Clearbrook-Gonvick board awarded contracts on building referendum

The Clearbrook-Gonvick School board has been having working sessions for a future referendum. The school building is twenty years old and they are looking for upgrades. They have had presentations from architects and construction management teams.

After those meetings the board met on Tuesday, March 14 and awarded the contracts for the future project.

Two firms were selected by the board. R.A. Morton Construction Managers - Construction management special-

ist located in St. Cloud. Their contact person will be Preston Euerle. Preston grew up on a farm in Litchfield. He is a graduate of Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter, with a BA in Administrative Management and Education. Preston and his wife, Linda, reside in Clearwater and have three children. He has been actively involved with Central MN Youth for Christ, currently serving on the Board of Directors.

The firm that the school board awarded the contract to for Architectural and En-

gineering service was ATSR (Armstrong, Torseth, Skold and Rydeen) from Minneapolis.

Blayne Parkos and Sarah Fox will be working directly with the school board.

Blayne Parkos, Director of Mechanical Engineering at ASTR. He has a Bachelor of Science - in Mechanical Engineering from North Dakota State University.

Sarah Fox received a Bachelor of Arts in Architecture from University of Minnesota and a Masters in Architecture from Syracuse University.

Clearbrook Elevator Association holds annual meeting March 10

The Clearbrook Elevator Annual Meeting was held on Friday, March 10th at the Clearbrook Community Center-Legion Room. Coffee and donuts were offered at 10:00 with the business meeting at 10:30.

Board President, Richard Kroening called the meeting to order. Board Secretary, Scott Anderson, read the minutes from last years annual meeting. It was approved as read.

Joel Piekarski, auditor with CarlsonSV, presented the financial reports. All reports were for 2022. The Balance Sheet shows assets of \$1,346,068, noting the purchases of a feed truck, no-till drill, and auger in 2022. The Statement of Operations Net Loss was \$45,874. This was taken from the Unallocated Reserve to carry forward \$387,209. Cash Flows, Statement of Patron Equities, and 5-year Historical Information were also reviewed. Joel credits the drought year of

2021 with lack of crops to sell in 2022 as well of livestock being sold off resulting in less feed business as the main reasons for the loss. In 2022, the Elevator expenses were down \$26,689 from 2021 showing the Elevators move to try and reduce the loss.

Manager Leslie Westrum gave the State of the Elevator Report. He commented on the last year being a tough year with injuries & illnesses. He was happy to report that Dan Johnson and Wayne Ehlers are both on the mend and expect them both back to work later this year. On the business side, he talked about the lingering effects of the drought that carried over into 2022 with less grain to sell & less storage revenue. We were also short soybeans. With the shortage of help, the Elevator lost out on bale wrapping revenue. Expenses for insurance, utilities, fuel, and professional services went up and they

will all continue to rise in 2023. On the positive side, we cut our expenses by over \$26,000. We purchased a No-Till Drill to rent out in line with the Soil and Water Conservations program to pay farmers \$45/acre to plant with it. We passed on \$54,000 of DPAD deductions to the grain farmers to use on their tax returns. A couple of new things we will be selling this year are herbicides and bagged fertilizer. Les thanked all the patrons for their business and looks forward to 2023 being a better year for the Elevator. There was no old business brought to the floor.

New business involved a vote for two board members. Incumbents Nolan Eck and Tyler Johnson were re-elected for 3-year terms. Several door prizes were given out and the meeting was adjourned.

County Commissioners discuss Good Samaritan property

During the March 14 Board of Commissioners meeting, there was discussion about the Good Samaritan property in Clearbrook. The property has been in tax forfeiture for a number of years and the most recent purchase offer fell through last year.

On Monday, March 13, the commissioners, and County Assessor inspected the property. Commissioner John Nelson noted that the main building – the former nursing home – is well built with a concrete roof and brick and concrete walls. Nelson stated that “the building will probably still be standing 100 years from now”. During past renovations, asbestos was removed from the building, so that won’t be a major concern. There has been significant

water damage and mold in the basement, which will need to be addressed.

The county is planning to auction the property (probably in June), which also includes a separate residential home on an adjacent parcel. Terrie Johnson, County Assessor discussed the value of the two parcels. The residential parcel is valued at \$120,600.00. The Good Samaritan nursing home parcel is more difficult to value, as there could be many uses for the building in the future. In the condition that it is in, Johnson suggested a value of \$50,000.00 for the nursing home parcel.

Commissioner Mark Larson made a motion to set the sale price for the two parcels at \$170,600.00. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Nelson and was approved.

In other business, Sheriff

Halverson asked the board to give authorization for the department to create a K9 budget and to hire a corrections officer.

Commissioner Stuart Dukek made a motion to authorize the creation of a K9 budget and line item in the subsidiary County revenue fund for the deposit of K9 donations. No local tax dollars will be used in this budget, only donated funds, or other non-tax dollars. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Mark Titera and was approved.

Commissioner Nelson made a motion to authorize the hiring of DeeWayne Rognstad as a part-time Communications Corrections Officer effective immediately. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Larson and was approved.

Phung Do is one of two exchange students at the Clearbrook-Gonvick High School. She answered several questions that were given to her. She is living with the Eileen Miller family in Clearbrook.

Tell us about your family at home and yourself. "There are four members in my family. Because we live in a crowded city so we usually hang out on the weekend (and I hate traffic jams) for watching movies and having dinner together. My dad has two dogs but I'm scared of them. I'm scared of being bitten although they haven't done that to anyone. So mostly my dad plants a lot of his favorite trees and flowers, especially yellow apricot blossoms every Lunar New Year. Because it's a symbol of good luck, wealth and happiness. We also play badminton in the yard and I accidentally broke some of my dad's flowerpots. (He doesn't know that so

keep it a secret.)"

Tell us about your home country and city. "I'm from Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam, a south east Asian country which has tropical monsoon climate. That's why we have plenty of fruit throughout the year. (I'm too lazy to eat, don't ask me) We do have snow but it's only in some Northern cities. We play all of the sports except winter sports. I'm glad that people in my country also celebrate the same holidays with Americans so that I easily get along with my host family. Oh, we celebrate two New Years annually and one of them is from Lunar Calendar."

What exchange program brought you to Clearbrook? "The ISE program."

What classes are you taking? "I'm taking American Literature, College Algebra, Personal Math, Chemistry, History and Economics."

What are some differences at the school? "In Vietnam, teachers go to students classrooms instead of students, so we own the classroom and can decorate whatever we want. School day in US is shorter because in Vietnamese schools, we have more than two hours of noon to have lunch and take a nap, that's why it seems to be longer although we also have seven periods a day."

Are you involved in any activities in school? "I helped with the concession stand and it's fun. I took part in the polar plunge (and lost my slippers)."

Do you have any favorite food? "I love everything except cheese."

What are your future goals? "I'll be having three months of summer in my country and attending to college."

Board Coordinator, Amie Jordan, submitted two requests on behalf of the Auditor/Treasurers office. Commissioner Larson made a motion to authorize the Auditor to pay submitted invoices of \$103,190.42 from the County revenue fund and \$22,084.77 from the Nursing Service fund. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Dean Newland and was approved.

Commissioner Larson made a motion to approve the step increase for Jamie Halverson to Range 26, step 8 effective April 1, 2023. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Titera and was approved.

Veteran Service Officer, Logan LeClair, explained that the Fargo Veteran Center will begin offering group counseling services for PTSD in Clearwater County and are in need of a meeting space. Commissioner Dukek made a motion to approve the use of a vacant room in the County building by the Fargo Veteran Center on a monthly basis. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Larson and was approved.

County Engineer, Dan Sauvé had three items for the board to review and also opened bids for four road projects. The bids will be reviewed for accuracy and the winning bids will be submitted for approval at the next meeting.

Commissioner Nelson made a motion to approve payment of the highway department bills as presented, seconded by Commissioner Titera. Motion carried.

Commissioner Larson authorized the highway department to purchase a NAPA Industrial Air Compressor Model 82-346 from Carlson Parts Store of Bagley in the amount of \$1,280.18. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Dukek and was approved.

Commissioner Newland made a motion to accept the Engineer's Certificate of Performance for CP 22-200; regravelling, to accept said completed project for and on behalf of Clearwater County, and to authorize final payment to Vogts Dirt Service, LLC. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Dukek and was approved.

Following the opening of bids for the road projects, the meeting was adjourned.

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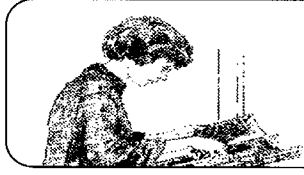

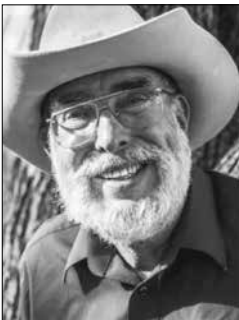
Home Country

Twitter files expose federal agencies' war America
To the editor:

The Twitter files have been in the news a lot, but the Leftists pooh-pooh their significance and are even criticizing Elon Musk for allowing their release.

To obtain a quick look at the files' significance, I recommend you go to the Hillsdale College website and look up the "Imprimis" issue of January 2023, written by John Daniel Davidson, who is a senior editor at The Federalist.

Danielson writes about how the FBI and other federal agencies became "partners" with Twitter to regulate what was allowable for Twitter to be read by the public and which topics were banned.

Danielson writes about "...the suspension (of Trump after the Jan. 6 riot) came amid ongoing interactions with federal agencies – interactions that were increasing in frequency in the months leading up to the 2020 election...."

"...Twitter's censorship tools to diminish the reach of Trump and others on the right through shadow banning and other means...."

"... Shift the entire intellectual framework of content moderation from the enforcement of objective rules to the consideration of

content and narrative, thereby allowing executives to engage in what amounts to viewpoint discrimination...."

"...The problem is that when Twitter suspended Trump, it was operating less like a private company than like an extension of the federal government."

Danielson also writes about the Hunter Biden laptop and attempted cover-ups: "...For months, the FBI and other federal intelligence agencies had been priming Roth (Twitter's chief censor) to dismiss news reports about Hunter Biden ahead of the 2020 election as hack and leak operations by state actors. They had done the same thing with Facebook...."

In his concluding paragraphs, Danielson notes: "...These (social media) companies have become malevolent government actors. As a policy matter, the hands-off laissez-faire regulatory approach we have taken to them should come to an immediate end...."

"...The administrative state has metastasized into a destructive deep state that threatens to bring about the collapse of

America's constitutional system within our lifetimes. Emblematic of the threat is the fact that the intelligence community has proven itself incapable of not interfering in American elections."

He touches upon the post 9-11 response of countering terrorism, citing the late political scientist named Angelo Codevilla, who argued against the terrorism response of expanding a "sprawling security and surveillance apparatus...." Codevilla argued that "a security and surveillance apparatus powerful and pervasive enough to do what we wanted it to do was incompatible with a free society. It might defeat the terrorists, but it would eventually be turned on the American people."

Danielson closes his essay: "The Twitter Files leave little doubt that Codevilla's prediction has come to pass. The question we face now is whether the American people and their elected representatives will fight back. The fate of the republic rests on the answer."
