Several property tax programs can help reduce one’s property taxes

Judging by the questions raised at the county’s Truth in Taxation hearing late last year, many people very likely don’t understand the ins and outs of property taxes, especially how to be sure they get the credits they are due.

What became quite clear was that when people received their property valuation notices last spring, they did not fully realize the tax impact that would follow.

Visiting with Clearwater County Assessor Terrie Johnson recently, she noted there are four steps a property owner can take if they disagree with their property valuation.

First is call the Assessor’s Office for clarification; second is to take your case to your township or city Board of Equalization held in April or May; third is to bring your case to the County Board of Equalization in June. Lastly, if one still disagrees with the valuation, a person can contest the valuation in Tax Court. Johnson said information about the Tax Court is available on the State Department of Revenue website or contact the Assessor’s Office for guidance.

Later in the year come the property tax notices. They are mailed out in November, with the meeting being held in December. This is when a property owner might wish he or she had previously taken steps to have their property value and classification reviewed.

Johnson said there are various property classifications that can help reduce one’s property taxes. The most common are Homestead and Relative Homestead; Special Agriculture; Managed Forest; Sustainable Forest; Blind and Disabled; and Disabled Veteran.

Highlights from these common classifications follow here:

Homestead
You may only have one homestead property per married couple in the state of Minnesota.

To qualify, you must: own a property; occupy the property as your sole or primary residence; be a Minnesota resident.

Qualifying property includes all property used as a residence, including garages and outbuildings.

You must apply for homestead classification by Dec. 31 for taxes payable the next year. If your property is already classified as homestead, you need not renew it annually. If your ownership status changes, then you must notify the Assessor’s Office. However, the Assessor’s Office may at any time ask you to submit an additional application or provide documentation to verify that you continue to meet the requirements for homestead classification.

You must notify the asses-

sor within 30 days if you move, sell your property, your marital status changes, or occupancy of your spouse changes.

If relatives are living on your property, then the property may qualify for homestead classification. Qualifying relatives include: parents, grandparents, siblings, children, grandchildren, aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews of the owner or spouse of the owner.

Property held under a trust may also qualify for homestead if occupied by a grantor or qualifying relative of the grantor of the trust.

Special Agricultural Homestead

Special Ag Homestead classification gives homestead status to Ag property when the owner does not live on the farm.

To qualify, the property must be: classified as agricultural, at least 40 acres in size, farmed by a qualifying person or qualifying relative (child, grandchild, sibling, parent), or actively farmed by someone who participates in the day-to-day labor, decision making, and management of the claimed homestead who assumes all or part of the financial risks of the farm; and who lives near the agricultural property. This classification does not apply to occupied entity-owned agricultural property.

Class 2C Managed Forest Land

Owners of forest land who follow a qualifying forest management plan can pay reduced property taxes for as long as the property continues to meet the requirements of the Class 2c Managed Forest classification.

As long as the property is enrolled in this program, the market value of the property subject to property tax that is used to calculate local property taxes will be calculated with a rate of 0.65%.

To qualify, the property must have at least 20 eligible acres of contiguous parcels of forested land; and have a registered forest management plan with the Minnesota DNR that is less than 10 years old.

Sustainable Forest Incentive Act

The Sustainable Forest Incentive Act (SFIA) provides incentive payments to property owners to encourage sustainable use of forestlands.

Property owners can receive a payment for each acre of qualifying forest land they enroll in SFIA. In return, the owner agrees not to develop the land and to follow a forest management plan while they are in the program. All enrolled land must remain in SFIA for at least 8, 20, or 50 years, depending on their recorded agreement length.

Payment rates vary based on the length of the agreements and number of acres enrolled.

Blind or disabled
Any property owner who qualifies as blind or as permanently and totally disabled can receive a reduced tax rate.

To qualify, the property must be classified as a homestead; the owner must provide documentation to prove he or she is blind or disabled as defined by statute, and the blindness or disability must have occurred on or before June 30 of the year you apply.

A total disability for this classification is defined as a condition that is permanent in nature and totally incapacitates a person from working at an occupation which brings the person an income. An individual who is permanently and totally disabled must be receiving payments from a qualifying agency because of their disability.

Apply by Oct. 1 for taxes payable the next year. Agencies that qualify to verify disability include: Social Security Administration, Veterans Administration, public or private pension plans, welfare supplemental security income, or workers compensation.

The property does not qualify for this reduced tax rate if it is already receiving a market value exclusion for a veteran who is disabled.

Disabled veteran
If owned by a disabled veteran, a market value exclusion can be applied. There are two exclusion levels: \$150,000 and \$300,000, depending upon the veteran’s status.

A veteran with a 100 percent and total disability rating may qualify for a market value exclusion of \$300,000. A veteran with a 70 percent or greater service-connected disability rating may qualify for an exclusion of \$150,000.

Others who may qualify for the disabled veteran exclusion include: a surviving spouse receiving dependency and indemnity compensation; surviving spouse of a qualifying veteran or service member; a qualifying primary family caregiver.

One must apply by Dec. 31 for taxes payable the next year. Details on this category are numerous and can be obtained from the Assessor’s Office.

More programs
There are several lesser used programs that can help reduce property taxes. These are:

Green Acres, which limits increases in market value of farm land affected by development pressure;

Senior Citizens Tax Deferral; and

Disaster Relief, which provides tax relief for disaster affected and destroyed property.

Clearbrook-Gonvick School board has election of officers

The Clearbrook-Gonvick School Board held their re-organizational meeting on Monday, January 24. They elected Vern Wittenberg as the chairman, Dudley Wishard as the Clerk and Vanessa Gustafson as the Treasurer. They also assigned all the committees to the four that were present at the meeting. Board salaries were set at \$80.00 for the officers and \$75.00 for board members. \$55 for negotiating sessions and \$50 for committee meetings. They set the monthly meetings on the third Monday of each month. The Border Bank and Northern State Bank were the official depositories and both county papers were the official publications. Knutson, Flynn and Deans was named the official school attorney. The mileage rate was set at the IRS rate of 58.5. If a personal car is used the person would receive ½ of the IRS rate. Vanessa Gustafson was selected as the Minnesota State High School League representative.

were given and they were glad that the district was keeping children in school and to keep things going with activities. They also thanked the school board members who have resigned for putting in their time for the students in the district.

They are also continuing to offer after school tutoring three nights a week.

The elementary students are currently completing their winter NWEA and Fastbridge testing and screening.

January 17th was teacher in-service/fast bridge training. Teachers participated in virtual sessions at the school revolving around the topic of mental health. They were provided by the Northwest Service Co-op. Elementary teachers also participated in FastBridge professional development.

Kathleen Anderson and Pam Bagaason are leading the charge this year for the first MathMasters team. They are working with 5th graders before school to get them ready for their competition in April.

Upcoming events include: Snow Days Week is February 7 to 11. February 17 and 18 is parent-teacher conferences and there will be no school on February 21.

Superintendents Report

Superintendent Grow gave his report. They have been very lucky to be able to find subs to fill positions and people in the building have also been helping out. Melissa, the HR person stated that the rating came back for the Work Comp and it has decreased as there has not been any claims. With Covid related there have been 4 staff members and 17 students out the past month. They are working on the education calendar and schedules for elementary and high school for next year. They are starting a team to develop the Worlds Best Work Force. They are short on Crome Books and there is a grant to be able to get the rest that they need that they are looking at. The legislature is deciding how much the school districts will receive but with the Covid relief there probably won’t be as much. Compensatory Revenue is a big topic. There has been a decrease of \$58,000 from last year to this.

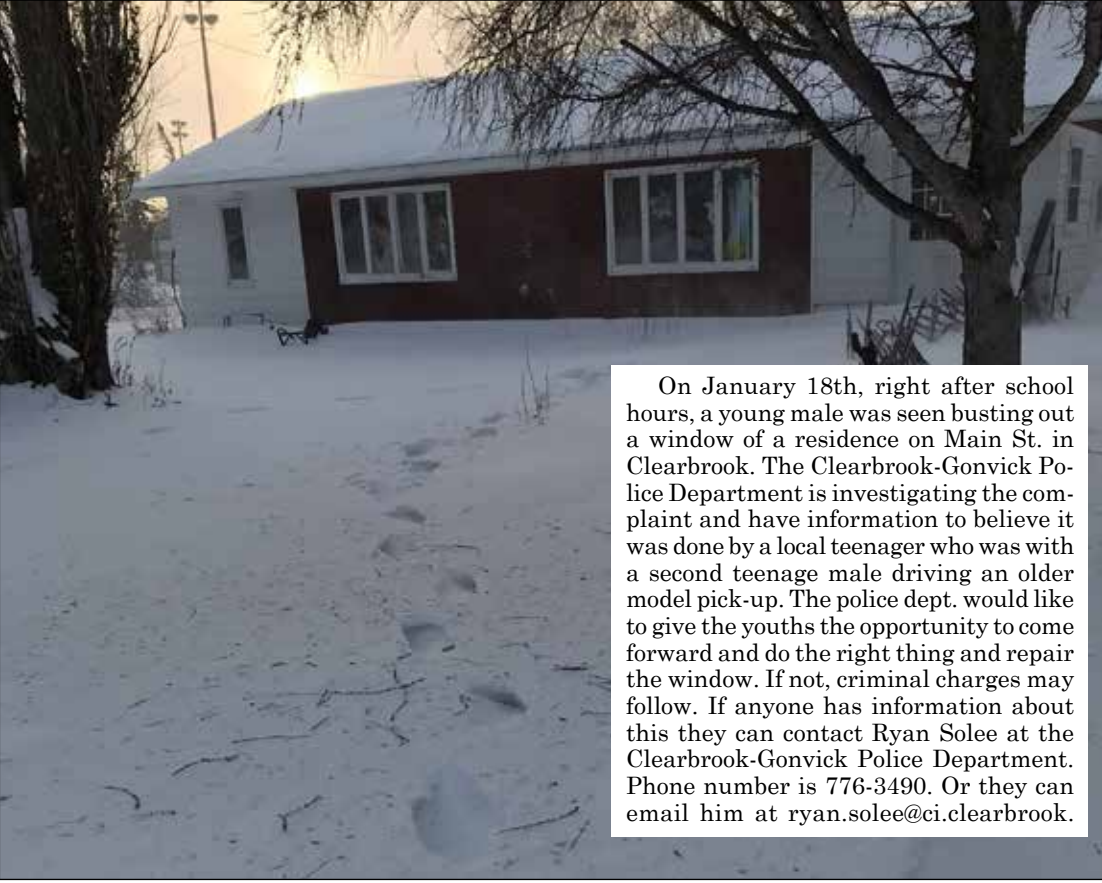

Consent Calendar The bills and treasurers report were approved. The cash and Investments from 12/31/20 went up \$417,128.58 from \$3,538,582.17 to \$3,955,710.75 in 12/31/21.

Ages of current cases: 0-19 50 20-39 69 40-59 48 60-79 18 80+ 5 The positivity rate in MN is 22.7 and daily cases for today are 14,633. Vaccine: Get vaccinated! We do not want to lose another person to COVID! The COVID-19 vaccine is safe. It has gone through all the same safety steps of any other vaccine. The COVID-19 vaccine works. The vaccine is very good at protecting people from COVID-19 disease. If you do get sick with COVID-19 after being vaccinated, the vaccine will help protect you from getting very sick or having to go to the hospital. It takes two weeks after your second dose in a two-dose series or first dose in a one-dose series to build up protection against COVID-19. After those two weeks, you are fully vaccinated. The person who gives you the vaccine can tell you how many doses of vaccine you need and when to get them. This could include a third dose or booster dose. It is important to get the doses you need for the best protection (MDH). 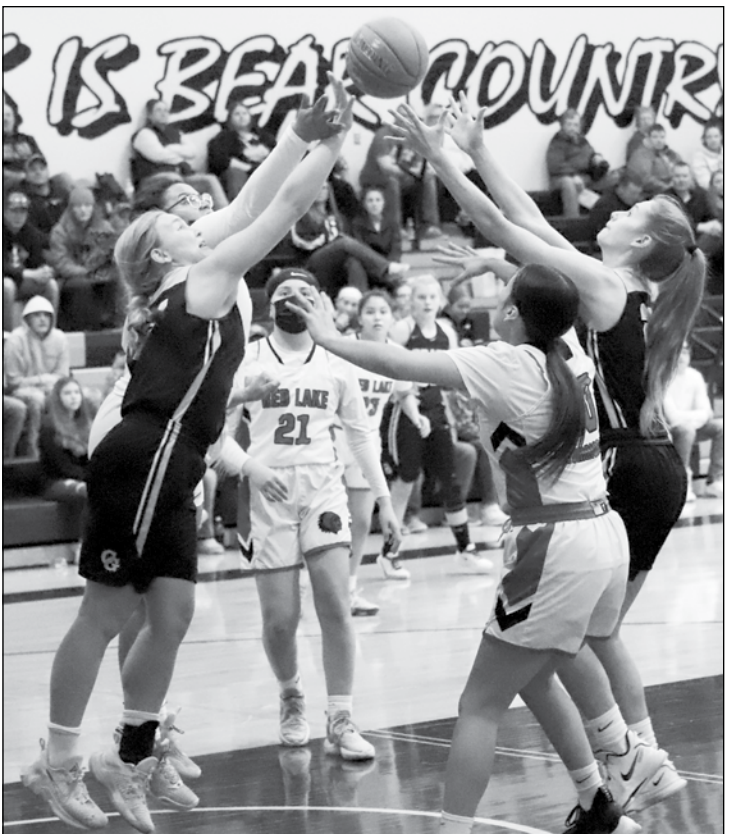

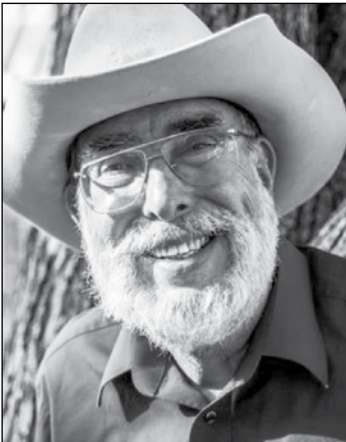

Dear Clearbrook-Gonvick Families and Community Members,

As many of you are likely aware, Clearbrook-Gonvick School is experiencing the same COVID wave that is creating issues for many districts throughout the state. Transportation, food service, custodians, paraprofessionals, and other support staff are facing similar challenges. In addition to staffing concerns, the number of students who have been absent over the past two weeks has been increasing rapidly. I am writing to update you about a few things the district is adding to their testing procedure as well as information about a potential emergency reset. Here are some updates to Covid testing as well as information previously communicated.

- Covid-19 Testing:
- The school district will accept test results from both a PCR test and an Antigen Test.
 - Test results should still be communicated to the school health office. The health office will let you know when your child may return to school.
 - The district will continue to follow the procedure of isolating for 10 days for students and staff who have tested positive for Covid. We ask that all students check in with the health office prior to returning to class after their isolation period.
 - If there is a positive case within a household, we strongly encourage families to keep their children home if they are sick or displaying any symptoms. Please keep your child(ren) home if they are sick.
 - If you choose to have your child tested for whatever reason, and have a pending test result, DO NOT send your child to school until you receive a negative test result.
 - If you are keeping your child home for other illness reasons, please notify the office for attendance records as well as their teacher(s) for their academic needs.

In The Event of a Potential Emergency Reset:

As Covid cases continue to rise, we have noticed more student and staff absent. Fortunately, we have been able to find substitutes for our certified and support staff, along with people helping where needed throughout the building. If the district were to get to a point where we can no longer adequately staff our classrooms, administration and the school board will work together to call an emergency reset. A reset would mean no school and extra-curricular activities for a certain number of days. During that time there would be no instruction given to students in any format, and there would also be no food service. The purpose of an emergency reset is to provide the time necessary for students and staff to rest, recover and return to school healthy.

Again, the purpose of this letter is to inform you of some new changes the district is taking for Covid-19 testing as well as what an emergency reset would entail if it were to be implemented. This plan remains fluid and may change if/when necessary. If the district makes any changes to our current policies or procedures, we will continue to inform you via the district's communication channels. Clearbrook-Gonvick School will support our students, families and staff and encourages everyone to do their part to help reduce the spread of Covid-19.
