Stella Nelson Westby
1900-2000

Stella Agnette Nelson was born to Hans and Anne Nelson on May 19, 1900 in Clearbrook. Stella was the first of five daughters born to Hans and Anne. Hans was a farmer in Greenwood Township and also the conductor of the Clearbrook Band and between 1920 and 1924 he owned "Nelson's Music Store" in Clearbrook. (It burned down in 1924.)

Sadly, when Stella was just 9 years old, her mother died. The cause of death was listed as "miscarriage and unable to get medical aid in time" This was the third blow to the family in a short period of time; in 1905 Hans had suffered a broken limb, then shortly after that their home had burned down, then in 1909 he lost his wife and unborn child. The local newspaper wrote "And now...merciless fates again visits his home and deprives him of his beloved companion and the little ones robbed of their mother and best friend." Stella, at age 9, became the caregiver to her younger siblings until she married.

Her father remarried in 1923 to a woman who was a widow with seven children of her own. They in turn had two children together.

Stella married Clarence Westby in 1919 at Clearbrook. They lived in Sinclair Township where they raised 3 children: LaVone, Ervin and Lloyd. Clarence was a WWI veteran and he spent quite a bit of time in the veteran's hospital in Minneapolis where he died in 1936 at age 43. This was also the same year Stella's father died.

In about 1950 Stella sold the family farm and went to work at the agriculture school

in Crookston during the school year and during the summer she worked at Rutgers Lodge in Bemidji. She retired from both in 1968 and moved to the Good Samaritan Center in Clearbrook.

Stella died at age 100 on August 31, 2000. She was a member of the Bagley Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses and is buried in the Westby Cemetery near Clearbrook.

2000 Men's Indoor Track & Field Team

In a look through the most successful teams in Bemidji State athletic history, the 2000

men's indoor track and field team certainly makes the list. Led by NSIC event champions Andy Eggerth (55-meter hurdles and 400-meter dash), Jesse Miller (600-meter dash), Aaron Feia (800-meter run and Mile run) and Joe Ferraro (shot put), the 29-man roster became the first and only Bemidji State track and field team to win a conference championship in the 77-year history of the program. In addition to six individual event championships, BSU also claimed the 3,200-meter relay title en route to edging Northern State University for the NSIC Championship. Under the direction of 2000 NSIC Coach of the Year Craig Hougen, Eggerth, who set a 55-meter hurdle record that still stands today (7.61), was selected as the league's indoor athlete of the year, four men earned All-NSIC honors, while four more were tabbed for All-NSIC Honorable mention awards. Eggerth went on to compete at the NCAA Division II Indoor Track and Field Championships and claim fourth place in the 400-meter dash to become an All-American.

Paul Peterson was part of the 2000 Men's Indoor Track & Field Team. He was a long and triple jumper on the team.
