Wishards are newest Emerging Leaders

Dudley and Cindy Wishard of Clearbrook are the new Clearwater County Emerging Leaders. They were named at a special meeting at the Peterson Pavilion at the Clearwater County Fair on Friday, August 8. They are the 37th couple to be chosen for this program.
They follow Beth and Matt Huschle of Bagley for the honor last year.
The Emerging Leadership Program had its roots in 1961 at the Red River Valley Winters Show. County Kings were chosen and that title changed in 1994 to Agassiz Leaders. They are from rural northwestern and west central Minnesota, ages 30-45, who symbolize the future of the area. They are farmers, educators and agribusiness men and women who have been identified and selected by their peers to take part in the program.
The Wishards live south of Clearbrook with their four children, Sam, Cooper, August and Ellie. Both are graduates of Clearbrook-Gonvick High School. He in 1995 and she in 1996. Parents of the couple are Stan and Lois Gray and Rio and Bonnie Wishard.

Also just announced to represent their counties this year are Eli and Alison Swenson of Shelly for Norman County, Joe and Tabitha Hass of Hawley for Clay County, and Noel and Tana Anderson of Crookston for West Polk County. Many of the other counties are still in the process of selecting their candidates. The Emerging Leadership Program includes representatives from Northwest and West Central Minnesota.

Clearwater County ELP Liaison Stacy Peterson stated, "that the backing of the program is the University of Minnesota Extension. The funding partnership comes from Northwest Minnesota Foundation and University of Minnesota Foundation.
This program dates back to the early '60's as the King Agassiz Program where Clearwater county joined the fun in 1969. This was when it was a part of the RRVWS (Red River Valley Winter Shows) that were held in Crookston for a week. Each county sent a representative to be the king of the county in hopes to win the honor of becoming the King Agassiz and having that title. Since then it has evolved and changed a bit to the Emerging Leader-

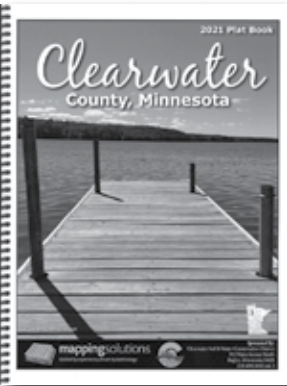

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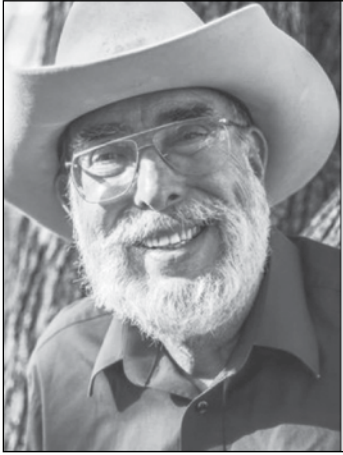

Do you know the red flags of a scam?

According to the Investor Protection Trust, one out of every five persons over the age of 65 has been victimized by a financial swindle. One recent study estimated that older Americans are defrauded out of nearly three billion dollars each year.

Be sure that you, your parents, and elderly friends and relatives know how to protect themselves from fraud. For example, everyone should avoid giving out personal information to strangers in response to texts, emails or calls, regardless of who they claim to be or where they claim to be calling from. Be alert for behaviors that may indicate someone you know is a victim of financial exploitation, such as unpaid bills, an unexplained lack of money or the sudden appearance of a new “friend.”

You can avoid becoming a victim by following these 11 self-defense tips, developed by the Minnesota Department of Commerce and the North American Securities Administration Association, Inc. (NASAA).

Don't be a courtesy victim. Con artists will not hesitate to exploit your good manners. Save your politeness for friends and family members, not strangers looking for a quick buck!

Trust, but verify. Say “no” to anyone who presses you to make a quick decision and take time to research the salesperson, firm, and investment opportunity. You can check the status of an individual's license at BrokerCheck or if an investment is registered with the Commerce Department by calling 651-539-1638.

Stay in control. Be wary of anyone who suggests investing your money in something you don't understand, or who urges you to leave everything in their hands.

Don't judge a book by its cover. Successful con artists sound and look extremely professional and can make even

the riskiest investment deal sound safe. Don't be fooled by the sound of their voice on the phone because it has no bearing on the soundness of the investment opportunity.

Don't make decisions out of fear. Fear can cloud your good judgment and cause rushed decisions. An investment that is right for you will make sense because you understand it and feel comfortable with the risk involved.

Monitor your investments and ask tough questions. Don't add to the mistake of trusting a fraudulent investment professional or con artist by failing to keep an eye on the progress of your investment. Insist on regular written reports, and look for signs of excessive or unauthorized trading of your funds. Ask questions about cyber-security. Make sure the firm or individual selling you a product has a plan in place to protect your private data from cyber threats.

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Look for trouble withdrawing your principle or cashing out profits. Some investments do have certain periods when you cannot withdraw your funds, but you must be notified of these restrictions before you invest.

Don't let embarrassment or fear keep you from reporting investment fraud or abuse. Every day you delay reporting fraud or abuse is another day the con artist is spending your money and finding new victims.

Beware of “asset recovery” scams. These scams pack a “double whammy” by targeting individuals who have already been victims of fraud. They will lure victims with the promise of getting your money back for an upfront fee and its unlikely they will deliver on their promise.

Beware of “Senior Specialists.” Fraudsters may imply a certain level of training on

issues important to people 55 and older to give you a false sense of security, however, this “training” may be nothing more than a sales tactic. They often recommend liquidating assets to purchase other, more risky products like indexed or variable annuities.

Report suspected fraud, scams, or financial abuse to the Minnesota Department of Commerce. Your call may prevent others from being victimized.

Hunting regulations, deer hunting licenses now available

Deer hunting licenses can be purchased starting today and the 2022 Minnesota hunting regulations are now available on the DNR website. Print copies of the regulations will be available in early August wherever licenses are sold.

When deer hunters venture out into fields and forests this fall, they will find healthy deer populations faring well in most of Minnesota, ample harvest opportunities, and a continued commitment to managing chronic wasting disease management adaptively statewide.

“We're excited about deer hunting this year,” said Kelly Straka, wildlife section manager for the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. “Hunters in 20% of our deer permit areas will have increased opportunities for harvest, and opportunities in 70% of DPAs remain unchanged from last year.

Minnesota has the following deer seasons:

Archery: Saturday, September 17th, through Saturday, December 31st

Youth and early antlerless: Thursday, October 20th, through Sunday, October 23rd

Firearms: Saturday, November 5th, with various closing dates depending on a hunter's DPA

Muzzleloader: Saturday,

November 26th, through Sunday, December 11th

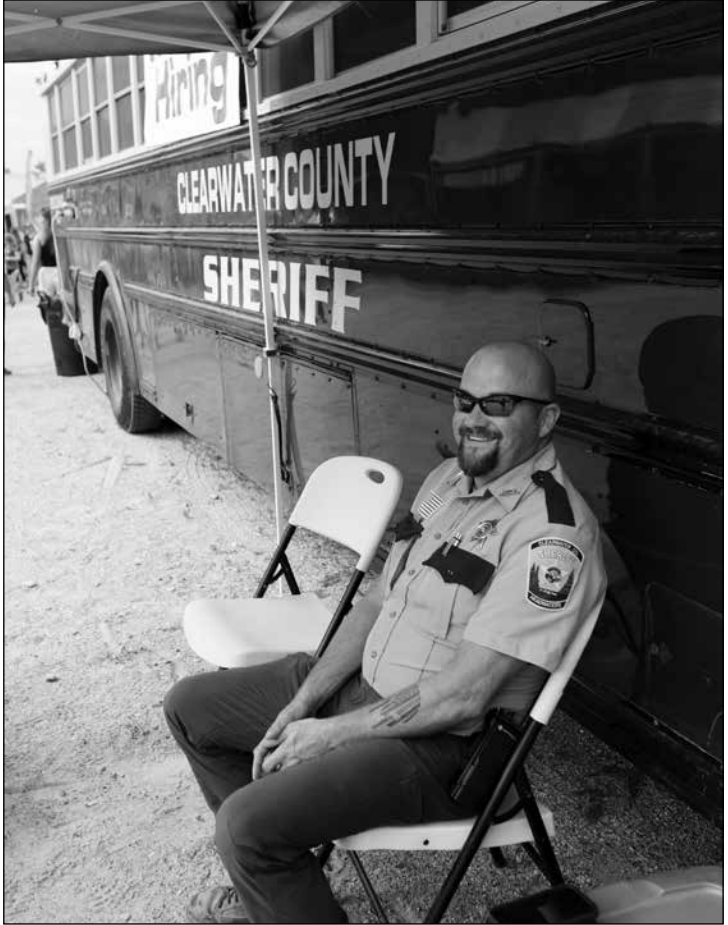
Changes for this year include:

- Eight more DPAs included in the early antlerless season. Hunters will also have more license options for the early antlerless season.
- Increased bag limits or lottery permits in 28 DPAs, the same limits in 90 DPAs and decreased limits in 12 DPAs.

In addition to deer seasons, hunters can participate in special deer hunts. The DNR, municipalities and organizations across

Minnesota offer opportunities to hunt at special times and in areas that might regularly be closed to hunting. Participation in these hunts is limited and often requires special registration. More information is available on the DNR website.

Firearm and muzzleloader hunters who want to harvest antlerless deer in a DPA designated as lottery need to purchase their license by Thursday, September 8th. Hunters who purchase their license by September 8th are automatically entered into the lottery for the DPA or special hunt area they declare. No application is needed to take antlerless deer in permit areas with either sex, two-deer limit, three-deer limit, or five-deer limit designations.

Leonard Centennial 1922-2022

Women of Clearwater County

Hilda Elhers of Leonard 1884-1966

Hilda was born in Norway on Oct. 5,1884 and came to America with her parents Lars and Lena Olson in 1892. They first settled in Murray County MN but soon came to Leonard where the family set up a home-stead. Hilda married Henry Ehlers in 1915. (Although some records also say married in 1913 and another says 1916.) Hilda and Henry raised a daughter Gladys, born in 1919; Gladys married Emil Rhen and moved to Oregon. She died in 2004. Hilda's brothers Bert, Julius and Ole Larson also lived near Leonard.

Hilda was active in the Lutheran Church in Leonard and was known for her willingness to help neighbors in times of sickness and sorrow, often being away from home for days while she tended to those who needed help. She worked as a grocery clerk for Leonard French and later for Magnus-

son's, and NH Strand. She was also a mail carrier, working the route from Leonard to Neving; with horse and buggy, in all kinds of weather.

They lived for a time in Oregon, and worked in the Shipyards during WWII, but returned to Leonard in the late 1940's.

Hilda died on August 30, 1966 and is buried at Norway Lake cemetery in Holst Township.
