The book can be ordered through Birchtree Publishing Group, Post Office Box 1644, Bemidji, MN 56619.

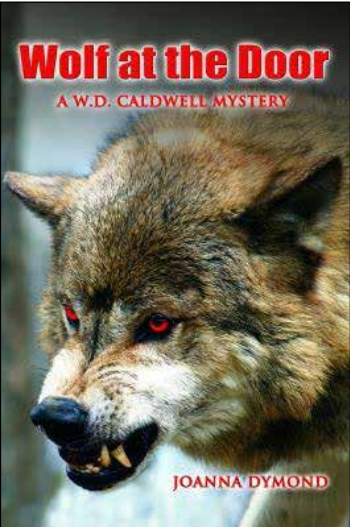
This was Dymonds second book with her first book "Crazy as a Loon" published in 2012.

County Board of Commissioners' meeting

The first department on the agenda was the Auditor/Treasurer for Clearwater County Commissioners. Al Paulson opened the two bids for publishing legal notices. Commissioner Neal Illies made the motion, seconded by Commissioner Mark Larson to accept the low bid of \$2.00 per column inch from the Leader-Record for the annual publishing for the 2023 First Publication of Financial Statement, Publication of County Board Proceedings & legal notices and all other publishing requirements and the two publications of the list of delinquent taxes. And \$2.10 per column inch from the Farmers Independent for the second publication of the financial statement. Motion passed.

Commissioner Mark Titera made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Dean Newland, to authorize the Auditor/Treasurer to pay submitted invoices of \$94,017.23 from the County Revenue Fund and \$33,021.60 from the Nursing Service Fund. Motion passed.

Applications for beer and liquor sales were approved for Hoot Owl Resort, Alida Country Store, and Lobo's Bar and Grill Inc. Warrants totaling \$882.42 were also canceled.

In a series of motions related to County employees, the following were approved:

•County Sheriff, Jail Administrator and Chief Deputy to get the same contribution toward the Teamsters Health Fund Insurance and the Teamsters

Local 346 Union, effective January 1, 2023.

•A step increase for Logan LeClair to Range 16, step 6 effective January 1, 2023.

•Non-union pay scale increase of 3% effective January 1, 2023, for non-union employees.

•2023 salary for the Commissioners to remain the same as 2022 at \$20,742 annually.

•Increase the County Sheriff's salary from \$97,572.80 to \$100,505.60 effective January 1, 2023.

•Increase the County Attorney's salary from \$94,078.40 to \$99,923.20 effective January 1, 2023.

•Increase the County Auditor/Treasurer's salary from \$97,669.20 to \$100,598.25 effective January 1, 2023.

•Increase the County Recorder's salary from \$77,812.80 to \$80,142.40 effective January 1, 2023.

Budgets for the 2023 Solid Waste Management Fund and Nursing Service Fund were reviewed and approved.

Land Department Director Bruce Cox was next to report. He discussed timber sales and submitted the 2023 budget for the Forfeited Tax Sale Fund, which was approved.

Dan Sauve, County Engineer submitted four items for consideration. Commissioner Newland made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Titera to authorize the rental of a melter from Midstates Equipment and Supply of Mountain Lake, MN at a price of \$6,995.00 monthly, to be scheduled for mid-April

to early May 2023. And to purchase ½ pallet of Glenzoi -20 Plus at the price of \$1,368.00, plus freight of \$260-310. Motion passed.

Commissioner Illies made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Larson, to accept the Engineer's Certificate of Performance for Bituminous Surfacing and authorize final payment to Knife River Materials. Motion passed.

Commissioner Larson made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Newland, to approve the 2023 Highway Department budget as submitted.

Commissioner John Nelson made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Illies, to approve payment of Highway Department bills totaling \$59,057.76. Motion passed.

Derek Loiland from Maintenance submitted a proposal for the kitchen remodel project in the jail with a bid from Wagner's Plumbing & Heating of \$19,850, which will be paid from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Fund. During discussion about the bid, Commissioner Nelson was concerned the bid seemed high for the work that would be done. Commissioner Larson asked if other bids were received and Loiland responded that no other bids had been sought. Commissioner Larson suggested that in the future, other bids should be obtained from local businesses whenever possible. Commissioners Titera and Newland stated that the plumbers they knew in the area are already very busy trying the keep up with existing jobs. Commissioner Newland made the motion to accept the bid, seconded by Commissioner Illies. The motion passed 4-1, with Commissioner Nelson voting no.

At that point, the commissioner meeting was closed and a Truth in Taxation Meeting was opened. County Assessor, Terri Johnson made a presentation to those in attendance. Johnson stated that Deputy Assessors Amie Willborg and Shawn Primus have completed their training and are now certified. With their assistance, the department was able to complete the quintile in 2022, which means that all proper-

Bye gave report to Clearbrook City Council

Bryan Bye, with Widseth, Smith and Nolting gave his report to the Clearbrook City council at their regular monthly meeting on Monday, December 12. He had a Certificate of Substantial Completion to be signed by the council. The company (Reierson Construction, that did the street work) had been six days late and they could deduct that from the pay amount. He had a punch list of items that were not completed. Such as making sure grass was growing in the spring. Items could be added to the list as things come up. That won't be checked until next spring.

There were items on the change orders list that he also addressed with the Pond piping, water tower value and the 10 foot water main.

Bye's company will be submitting to the state concerning the culvert on Main Street north of the Elevator. The bridge fund as the culvert is over 10 feet long is very expensive. The road has been closed all summer. Maintenance Mark Snoble and Nick Rankin asked if they could do a temporary fix so that the road could be open again. They will be putting rocks so that it can be fixed up for winter. The water coming over the dam can go through as needed.

The treatment plant had been checked by the Department of Health concerning the amount of manganese in the water. This has been changing with the new pipes that are in the ground.

Police Report

Ryan Solee gave his report. The blight issue has been taken of. He has four felonies that he has been working on. He informed the council that he is under budget this year. He gave them the record report of 33. They included: Alarm 2; Animal Related 2; Assist Other Agency 1; City Ordinance 2; Civil Complaint 3; Disturbance 1; Domestic 2; Harassment 1; Information Only 2; Juvenile Misc. 1; Medical 4; Officer Detail 1; Parking Complaint 1; Theft 2; Threats 1; Transport 1; Vandalism 1; Vehicle Lock Out 2; Warrant Arrest 2; Welfare Check 1.

Fire department

Clearbrook Fire Chief Adam Krog gave his report for November. They had 11 calls; nine were medical, one meeting and one grass fire, as high winds had knocked down a tree and hit a power line. They elected officers for the next year term with Chief, Adam Krog; 1st Assistant Chief, BJ Engen; 2nd Assistant Chief, Nick Rankin; Training Officer. Ryan Rude; Treasurer, Tom Davis; Secretary, James Kumpula and SCBA Officer, Ryan Jensen.

They have applied for a couple of grants from Enbridge for Class B foam for fighting fires on flammable liquid. Another one through the DNR for supplies.

Municipal Liquor Store

Karra Weems, Manager of the liquor store had a November profit of \$1,103.64. She said that the wine tasting at Santa Claus Day went well. They had over \$1,000 in sales. They are planning on Karaoke on Friday, December 23 at 8:45 pm at the liquor store. They are looking at a possible open juke box for New Year's Eve. She will contact the auditors for the Year End Inventory. They will be closed on Monday, December 26.

Utilities & Maintenance

Mark Snoble said that Pump Works came to check out. The main lift station is good. There is some issue with the pump at the school. Corrective action will have to be done. The Minnesota Department of Health checked out the wells. Everything came back fine. Nothing wrong with the water. The infrastructure is working and the chemicals that are added are better in the water.

Nick Rankin would like the city to make some plans for the plowing of sidewalks. Maybe a part time person could be hired to help out. He had information on new equipment that could be put in the budget for planning in the future. Business places could be contacted as to what their plans were for the snow that is coming.

City Clerk

Lucie Thompson had the Ordinance #124 which determined that no livestock animals would be allowed within the city limits. This did not apply to dogs, cats, rabbits, guinea pigs, hamsters or reptiles. That was the last reading of that ordinance and would go into effect next month.

Ordinance #125 had the second reading which outlines

the authorizing and regulating adult uses within the City of Clearbrook. A third reading would be held next month.

Resolution 2022-17 for Donations for November was accepted. They include \$1,000 donation from Paul and Kathy Imle for the pool and \$1000 donation from Clearwater Polk Electric for the 2025 All School Reunion that will be held.

The Property Tax Levy and budget was to be held at a special meeting on December 19 at 6:00 p.m.

The monthly claims were paid for \$72,279.18 and the additional claims of \$210,888.41. \$117,000 of that was for the natural gas payment.

Meeting was adjourned and the Economic Development & Housing Redevelopment meeting was called to order. Kevin Prosser was wondering if an ATV run could be added for something new for Summer Fest that is held every year. Or a group could be set up to come up with some more things that could be done as there is no more softball tournaments anymore. Julie Prosser suggested a teen dance and she would be willing to be on a committee looking for other events.

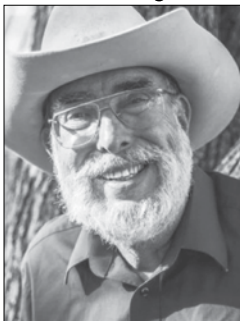

Gonvick City Council December monthly meeting

The Gonvick City Council heard from Gonvick Fire Chief Cody Rude that they have sold the older fire truck to Custer County Fire Department for \$60,000. That will be used for paying off the purchase of ex-traction tools and other equipment that the department needs. They have voted on three new firemen. New equipment will be needed. The three that will be on a one-year probation period are Jake Ruckreigle, Chad Danielson and Tyler Rogstad. The department will be up to 21 members. Other issues that Rude brought up was during the last month they had: 3 medical calls; 1 work night; 1 meeting with 11 members present; Great Plains Fire was up and replaced the packing in engine 2 and put a new water level gauge in engine 1; both trucks pass for ISO rating. (Insurance specs). They had election of officers. They will be looking into a EMR training for all firemen this winter or spring. They will be signing up firemen from the department to attend the Moorhead Fire & Rescue School in March. This is a two-day training with 25 different classes to choose from. The third February will be the meeting with the township officers.

The council passed resolution 22-06 for the 2023 Budget Levy.

Maintenance Dan Johnson stated that the plow has many hours left on the contract to be able to take care of the winter season. It is a three-year contract with the company for that service.

Miscellaneous issues included compensation for Carol Peterson who filled in at the office. She had 21 hours to be paid on a 1099.

The liquor license for The Trap in Gonvick was renewed for another year.

A question was asked about the status of the Water Project. No word has come yet.

Thoughts from the Sheriff

Clearwater County Sheriff Darin Halverson



This time of year, I often get questions about the laws and regulations for snowmobiles, so I want to answer some of them in this month's article. It is our hope that this season will be safe and everyone will enjoy the winter season. First, all snowmobiles must be registered with the State of Minnesota Department of Natural Resources with a few exceptions. The majority of money collected for registrations are used for grant-in-aid trails and maintenance of those trails. If you do not intend to operate your snowmobile on a state or grant-in-aid trail, you can register it as a non-trail snowmobile. There are a few exceptions for the registration requirement.

Clearbrook-Gonvick School Lunch Menu

One is if the snowmobile is more than fifteen years old and for use on land owned or leased by the owner or being used exclusively for agricultural purposes and another is if it is being used for organized track-racing events. Any snowmobile with an engine displacement of 125 cubic centimeters or less, not used on state or grant-in-aid trails, is also exempt. The next most asked question is where can you operate a snowmobile if you are not on a trail system. If you are riding next to a county or state road, you must be in the bottom or outside slope of the ditch. You must ride in the same direction as road traffic one half hour after sunset to one half hour before sunrise. You can also operate on public lands open to motorized vehicles and on any ice-covered waters that have legal access. Riders can also operate on township roads that are not restricted by local ordinances and also on your own property. If you are operating on a state or grant-in-aid trail system, you must stay to the right when meeting another machine and obey the posted speed limit. At night, it is recommended to drive at less than 40 MPH as studies have shown that speed greater than that results in overdriving your headlights. Don't be the one who gets injured or injures someone else because you were driving recklessly. If you are crossing any roadway, you must yield to other motor vehicles. Always remember to stay on the groomed portion of the trail. That is by far the biggest complaint I hear. People will operate their snowmobiles off the groomed portion of the trail and onto the property of landowners who have graciously allowed the trail to pass through their land. This kind of behavior has resulted in some landowners deciding that they do not want the trail crossing their land and the trails have had to be re-routed. Don't be the person to ruin it for everyone else. As a landowner along a groomed trail, remember that it is illegal to block a trail or push snow in the trail to cause a safety hazard. Just as it is important for riders to use courtesy on the trails, please extend the same courtesy to riders along them as well. We can avoid conflicts if we work together. Regulations for youth riders is another big topic for questions. How old do you have to be and where can youth operate a snowmobile are often asked. The first thing to remember is that anyone born after December 31, 1976 must complete snowmobile safety training. If you are 16 years or older, you must complete the online course for snowmobile safety and those under 16 must complete the online course, or a traditional classroom course if offered, and attend a hands-on riding course. Youth must be at least 11 years old to complete the courses and the safety certificate will become valid when you turn 12. After obtaining your safety certificate there are regulations on where youth can ride. If you are between 12-13, you may ride on public lands, waters or grant-in-aid trails if accompanied by an adult or you must be in possession of your safety certificate. You may not cross state or county roads or drive on any street in a municipality. If you are between 14-18 years of age, you may cross state or county roads if you are in possession of your safety certificate or driver's license with a valid snowmobile indicator. You may ride on streets in a municipality if permitted and also on public land, waters and grant-in-aid trails. Regardless of your age, please use sound judgement and drive with care. Lastly, remember that operators under the age of 18 must wear a helmet at all times when they are operating a snowmobile, but I would encourage everyone to I hope this winter will be a safe and fun one for all and I wish everyone a happy holiday season.
