly reported that the board passed a motion to adopt a camping ordinance.

What occurred is that Board Chairman Neal Illies asked that the commissioners take action based on the "Minnesota Administrative Rules" to create an ordinance regarding camping on county managed lands.

A motion was made by Commissioner Illies and seconded by Commissioner Mark Titera to proceed on starting the process to form an ordinance about camping on county land.

When the board met next on Nov 17, the board reached a consensus to not pursue such an ordinance at this time.

Once you receive the text with your completed order notice, you will be able to pick up your toys at the door. At that time, you will show your proof of Clearwater County residency to the staff.

The Clearwater Christmas Project toy and grocery voucher distribution will be on Wednesday, December 2, from 1:00-7:00 pm at the Timbers Event Center in Bagley. We look forward to making sure that the 2020 Christmas season is enjoyable for everyone!!

Recycling Saves YOU Disposal Fees

If you think that recycling isn't worth the bother, think about what it costs you to throw your recyclables in the trash. Clearwater County pays tipping fees by the ton for trash hauled to the Fosston Incinerator. As the tonnage increases, the costs also increase. A state-of-the-art Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) recovers recyclables from trash, but the MRF operates more efficiently if it's separating mixed recyclables only, rather than recyclables from trash. Some of the recyclables aren't pulled out and end up in the landfill. Not only that, but the tipping fee for mixed recyclables is ZERO, which saves the county money!

You can reduce the volume of rubbish by recycling your paper, cardboard, plastic food and beverage containers, steel cans and, of course, aluminum and glass containers! 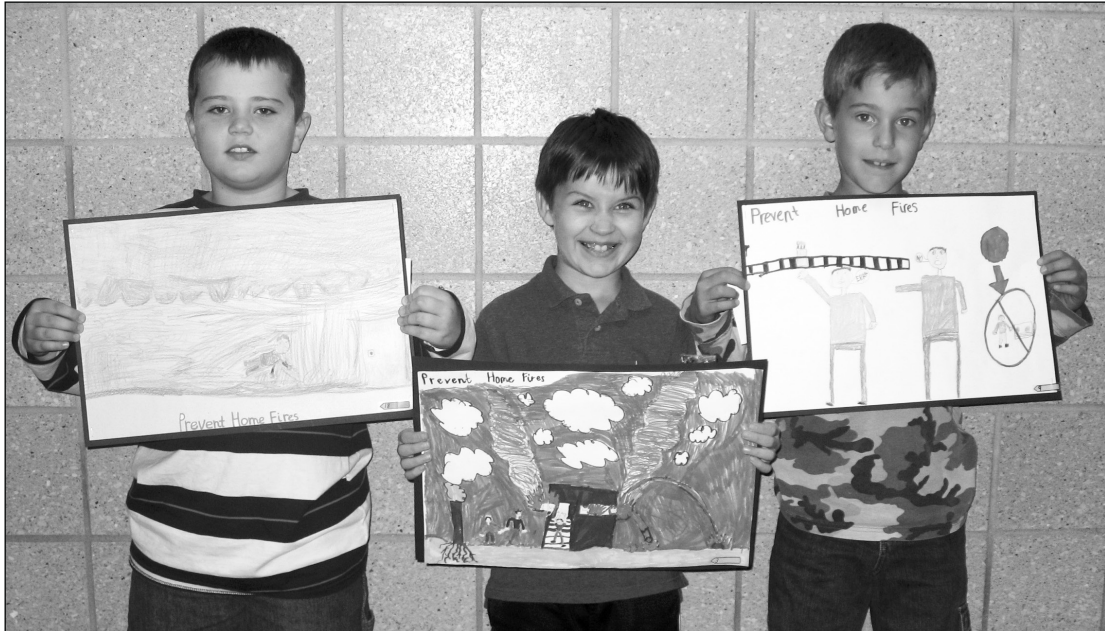
