Clearbrook City Council receives ordinance

Police Chief Ryan Solee and County Attorney Kathryn Lorschbach brought the proposed Public Nuisance Ordinance to the Clearbrook City County at their regular monthly meeting on Monday, September 13. She stated that she had structured it after one similar to the ones used at Park Rapids. This would give her tools to go forth in the court system for people who violate the ordinance. That included deteriorated structures, firewood, high grass, junk or rubbish, noxious and virulent weeds, unsafe buildings, public nuisances affecting health, public nuisances affecting public peace and safety.

Solee is waiting for approval from the state for \$2,552.00 which will be used for state training.

He had 48 incidents for the month of August. They included:

ed: 911 Hang Up, 1; Alarm 2; Assist 6; Assist Other Agency 1; City Ordinance 2; Civil complaint 1; Court Order Violation 1; Disturbance 5; Fraud 1; Information Only 1; Medical 8; Motorist Assist 1; Motor Vehicle Crash 1; Office Detail 1; Search Warrant 1; Suspicious Activity 2; Threats 1; traffic Stop 5; Transport 1; warrant Arrest 1 and welfare Check 2.

Solee also informed the council that they have 18 hours of Traffic Enforcement saturation which they will be doing along Highway 92. There is Pumpkin Day in Gonvick on September 25 and that could be used there.

Scott Anderson gave the Clearbrook Fire Department report. They are now storing two trucks in a different shed because of the roads that are under construction. They are planning a Fall Banquet on October 16. The 4th annual banquet will be open at 5 with the meal at 6. They will be having raffle tickets for 4 different prizes. The ticket will include a chance on the prize and will include the meal. They are looking at buys 2 skid units for \$12,000 and the money will come from the fish fry and the DNR reimbursement. They have had 108 calls for the year. In August it amounted to 21 calls for the fire department. 15 of them were medical, 2 grass fires, 2 fire alarms, 1 vehicle accident and 1 rescue.

City Clerk Lucie Thompson gave the Municipal Liquor Store report for Karra Weems as it was busy at the liquor store with the many people who were camping in the park. They were

riding bicycles to Duluth and they stopped in the park for the night. It was a pretty good month with a profit of \$4,400 and that included 3 payrolls. She was asking for thoughts to be open on Sunday for football . The council will look at it again to see if it should be open with the short staff. There will be two more weddings in October and there was concern as to parking by the community center for both events. They are also looking at purchasing some new bars stools for the liquor store.

Mark Snobl and Nick Rankin gave the Utilities and Maintenance report. September 18 will be the annual well inspection and the wells look good. Enbridge is in need of 50,000 gallons of water a day

to get the project done. The furnace in the utility room needs parts to get it fixed. They have contacted several vendors to see what can be done. Agua Marine came and winterized the pool. The bathrooms will have to be done at a later date. The trail through town will need to be cleaned during the winter. In order to keep it clean they were looking a 10 foot bucket for the skid steer. It will also need new tracks. They are looking at prices by leasing for buying. Will have more information at the next meeting.

City Clerk Luci Thompson gave her report. The council passed a motion to pay Reirson Construction Inc. for the 4th installment of the contract for the Street and Utility improvements for \$741,713.29. 68 percent of the main line is in the ground. 50 percent will

need to be tarred according to the contract. One gray area was discussed on when the yards of area residents will be fixed. Nothing was done on the west side of Highway 92 this year.

Sara and Ken Stoller were issued a building permit to remodel and add on a porch.

The council approved the donation to the City of \$221.09 from the Clearbrook Community Club for a donation to Kloser Park for Trailer and Leaf Blower; \$626.80 from the Clearbrook Community Club for a donation to Kloster Park for Catcher Gear for Boys and

Girls; \$50 from Deann Dyrdaal for the Community Pool and \$500 from Larry Shelquist for the Community Pool.

A resolution approving the preliminary 2021 tax levy collectible in 2022 was made for \$235,000.

Bills were paid in the amount of \$132,826.48 and additional claims for \$104,628.23.

A discussion was held on the snowmobile route that goes through Clearbrook. They were asking that the trail would not go across the bike path that has been newly finished.

Northern Exposure to Lifelong Learning is hosting a day trip that will take participants to Minnesota Discovery Center In Chisholm MN on Friday October 1.

Minnesota Discovery Center is the state's largest museum complex outside of the Twin Cities metro area.

Comprised of a Museum, Research Center, and Park and encompassing 660 acres, Minnesota Discovery Center tells the story of the Iron Range - "The Land, The Mines, The People and The Work" - through exhibits, interpretation, programming and research materials. The Center highlights the story of the predominantly European immigrants who migrated to this region at the turn of the 20th century to find work in the burgeoning iron ore industry.

Minnesota Discovery Center's Museum is a 33,000-square-foot facility that houses artifacts, examines mining methods, explores regional geology, and hosts traveling exhibits that help illuminate the spirit and sensibilities of Iron Range pioneers and their descendants. A special area of the museum is dedicated to the life and work of Minnesota Governor Rudy Perpich, a Hibbing native.

The cost is \$55, which includes the bus, tickets to the museum, a trolley ride and lunch. The bus will leave from Bagley at 8am and return at about 6pm.

100th Anniversary of Medal of Honor recipient
Wold's funeral will be remembered with a service



Medal of Honor recipient Nels T. Wold was born in Winger, Minnesota. Winger is also the final resting place of Wold, who was killed in action in France on September 26, 1918 during a World War I conflict

One hundred years ago an American hero was laid to rest in a small cemetery near Winger.

On September 21, 1921, remains of Nels T. Wold, recipient of the Congressional Medal of Honor, were buried in Elim Cemetery.

On the 100th Anniversary of his funeral, a remembrance service will be held on Saturday, September 25, 2021 at 1:00 pm in the Community Center in Winger.

The son of Norwegian immigrants, Nels T. Wold was born December 24, 1895 in Winger, Minnesota, the 8th of 10 children born to Tidemand E. and Klara (Tharaldsrud) Wold who both immigrated to the United States from Norway in 1883. After Klara died when Nels was just six years old, Tidemand had an 11th child with his second wife, Osse Lee. Tidemand died when Nels was 16.

When Nels registered for the draft on June 5, 1917, he was living in Akron, Ohio, and working for Goodyear Rubber Company. He was described as

tall, with blue eyes and light hair.

Nels was living in Minnewaukan, North Dakota when he enlisted in the Army. He was inducted at Crookston, Minnesota on April 2, 1918, and sent to Camp Dodge, Iowa. His emergency contact was his stepmother who was living in McIntosh, Minnesota at the time.

Wold served as a private in Company I, 138th Infantry Regiment, 35th Division. At the start of the Meuse-Argonne Offensive on September 26, 1918, his battalion was tasked with capturing the French village of Cheppy.

Wold's platoon, at the battalion's far left flank, was to act as a communication link between the battalion and the neighboring 137th Infantry Regiment.

However, thick fog caused the platoon to lose contact with both the 137th and its own battalion immediately after the advance on Cheppy began. The platoon continued forward as a combat patrol until encountering a group of American scouts led by Lieutenant John Wingate.

Wingate combined the two groups and led them behind German lines, with the intention of attacking the Germans from the rear and thus clearing the way for the American advance.

Upon reaching the German rear outside Cheppy, with the fog lifted, the group began destroying enemy positions one at a time.

One well-placed machine gun nest, located in a clump of bushes, was deemed too dangerous to attack head-on. Wold asked for and received permission to crawl up to the position and investigate.

While the rest of the group took cover, he crept up to the rear of the emplacement, killed two occupants, and captured the remaining three. As the group continued on, clearing ambushes, sniper posts, and gun emplacements, Wold volunteered four more times to single-handedly attack machine gun nests. He was successful each time except the

last.

He was killed by machine gun fire while penetrating a camouflage screen which concealed the fifth emplacement. His comrades then charged the position, killed the occupants and recovered Wold's body.

Wold was initially buried in France. Wold, aged 22 at his death, was returned to Minnesota and buried at Elim Cemetery in his birthplace of Winger, Minnesota.

Private Wold's official Medal of Honor citation reads: "He rendered most gallant service in aiding the advance of his company, which had been held up by machinegun nests, advancing, with 1 other soldier, and silencing the guns, bringing with him, upon his return, 11 prisoners. Later the same day he jumped from a trench and rescued a comrade who was about to be shot by a German officer, killing the officer during the exploit. His actions were entirely voluntary, and it was while attempting to rush a 5th machinegun nest that he was killed. The advance of his company was mainly due to his great courage and devotion to duty."

Wold was called "one of America's 100 bravest" by Gen. John Pershing.

Fengstad-Solie American Legion Post 200 of Winger will host the centennial observance. The public is encouraged to attend. Again, the service will be held on Saturday, September 25th at 1:00 pm at the Winger Community Center.

Waterfowl hunting begins this weekend

Minnesota's regular waterfowl season opens a half-hour before sunrise on Saturday, Sept. 25. Hunters need to be aware of new regulations in effect for the 2021 season:

Shooting hours end at sunset the entire season.

The Canada geese daily bag limit is five per day the entire season, with a possession limit of 15.

In the South Zone, the split (closed period) is five days instead of 12 days. The closure is from Monday, Oct. 4, through Friday, Oct. 8.

Motorized decoys may be used statewide throughout the entire waterfowl season, including on wildlife management areas. Remote controls for motorized decoys are legal.

Although drought conditions in some areas have improved, waterfowlers should plan ahead to ensure they can access areas they plan to hunt.

How to participate in National Voter Registration Day

Democracy is most effective when all eligible voters cast their votes. Whether voters vote in person or submit absentee or mail-in ballots, the importance of voting cannot be understated.

In recognition of the importance of voting, each year the United States celebrates National Voter

Registration Day on the fourth Tuesday in September. This year National Voter Registration Day is Tuesday, September 28th.

What is National Voter Registration Day?

National Voter Registration Day is a nonpartisan civic holiday to get Americans registered to vote and educate them about how to vote on or around Election Day.

One and a half million people registered to vote on National Voter Registration Day in 2020.

Why is this day important?

The organizers behind the holiday note that as many as 25 percent of all eligible voters in the United States are not registered to vote.

Voters who miss the deadlines to register, which vary from state to state, are ineligible to vote, though some states allow voters to register in person on Election Day and still vote. Voter registration is not closed in any state on or before National Voter Registration Day, so participants can rest easy knowing that if they successfully register on this day they will be eligible to vote on Election Day, which is Tuesday, November 2, 2021. A list of state-by-state voter registration deadlines can be found at Vote.org.

How can everyone participate?

The organizers behind National Voter Registration Day note that it is a partner-driven effort.

Community events, including in person and virtual events, and social media campaigns are just some of the ways individuals can promote and participate in National Voter Registration Day.

Is this Day a partisan event?

Organizers urge participants to avoid using National Voter Registration Day to advocate on behalf of a particular candidate, party or ballot measure. The organizers want the day to remain positive.

As Line 3 Construction Work Nears Completion and Crews Move on to Next Project, Local Businesses Reflect Back on the Project's Impact
MINNESOTA COMPANIES THAT HAD DIFFERENT ROLES IN THE PROJECT SAY LINE 3 MADE A SIGNIFICANT, LONG-TERM IMPACT FOR THEIR BUSINESSES AND WORKERS
(CLEARBROOK, MINN) Last September, people and businesses in Northern Minnesota were still waiting to see if or when final permits would be issued to allow the Line 3 Replacement project to move forward. One year later and construction work on the more than \$2 billion dollar project is now almost complete. Local construction-related businesses who worked on different parts of the project are looking back and noting how Line 3 created an important and significant impact for their companies and their employees. Companies like Gustafson & Goudge in Clearbrook, Naylor Heating & Refrigeration in Bemidji, and State Group Industrial in Solway say the opportunity to be a subcontractor for this project has been incredibly important and created a significant long-term benefit.
“This has been an amazing year and it has meant a lot to our company and employees to be part of this project,” said Paul Gustafson, Vice President of Gustafson & Goudge. “The work was really great to be a part of and it helped our bottom line at a key time. Our workers were busy most of this year and now have more money and support for their families. Our team has gained more experience now and we have been able to do even more to invest in our company

because of Line 3. Work is clearly winding down, but we will feel the great impact for years to come.”
“This clearly is a massive project that takes a lot of people working together to get done,” said Dave McCollum, President of Naylor Heating & Refrigeration. “For our company and our team, the part we were able to work on was really important. It came at the right time for our employees, our company, and our communities. While the work is now close to coming to an end, when it started it was an immediate and important lift for all of us. It was an economic lifeline for so many after COVID impacts and we are proud to have had the chance to play a role in what we think is a transformational project for our region.”
“Years from now I believe this project will continue to be important and continue to teach an important lesson,” said Gary Kroening, Project Manager & Estimator with State Group Industrial USA, Ltd., in Solway. “For our workers and our company, the chance to work on a part of Line 3 was both an immediate lift as well as something that will continue to help us all going forward. We are very proud of the work we have been able to do, and it means a lot to our team. The money invested with our company and others helped many of us to re-invest in our businesses that will help us for years going forward. For our employees, being part of a project so focused and committed to the highest level of quality shows our future customers what our team can do. All of this matters and after an amazing year, it's an interesting time to reflect on what has happened.”
After more than six years of review and permitting approvals, construction on Line 3 started in December of 2020. The replaced Line 3 is expected to be activated later this year, upgrading the line and restoring its ability to safely move oil to the line's original capacity. The project will increase environmental protections and decrease the need to use less-safe ways to transport oil and related materials as the country continues to transition to a more renewable energy-focused economy.
Line 3 is the largest privately financed construction project in Minnesota history, coming at a key time as the region struggled with issues related to the economic impact of COVID. The Bureau of Business and Economic Research (BBER) at the University of Minnesota Duluth's Labovitz School of Business and Economics concluded via their analysis that the project would create approximately 8,600 jobs and will represent an investment of over \$2.0 billion in the 15-county study area in the northern portion of the State of Minnesota.
“What we have seen and what our company has experienced because of Line 3 not only proves the validity of the UMD analysis,” Gustafson said, “it connects this important data to real life. There will likely always be a debate by some about this project but what can never be dismissed is the reality and the positive impact building Line 3 has had in our community. Long after work is done and the sites have been restored, our people and our community will still be connected to what Line 3 means and what it means to us all.”
The decision to replace Line 3 was made by the Obama Administration. To complete the project, Enbridge has invested more than \$2 billion, employed more than 5,000 people, and created an important economic impact to help the region recover from the COVID economic challenges.
The Biden Administration recently filed its support of federal permits for the project as part of legal proceedings. Minnesota Governor Tim Walz recently reaffirmed his support for the project via an editorial in the Duluth News Tribune.

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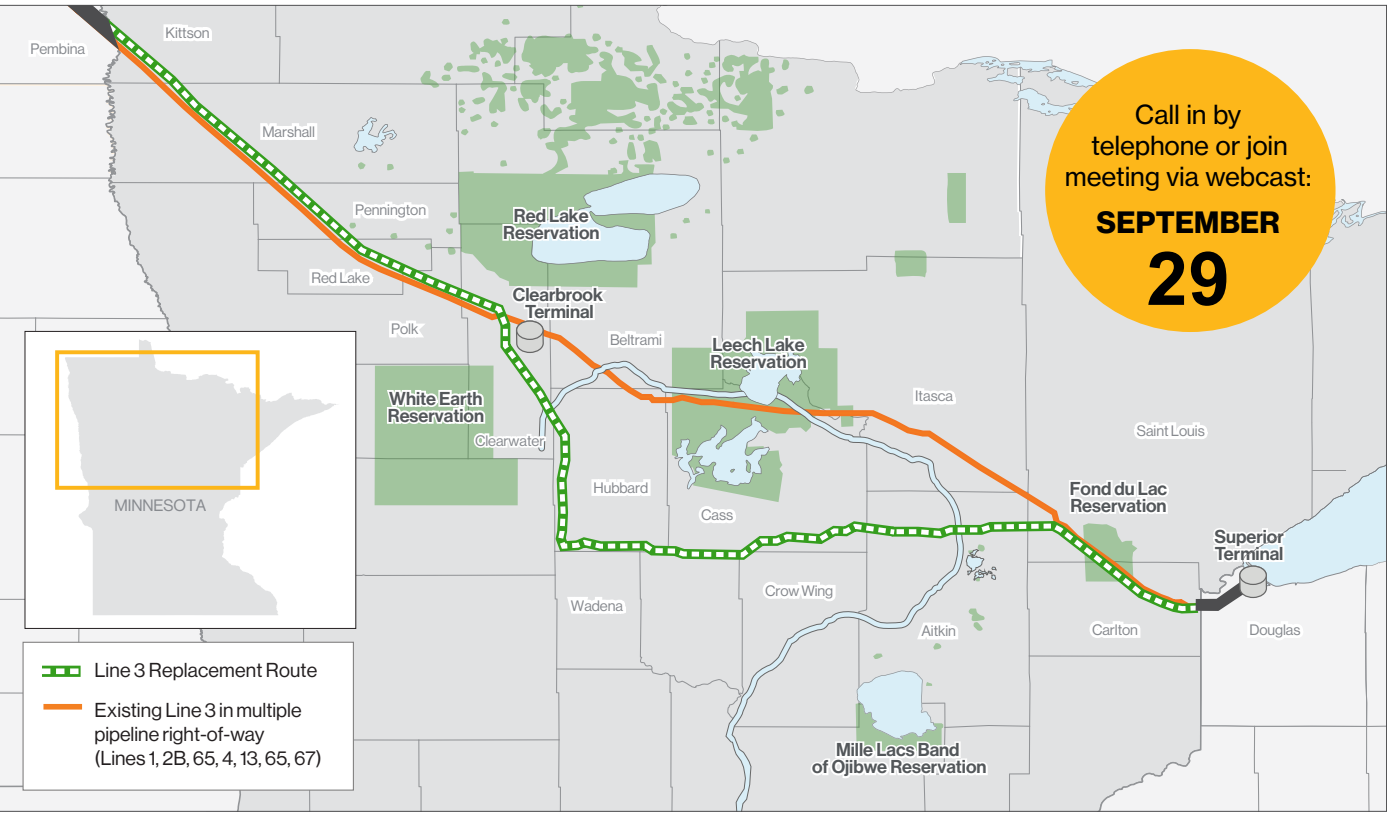
