Clearbrook City Council meeting held

Ryan Solee gave the Police Department report to the Clearbrook City Council on Monday, June 13. He and City Clerk Lucie will be going over the budget and report next month. The training that was to be held did not work out. He is looking at other options for later this fall. He has been talking with landlords on Main street and there will be an ordinance that will have no overnight parking on Main street. Tenants in the apartments will have to park in the back of the building.

He presented the police report with a total of 51 records. They included: 911 Hang Up 2; Animal Related 3; Assist 1; Assist Other Agency 1; Burglary 1; City Ordinance 3; Court Order Violation 1; Crimes Against Family 1; Disturbance 2; Domestic 1; Information Only 5; Juvenile Misc. 1; Missing/Lost Person 2; Officer Detail 1; Property Damage 4; Sexual Conduct 1; Suicide Related 1; Suspicious Activity 3; Theft 1; Threats 2; Traffic Complaint 2; Traffic Stop 4; Trespass 3; Welfare Check 4.

Nick Rankin, Assistant Fire chief gave the Fire Department Report. They had a few medical calls and with the Gonvick Fire Department they had a training with a house burn. Each member was able to take part in the burn. They have a couple of houses lined

up. The grant came in and the truck payments are getting close to done.

Lucie Thompson gave the Municipal Liquor Store report from Karra Weems, Manager. The profit for the month was \$8,262.75. They will be having a wedding dance in July. They will also be having a Karaoke night on June 17. The ATM machine is doing well at the Liquor Store.

Mark Snobl gave the maintenance report. Work on the streets are supposed to be done by August 3. They will be working on the west side of town and crossing Highway 92. This work should be going a lot faster.

There have been complaints with driveways that are bad and residents not being able to get out.

Nick Rankin reported that Richard Hetland was to fix the faucet at Kloster Park and the water heater at the pool needs to be fixed. The area will need a cleanup. The bike path has motorized vehicles using it and more signs have to be put up to make sure that people are aware that only bikes and people can be on the bike trail.

The pool was set to open on Saturday, June 18. A new cabinet for the pool was built at the school. All supplies are ready to go and there are chemicals in the pool. They will vacuum

and the pressure valve was inspected. There is concern as there is a lot of rust in the water in town.

Listrom Disposal will be discontinuing individual curb-side garbage pickup in the City of Clearbrook at the end of June. It is not cost effective to provide the individual curb side service. Residents will have to take their garbage to the Leon Dumpster site on the Clearwater Lake Road.

They checked with Bruce Cox about the Good Samaritan Property. He said that it was in tax forfeiture along with the house. The city came up with a rate to present to the county to pay for mowing of the property at \$150 per time.

A new business in town had asked if they did ribbon cutting for a new business in town. Massage Solutions located in Sue Voxlands of beauty shop on main street.

The council passed Resolution 2022-12 authorizing Encroachment Permit.

A building Permit was issued to Tami Weber to fix her roof that was leaking.

City Clerk Lucie Thompson presented the bills to be approved. Monthly Claims \$78,587.44 and additional Claims \$184,323.51. Also the project Pay App #8 to the Reirson Construction Company.

June 14 County Commissioners' meeting

It was a short agenda for the June 14 meeting of the Clearwater County Commissioners with the Sheriff, Assessor, Engineer,

and Auditor-Treasurer making reports.

Sheriff Darin Halvorson submitted a request to hire a Communications Corrections Officer. A motion was made by Commissioner Neal Illies, seconded by Commissioner John Nelson to hire Veronica Miller as a full-time Communications Corrections Officer effective June 20, 2022, to fill a vacancy. Pay will be Range 14, Step 1. Motion passed. The other request by the Sheriff was regarding paperwork for a grant. Commissioner Dean Newland made a motion to authorize the Sheriff to sign and execute the 2022 State of Minnesota Boat and Water Safety grant in the amount of \$3,186.00, seconded by Commissioner Mark Larson. Motion passed.

Terri Johnson, Clearwater County Assessor, gave an update about the upcoming Board of Equalization meeting. Only one appeal regarding property valuation & taxes has been filed so far. The meeting will be held on Tuesday, June 21 at 6 pm.

Dan Sauvé, Clearwater County Engineer was next to report to the commissioners. Sauvé presented bills totaling \$121,366.51. Commissioner

Nelson made the motion to approve payment of the highway department bills, seconded by another commissioner. Motion passed. Sauvé submitted four quotes for the repair of flood damage to County Rd 121. Commissioner Larson moved to accept the quote and authorize Dyrdahl Construction of Leonard to complete project CP-121-01 Flood Repairs on CAR 121 to install culvert, granular backfill, and aggregate surfacing in the amount of \$33,024.00, seconded by Commissioner Nelson. Motion passed.

Al Paulson, Auditor-Treasurer brought four items of business before the commissioners. Commissioner Nelson moved to designate the County Auditor-Treasurer to establish an Absentee, Mail and UOCAVA Ballot Board consisting of Auditor-Treasurer office staff and election judges effective for the 2022 Primary and General Elections, seconded by Commissioner Mark Titera. Motion passed. Commissioner Nelson made a motion to authorize the repurchase of parcel 24.300.1040 Block 14 Lot 7, 8 & W 90' of Lot 90, Clearbrook City, by Joshua Tollefson for \$3,129.77 plus recording and deed tax fees of \$81.33 for a total of \$3,211.10, seconded by Commissioner Larson. Motion passed. Commissioner Newland made a motion to accept the proposal from Ehlers Public Finance Advisors to provide consulting services to Clearwater County with respect to the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and Local Fiscal Recovery (LFR) Funds. Ehlers will invoice for work completed each month with descriptions of the activities performed and time expended daily (in ¼ hour increments) at Ehlers standard rate of \$250 per hour. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Nelson. Motion passed. Commissioner Titera moved to appropriate \$5,000.00 to the Clearwater County Historical Society for construction of connecting sidewalks to exhibit buildings, seconded by Commissioner Illies. Motion passed. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Clearwater County Sheriff Darin Halverson

On June 16, 2022 at approximately 1:40 pm, the Clearwater County Sheriff's Office received a call that a five-year-old autistic, non-verbal boy had been missing from a home approximately eight miles south of Bagley in Minerva Township. The boy had been missing for about an hour at the time of the call. Clearwater County Sheriff's Office personnel responded to the scene and began searching for the boy. Family and neighbors were also assisting in the search. The Clearwater County Volunteer Sheriff's Reserve were also assisting in the search. Adult Education (ABE) has been a mainstay in our communities for decades. For the first few decades it was only for those who needed their GED, but ABE looks vastly different in 2022. There is something for everyone who is 17 or older and learning options abound. You can study from home with just a smartphone and internet connection to hybrid models where you spend some time in class and some online, or if you know that you just can't study independently, then the classroom in Clear Waters Life Center-Clearbrook (CWLC) is for you.

You can enroll in Fast Track classes that meet online four hours a week for eight weeks and cover everything from GED and TEAS Prep to Vocational Soft Skills and Manufacturer's Math. You can earn a Minnesota state-issued Adult Diploma by combining your high school credits, passing GED tests scores, and independent study to meet additional requirements under the guidance of a trained Adult Diploma Program instructor. You can attend to improve your vocational skills like digital literacy (computer skills), earn a ServSafe certificate, write a resume, or brush up on math skills to help your children with their school work.

What is required? Time commitment and motivation to accomplish your goals. No cost to you except actual GED testing costs. The first step is to all Sherry at 763-453-0317 to set up your in-person enrollment and assessment appointments or just for more information. You can start as early as July 12. In person classes meet on the second floor of CWLC, 256 2nd Ave., SW, Tuesday evenings, 6:00-8:00 PM and Wednesday afternoons 12:30-3:00 PM. Adult Education is provided by the Northwest Service Coop ABE Consortium.

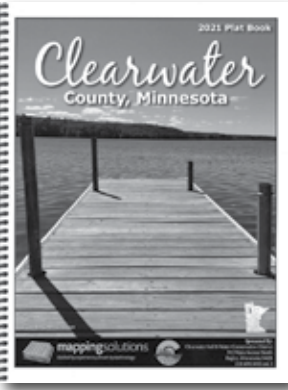

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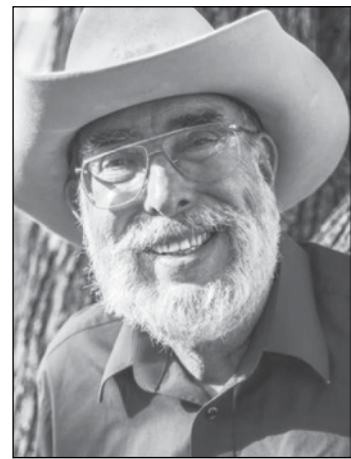

Clearbrook 2021 Drinking Water Report

Making Safe Drinking Water

Your drinking water comes from a groundwater source: two wells that are 185 feet deep, that draw water from the Quaternary Buried Artesian aquifer.

Clearbrook works hard to provide you with safe and reliable drinking water that meets federal and state water quality requirements. The purpose of this report is to provide you with information on your drinking water and how to protect our precious water resources.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency sets safe drinking water standards. These standards limit the amounts of specific contaminants allowed in drinking water. This ensures that tap water is safe to drink for most people. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration regulates the amount of certain contaminants in bottled water. Bottled water must provide the same public health protection as public tap water.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about

Clearbrook Monitoring Results

This report contains our monitoring results from January 1 to December 31, 2021.

We work with the Minnesota Department of Health to test drinking water for more than 100 contaminants. It is not unusual to detect contaminants in small amounts. No water supply is ever completely free of contaminants. Drinking water standards protect Minnesotans from substances that may be harmful to their health.

How to Read the Water Quality Data Tables

The tables below show the contaminants we found last year or the most recent time we sampled for that contaminant. They also show the levels of those contaminants and the Environmental Protection Agency's limits. Substances that we tested for but did not find are not included in the tables.

We sample for some contaminants less than once a year because their levels in water are not expected

to change from year to year. If we found any of these contaminants the last time we sampled for them, we included them in the tables below with the detection date.

We may have done additional monitoring for contaminants that are not included in the Safe Drinking Water Act. To request a copy of these results, call the Minnesota Department of Health at 651-201-4700 between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Some contaminants are monitored regularly throughout the year, and rolling (or moving) annual averages are used to manage compliance. Because of this averaging, there are times where the Range of Detected Test Results for the calendar year is lower than the Highest Average or Highest Single Test Result, because it occurred in the previous calendar year.

Definitions

■ **AL (Action Level):** The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

■ **EPA:** Environmental Protection Agency

■ **MCL (Maximum contaminant level):** The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

■ **MCLG (Maximum contaminant level goal):** The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin

of safety.

■ **MRDL (Maximum residual disinfectant level):** The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

■ **MRDLG (Maximum residual disinfectant level goal):** The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

■ **N/A (Not applicable):** Does not apply.

■ **pCi/l (picocuries per liter):** A measure of radioactivity.

■ **ppb (parts per billion):** One part per billion in water is like one drop in one billion drops of water, or about one drop in a swimming pool. ppb is the same as micrograms per liter (µg/l).

■ **ppm (parts per million):** One part per million is like one drop in one million drops of water, or about one cup in a swimming pool. ppm is the same as milligrams per liter (mg/l).

■ **PWSID:** Public water system identification.

Drinking Water Sources

Minnesota's primary drinking water sources are groundwater and surface water. Groundwater is the water found in aquifers beneath the surface of the land. Groundwater supplies 75 percent of Minnesota's drinking water. Surface water is the water in lakes, rivers, and streams above the surface of the land. Surface water supplies 25 percent of Minnesota's drinking water.

Contaminants can get in drinking water sources from the natural environment and from people's daily activities. There are five main types of contaminants in drinking water sources.

■ **Microbial contaminants,** such as viruses, bacteria, and parasites. Sources include sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, pets, and wildlife.

■ **Inorganic contaminants** include salts and metals from natural sources (e.g. rock and soil), oil and gas production, mining and farming operations, urban stormwater runoff, and wastewater discharges.

■ **Pesticides and herbicides** are chemicals used to reduce or kill unwanted plants and pests. Sources include agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and commercial and residential properties.

■ **Organic chemical contaminants** include synthetic and volatile organic compounds. Sources include industrial processes and petroleum production, gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.

■ **Radioactive contaminants** such as radium, thorium, and uranium isotopes come from natural sources (e.g. radon gas from soils and rock), mining operations, and oil and gas production.

The Minnesota Department of Health provides information about your drinking water source(s) in a source water assessment, including:

■ How Clearbrook is protecting your drinking water source(s);

■ Nearby threats to your drinking water sources;

■ How easily water and pollution can move from the surface of the land into drinking water sources, based on natural geology and the way wells are constructed.

Lead in Drinking Water

You may be in contact with lead through paint, water, dust, soil, food, hobbies, or your job. Coming in contact with lead can cause serious health problems for everyone. There is no safe level of lead. Babies, children under six years, and pregnant women are at the highest risk.

Lead is rarely in a drinking water source, but it can get in your drinking water as it passes through lead

service lines and your household plumbing system. Clearbrook is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but it cannot control the plumbing materials used in private buildings.

Read below to learn how you can protect yourself from lead in drinking water.

1. **Let the water run** for 30-60 seconds before using it for drinking or cooking if the water has not been turned on in over six hours. If you have a lead service line, you may need to let the water run longer. A service line is the underground pipe that brings water from the main water pipe under the street to your home.

■ The only way to know if lead has been reduced by letting it run is to check with a test. If letting the water run does not reduce lead, consider other options to reduce your exposure.

2. **Use cold water** for drinking, making food, and making baby formula. Hot water releases more lead from pipes than cold water.

3. **Test your water.** In most cases, letting the water run and using cold water for drinking and cooking should keep lead levels low in your drinking water. If you are still concerned about lead, arrange with a laboratory to test your tap water. Testing your water is important if young children or pregnant women drink your tap water.

Conservation

Conservation is essential, even in the land of 10,000 lakes. For example, in parts of the metropolitan area, groundwater is being used faster than it can be replaced. Some agricultural regions in Minnesota are vulnerable to drought, which can affect crop yields and municipal water supplies.

We must use our water wisely. Below are some tips to help you and your family conserve – and save money in the process.

■ Fix running toilets—they can waste hundreds of gallons of water.

■ Turn off the tap while shaving or brushing your teeth.

■ Shower instead of bathe. Bathing uses more water than showering, on average.

■ Only run full loads of laundry, and set the washing machine to the correct water level.

■ Only run the dishwasher when it's full.

■ Use water-efficient appliances (look for the WaterSense label).

■ Use water-friendly landscaping, such as native plants.

■ When you do water your yard, water slowly, deeply, and less frequently. Water early in the morning and close to the ground.

Home Water Treatment

Overview

Most Minnesotans, whether they drink from a public water supply or a private well, have drinking water that does not need treatment for health protection. Water treatment units are best for improving the physical qualities of water—the taste, color, or odor.

No single treatment process can remove all substances in water. If you decide to install a home water treatment unit, choose a unit certified and labeled to reduce or remove the substance of concern. If there is more than one substance you want to remove from your water, you may need to combine several treatment processes into one system.

Even well-designed treatments systems can fail. You should continue to test your drinking water after you install a treatment unit. All home water treatment units need regular maintenance to work correctly. Regular maintenance may include changing filters, disinfecting the unit, or cleaning scale buildup. Always install, clean, and maintain a treatment unit according to the manufacturer's recommendations.

Beware of Water Treatment Scams

False claims, deceptive sales pitches, or scare tactics have been used by some water treatment companies. Every person has a right to decide what is best for themselves and their family, and you may choose to install additional water treatment to further lower the levels of contaminants of emerging concern, chlorine, and other chemicals in your water. However, you should be cautious about purchasing a water treatment system. The Pros and Cons of Home Water Softening

When considering whether to use a water softener, contact your public water system to find out if you have hard water. Many systems treat for hardness, making water softeners unnecessary.

Water softeners are a water treatment device. They remove water hardness (dissolved calcium and magnesium). Water softeners must be installed and maintained properly to be safe and effective. The benefits of soft water include:

■ Increased efficiency for soaps and detergents.

■ Reduction in mineral staining on fixtures and in pipes.

■ A potential increase in the lifespan of water heaters.

The drawbacks of soft water include:

■ Operation and maintenance costs.

■ More sodium. People on low-sodium diets should consult a doctor if they plan to regularly consume softened water.

■ The production of salt brine as a byproduct. This can have negative effects at wastewater treatment plants and on ecosystems. Reduce the amount of salt brine used or install a salt-free system.

Monitoring Results - Regulated Substances

In addition to testing drinking water for contaminants regulated under the Safe Drinking Water Act, we sometimes also monitor for contaminants that are not regulated. Unregulated contaminants do not have legal limits for drinking water.

Detection alone of a regulated or unregulated contaminant should not cause concern. The meaning of a detection should be determined considering current health effects information. We are often still learning about the health effects, so this information can change over time.

The following table shows the unregulated contaminants we detected last year, as well as human-health based guidance values for comparison, where available. The

comparison values are based only on potential health impacts and do not consider our ability to measure contaminants at very low concentrations or the cost and technology of prevention and/or treatment. They may be set at levels that are costly, challenging, or impossible for water systems to meet (for example, large-scale treatment technology may not exist for a given contaminant).

A person drinking water with a contaminant at or below the comparison value would be at little or no risk for harmful health effects. If the level of a contaminant is above the comparison value, people of a certain age or with special health conditions - like a fetus, infants, children, elderly, and people with impaired

immunity – may need to take extra precautions. Because these contaminants are unregulated, EPA and MDH require no particular action based on detection of an unregulated contaminant. We are notifying you of the unregulated contaminants we have detected as a public education opportunity.

Some People Are More Vulnerable to Contaminants in Drinking Water

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. The developing fetus and therefore pregnant women may also be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water. These people or their caregivers should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers.
