Council hears proposal to buy land near Kloster Park

The Clearbrook City council held its regular monthly meeting on February 8, 2021 in the Clearbrook Community Room. At this meeting, council members considered a proposal by The Overland Group, LLC to buy land near Kloster Park. The company would use this location, currently owned by the city, to build a Dollar Store. The council members' discussion on the proposal highlighted concerns that established Clearbrook businesses that are locally owned would be negatively impacted by the addition of a Dollar Store. City staff members added that the land the proposal refers to is used by the city for dumping snow in the winter months and for parking during the baseball season. None of the council members expressed support for the sale.

Lucie Thompson, City Clerk also presented the official letter from the Minnesota Department of Health regarding the recent testing of the city's water. Residents will receive a letter explaining the manga-

nese test results in next month's utility bill.

Lucie updated the council members on the sale of the house near the pool. Once the final paperwork on the sale is received from the county, the house will be torn down. The city may use the lot for overflow parking for the City Pool. Lucie also explained that employee policies have been reviewed and the language has been updated as necessary. The council members will conduct employee reviews in the near future.

Mark Snobl and **Nick Rankin**, Utilities and Maintenance, told the council that the gym light installation is scheduled to start on Monday, February 15th. They continue to provide location services as needed for the pipeline construction and are working on year-end reports. A Clearbrook resident attended the meeting to clarify his request to remove dead trees that are on his fence line. The council gave their okay for him to cut the trees down.

Karra Weems, Liquor Store Manager, informed the council

that the Super Bowl event at the bar was well attended. Council members discussed reinstating the Community Club meat raffles. The state health department currently allows bars and restaurants to be open at 50% capacity.

Police Chief Dan Gazelka reported that the department handled 42 incidents in January. The fire department responded to eight medical calls, one structure fire, one motor vehicle accident and a false alarm at Riviana Foods. According to Fire Chief Adam Krog, department members received training on rescue equipment in January. The pick-up that was donated by Enbridge has been received. It will require some work as well as modifications before it is ready for fire department use. Department members are hoping to hold their annual fish fry and raffle fundraiser in April.

The council approved the monthly claims of \$31,774.76 and additional claims of \$108,829.76.

Engineer, Dan Sauv   deems 3 bridges as deficient

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on February 9, 2021 to hear from the Veterans Service Officer, Soil and Water District, Engineer, County Attorney, and Auditor Treasurer.

Veterans Service Officer and County Safety Coordinator, Logan LeClair brought the Safety Program Policy Statement for 2021, which the Commissioners consider to be of prime importance. It states in part: "Hazard control is key to our culture of safety awareness, and ultimately provides for the well-being of our employees and the public we serve... Clearwater County has every desire to provide a safe and healthful working environment for its employees."

All commissioners approved the new Safety Program Policy Statement for 2021, which depends on the cooperative efforts of all employees by their participation and support to succeed.

County Engineer, Dan Sauv   has determined that the following deficient bridges on CSAH, County Road, and Township systems are a high priority and require replacement or rehabilitation within the next five (5) years: Bridge L1671 located on Pine Lake Twp. T46 over Lost River at an estimated project cost of \$130,000; Bridge 92229 located on CSAH 9 over Silver Creek at an estimated project cost of \$210,000; and Bridge L1496 on Eddy Twp. T17 over Lost River at an estimated project cost of \$130,000.

He received approval to pay the Highway Department bills in the amount of \$97,449.

A motion was made by Commissioner John Nelson, and seconded by Commissioner Mark Larson, stating that Clearwater County concurs that Reiersen

Construction, Inc. is the apparent low bidder for the City of Clearbrook Street and Utility project, which includes County State Aid projects. Clearwater County agrees to pay the estimated bid price of \$1,269,050 for work on these projects, and agrees with the City to award the project to Reiersen of Bemidji. The motion passed.

The Highway Department was authorized to purchase a Waste Oil Burner from Lanair Products of Janesville, Wisconsin in the amount of \$5,224. This is to replace a 15 year old unit that is no longer working.

Chester Powell, Program Technician of Soil and Water Conservation District informed the Commissioners that the Wild Rice-Marsh River Watershed Management Plan has been approved according to Minnesota Statutes and Board Resolutions and is done at this time.

He brought information regarding the estimated cost distribution discussed at the Steering Committee meetings. A grant in the amount of nearly \$1.4 million, in which the counties of Clearwater, Mahnomen, Norman and East and West Polk Soil and Water Conservation Districts are participating with the Wild Rice-Marsh River Watershed Districts. Becker County did not sign on.

"Everybody is liable for their own employees when they turn in a work plan," Chester stated. "You can exit with a 30 day notice, and are liable for a project until the end of the grant, every two years."

The project will be discussed at the next meeting to consider adoption and implementation of the plan, after the commissioners have time to review the information.

The money is estimated to be divided between 69% for cost of the projects, 30% for Capital Improvements, with 10% county match, often made up by the Watershed or land owner; and is covered by current budgets of counties, Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD), and Watershed Districts (WD).

The Mississippi Watershed is on a 60 day review, which is almost done. A budget of \$246,000 has been set for Clearwater. A meeting to discuss that is set for February 24.

Attorney Kathryn Lorschbach, received Board approval to Implement the County Guidelines and Procedures for the Minnesota Data Practices Act as of February 9, 2021; with motions being made by Commissioner Neal Illies and seconded by Commissioner Mark Titera.

County Auditor Allen Paulson received approval of a motion to have Board Chairman sign the ratification for the extension of CamaUSA and the Property Tax System Maintenance and Support Agreements between Minnesota Counties Computer Cooperative and Avenu providing an extension for support for CamaUSA from January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2023.

The Board approved the appointment of Amy Berg to the County Extension Committee for a three year term, from January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2023.

The Auditor-Treasurer was authorized to pay the submitted invoices of \$108,770 from the County Revenue Fund and \$39,276 from the Nursing Service Fund.

All Commissioners were present at the meeting: Mark Larson, Mark Titera, Dean Newland, John Nelson, and Neal Illies.

My brother and I, along with our wives, have spent countless hours creating, what we hope, are cattle that will fit consumer demands for the next decade. The modern beef consumer wants quality beef, consistently. We strive to produce cattle that will hang a carcass which fits that need. Our Red Angus bulls rank in the top 23% and 17% for Marbling and Ribeye Area, respectively. Our Gelbvieh bulls rank in near the top half of the breed for all measured carcass traits. However, before the cattle get to the rail, they need to work for you on the farm. The Gelbvieh bulls rank in the top 20% of the breed for calving ease, yet rank in the top 40% of the breed for growth. It's hard to find a better numbered set of bulls that can hang that kind of carcass. The Red Angus bulls are no less impressive. They rank in the top 40% of the breed for calving ease, while ranking in the TOP 12% and 15% of the breed for weaning and yearling weights! And if you want to make a group of top notch cows, both set of bulls rank in the top 25% of the breed for milk production! I challenge you to find a more complete set of bulls in country. To top it all off, while the ration was designed for about 3.4 lb/day of ADG, these bulls gained over 4.5 lb/day during their test period. Strands Store in Leonard seeing more customers

(LEONARD, MINN) Niki Cole had been a strong supporter of Line 3 for years because she thought it was important to replace aging infrastructure like pipelines. Now that construction work has started, Cole said the project has not only delivered on the promised economic boost it would bring, the workers have brought important new positive energy to the Leonard community. Cole owns the Strands Store in Leonard that also serves as the town's post office. She said her business immediately increased when construction started and others in the small community are seeing the same positive results.

"We are a small rural town without any stop signs or stop lights and have 7 great local businesses," Niki Cole said. "Not only have I watched more customers come into my store, the other local businesses are now serving the construction workers and also seeing an increase in sales and traffic. Beyond the fact we have more customers, the construction workers have been embraced by local residents and we have truly enjoyed making new friends and getting to know our great visitors."

After more than five years of review by regulators, there are now more than 5,000 people working on the Line 3 project in 14 counties across Northern Minnesota. While construction work continues, project opponents have unsuccessfully tried to use legal action to stop the project. This

week, a federal appellate court judge denied a request by opponents to stop work by making unfounded claims related to the environmental review. The federal denial follows a decision by the Minnesota Court of Appeals to reject a petition from the Red Lake band and the White Earth band of Ojibwe to halt construction.

The Line 3 process started in 2014 during the Obama-Biden

Administration. Enbridge submitted their application to the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission (PUC) in 2015 to replace Line 3 as part of the company's integrity and maintenance driven program. The Line 3 project is the most reviewed pipeline project in Minnesota history and has been reviewed by state and federal

For Cole and other Line 3 supporters, seeing work start and then be allowed to continue has been important to them and their community. "We are relieved and incredibly happy the courts reviewed all the work that went into the permits and denied attempts to stop construction," Cole said. "Beyond the impact on my business, had work been stopped by the courts - it would have been devastating for the people and their livelihoods. It is inspiring to get to know the hardworking pipeliners, who are doing a much-needed job of restoring Line 3."

Cole moved to Leonard, MN in 2000 from Lincoln, Nebraska where she had been working for a large manufacturing company that had global customers. The decision to move to Leonard was an easy one because she had vacationed in the area often and had thought Clearwater County was ideal location to raise a family.

In 2006 Niki saw a 'for sale' sign in the window of the Strands Store and bought it on the spot. The Strands Store first opened in the year 1915 and became a contracted Postal Unit in the year 1986. All regular services of a post office are available on-site including post office boxes that are leased by local residents and/or businesses. The original owners (Strand Family) had a scale in the store that was used to weigh goods, produce, and often times to weigh babies. Today the original scale remains in the store being used for exactly those same things.

For Cole, the store is more than a just a business to her. It's a chance to connect with and support the community. "Owning the store is great but what is even better is the chance it gives me every day to help people," Cole said. "A good example is doing what I can to show how much we love the workers. Recently a pipeliner came into my store and wanted to know where he could buy good crawfish in the area. Instead of sending him someplace else, I went to my freezer where I pulled out a package of frozen crawfish my friend had shipped to me from Mississippi. The pipeliner said, how much do I owe you? I replied, not a thing. Enjoy."

Thoughts from the Sheriff

Clearwater County Sheriff Darin Halverson



So far this winter we have been fortunate to have mild temperatures and little snow. This week, however, has brought us back to reality and we are experiencing frigid temperatures. This month, I want to remind people who own a pet or livestock to take extra measures to provide food, shelter and water for your animals. Winter is a tough time for all of us, animals included, and when we get sub-zero temperatures it makes it that much worse. I also want to bring attention to Minnesota law as it relates to the care of animals.

One of the most common complaints we receive in the winter months are about pet dogs not being provided adequate shelter. Minnesota State Statute 343.40 states that "a person in charge of a dog shall provide shelter and bedding if that dog is kept outdoors or in an unheated enclosure." In addition, "The shelter must be moisture proof and windproof and of adequate size for the dog. The floor must be constructed out of durable materials and be moisture proof or be raised at least two inches from the ground." Bedding such as straw, wood chips, blankets or the equivalent are also required. Between November 1 and March 31 of each year, the structure must also have a windbreak at the entrance.

There is a subdivision to this statute specific to farm dogs. Dogs that are kept on a farm and

have access to a barn with sufficient loose hay or bedding do not have to abide by the rules mentioned above. The bottom line is that you must provide shelter for your dog to protect it from cold temperatures and promote the retention of body heat.

Another question people often ask is what are the requirements for feeding and watering of their animals during winter months. Minnesota State Statute 346.38 states that horses must be "provided with sufficient food of quality and quantity to allow for normal growth." Water must be provided in sufficient quantity to satisfy the animal's needs or supplied by free choice such as a water trough. According to Minnesota law, "snow and ice are not an adequate water source."

As far as cattle go, Minnesota State Statute 343.21 subdivision 4 states that "No person shall feed any cow on food that produces impure or unwholesome milk." Basically, you must feed your cattle food with proper nutrients or provide other forms of nutrients to keep them healthy. Since the sale of cattle is where farmers make their money, this isn't usually a huge issue. Sometimes, however, a person is found not properly taking care of their cattle and these are handled on a case-by-case basis.

If our office receives an animal complaint, we are obligated to investigate. Clearwater County uses the services of an animal

control officer employed by the City of Bagley to look into these cases or a deputy is assigned. Occasionally, reports are made directly to the Minnesota Federated Humane Society and they come to investigate.

Often, when someone decides to call our office regarding the treatment of animals, it is because they have a difference of opinion with someone else about the care being given. Law enforcement must decide, after the case has been investigated, as to what adequate care is and what isn't. Minnesota law, along with the Clearwater County Animal Ordinance, are reviewed and considered. The way many of the laws are written are open for interpretation. Officers must consider them and use their own common sense to resolve these situations.

Many times, it is difficult to satisfy both sides. Most of these issues are resolved by simply talking to the party not caring for their animal(s) and educating them on what they need to do and the problem is fixed. Very seldom does the situation come down to a criminal complaint being filed and the person having to come to court and possibly paying a fine.

I hope this article will help people understand animal laws in Minnesota and what our office does in these cases. I would encourage anyone interested in animal laws to do their own research for additional information. The bottom line is, if you want to own an animal, then it is your responsibility to provide adequate care for them. Please do your part to make sure your animals don't suffer this winter.

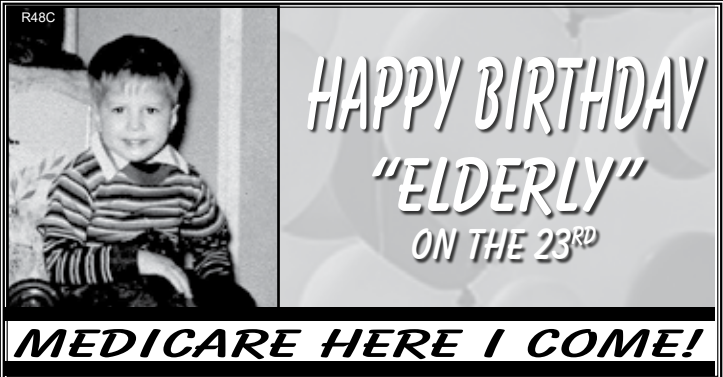

He deeded it to his son Tom who added and H to his name to Huseth. His wife Marie took over the farm in 1950 and in 1975 it went to her son Gordon and his wife Dianne Huseth. Diane L. Huseth - Godtland took over in 1996 and is the present owner.

They used big beautiful Percheron horses to do the work on the farm. Diane also wrote a poem about the farm.

Hedin Junior had the farm until the present day.

Lorena Merseth - 1995

Bernhard and Lina Merseth homesteaded the property in section 21 of Township 48. He came from Norway and farmed from 1896 to 1946 when his son Edwin and wife Leona Merseth took over until 1980. John and Lorena Merseth are the present farm owners.

Joel and Enice Nordlund - 1996

John and Marie Nordlund from Sweden settled in Section 15 of Eddy Township in 1896 until 1946. Their son Joel and wife Enice Nordlund are the current owners of the property.

Myrtle Nordlund - 1997

Lars Nordlund was the original owner of Section 21 in Eddy Township. He farmed the land until 1954 when his son George Nordlund took over. In 1986 George's wife Myrtle took over until the present time.

Raymond Odegaard - 1996

Peter Odegaard came from Norway and was a carpenter until he homesteaded in 1896. He had to live on the land for seven years before he was given Homestead rights. In 1931 his wife Len took over the farm until 1950 when Raymond Odegaard took over.

They had small grains, and dairy cattle. The property was not taxed until 1903.

Claude Pearson - 1998

John E. Pearson came from Wisconsin to Section 11 in Pine Lake Township. In 1896 to 1925 he and his wife Laura farmed. He had worked in a Land Bank. Laura farmed until their son Claude J. Pearson took over in 1979.

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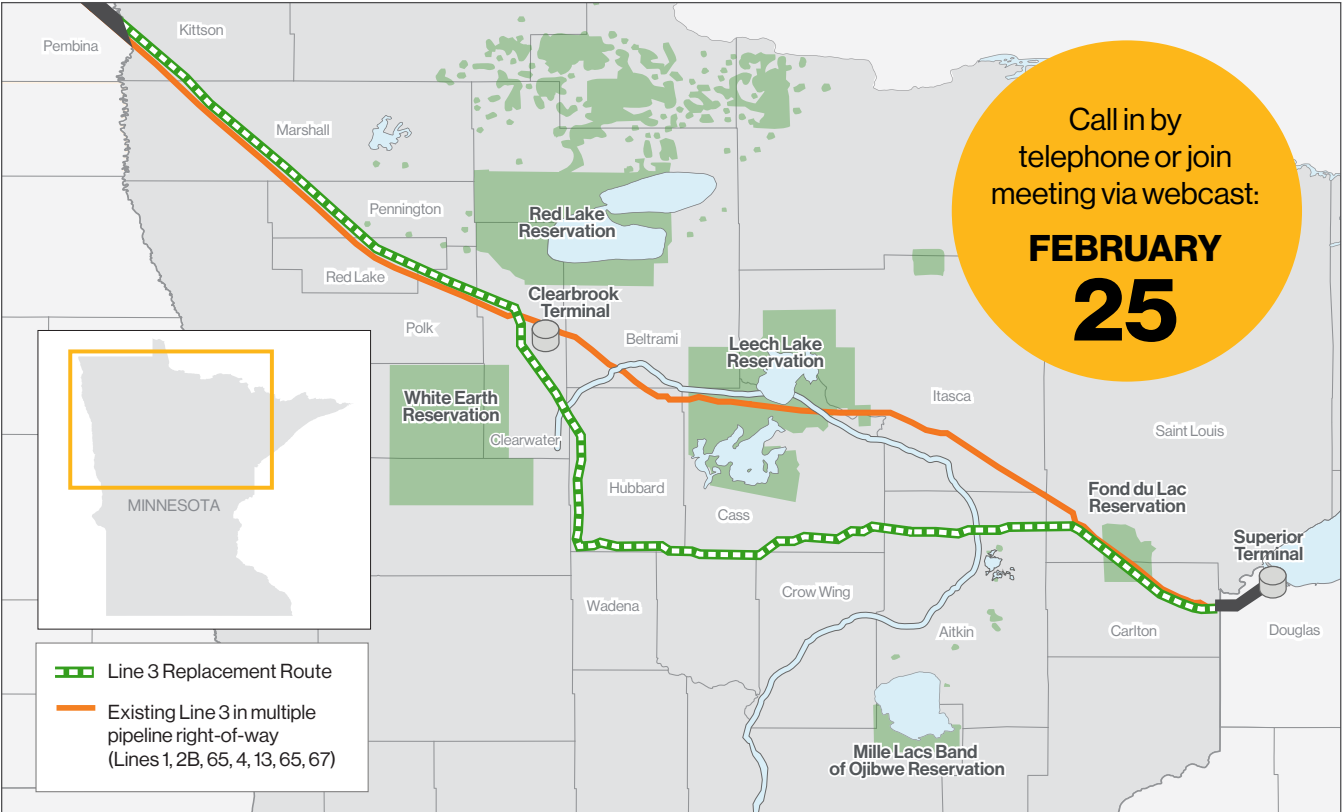

Most importantly, we've been listening. From the start, we respected the wishes of the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe to route the new Line 3 around their reservation. We've also signed a 20-year easement renewal with the Fond du Lac Band and made further route changes based on the Tribal Cultural Resources Survey results.
