Bryan and Stephanie Ramsrud, of Bagley are Clearwater County's representatives in the Red River Valley Emerging Leadership Program. Alumni of the program from the county nominated them to take part in the program because of their involvement in their community.

Bryan is a painting and drywall contractor. He does finishing and texturing of dry-wall, plus interior and exterior painting and has one employee. Steph is a substitute school teacher and homemaker. Bryan and Steph own and operate about 350 acres. They raise hay and have 40 beef cows.

Bryan and Stephanie have been taking part in educational sessions since November 2015. They are building skills for leadership and networking with other rural leaders from 16 counties in the region. Extension educators Lisa Hinz, Brian Fredrickson, and Jody Horntvedt are instructors for the sessions which focus on personal leadership styles, communication, community leadership, legislative issues, life balance, dealing with challenges, change, and facilitating effective meetings.

According to Horntvedt, "this program focuses on bringing rural leaders together for education that expands their potential and ultimately improves communities." This is the 32nd year the Emerging Leadership Program has

brought together individuals from across the region for training workshops. Over 1,000 leaders in northwest and west central Minnesota are alumni of the program, which was developed in 1985 to enhance the King Agassiz Program of the Red River Valley Winter Shows.

Board hears about land acquisition program

Highway Department Fleet Management Program discussed and approved

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on January 16, 2016 with all commissioners in attendance. Mississippi Headwaters Board Director Tim Terrell gave a presentation to the Commissioners about the Land Protection Process to protect the headwaters, the first 400 miles of the Mississippi River, from pollution and aquatic invasive species (AIS). Grants have resulted for this protection, the last two years in the amount of \$3.16 million. The beginning and end of this process are acquisitions and easements. The commissioners will have a say as to whether a parcel in this county would have the potential for acquisition, and they would have the final say. Also, the land owner must accept.

Much of the expense to do so is in land appraisal and title search. The Commissioners would determine who would best manage the property, for instance the Land Commissioner, or DNR, if the land is acquired.

Commissioner Dan Stenseng asked what the land could be used for and how it differs from tax-forfeited land.

Mr. Terrell said "Whose realm the land is in, it would be under their management and for public benefit, such as a forest resource. There are different programs available."

Land Commissioner Bruce Cox asked what tributaries are in Clearwater County. Terrell said the main priority is the Mississippi River and they are more interested in forests by the river, which would be under local control.

County Engineer, Dan Sauvé brought motions to purchase many vehicles and equipment off the State contract, including two 2016 GMC Sierra 4WD double cab pickups to replace older models; two 2016 John Deere tractors with trade-ins; mowers, and other equipment. This equipment is part of the Clearwater County Highway Department Fleet Management Program detailed by Engineer Dan Sauvé.

Mr. Sauvé said they do trade ins towards new equipment every 6-10 years in an effort to achieve the most value and efficient use from their equipment, and obtain the best prices through the State contract, often 20-25% less than retail. (Please see the explanation of the Fleet Management Program as a separate article.)

"The rotation of equipment is designed so we do get a better price for trade-ins. There is a window of time when it's still worth something," Commissioner Newland said.

"Clearwater County does get reimbursed from the State for a share of this amount over a period of time," he said.

The total cost to acquire these items from the State contract with trade-ins, will be approximately \$401,551. The Board of Commissioners unanimously approved the purchases.

Mr. Sauvé received authorization to pay the current Highway Department bills in the amount of \$12,921.

Mr. Sauvé traveled to Brainerd to attend the Minnesota Counties Engineering Association.

Sheriff Darin Halverson was given authorization to hire Erick Thoresen as STS Crew Leader pending successful completion of the background check. All Commissioners approved the hire except for the opposing vote of Commissioner Dean Newland.

He said, "The Highway Department only starts employees at around \$14 per hour, and this hire is at \$17.47 per hour." He said the disparity in the wages is why he opposes the hire, and "It needs to be fair."

Sheriff Halverson was authorized by the Board to advertise a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a public safety CAD technology system; and to advertise the position of full-time Jail Programmer, in house, due to the resignation of Mary Musselman effective Feb. 29. Ms. Musselman has served Clearwater County for the past 35 years.

The Jail Programmer position was created to make things better. Commissioner

Newland asked if this is the case, to which the Sheriff answered yes, and that the duties of the jail administrator go to the programmer if there are more than 30 in the jail.

"The State can shut the County down without this backup," he said.

Both measures did pass, but received a no vote from Commissioner Arlen Syverson, who commented that, "I believe this position (jail programmer) is unnecessary, and that the jail administrator should be sufficient to do the job." As far as the CAD system, "We just need to call 911," he said.

The Sheriff also received authorization to purchase a 2016 Ford Police Pursuit Utility Vehicle for \$26,274 and have it equipped. The total cost will not exceed \$38,000. This is a budgeted expense.

MIS Director Stuart Lien received authorization to purchase 2016 computer replacements and technology upgrades for General Government, not to exceed \$58,000; and 2016 General Government

computer and software maintenance, upgrades and support agreements not to exceed \$45,000.

County Veterans Service Officer, Hutch Hutchens brought a Safety Controls Quarterly Report for the period of Oct. 1 to Dec. 31, 2015. Besides regular county activities, he attended the CVSO Quarterly Meetings in Fargo; facilitated the Clearwater County Safety Committee Meeting; and attended the Northwest Minnesota Safety Council Quarterly Meeting in Park Rapids, all in November.

He said there will be a Caring Friends event Feb. 20 in support of the Veterans Transportation program for Clearwater County.

County Auditor-Treasurer Allen Paulson received authorization to pay the submitted invoices of \$354,674 from the County Revenue Fund, and \$33,168 from Nursing Service.

He said there was an expen-

Clearwater County Highway Department Fleet Management

The Clearwater County Highway Department manages over a million dollars' worth of equipment and just like any successful business would, we try to manage these assets in the most efficient manner possible to be cost effective and still provide reliable service to the public we serve. We operate much like a private business in that we have to balance our service provided with revenue to cover the cost of providing the service. A well run fleet management system helps us manage our operating cost and balances with revenue to reliably provide the service our public expects.

We depreciate out our equipment similar to how a business would, except instead of using depreciation as a tax write-off it is charged against a State Aid maintenance allotment that comes to the County out of gas taxes. By following stable equipment replacement schedules we can keep budgets consistent year-to-year. When we lapse on our equipment purchasing for a year or two we end up taking a big hit on recovering our equipment costs from our gas tax revenue.

When we let too many pieces of equipment fall off the replacement schedule and keep them too long past the depreciation period, then local property tax revenue is needed to catch up with our lost capital rather than using the captured dollars from our gas tax revenue to pay for the equipment.

The next part of our fleet management is picking the most cost effective time to replace a piece of equipment. As part of our fleet management we keep good equipment cost records at the Highway Department. We use those records to help guide us for the most efficient replacement schedule on our equipment. We try to target the best life cycle cost for our equipment replacements to give us the lowest total cost for owning each piece of equipment. As equipment ages (sometimes regardless of amount of use) due to wear and tear, parts availability and

other factors, it's operational and maintenance costs go up. That cost stays fairly stable for some time, but eventually begins to rise fairly quickly. It is best to trade in the equipment before the cost of repairs rise and we still have a good resale value on the equipment. The goal of our fleet management is to make good judgments about the best targeted replacement point, but that target replacement point can occur at different times in a unit's life. Many times there are two points in a unit's life where it makes sense to sell or trade in. The first point is when you will get the best resale value of that equipment versus the price of new equipment. The second point normally occurs close to the full depreciation time for that equipment. When you consider the resale value of a tractor, for example, the first replacement target is in the range of 3-5 years and a pickup truck is around 3 years because we get such a good discount using the State Contract to purchase new.

The second replacement target on a tractor is 8-12 years after we have fully depreciated it out and for pickups the second target for us is 10-12 years. The first trade point when the equipment is newest is the best trade point most of the time because the equipment is under warranty the whole time and we do not assume the risk of a major equipment failure.

Although it would be cheaper many times to trade in our equipment while it still is under warranty, we recognize the public perception if we always drive new pickups. Because of this we usually pick the later of the two replacement times in the equipment life and we accept the risk of a failure that is not covered because the warranty ran out. Effective fleet management is really all about saving money in the long term and I believe we do have an effective fleet management program in place here at the County Highway Department.

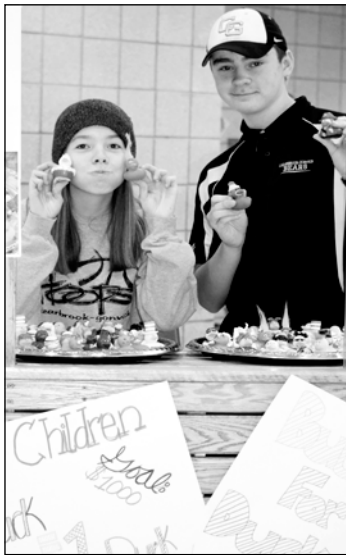

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Fairy rings
Over the years, there have been many theories as to the cause of the mysterious lawn disorders known as fairy rings. The two previously leading theories include small pixie-like humanoids flitting about casting spells on your lawn, probably after you had done something bad to a neighbor. The other leading theory was alien spacecraft landings left unusual rings in your lawn, probably from the flux capacitor. I can say with some level of certainty, both of these theories are not true. At least I'm pretty sure...

Actually, in all truth, fairy rings are not nearly that exotic or exciting. In reality, they are caused by a number of fungi that produce peculiar patterns in home lawns. Fairy rings typically appear and consist of a dark green ring or arc with an inner ring of dead brown grass. The size of the ring can range from a few inches to more than 50 feet in diameter (hence the spacecraft theory). Following irrigation or rain, mushrooms often suddenly appear within the rings.

Fairy ring fungi live on dead organic matter in the soil and thatch layer. Fairy rings expand radially outward until the food supply is used up, the soil becomes too wet, or better-adapted organisms surpass the ability of the fungi to survive. The ring and surrounding area can be broken into three zones, although all three zones may not be visible on the surface.

As the fairy ring fungus expands and enters new soil or thatch, an outer zone of stimulation forms. In this area, excessive nutrients are released as the fungus decomposes organic debris. Grass growth is stimulated, resulting in a ring of luxuriant green grass. Inside the zone of stimulation, a zone of dead or dying (brown) grass may be present. In this area, a high concentration of thread-like structures (mycelia) composing the body of the fungus can often be seen upon close examination of the thatch and soil. The mycelia prevent water movement into the area, weakening or killing the grass.

A third zone may be present in some rings. This is another zone of stimulation, inside the zone of dead, brown grass. As the fungus leaves this area or dies, additional nutrients are released allowing for luxuriant green grass.

To prevent fairy rings, properly water, fertilize, and de-

thatch lawns. Fairy rings are most common on sandy soils that are low in water and fertility. Thick thatch layers also contribute to this problem. Eradication of fairy ring fungi is difficult and often impractical. Most homeowners prefer to mask the problem, rather than eradicate it.

You have a few options.

Replace the Infected Soil. The sod and underlying soil, in a band about one foot beyond the ring, could be excavated to a depth of one foot, depending on the extent of the ring. Discard the infested soil, being careful not to spill any on the healthy lawn. Add clean, sterilized soil in the hole and reseed. Granted, this option seems pretty extreme, unless it involves a very small area.

Perhaps a more practical solution is to try masking the symptoms. This can be done in different ways.

Removal of Mushrooms. If mushrooms are the only evidence of fairy rings, remove them by picking or raking and destroy. Give your neighbor kid a golf club and tell them to practice their golf swing on the mushrooms.

Fertilizing may be the easiest option. The dark green rings will be more obvious in nutrient deficient soils. Conduct a soil test and apply recommended levels of fertilizer. Do not over fertilize, as this will cause additional problems. If everything looks a darker green, you simply won't notice the nutrient rich area of the fairy ring.

Special Watering. Reduce the water repelling nature of the ring by watering the area with a root-watering wand. Punch holes at least every foot in the yellowing or dying area and pump large amounts of water into the ground to a depth of 10-24 inches. Repeat frequently. Application of a surfactant (wetting agent) to the area may also increase soil permeability and help to lessen symptoms.

Soil Aeration may help to some degree. Reduce symptom severity by increasing water penetration and accelerating thatch decomposition.

Of course, if you don't believe the fungi theory, you can always sprinkle your lawn with FairyGuard (at midnight on the eve of a full moon) and continue to wear the tinfoil helmets. Just in case...
