Gonvick Council has regular meeting

Gonvick City Council at their July meeting set the Rural Service Benefit Ratio at the same as it has been in the past years at 70%. That is the taxes that are paid by residents who live north of the fire department in Gonvick. This is reduced for those residents as they are not receiving water and sewer on the north side of the river.

Carol Peterson has volunteered her service to assist City Clerk during emergency back up.

Ryan Solee, Clearbrook, Gonvick Police, updated the council on how to handle blight issues more effectively through state statute. He will be meeting with Clearwater County Attorney Kathren Lorsback to update the ordinance so that Gonvick and Clearbrook will be more the same. In the August meeting he will give the council the update and in September to make any changes that may be made. The police department has had a budget meeting and they are sitting good financially.

He gave the council the incident report for a total of 18. They included: Alarm 1, Animal Related 1, Assist Other Agency 3, City Ordinance 1, Civil Complaint 1, Civil Process 1, Crimes Against Family 1, Fraud 1, Harassment 1, Information Only 1, Theft 1, Traffic Complaint 1, Traffic Stop 2, Vehicle Lock Out 1.

Dan Johnson, City Maintenance had a resident who would like to park a semi-trailer on the Gonvick City grounds near the rodeo grounds. The council approved temporarily.

There were no fire department issues except they were called out for a grass fire near Gully. They were also called to the accident east of Gonvick.

With the water so low at the creek down by the Gonvick Fire Hall fish are unable to move down stream. Nothing can be done until it rains and fills up the hole. The council renewed the CD for the Water Fund of \$63,056.21 at .070 %.

Expenditures were approved for Water and Sewer \$5,345.22, General \$19,733.39, Fire \$2,665.62 for a total of \$17,744.23.

As drought continues, risk of equipment-caused wildfire increases

With the ongoing drought increasing the risk of wildfire in northern Minnesota, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources urges off-road vehicle, heavy equipment and agricultural operators to be cautious in these dry conditions, as they could unintentionally spark a fire.

Equipment use is a major cause of wildfires every year, but Minnesota's wildland fire management agencies report

an uptick in recent weeks of equipment-caused wildfires due to extremely dry grasses and brush.

"Proper equipment use includes knowing the fire danger condition before you operate and making appropriate adjustments or delays to your planned activities," said Ben Lang, Bemidji Area Forestry assistant supervisor.

Lang said it takes about 500 degrees to start a wildfire in

the summer, and that exhaust systems on both road and recreational vehicles can reach temperatures of more than 1,000 degrees. "Use good judgement, avoid parking or operating in tall grasses or brush where exhaust systems could ignite vegetation, and keep ATVs on the trail," he said.

In addition, various farm, construction, logging, welding, and lawn equipment have an assortment of belts, chains,

buckets and blades capable of creating sparks when they hit against rocks or hard surfaces.

In northwestern Minnesota, mowing and haying activity is ongoing, and the coming wheat harvest later this month also brings concern for potential wildfire, especially as July and August are typically drier months.

Lang encourages the following tactics to keep equipment from turning into fire starters:

- Make sure equipment has undergone maintenance and is fire safe, including use of an approved spark arrester on all internal combustion-powered equipment.

- When hauling equipment, take care to ensure trailer chains are not dragging, as this can create sparks on roadways.

- Always check current fire danger conditions at the DNR statewide fire danger and burning restrictions map and adjust or postpone operations as necessary.

People who do spot a wildfire, should call 911.

Thoughts from the Sheriff

Clearwater County Sheriff Darin Halverson



I hope everyone is having a great summer and getting out and enjoying outdoor activities. It is hard to believe that it has been two years since we had a county fair, but in just three weeks it will be here for everyone to enjoy. Some other county fairs have already happened and others are going on right now, so I wanted to put out some safety reminders for people venturing out to one of these venues.

The first piece of advice I have is to not over stretch yourself when it comes to bringing young children to the fair. It is difficult at times to watch two or three children, but if you have a larger group it becomes nearly impossible for you to keep track of all of them, especially if you are alone. Every year at the fair we get reports of lost children. This can be very stressful for the adults, but can be more traumatizing for the young child once they realize they cannot find their parent or other trusted adult. The first thing you should do is talk with your little ones about staying in one spot if they become separated from you. Secondly, take a picture of any young children you have with you when you arrive at the fair. In the

event that one goes missing, it will help law enforcement, or others, know who to look for. There are so many young children at the fair that it is difficult to locate any one child, and even harder if you don't really know who you are looking for. At a minimum, have a good description of what they are wearing as that can be helpful in finding them. Lastly, if a child becomes missing, either call law enforcement or go to the fair office to report it right away.

Be sure to have a meeting place for you and your family if you have older children and they are left to enjoy the fair with their friends. Having a meeting place is a great idea and can be very important in the case of bad weather. If a strong storm develops and we have to evacuate the midway, having a meeting place picked out ahead of time will help in accounting for all your family/friends and avoid the unnecessary time delay it may take to find everyone. Sometimes, severe weather can develop quickly and if you are not paying attention, it can be on top of you before you know it.

In addition to personal safety reminders, remember to keep

your vehicle locked and valuables out of sight. With the amount of people that come to the fair, there are always some who are there for illegal intentions. If your vehicle is unlocked it is easy for someone to quickly gain access inside. If you have anything of value laying around, it will most likely go missing. There are also those that are looking for transportation and if you have left your keys inside, your car may go missing.

It is just as important to be careful with personal belongings that you have on your person, such as cell phones, purses or wallets. Be sure not to leave them laying in a stroller or on a counter if you are eating or playing a game. It only takes a split second for someone to grab that item and walk off with it. Keep your valuables secure and out of sight.

One last reminder is pay attention to where you are parking. It is illegal to park within a crosswalk, within 20 feet of a crosswalk at an intersection and within 30 feet from a stop sign. In addition, you cannot park in front of a driveway or within 10 feet of a fire hydrant. Parking complaints are one of the major calls for service during the fair.

People will park just about anywhere. If you are obstructing any flow of traffic, you probably should reconsider where you are parked and move to a different location. Also, be considerate to handicapped drivers. The fair posts areas for handicapped people to park, however, there

are people who will even park in those places just to get a good parking space. Remember to be considerate and use common sense so everyone can have a safe and enjoyable fair.

I hope you're having a great summer and I hope to see many of you at this year's fair. We will have our new Emergency Management Mobile Command bus parked near the hockey arena. Please stop by and say "Hi" and get some of your law enforcement questions answered and take a tour of the bus. We look forward to seeing you.

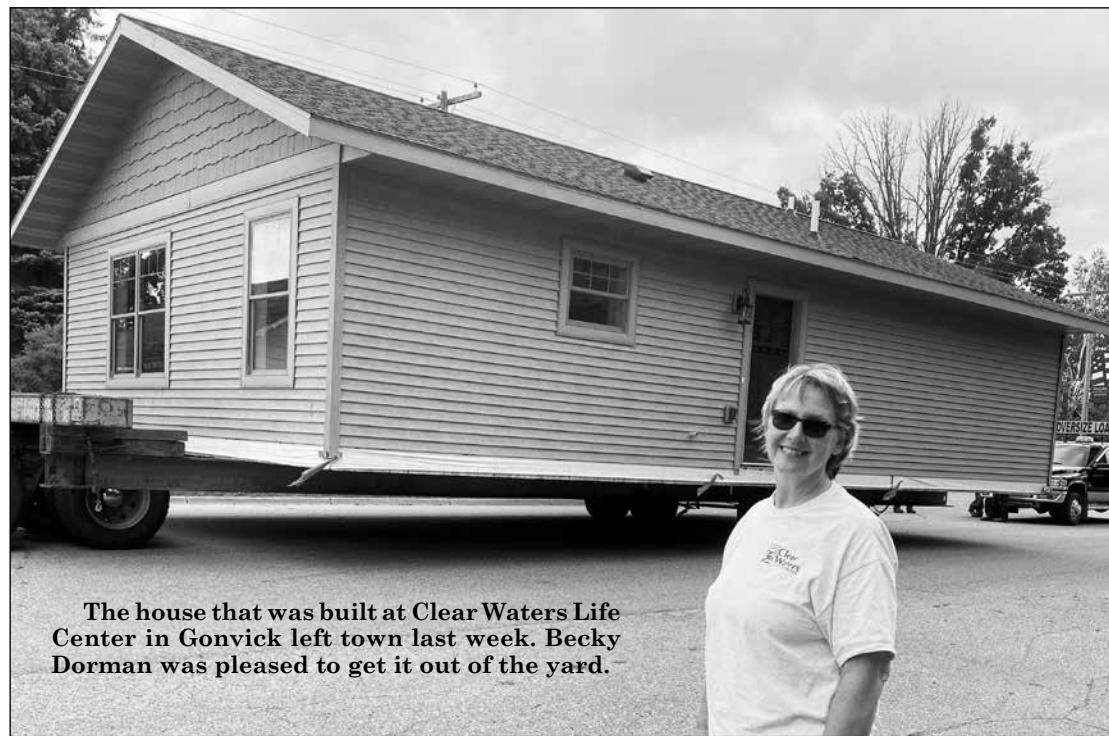
