Notice is hereby given that the Board of Appeal and Equalization of Greenwood Township will meet on May 10, 2022, 6:00 pm, at the Greenwood Town Hall. The purpose of this meeting is to determine whether taxable property in the jurisdiction has been properly valued and classified by the assessor, and also to determine whether corrections need to be made.

If you believe the value or classification of your property is incorrect, please contact your assessor's office to discuss your concerns. If you are still not satisfied with the valuation or classification after discussing it with your assessor, you may appear before the local board of appeal and equalization. The board shall review the valuation, classification, or both if necessary, and shall correct it as needed. Generally, an appearance before your local board of appeal and equalization is required by law before an appeal can be taken to your county board of appeal and equalization.

The town board will meet to take care of regular township business following the Equalization meeting.

2020 Census found no significant population shifts county wide

During the commissioner's meeting April 12, Allen Paulson, the county auditor and treasurer, discussed that the largest shift in population was an approximate 20 resident reduction within the city of Bagley since 2010. "There was not enough change in our population to change districts," Paulson said. Several neighboring counties face redistricting, including Beltrami, where all five districts will change.

The county attorney's office is set to begin litigation in several trespassing and public nuisance cases stemming from last year's pipeline protests. County Attorney Kathryn Lorschbach said her office will be handling around 100 cases, with most of the accused from out of state. "Less than 15 are Clearwater County residents," Lorschbach said. "We will never get un-backlogged because of this and Covid." As Clearwater County is home to the Mississippi River headwaters, the area drew pipeline protesters from around the country, and local residence frequently encountered road blockages and encampments through the 2021 summer season.

A Sentence to Serve [STS] crew leader is being sought by the Clearwater County Sheriff, however board members debated whether the position warranted a full-time employee.

Sheriff Darin Halverson said he would consider combining the position with other job duties that would make the position full time. "It's possible to combine it with custodial at the courthouse," Halverson offered. County Attorney Lorschbach said the county has to have the STS foreman because of the non-adult offenders. "I can't sentence juveniles to anything else," Lorschbach said.

"If the county did not have an STS crew, then juveniles would have to go to the Northwestern Minnesota Juvenile Center in Bemidji."

The county engineering department accepted bids for pavement markings, re-graveling, surfacing and bridge repair. Bids were opened and apparent low bids were accepted for each project. Official awards are pending.

The Clearwater Lutheran Church will offer a scalloped potato and ham dinner from 5:00- 6:30 before the concert.

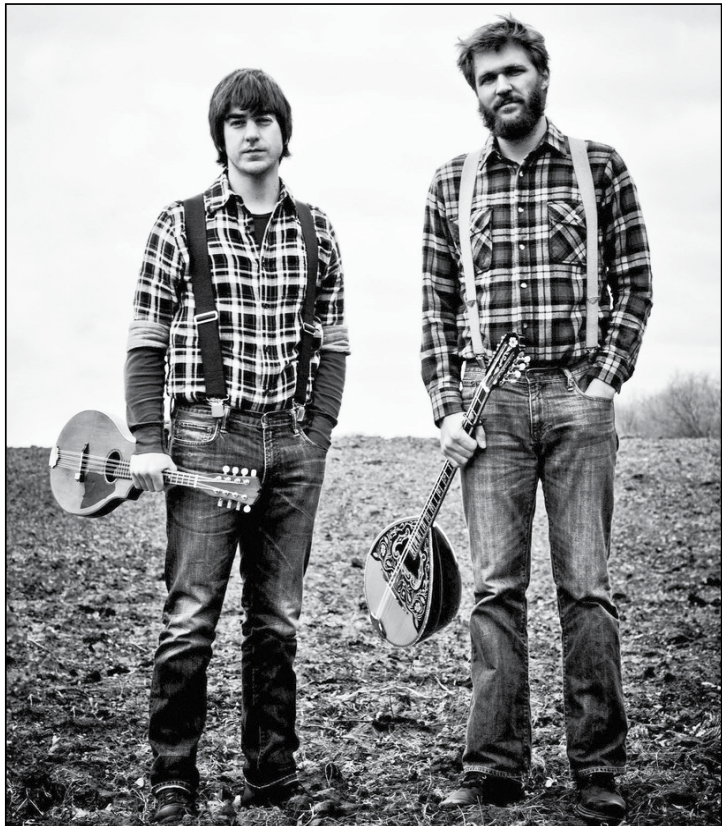

A native of the northern Minnesota logging town of Bemidji, Brian Miller teams up with Wisconsinite Randy Gosa to perform the Irish-influenced music of men who roamed the Great Lakes region in the days when pine was king. Miller and Gosa are both renowned in the Irish traditional music world for their work with top artists (including Bua and Myserk) in the US and Ireland. As a duo, they mix a passion for northwoods history and folklore with

their finely honed approach to song-arrangement to bring this rich but under-explored music to life.

Both the dinner and the concert will be held at the Clearwater Lutheran Church in Shevlin. Proceeds from the dinner will support church activities.

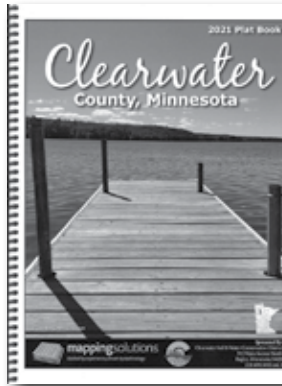

Container Gardening

Many of us don't have spaces for gardens. If you live in an apartment or condo, your space is probably minimal. Container gardens might just be the answer you are looking for. You can grow flowers, herbs, or vegetables in containers. Container plants are a great way to have a lot of color in a small space. You will need to give them a bit more attention and

maintenance, but the benefits will surely outweigh the efforts. Almost any size of shape container can reused on your patio, balcony, or deck: one gallon, three gallon, and 5 gallon sizes are the most popular. Metal containers can get hot in the sun and do not lend themselves to some container gardens. Ceramic, plastic, or wood are better choices. Most plants will require

twelve inches of soil or less. Many annuals do well in six inches of soil. If you are using a tall container, you can put plastic bottles in the bottom to use up some of the space. If wind is a factor, consider some rocks or bricks to keep the container from fall over. If you are planning on using a vine-like plant, adding a small trellis works well. You can add some organic material to bottom to use of space. Wood chips and branches work well. Mulching the top layer is also a good idea as mulch helps retain moisture. Be sure to use a good quality soil and fertilizer. Be cautious with fertilizer so as not to burn the plants. An all purpose fertilizer the best option for container gardens. Be sure and follow the label recommendations. Containers will require more frequent watering. Test the soil often for moisture. Most container plants prefer moist, not soggy soil. Most herbs are well-suited for container gardens. Roots are generally only three to six inches deep making great use of a shallow container. Basil, oregano, thyme are my favorites and all come in several varieties. Chives are another, plus they are perennial and easily survive our winters. Be sure and place your herb container where it will get plenty of sunshine—the more sun the better. Harvest culinary herbs throughout the growing season by snipping sprigs and leaves. Once they start to flower, pinch off the the blossoms as we want the leaves, not flowers. Almost any vegetable grown in a garnet can be grown in a container. Choose a container in proportion to what the final plant will look like. Tomatoes, peppers, lettuces, and carrots, all do well. Most vegetables require twelve inches of soil so large pots work the best.

The variety of flowers adaptable for containers is endless. Keep in mind where how much sunlight the pots will get and choose plants based on the number of sunlight hours. Wax begonias, geraniums, and petunias are some of the most popular sun tolerant flowering plants suitable for containers. Impatiens and coleus do well in shadier spots. Coleus are sensitive to cold and temperature extremes and will be on of the first plants to be affected in the fall. Add a spiller plant which will hang over the edge of the container. Trailing plants can also help keep container plantings in scale and help connect the plantings to the container while hiding and softening its edges. Some spillers to consider are vinca, ivy, and wandering jew. Mix in a few Ipomoea (sweet potato vine), a vigorous trailing plant. The foliage comes in chartreuse, purple, copper, and even "black". It's a great choice for a splash of color.

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St. Paul, MN – Only 10 days remain until the first-quarter unemployment insurance payments are due and Representative Matt Grossell, R-Clearbrook, is calling on House Democrats to fulfill their promises and provide relief for Minnesota businesses.

“Last month, as a result of House Democrat's inaction, our job creators had to begin paying unemployment insurance payments,” Grossell said. “This is a harmful and unnecessary tax increase. House Democrats need to move on this bill and fix this tax hike that they created.”

Minnesota has a more than \$9.25 billion surplus and can afford to fill the Unemployment Trust Fund to solvency, reverse the tax increases on employers, and stop Minnesota from borrowing \$50,000 a day from the federal government. House Speaker Melissa Hortman, DFL-Brooklyn Park, downplayed the original March 15 deadline, insisting that lawmakers had until April 30 when tax bills were due to take action.

The Minnesota Senate



passed a bill to refill the UI trust fund on February 14 on a broadly bipartisan 55-11 vote. Replenishing the UI Trust Fund enjoys broad support from Gov. Walz, House Republicans, Senate Republicans, and Senate Democrats, but has been stalled

thanks to inaction by the House Democrat majority — Democrats have refused to pass a bill of any kind off the House floor, and it's been 70 days since the bill last received a hearing on February 9. Democrats have also excluded UI repayment from their budget targets released this week, suggesting they have no intention of paying back the UI Trust Fund. If the trust fund is not repaid, it would result in ten years of higher taxes on employers.

“Democrats told businesses that they could delay their payments and that the real deadline was April 30. Now here we are days away from that deadline and Democrats have continued to ignore the plea of our job creators and have not gotten this passed. The money is there, and we need to take action to support our employers as they deal with inflation, supply chain, and workforce challenges,” Grossell concluded.

Doc grinned. “Okay, Steve, what's the problem?”

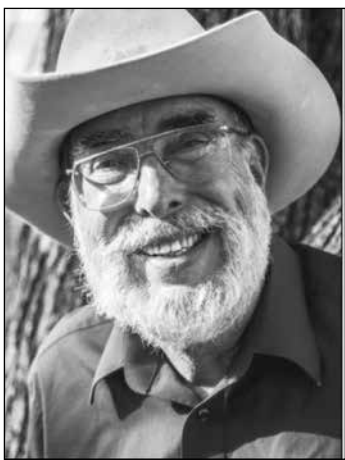
“Licenses. Every dang time you turn around some guy behind a counter tells you you have to buy a license. Runs a guy straight into the poorhouse. It does.

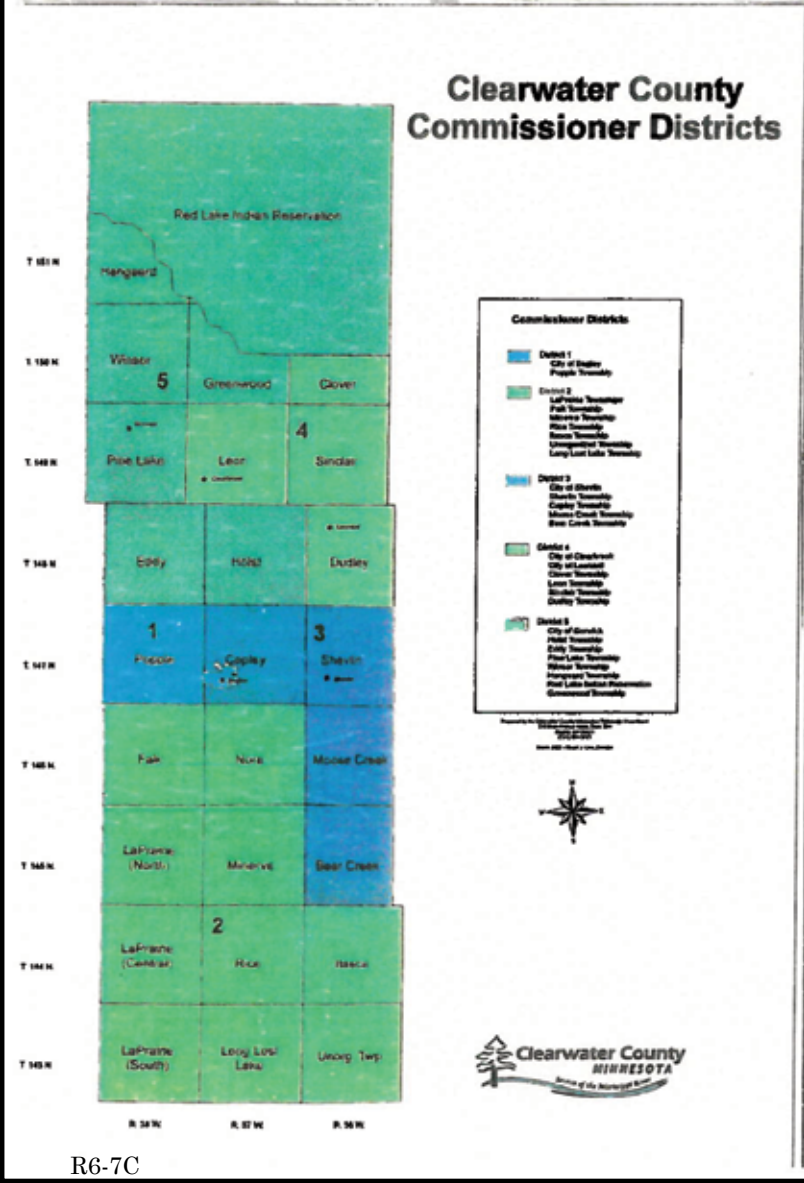

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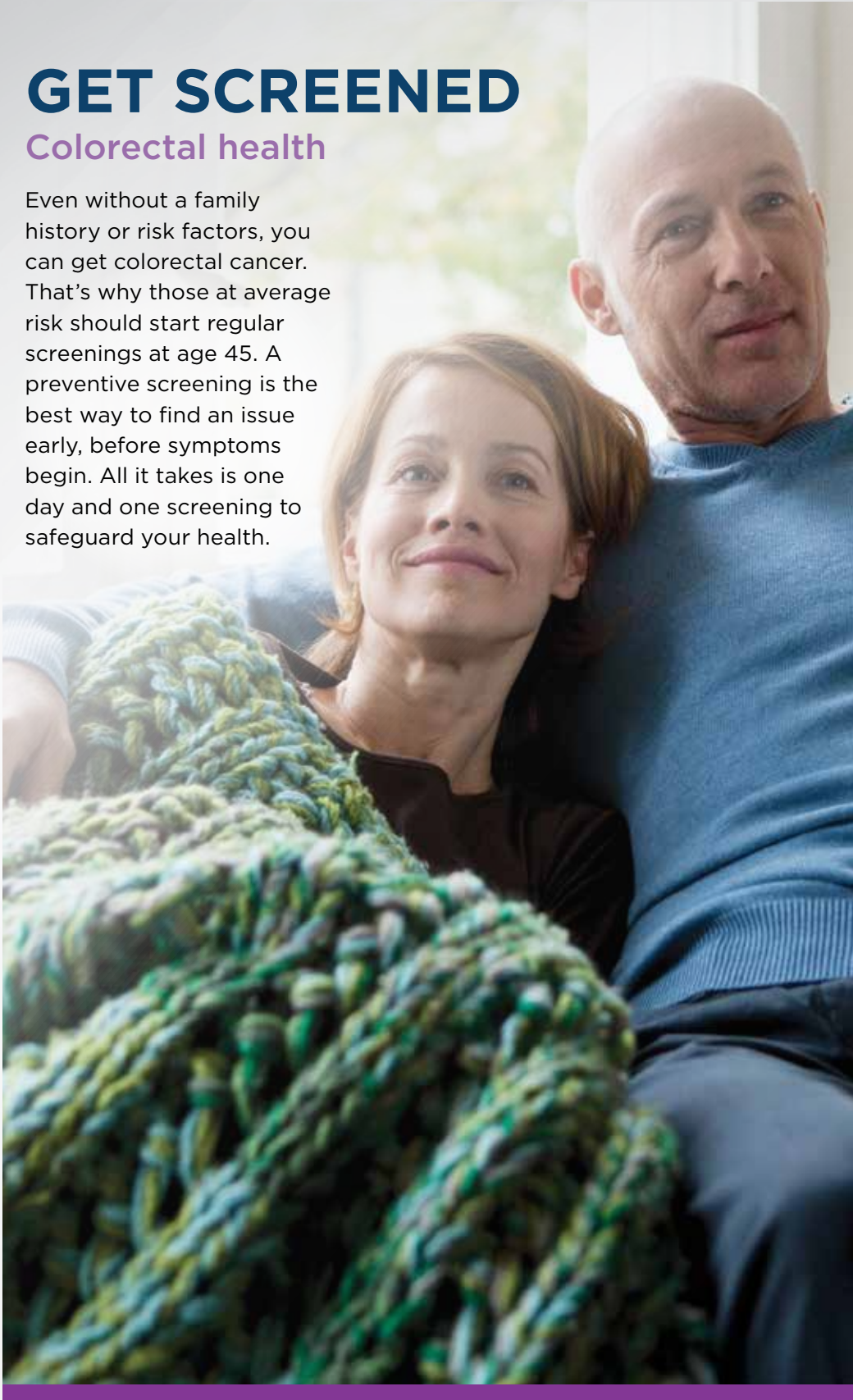
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
