County tax levy reduced 3.66% for 2023

During the Clearwater County Board of Commissioners meeting on September 13, County Auditor Allan Paulson presented the proposed departmental budgets and tax levy for the commissioners to consider. (Budget & Levy tables are on page 7).

Commissioner Dean Newland made the motion to approve for truth-in-taxation purposes the departmental budgets under the County Revenue Fund for fiscal year 2023. The motion was seconded by Commissioner John Nelson and the motion carried.

Paulson explained that while other counties in the area will be increasing their tax levies from 2 to 8%, Clearwater County benefited from the Enbridge Line 3 replacement project, which will allow the county to reduce the tax levy by 3.66%. Commissioner Mark Larson made the motion to approve the 2023 Levy for Truth-in-Taxation purposes as shown in the table. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Mark Titera, and the motion carried.

Auditor/Treasurer - In other business, Paulson submitted invoices that needed to be reviewed and approved. Commissioner Newland made the motion to authorize the Auditor to pay submitted invoices of \$210,405.64 from the County Revenue Fund and \$25,546.56 from the Nursing Service Fund. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Titera and was carried. Commissioner Neal Illies made a motion to approve an application for cancellation of forfeiture on parcel 19.031.0450 due to a clerical error in 2020 when it forfeited.

Commissioner Nelson seconded the motion and the motion carried. Commissioner John Nelson made a motion to approve payment of North Country Communications Coordinator position - Darla Hoie-Ostrom at Range 22, Step 1. Full time. She will work more than 1040 hours per year. This position is fully covered by the North Country Infrastructure Grant and ends when the grant ends 3-31-2024. The motion was seconded Commissioner Larson and the motion carried with Commissioner Illies being the only opposing vote.

Soil & Water - Chester Powell submitted a resolution to submit, adopt and implement a Clearwater River Headwaters Watershed comprehensive management plan. Commissioner Larson made a motion to approve the resolution, seconded by Commissioner Titera, and the motion carried.

County Engineer - Dan Sauvé presented two requests for the commissioners to review. The first was bills that need to be paid. Commissioner Illies made the motion to approve the payment of highway department bills totaling \$10,813.23, second by Commissioner Newland, with the motion being carried. The second was for the purchase of a brush mower. By general consent, the commissioners waived the 3-day notice and Commissioner Titera made a motion to purchase the brush mower from Willberg's Auto Center for \$2,599.99. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Larson and was carried.

Assessor - Terrie Johnson brought a contract for archiving for the commissioners to review. Commissioner Nelson moved to

approve and sign the contract with Vanguard Appraisals, Inc. for an archive module and approve the cost of \$2,380.00 for the service. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Titera and was passed. The funds will come from the Assessor's computer expense account. The contract had a 20% discount and was locked in for the same price for 2024.

Information Technology - Stuart Lien asked for permission to hire two full-time specialists for his department. Commissioner Newland made the motion to authorize the Information Technology Director to advertise for two full-time permanent IT specialist positions, which was seconded by Commissioner Illies and was carried.

Sheriff - Darin Halverson has two staff positions to fill. Commissioner Illies made a motion to authorize the Sheriff to advertise for a full-time deputy to fill a vacancy. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Larson and was carried. Commissioner Newland then made a motion authorizing the sheriff to hire Michael Anderson as a full-time communications/corrections officer for the jail. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Titera and was carried. Commissioner Larson made a motion to authorize payment in the amount of \$1,000 to Tim Quinn for costs of repairing his driveway. Commissioner Nelson seconded the motion and it carried.

Veteran Services - Board coordinator Amie Jordan presented a request on behalf of

Clearbrook City Council meeting

Julie Prosser commented on the Community Garden plots that she has been pursuing. The lot near Kloster Park she felt was not close enough to town. She really liked the old football field on the south end of the community center. That does not have a water source and city maintenance was going to try mapping to see if there was any lines. Julie wanted permission from the council to approach Brookfield Management for an area next to the dam. She has been doing grant writing for Clear Waters Life Center and would like to write a grant for support of rural communities to have the council meetings live streamed for citizens to watch.

Joy Walberg met concerning the washout by her property. She felt the project was not complete and needed corrective action. She had pictures that Joe Sutherland with Widseth Smith and Nolting was going to check out the next day.

Tina Kerrsen Novy wanted to know if the council had any ideas to promote business on main street. She is located next to Thrifty White. They suggested she talk with the Athletic Director at the school about sports message and on December 3 Santa Claus Day was going to be held and that might be a good time to have a booth set up.

Police Chief Ryan Solee gave his report. The dirt bike problems have been taken care of. He is receiving back from the state \$3,788 in surplus training dollars money. He would like to have that carried over to next year to help with the budget.

He presented the livestock ordinance No. 124 to the council for their first reading. It is determined that no livestock animals of any sort will be allowed within the city limits of Clearbrook. This ordinance does not apply to dogs, cats, rabbits, guinea pigs, hamsters or reptiles. A second reading will be done at a future meeting.

There was no other action on the trucks being parked or driven on the new streets as it is rated for 5 tons. There is a designated area in town to park overnight.

He presented the incident report which included: 911 Hang Up 2; Animal Related 2; ATV Complaint 1; Burglary 1; City Ordinance 1; Civil Complaint 1; Civil Process 1; disorderly 1; Disturbance 5; Drug Related 3; Information Only 4; Welfare Check 3 for a total of 55 records.

Adam Krog, Clearbrook Fire Department Chief gave his report. There were 14 calls for the month. They included Medical 10, Structure fire 1, Vehicle Accident 1, and Vehicle fire 1, both canceled enroute and 1 meeting. They have accepted

Jackie Hartwig back on the department after her one year leave of absence. The annual fall fund raising banquet will be held on Saturday, October 15 at the community center. They will be serving pulled pork along with other items. Money will be used for the med van transmission that has some issues.

Karra Weems, manager of the Liquor Store gave her report with a \$7,269.67 profit for the month of August. They will be having Karaoke on Friday, September 23. The building is being painted and the chimney needs to be finished. Dart tournament for September 17. The new compressor is up and running for the Walk-in Cooler. There will be a wedding dance at the liquor store on October 1.

Mark Snobl gave the maintenance report. They will be sweeping the streets and cleaning storm sewers. Pond #3 had a discharge. Pavement on Elm Street is not done. There are sewer services that need to be done. Man holes will have to be raised a little. Gas Services is being set up for C & G. Water meter in Brookfield has been taken care of.

Ryan Solee gave the pool update. They will be closing up the pool at the end of the month. It has all been winterized. There is a leak that will be addressed. After the state inspection the floor in the bathroom needs epoxy layers. North County Hardware has for \$1,800 and Ryan offered to lay that down this year.

City Council clerk Lucie Thompson was up next. The council approved the pay App #11 for \$924,396.81 for the

Suicide is a distressing public health issue that leaves a lasting impact on everyone. Most of us know someone who has been directly affected by suicide or a suicide attempt.

7 Things Attempted Survivors Wish Their Family and Friends Knew:

When you find out that a loved one had attempted suicide, you may feel overwhelmed with questions. Why didn't they come to me? What did I miss? And most perplexing, What do I do now? The Lifeline asked people to recall the aftermath of their attempts to give you some insight into what they wanted and needed from their friends and family following their darkest moments. While there's no formula or one-size-fits-all answer, we hope learning from these attempt survivors will help you feel confident in sup-

porting your loved one.

1. "I want to talk about my pain."

I wished I could talk to my parents about what I was going through, but I was scared they would get mad at me. I knew that their anger would stem from the fact that they love me and hate the way I feel. But I still needed to talk about my pain, even if they didn't know how to help. - Shelby

2. "Please don't make me feel guilty."

The guilt that people put on me after my attempts didn't help. They would say things like, "Don't you know what it would have done to me if you had died?" That just made me depressed all over again. Now on top of everything else there was all this guilt, so I punished myself. - Ashley

3. "Hug me."

What helped me most was when people didn't ask me questions like "Why did you want to do it?" or "What is so freaking bad about your life?" and instead just gave me hugs and told me they loved me. I wanted to know that they still want me in their lives. - Joe

4. "Please don't leave me alone."

No matter how hard I fight to get away, push others far from me, just don't let me be alone. Being alone equals time. Time to think, time to dwell, time to act. - Stormi

5. "I wish they had seen the signs and asked if I was thinking about suicide."

I'm not blaming anyone, but I wish my family had known the warning signs of suicide and asked me if I was thinking about killing myself. I don't know if it would have made a difference. It's just that so many people are scared to mention the "s" word and think that asking someone if they're thinking of suicide is going to encourage them or put the idea in their head. That's not the case at all. - Melanie

6. "Tell me you love me."

I needed help and love and support. I needed them to tell me that they loved me and that I was okay as a person, that I meant something to them and that I had value and worth. Most importantly, that I didn't need to be fixed. I just needed them to be there. - Kimberly

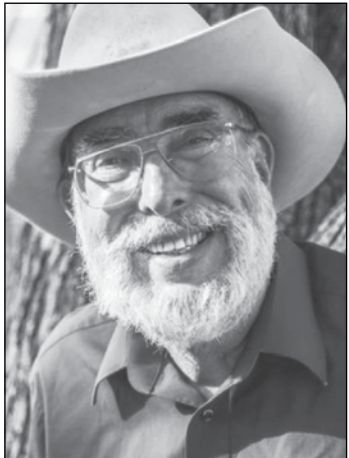
7. "Eventually, I'll want to move on."

Hovering over a person who attempted suicide can make them feel like they lost everyone's trust. My father still won't talk to me about my attempt, but still asks me more than ten years later, "You're not feeling like you did in high school, are you? You're not going to do THAT again?"

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Stanley family in need of support after mom suffers two strokes baby battles RSV

After losing her vision for about 20 minutes due to her first mini stroke, Chelsea's eye sight was slightly damaged, prompting her to now wear glasses. Her two mini strokes were caused by a hole in her heart. Due to the exertion of childbirth, a blood clot had traveled through the hole and down to her kidney. She had a surgical scope procedure done on September 12th that will help her doctors determine their next step.

What should have been nothing but a warm welcome home and new baby snuggles, quickly turned into a scary health battle for both Chelsea Stanley and new baby Maverick.

Chelsea and Anthony Stanley had their baby boy on August 8th. Maverick was born perfectly healthy and was to join his family at home in rural Grygla, which includes his siblings Ryelin and Piper.

When Anthony and Chelsea were discharged from the hospital on August 10th, they had stopped to pick up their other two children at Anthony's parents house, Brian & Bonnie Stanley. Chelsea sat down at the table and all of a sudden lost her vision. "It was so scary. We called the doctor right away and they said to come in immediately," she shared. Chelsea has a blood clotting disorder but had been off of her medication due to having Maverick. Symptoms of a stroke quickly started to appear. On the way to Grand Forks, the left side of Chelsea's body had started to go numb - her hand, up her arm, into her ear, and on the left side of her face and tongue. "It was so scary," she said.

Anthony called the ambulance, but since they were outside of Thief River Falls already, they said it would be quicker to just continue driving themselves. At 120 mph, with the hazards blinking, the Stanleys continued on to Grand Forks where Chelsea was admitted and watched for a couple of days. The plan of action included pumping magnesium into her via IV in order to get her blood pressure down. An Echo was also performed and it was discovered that Chelsea has a hole in her heart. With the exertion of delivery, a blood clot

had went through her heart and down into her kidney; this was what caused the first stroke.

A few appointments quickly followed, including a trip to Fargo to see a blood specialist who put Chelsea on six different medications. Everything was going better, but on Friday, August 26th, Chelsea's hand started to go numb again. She checked her blood pressure and it was very high. Like before, the symptoms started to get worse on the left side of the body, including her leg going numb this time. By the time they got to Thief River Falls, Chelsea couldn't walk into the hospital. After an MRI and CT Scan, everything was clear. However, TIA's (mini strokes) don't show up on those procedures.

From that point, Chelsea went to see her blood specialist again in Fargo. He set her up with a Cardiologist where a procedure was planned for Tuesday, September 13th. A scope was to be inserted in order to look at the heart and determine how big the hole is, if it can be fixed, and what the next step will be.

With her own health to worry about, Chelsea was also thinking about her children at home. Especially the newest arrival, Maverick, who had started to get a little congested last week. His breathing had gotten difficult for him, so Anthony and Chelsea decided a doctor visit would be best. Maverick was sent to Grand Forks and admitted for a 24-hour observation. He was put on fluids and oxygen, and diagnosed with RSV Bronchiolitis. After 5 days in the hospital, doctors tried to wean him off the oxygen, but little Maverick wasn't ready to tackle the breathing without assistance quite yet. Chelsea stated, "He was retracting quite

a bit, meaning he was breathing very hard. But the doctors said we are at the peak of it so hopefully he gets better from here on out." Maverick isn't on any medication as RSV is a virus that needs to run its course. His mom also shared that he is eating like a champ again, so right now it's just a waiting game. She added, "We don't know how long we'll be here, so please keep those prayers coming."

Neither Chelsea or Anthony are able to work right now. Chelsea works as a Para in Grygla's Head Start room and often pitches in to help out in other parts of the school also. The Grygla School has put together an online silent auction for Chelsea and her family. Classes and organizations within the school will be putting baskets together as part of the fundraiser. In conclusion, Chelsea had expressed her gratitude, saying, "Thanks to everyone that has reached out to us. We really appreciate all the kind words. We also want to give a huge thanks to our school and our community for setting up the online silent auction for us, we can't appreciate you guys enough. It brings tears to my eyes and means the world to us that we have such an awesome support system while we go through all of this."

David grew up in Sinclair Township

David Larson a native of northern Minnesota is now a New Jersey Symphony trumpet player. A world-class orchestra with local roots, creative programming in concerts throughout the state and service to the community through education—these values have been the hallmark of the New Jersey Symphony since its beginnings nearly 100 years ago.

Internationally renowned Chinese-American conductor Xian Zhang began her tenure as the New Jersey Symphony's current Music Director in 2016. Zhang will be conducting the New Jersey Symphony through the 2023–24 season.

David's parents, Harry and Gena Larson were from Norwegian emigrants who settled in Clearwater County. They rented a farm northwest of Leonard until Harry bought the farm across the road.

They had two sons LeRoy born September 1939 in Bagley and David born January 15, 1943 also in Bagley.

They were a musical family. Harry was a member of the Bagley Drum and Bugle Corps and other local old-time dance bands. Music was the most common kind of home entertainment for the Larsons.

After graduating from Clear-

brook High School, LeRoy attended Bemidji State. He later completed his Master's degree at Indiana University and earned his Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota. LeRoy focused his career on being a musician, composer, musicologist, folklorist and record producer. LeRoy founded LeRoy's River Minstrels, and the Minnesota Scandinavian Ensemble.

David also graduated from Clearbrook High School, where they both played in the high school band.

David received a Bachelor of

Science degree in Instrumental and Vocal Music from Bemidji State University in Minnesota and a Master of Music degree in trumpet from Indiana University, where he studied with Herbert Mueller. While in high school, Larson performed solo trumpet on the "Original Ted Mack Amateur Hour" in New York. He maintains an active teaching studio; his students
