You are the last to see the Gold Stars in the front windows of grieving neighbors whose sons [and a few daughters] died in the war

You saw the “boys” home from the war, build their little houses and Bank Loans fanned a nation-wide housing boom

You are the last generation who spent their childhood without TV. Instead, you “imagined” what you heard on the radio while the nation's radio networks expanded from three to thousands

New highways brought mobility and sprawl to urban areas

After working for months, the legislative session has concluded. Governor Walz had originally indicated we would not have a special session but I believe he may change his mind on this commitment, costing taxpayers billions of dollars.

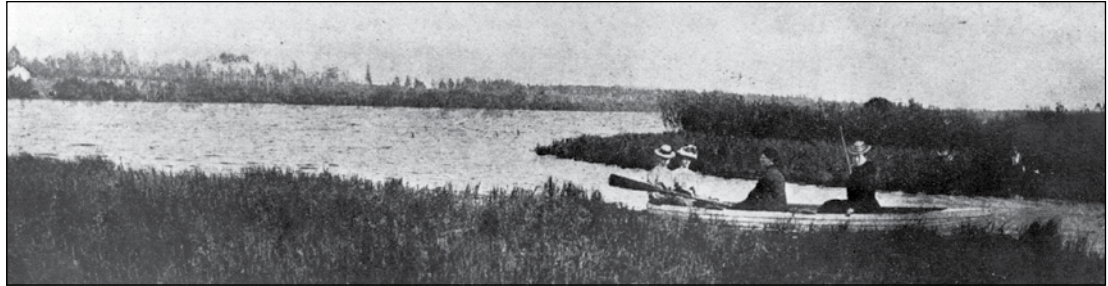

Established on this date in 1891 Itasca State Park was established by the Minnesota Legislature on April 20, 1891, making it the first of Minnesota's state parks and second oldest in the United States, behind Niagara Falls State Park. Henry Schoolcraft established Lake Itasca as the Mississippi River's source in 1832. It was named as a National Natural Landmark in 1965, and was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1973.

Nearly a half million people visit Itasca State Park each year. Photos are of the Headwaters of The Mississippi over the years.
