Many items on the last school board meeting August 15

Kathy Hushle and Tammie Ehlers brought a proposal to the Clearbrook-Gonvick school board at their meeting on Monday, August 15. A survey had been done with students to find out interest in having softball and baseball as a program in the school. Kathy has been looking at a matching grant that the Minnesota Twins organization is giving out and that application is due mid March. They thought about girls 9 to 13 and boys that had been in the cadets and Pee Wee teams this summer. The fields at Kloster Park would be ideal. They were going to go to the Clearbrook City Council as well concerning the matter. They would have two fields for each group. Being this was the home of Wes Westrum and this would be something that students who are not in track would be able to participate in for the spring season. More information will be gathered for the board. Kathy had volunteered to be the softball coach.

Superintendent Report
Superintendent Grow told the board that their top priority was to find a Ind. Tech Instructor and another custodian. He reminded board members that filing for the board closes this week. Fall Sports started August 14. The legislature was not in session so nothing to report. Elementary snack charges were not 10 cents but went up to 20 cents. Eide Bailey started the audit of the school. Ehlers will be going over the referendum expiration and what the district wants to do in the future.

The gym floor is behind as the company could not get enough people to do the project. Talking with the coaches they decided to start next summer on June 5. They have not paid anything yet and the company will honor the bid that they gave the district. The new lights are up and Virgil and crew have the waxing done even with a short staff. They will be working on the school web site for new developments.

Negotiations are still waiting for times to set up meetings.

National School Lunch Program, School Breakfast Program and Child and Adult Care Food Program

The Minnesota Department of Education has announced the household income guidelines established by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for free and reduced-price meals through the National School Lunch Program, School Breakfast Program and the Child and Adult Care Food Program. The income guidelines are effective from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023.

Contact your school, childcare center, family childcare home or adult care center to find out whether it participates in these programs.

Participating schools and childcare centers that charge separately for meals will provide a form upon request to apply for free or reduced-price meals. Most participating centers and all participating family childcare homes provide meals to all enrolled participants without any separate charge.

At schools and centers that charge separately for meals, households with incomes that are less than or equal to the guidelines for free meals qualify for free meals. Households with incomes that are greater than the guidelines for free meals, but less than or equal to the guidelines for reduced-price meals, qualify for reduced-price meals.

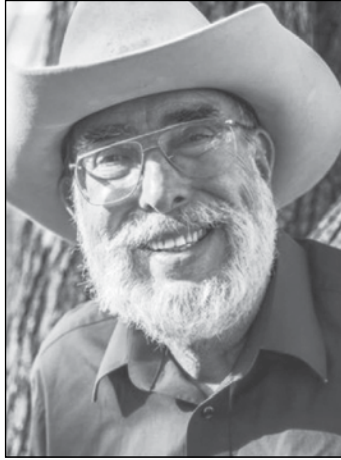

were happy to hang out with friends and get a break from the chores that waited for us when we got home. There were also many kids from the big cities of Gonvick, Gully and Berner that we envied, but none of us ever worried about the roof over our heads. The school building held a place of community and a place of connection for us.

Recently I joined the board of Clear Waters Life and I've had several opportunities to be in the Gonvick building. Occasionally I think about Betty Masoner when I walk down the hall, Frank Lien when I go to the green houses and Ruth Larson when I walk by the Principals office. No, Mrs Larson wasn't the principal. She was our History teacher, but for some reason, I had a lot of memorable experiences getting into trouble in her class. But most of my reminiscing is done when I look at all the pictures of classmates I left behind when we

moved in 1973.

Some of the old Gonvick School that I knew is not there anymore. But thanks to the grace of God, vision and hard work of community minded people of the Clear Waters Life Center, what is there, is alive and thriving. Today you can walk down the halls and still see the memorabilia, but the kids in the gym playing pickle ball are now in their 50's, 60's and 70's. Those elementary rooms don't teach reading, writing and arithmetic, but they do have art and community education classes. Shop still happens, but the shop room moved to the former gym locker areas and is producing some beautifully restored furniture. Oh yes, and that home economics room hops every second Friday night of the month when the Tuscany room becomes the "go to" place for Friday Night Out in Clearwater County. And forget me not, every spring that old band room, comes alive with a melody of flowers and plants in what is now called, the Grow It Greenhouse.

Friends, if I can switch gears with reminiscing aside, whether you went to the Gonvick school or not, the fact that you are now reading this letter proves you have some connection to this place. Now is our time to worry about keeping the roof over our heads. The patches on patches are letting the water through. And when it rains in Gonvick, there are buckets all over the place. We have estimated that the cost for repairs to the roof and the steel for the remaining uncovered roof to be \$40000. This is an amount far above the discretionary funds of the Clear Waters Life Center. I hate to sound like a fundraiser. I'm not. If you are like me, it seems like I have a half dozen overwhelming requests for money in my mailbox every day. There are so many legitimate needs out there, but today I'm asking you, will you this one time, consider donating to CWLC for the roof of the Gonvick facility. We believe it is still a place of community and connection worth investing in. Please join me in writing a check to CWLC for the Gonvick Roof Project. And thanks for listening to an old person reminisce.

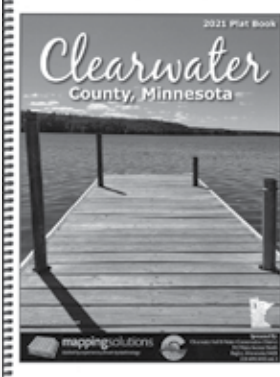

The Clearwater County Food Shelf experienced an increase in clientele and food needs during COVID in 2020. Last year, post-COVID, our numbers continued to increase. 2022 has brought supply chain shortages to deal with (even from North Country Food Bank) and inflation for our Food Shelf and our clients. Comparing the first half of 2021 with the first half of 2022, our food shelf has distributed 25,000 pounds more food, served 218 more families, and our clients 65+ years of age

have increased 33%. The food insecurity needs in our community are great.

Clearwater County Food Shelf is located in the basement of the American Legion in Bagley, the entrance is on the east side of the building. We accept food/monetary donations each Wednesday during our hours of operation (10 am-2 pm). Monetary donations can also be made through the mail: CCFS, PO BX 578, Bagley, MN 56621. Forms of Sexual Violence

Believing and breaking down the barriers of what is true and what is false when dealing with sexual assault can be difficult. This is going to be an eye-opening read for many and a confirmation for others.

Forms and definitions of sexual violence are as follows.

Child Sexual Abuse also known as child molestation, when an adult or older adolescent uses a child for sexual stimulation.

Sexual Assault (stranger/non stranger) is illegal sexual

contact that involves force and is without the consent of the person. Types of sexual assault include activities of a sexual nature such as groping, penetration of orifices and rape. Acquaintance Rape is a sexual assault that is committed by someone who knows the victim.

Date Rape or Marital Rape takes place while on a date or in your own home by a spouse.

Intimate Partner Sexual Violence is the most common type of sexual violence and a common component of domestic violence. Most of these cases go unreported. Drug Facilitated Sexual Assault is an assault that occurs when a person is incapacitated due to the influence of any mind-

altering substances, such as alcohol or intentionally being given a date rape drug.

Sexual Harassment is the behavior characterized by making unwelcome and inappropriate sexual comments, actions and physical advances in the workplace or other professional or social situations. Exposing takes place when an individual purposefully displays one's genitals in public causing others to be alarmed or offended. Indecent exposure is often done for sexual gratification or to entice a sexual response.

Obscene phone calls happen when an unsolicited telephone caller uses foul language and improper sexual language with intent to annoy, abuse, threaten or harass. These calls are usually done without disclosing the identity of the caller. Sexual Exploitation takes place when someone is in a vulnerable situation, such as needing money, food, housing, transportation, medication, drugs or alcohol. The victims are encouraged to submit to sexual favors to obtain items of survival.

Sex Trafficking is also known as modern day slavery. It is the action or practice of illegally transporting people from one country or area to another for the purpose of sexual exploitation. Sex Trafficking is the recruitment, harboring, provision, transportation or soliciting of a person for the purpose of commercial sex acts for monetary gain. Internet Related Crimes happen when abusers assault victims using the internet to conduct and facilitate unwanted sexual advances. These threats of violence on victims causes them to suffer from fear and/or anxiety.

Child Pornography unlawfully exploits children for sexual stimulation. This can be produced with direct involvement of sexual assault of a child or through videos, photos or internet usage to obtain such materials. Child pornography is Illegal.

Here are some statistics that are very eye opening. One in 6 American women and 1 in 33 American men have experienced different degrees of rape as a child or an adult. Sexual assault is not limited to females and numbers have proven that abuse of men is on the rise. With this being said, we need to reach out to our children with strong direction on what is good touch and what is bad touch. We need to continue to present information to them through their school years on sexual violence. The education does not stop at the school age level, as sexual violence knows no age limits, so outreach and education throughout the community is vital to keep sexual assault at bay.

Minnesota’s historic northwest celebrates 25 years

One of the things we appreciate most about small-town and rural life in northwest Minnesota has to be the way we can join with our neighbors to get things done. A very successful example of this concept is a regional historical society known as The Minnesota’s Historic Northwest, which is noting its 25th birthday this summer.

This group, which includes historical museums in twelve counties, including: Marshall County Historical Society and The Old Home Town Museum in Stephen. The group takes an active role in bringing in grant funds and special projects that wouldn’t be easy to obtain if individual museums were on their own.

When the group first organized in 1997 it was known as Minnesota’s Historic Great Northwest, with the name being shortened in 2000 to its current one. The organization’s mission is “to routinely join together our historic and cultural organizations in order to promote our area’s history. Our focus is to plan group events and projects that celebrate our area’s richness and diversity.”

To that end, the group sponsored annual “Preserving A Sense of Place” seminars with themes like Community, Culture and the Visitor; Portraying History to The Traveler and Through Living History. The group has also hosted workshops presented by the Min-

nesota Historical Society on collections care, displaying Native American artifacts, and archive and library techniques. A summer two-day auto tour was promoted in 2003 where participants traveled to museums in the northwest and at each location enjoyed a special tour and a meal or treat before heading on to the next location. Recently the group has partnered with Minnesota Historical Society and the Minnesota Alliance of Local History Museums for ongoing workshops and events.

Currently twelve county and a half dozen local museums make up the Northwest group: the county museums of Becker, Beltrami, Clearwater, Kittson, Lake of the Woods, Marshall, Mahnomen, Roseau, Red Lake, Norman, Pennington, and Polk. In these twelve counties there are over 50 historic sites ranging from county museums to a Wilderness Drive to more than a dozen National Registry Historic Sites, including two locations in Marshall County. The local museums who are active include: the East Polk Heritage Museum, The Sand Hill Settlement Society, the Oklee museum, the Tri-River Pioneer Museum, The Warroad Heritage Center, the North Beltrami Heritage Center, and The Old Home Town Museum.

In 1998 the Historic NW was honored with an Achievement Award at the Red River Valley Heritage Society Awards. The group frequently publishes an area brochure available to trav-

elers in the northwest region. For many years, participating museums have submitted stories and information about upcoming events at their museum that are compiled into a newsletter. It is mailed to all members and friends of each participating museum so that it reaches over 2,500 people nation-wide.

One of the largest projects completed was a 2008 Minnesota Sesquicentennial project that included developing a traveling exhibit and accompanying book that celebrated the northwest regions shared and individual histories. A total of 150 Photographs from ten counties traveled the region during 2008 to celebrate the 150th Birthday of Minnesota. Those same 150 photographs were bound into a “coffee table” book as a sesquicentennial keepsake. This project won a Merit Award from the American Association of State and Local History.

In 2010 the partners developed a new traveling exhibit: Faith Matters: Churches of Minnesota’s Historic Northwest. It is a photo exhibit of the area’s historic churches, which traveled throughout the region in 2010 - 2012. This project was funded by a grant from the Hartz Foundation. Also, in 2010 the group received a grant from the Minnesota Historical Society for a series of workshops on collections care and proper storage of artifacts. Participating museums received training from peers and an assortment

of storage materials and boxes. In 2014 travelling exhibit was developed that features the Inventors, Innovators and Entrepreneurs of Northwest Minnesota. Funded in part with Hartz Foundation grant funds and a grant from the Minnesota Historical Society, the exhibit is currently traveling around the region. “Innovators, Inventors and Entrepreneurs” won a Minnesota History Award in the Public Programs division from the Minnesota Alliance of Local History Museums.

The group networks with non-museum organizations as well. “The King of Trails” a group that promotes Highway 75; area chambers of commerce, the Minnesota Department of Tourism, arts groups, The Pembina Trail RC&D and area economic development organizations have all been partners with the Historic Northwest in its various projects. The Northwest Regional Development Commission facilitates meetings and assists with many aspects of the newsletter and workshop planning.

The Historic NW partners adopted a policy and code of conduct in 2001 where each participant agreed to conform to three codes of conduct: to make a good effort to attend meetings; to follow through on commitments made to particular assignments; and to abstain from interference with one another’s policies. In 2009 the group applied for and received a 501c3 non-profit designation, so a more formal set

of bylaws and constitution was adopted at that time.

The group has changed and evolved slightly over the years. At any given time six or more organizations may be participating, while others may opt out of a particular project. Each project interests different organizations at different levels so it is a true collaboration every time a project is undertaken.

The group maintains a web site, mnhistoricnw.org which lists our museums, information about hours and events, and will soon have a blog component.

There is a small annual membership fee to belong, which pays for the web site costs. Organizations with paid staff pay \$25.00 per year and all-volunteer organizations pay \$15.00. Each organization paid a \$100.00 one-time initial fee to join. As each new project is implemented, participants pay an equal share of costs. Meetings are held on an “as needed” basis, usually quarterly, with an annual meeting in the early Spring (usually February) and a fall meeting to plan the next year’s events.

In 2018 the Historic NW received a large grant from the Minnesota Historical Society Legacy Grant program to create a traveling exhibit on the Fur Trade. Fifteen stories were developed that travel quarterly to locations to tell the story of the fur trade in our region. This exhibit will be traveling around the region for the next two years.

Officers in the organization come from all of the counties. Ethel Thorlacius from Marshall County was its founding member and longtime president. Dean Vikan from Polk County, Solveig Kitchell from Norman County, Tamara Edevold from Clearwater County, and Marlys Hirst from Lake of the Woods have all served terms as president of the Historic Northwest.

Others who have served as officers of the organization include: Amy Degerstrom from Becker county, Cindy Adams from Kittson County, Kent Broten from Marshall County, the late Norma Hanson from The Goodridge Area Historical Society, Diane Mostad, North Beltrami Heritage center, Lindsay Marshall from Lake of the Woods, Charleen Haugen and Britt Dahl from Roseau County, Ann Lindblom from Mahnomen County and Alden Anderson from Norman County,

Current officers are Tamara Edevold, Clearwater County, President; Lindsay Marshall, Lake of the Woods County, Vice President; Britt Dahl, Roseau County, Treasurer and Diane Mostad, North Beltrami Heritage Center is Secretary.

Regional Library to Close September 5 for Labor Day

All Lake Agassiz Regional Library (LARL) branches and LINK sites will be closed on Monday, September 5 in observance of Labor Day, with operation resuming Tuesday, September 6.

LARL’s branch libraries are located in Ada, Bagley, Barnesville, Breckenridge, Climax, Crookston, Detroit Lakes, Fertile, Fosston, Hawley, Mahnomen, McIntosh and Moorhead. LARL’s LINK sites are found in Cormorant, Frazee, Gonvick, Halstad, Hendrum, Lake Park, Rothsay, Twin Valley and Ulen.

Lake Agassiz Regional Library is a consolidated public library system comprised of 13 branch libraries and nine LINK sites serving the residents of seven counties in northwest Minnesota.
