Kory Solberg was sworn in as the new Gonvick mayor

Kory Solberg was sworn in as the new mayor of the City of Gonvick on Thursday, February 9, 2023. He had recently been elected as a council member for his second term. Candace Coulter ran for the office of mayor again but since the election she submitted a letter of resignation because of her work schedule. The council at their January meeting appointed Kory to the open position leaving his council position open. The council discussed appointing another member from city residents to fill the two year. The vote will be taken at the March meeting.

Chief of Police Ryan Sollee gave his monthly report with 16 records including: Information Only 2; Medical 3; Motor Vehicle Crash 1; Parking Complaint 1; Suspicious Activity; Traffic Stop 3; Transport 1; Vehicle Lock Out 1; Vehicle Off Road; Attempt to Arrest 1 and Welfare Check 1.

He will be working on a blight complaint in the city. He has lost one part time officer and has one in the pipe line.

Gonvick Fire Chief Cody Rude gave his monthly report. They have had 3 medical calls, 2 training nights, 1 work night, 1

call for a car in the ditch.

Upcoming events for the department will be looking into a EMR training for all firemen this spring. They also checked with FM ambulance if they could use their EMR training videos instead of paying for an instructor for the whole thing that will save money and only need an instructor for the hands on portion.

They will be signing up firemen from the department to attend the Moorhead Fire & Rescue school in March for the two day training with 24 different classes to choose from.

The department meeting with townships will be on February 28 at the Gonvick Legion. Meeting at 6:00 with supper at 7:00.

Market value for the townships covered by the Gonvick Fire Department with a 2022 total value of \$218,056,105.00. They include: Greenwood \$8,119,995.00; Hangaard \$17,198,400.00; Pine Lake \$60,569,550.00; Winsor \$36,317,300.00; City of Gully \$3,096,900.00; City of Trail \$1,971,200.00; Johnson \$19,094,750.00; Eden \$36,010,650.00; Gully Town-

ship \$35,671,400.00. Four of these had a decrease of market value. That included City of Gully, City of Trail, Eden and Gully Township.

Dan Johnson City Maintenance reported that Theim Well Company did service work on one of the water pumps this past month. Cost was approximately \$4000 to get everything back in order and also checking the other city pump.

Discussion was held on the repair that Bakke Excavating had submitted. It included work that was done on the road north of the fire hall that was damaged with the rains last summer. Rocks and gravel were hauled in with backhoe work totaling \$935.00. FEMA had been contacted to pay for the work but it has not come in yet.

Miscellaneous issues was the agreement for a contract with the Clearwater County Attorney and the agreement with Widseth Smith and Nolting engineer's agreement.

Bills were paid for the month with Water and Sewer \$2,457.07; General \$21,151.18; Fire \$23.9; for a total of \$23,631.32.

The cast and crew of the One Act Play "The Chair Play" showcased their work along with seven other class A Section champions on Friday, Feb. 10th at the O'Shaughnessy Auditorium in St. Paul. At the state level of competition, plays are not ranked, however, if two of the three judges "star" a performance, the play earns a "starred performance." Bagley did not star this year, however, judges had very complimentary

phrases in their evaluations of the show. Some of those comments were: "The step-by-step complications of this game is great fun to watch unfold"; "the universal, philosophical message about society and ownership is clearly delivered"; "great choreography of stage fights" and "beautiful costuming and staging consistent with the tone of the show." Some of the judges' critiques included a desire for more consistency in pace and one judge encouraged student actors to increase physicality and variation of characters' emotional levels to demonstrate their desire for "the chair".

There were 202 high schools registered in the class A One Act Play competitions this year; 25 of those were in our Section 8. In all aspects of their trip to the state festival, the BHS students exhibited exemplary behavior and performance. They wish to thank the school district for their ongoing support of the fine arts as well as parents and the community for their encouragement.

Up next, the spring musical, "Schoolhouse Rock Live!" Auditions will be Feb. 27 & 28 for students in grades 7-12. The spring show is scheduled for April 14, 15, & 16.

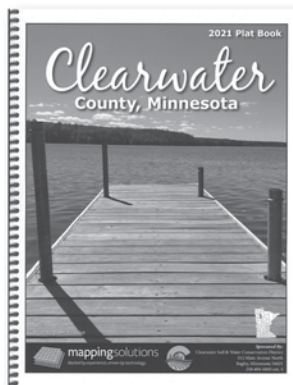

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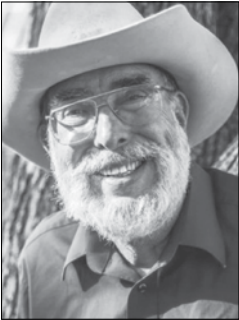

Bemidji Veterans Home Update

On January 31st the state of Minnesota and their Department of Veteran Affairs staff allowed local stake holders to get a tour of the new Bemidji Veterans Home. I was one of those stake holders as Clearwater County donated to the project. This Veteran home is a 72 bed facility that is nearly

a 78,000 Sq Ft facility. The home is designed to resemble a northern cabin. It has many fireplaces in the common areas with lots of natural light from the abundant windows. The home is about 70% complete. Some of the areas are already receiving paint on their walls. Other areas they are still doing electrical. Much of the material to furnish the facility (about 70%) come from local vendors. This included the cabinets,

furniture, TV's etc. Each individual room is approximately 300 Sq Ft with about a 100 Sq Ft bathroom. Each individual in the home will have their own bathroom. Veterans and their spouses are eligible to go into the home. Please check out these photos for a progress report. Local artist creates historic mural

Fosston artist, Ivy Bailie, recently completed a historic mural depicting the opening day of The Meuse Argonne Offensive on September 26, 1918.

This 4' x 8' oil painting is significant to our area as it is where Winger native, Private Nels T. Wold, 138th Infantry, 35th Infantry Division, joined his fellow American infantrymen in battle against the German forces.

Private Wold found himself in the center of the battle. He went forward through the morning fog and when it began to lift found his unit in the very midst of German machinegun nests.

He acted, personally knocking out four nests, dying while attempting to destroy the fifth. He was posthumously awarded The Medal of Honor. The Meuse

Argonne Offensive was the largest and costliest battle in American history. Ultimately, the allied success of this battle led to the Armistice being signed on 11th November 1918, the end of World War I.

Bailie was commissioned to paint two identical murals with funding from the Northwest Minnesota Arts Council. The project was a collaboration between the East Polk Heritage Center, the City of Winger, and project coordinator Dean M. Henney of Winger.

A unique Wold Exhibition has been emplaced within the historic Winger Community Center, a WPA-era building located in downtown Winger, Minnesota.

A historic 8' wide glass display case is now situated atop a

custom-built platform. The case will contain WWI mementos and photographs of Pvt. Wold. One of the paintings hangs above the display case. The other painting will be auctioned at a future date.

Historians consider The Meuse Argonne Offensive the opening chapter of The American Century. Positioning our local hero and national legend within its scope will prove a lasting and remarkable legacy, to Pvt. Wold, to the 100 Polk County men who perished in World War I, and to the sacrifice required to win the victory.

A dedication of the exhibit is planned for Spring 2023. Visitors are welcome to take in this significant tribute during hours the Winger Community Center is open.



Minnesota Department of Agriculture Commissioner Thom Petersen spoke to the members of the East Polk County Crop Improvement Association during their annual meeting on Monday, January 30th at the McIntosh Community Center.

MN Dept. of Ag. Commissioner speaks at annual meeting held in McIntosh

During the annual meeting of the East Polk County Crop Improvement Association that was held on Monday, January 30th at the McIntosh Community Center, members held their meeting and had a lunch before speaker Thom Petersen , Minnesota Department of Agriculture Commissioner spoke to the group.

Commissioner Petersen has a history in agriculture and currently owns a farm in rural Minnesota.

He spoke of agriculture's contributions to the Minnesota economy.

Statistics he brought to the group were about the 67,400 farms in Minnesota, which average 377 acres in size. Farming generates \$105.6 billion in sales for the state, divided into sectors:

- \$13.1 crop sector
- 8.91 livestock sector
- \$9.2 in exports

Farming in Minnesota also supports more than 388,000 jobs.

In the United States, Minnesota ranks in the top 10 in more than 20 agricultural products, ranking number 1 in turkeys raised and sugar beets.

Stating that the Avian influenza outbreak affected 110 bird sites with 4.2 million birds affected.

He proceeded in talking about the drought conditions that affected our area in 2021 and persisted into 2022.

The Agricultural Drought Relief Program provided that Livestock and specialty crop farmers in 83 of 87 were counties eligible and received nearly 3,000 applications with almost \$19 million in eligible expenses

Which is more than double the \$8.1 million provided by the Minnesota Legislature. The program provided checks to approximately 2,900 farmers.

The 2024 Governor's Budget proposal includes a Healthy Soil Grant Program This proposal builds on the new Soil Health Financial Assistance Program (SHFAP) that began as a pilot last year with a \$500,000 appropriation. It supports the state's Healthy Soil Management Plan through the voluntary implementation of soil health management practices by awarding funds to access specialized equipment and machinery.

Also included in the proposal is an AgBMP Revolving Loan

Increase which seeks to increase lending capacity for the AgBMP Loan program to address its funding shortfall and support projects and practices that help our state's air and water quality.

He spoke of the Minnesota Department of Agriculture's fight against Palmer Amaranth which continues to affect many farmers in as many at 60 sites across the state.

He also spoke of FarmLink a service which helps connect retiring farmers with new farmers. This free online service was recently updated to be more user-friendly and offer additional options.

He also spoke of the Beginning Farmer Tax Credit. A tax credit to the agricultural asset owner. Earlier in the day, the group had met about those seeking recertification of their Private Pesticide Applicator License. He neared the end of his presentation with information about dicamba and reported The MDA received more than 300 dicamba drift related complaints during the 2021 growing season, but there was a significant drop in 2022.

Carl Erickson retired from Leonard Route

In 1960, Carl Erickson retired from his rural carrier job of 37 years. An article in the January 14, 1960 issue of the Farmers Independent, written by Mrs. Erickson relates the many changes he had over his years as a rural carrier.

The mail route was established on October 2, 1922 and Carl was the first and only rural route from the Leonard Post office.

The route at that time was 29 miles long "and what a route it was- following old trails, it wound around swamps and through woods as far north as the Red Lake Reservation. The 'roads' were almost impassable even for Carl's faithful team of horses, Captain and Dolly. For the first year the service was three times a week, every other day, which allowed the team of horses to rest for a day before they were out on the road again. Carl used a team of horses for the first seven years during the fall, winter and spring. Sometimes he was able to use his model T in the summer months.

In the fall of 1929 he made a snowmobile from a Model T but it didn't work very well due to a lack of power. He used it for two winters, and then was able to buy a Model A snowmobile. These worked better and over the course of many years he wore out four different snowmobiles. They were to costly to run, broke down a lot, required a lot of time to work on repairs. The most common break down was the tracks. Carl soon abandoned the tracks and outfitted his snowmobile with four large airplane tires mounted on the Model A Ford. He also fashioned a combination of tracks and tires on several cars, changing transmissions and gears to suit the roads.

Gradually as roads improved he was able to use a regular car, saving a Model A for more difficult conditions. In all he used 14 cars, 4 snowmobiles and several other parts of cars to deliver the mail on his route.

In the early years, when the roads were bad, he was also called upon to use his snowmobile to fetch Dr. Larson and bring him to Leonard to make house calls when needed. Carl also used his snowmobiles to transport Leonard area residents to the hospital, or get the midwife as needed.

The 29-mile route was changed to a 60-mile route for most of the 37 years that Carl drove, and it was considered one of the longest routes in Clearwater County. His wife wrote in the news article about his retirement that Carl had "driven approximately 600,000 miles or 28 times around the world."

Carl delivered the mail to four generations. Some of his early patrons are still on the same route.

In the early years he was greeted with enthusiasm, since the isolation of living in the country was more common. They'd help him with shoveling snow, pull him out of the ditch or push him when he was stuck. He'd be invited in for coffee and a chance to warm up, and patrons would often offer their barn and some oats for his team so they could warm up and rest for an hour as well. Carl would often receive gifts of a sack of oats for his team, a venison roast or a couple of cleaned chickens for his Sunday dinner.

When asked what Carl would be doing in his retirement, oddly enough he thought he'd do some traveling.

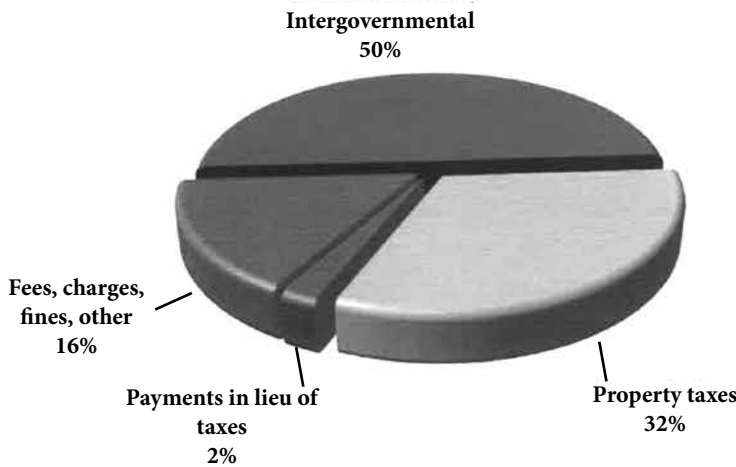
