May was Bike Safety Month

On Thursday, May 12th Nurses Terri Nelson and Lisa Syverson from Clearwater County Nursing Service, along with Officer Ryan Solee from Clearbrook-Gonvick Police Department, and Officer Andy Anderson from Clearbrook/Gonvick School conducted a bike rodeo at the Clearbrook/Gonvick School for the third grade students. The children were fitted for their new bike helmets in the classroom. They were taught how to inspect their bikes for safety, which types of clothes and shoes to wear or not wear when biking, and hand signals for biking. Then, each student completed an obstacle course where they put what they learned into practice.

According to the CDC, nearly 1,000 bicyclists die and over 130,000 are injured in crashes that occur on roads in the United States every year. To avoid injury, children must learn to follow basic bike safety practices which include: always wearing a bike helmet, obeying traffic rules, always having both hands on the handle bars except when signaling, and to wear the proper clothing and foot wear.

Do these things prior to bike riding to ensure your child's safety:

1. Adjust the seat. Make sure to adjust the seat to the proper height, and lock it into place.
2. Check the tires. Ensure that the tires are inflated properly.
3. Check warning parts. Ensure the bike is equipped with reflectors on the rear, front, pedals, and spokes.
4. Check alert devices. Ensure that the horn or bell, rear view mirror, and headlight are in good working condition.
5. Wear protective clothing. Ensure you have a properly fitted bike helmet and other protective light, bright, or reflective clothing before going out on your bike.

Items stolen from vehicles

On May 27, 2023, the Clearwater County Sheriff's Office received three separate reports of several vehicles being entered and items stolen from within, including two firearms.

Deputies from the Clearwater County Sheriff's Office conducted an investigation into these thefts and as a result of the investigation, a search warrant was conducted at a residence in Bagley on May 31, 2023. The two stolen firearms were recovered and two individuals were taken into custody. One adult male, 21-year-old Levi Joseph Miles, was booked into the Clearwater County Jail and a 16-year-old juvenile male was taken to the Northwest Juvenile Center in Bemidji.

The two were arraigned in Clearwater County District Court on June 1, 2023 on felony charges of receiving stolen property. Miles was also arraigned on an unrelated charge of violat-

ing an order for protection. The Clearwater County Sheriff's Office would like to thank the Bagley Police Department and the Minnesota State Patrol with assisting on this investigation.

Commissioners give approval to watercraft cleaning station

After wading through a lot of red tape, the Clearwater County Board of Commissioners were finally able to authorize the placement of a watercraft cleaning station at Clearwater Lake. At a meeting earlier in the year, the commissioners had approved the placement of the station pending contract adjustments suggested by the Clearwater County Attorney and were waiting for the MN DNR to approve the contract changes. Lori Buell and Chester Powell addressed the commissioners and stated that the DNR had replied with a denial to the request for changes in the contract. Fred Sundquist from the Clearwater Lake Association was present to encourage the commissioners to approve the station. While there are not currently any invasive species present in Clearwater Lake, having the station would be a preventative measure and a reminder to boaters to clean their watercraft when leaving a lake. Commissioner John Nelson made a motion to authorize the board chair to strike the "pending contractual formalities by the County Attorney" from the previous motion to approve the cleaning station. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Mark Larson and was passed.

In other business, Chief Deputy Vern Wittenberg submitted a request for the board to a Boat and Water Safety grant. Commissioner Nelson made the motion to authorize the board chair and Sheriff to sign the 2023 State of Minnesota Annual Boat and Water Safety grant in the amount of \$2,056.00, seconded by Commissioner Mark Titera. Motion passed.

Environmental Service Administrator Dan Hecht presented a draft motion for the commissioners to review before their next meeting. The motion would amend the existing rural solid waste collection sites service contract by adding capacity at the Copley, Moose Creek, Nora, Eddy, Leon, Pine Lake, and Sinclair Township collection sites. Hecht also talked about composting. The county will be purchasing 80 Geobin composters that would be available for purchase by interested citizens. These composters look like plastic snow fencing, but with much smaller holes. When set up the "fencing" forms a circular bin that waste material is placed in. The holes allow air circulation. By keeping the waste moist and occasionally mixing the contents, you create compost which can then

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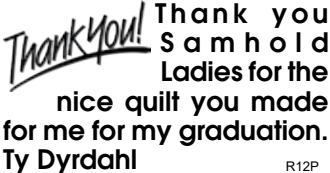

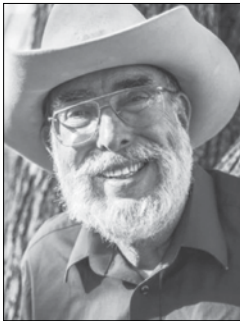

be used in gardens and flower beds. Hecht stated that he had one at home that he has been using and it has dramatically cut down on their garbage and has produced a lot of compost material – more than he had expected. **Land Commissioner Bruce Cox** presented two easement requests for the commissioners to review. Commissioner Nelson made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Stuart Dukek, to approve the terms and conditions for an easement for road purposes in Section 15, T148N R36W, across the County Park grade, to Andrew Gebhardt pending him having a survey completed. Motion passed. Then Commissioner Dukek made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Larson to revise the terms and conditions of a road-way easement granted to Ron and Tanya Engesether at the December 20, 2022, meeting. The revisions are based on new standards that are now in place. Motion passed. The final item on the agenda was a request by Auditor Allan Paulson to hire a part-time extension secretary. Commissioner Larson made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Nelson to approve the hiring of Alissa Preuss for the position as Range 8, Step 1, with a starting date of May 23, 2023. Motion passed. The meeting was then adjourned.

Bronze Star Markers

The Veteran Service Office and other affiliated organizations around Memorial Day get asked lots of questions regarding the Bronze Star Markers on Veterans graves. The Bronze Star Marker is just that, a bronze star. It sits on a spike that allows for easy placement of an American flag on a Veteran grave. I hope to clear up any misconceptions people may have regarding this star.

The star is provided by the State of Minnesota to counties who participate in the voluntary program. These stars have nothing to do with the federal government or the department of Veteran Affairs (VA). Not many states within the United States do this for their Veterans. Minnesota is one that likes to go above and beyond for its Veterans. Each county in Minnesota has the option to participate in this program.

Here's how the program works.

The Veteran Service Office of each county collects the names, date of death and cemetery location of every Veteran that dies within a given year. Those names are then provided to the state at the end of the year. Several months later the state will provide the county with the number of stars requested for eligible Veterans. This means that the Veteran Service Office will not always get the number of stars it requested. Also, it means that it may be a large amount of time between your Veteran passing and the county receiving your Veterans star.

Furthermore, you can imagine keeping track of every Veteran that passes away and is buried in any given county is quite difficult. In our more rural county, it is manageable.

Though, in counties around the twin cities, it is not. That is why many larger counties do not participate in the program.

Because the state does not always provide the number of stars requested, Clearwater County on its own accord has purchased extra. We have extras for people who never received one or may have had theirs lost or broken. Our county will give out one extra star only to help with those lost or stolen.

In Clearwater County we are blessed with the many volunteers that place these stars out at each cemetery and every grave each year. Even though we have these wonderful people, the ultimate responsibility of placing these stars falls to the families of the deceased Veterans. Believe it or not some families don't want these stars at their loved one's grave. That is why you may not see one on graves sometimes. The responsibility of maintaining a loved one's grave is truly the family's responsibility.

Frankly, the way the state executes this program isn't very good and is bound to make people upset. At the county we are trying to do the best we can with a bad system. We want the public to be informed of how the process works and their responsibilities.

If anyone needs a Bronze Star Marker replaced, the next of kin or cemetery official may contact my office and request a replacement. In that regard, we are very happy to help.

The City of Clearbrook's water system consists of two wells and associated pumphouses, an elevated storage tank, and distribution system piping. Currently, chlorine and fluoride are added at the pumphouses. No other water treatment is taking place. The city has high concentration of manganese and has been issued a health risk advisory by MDH.

The proposed project consists of upgrades to the existing wells and construction of a new treatment plant designed to remove manganese.

Environmental Impacts

The primary impacts of the projects are the short-term construction related disturbances such as dust and noise. The short-term impacts will be mitigated by the use of standard construction practices. Effective soil erosion and dust control measures will be carried out as often as necessary to prevent any dust or erosion that may be damaging to property, area vegetation, wildlife, adjacent lands, surface water bodies, or may cause a nuisance to persons in the vicinity.

Never Leave the Memories of Our Soldiers Behind

It's been said that a nation that forgets its defenders will itself be forgotten. We tell the world who we are as a country by how we come together to remember and honor our fallen heroes on Memorial Day — and every day.

So many Americans have put themselves in harm's way for our nation. One example is Charles Frances Shepherd, a veteran who fought in World War I as part of the Meuse Argonne Offensive in France. On November 5th, 1918, Charles' squadron was spotted by the German Army, and bombs began to fall. One got too close, injuring the corporal of his squadron.

Refusing to let a fellow service member die alone, Private Shepherd and two others put the corporal on a stretcher and sought out a first aid station to help him get treatment. It cost them. Their group was spotted and shot at by the German Army. Private Shepherd was hit

by rifle fire, and he took a bullet to the forearm.

The next day, Private Shepherd was taken to a field hospital near Beaumont, France for treatment, and five days later, at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, an armistice was signed. The war was won.

Charles Frances Shepherd made it home, but his corporal did not. As we reflect on his story, we are moved by the self-sacrifice: his squadron refused to abandon their corporal, even when they knew he most likely wasn't going to make it. Fighting on the frontlines, they understood the weight of his sacrifice and felt a responsibility to honor it.

Memorial Day tasks each and every one of us with doing the same.

We take this responsibility seriously in Minnesota. We have so many examples of neighbors lifting up the memories of those who made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of our country.

In 2019, Sergeant Kort Planenberg, Chief Warrant Officer

Without hesitation, the couple whose property they crashed on took it upon themselves to raise a flag and show the families of the fallen that they were thinking of them. What began as a single flagpole is now a beautiful, permanent memorial which will forever honor their legacy.

Last year, I worked with Senator Tina Smith, Representative Tom Emmer, and Representative Michelle Fischbach to rename the Avon, Perham, and Winsted Post Offices in honor of Sergeant Plantenberg, Chief Warrant Officer Nord, and Chief Warrant Officer Rogers so that their bravery and courage will continue to inspire their hometowns for generations to come.

Another way we can continue to honor the sacrifice and memories of these brave men and women is by better caring for the veterans and service members who follow in their footsteps. When our veterans signed up to serve, there wasn't a waiting line, and when they come home to the United States of America and need either a job, or education, or help in their later years—there shouldn't be a waiting line.

Over the past years I got to know Brian Muller, the husband of Amie Muller. Amie was a courageous Minnesota soldier who served in the National Guard and was stationed right next to one of the most notorious burn pits in Iraq. Amie tragically passed away in 2017 at age 36, leaving Brian and their three children behind, nine months after being diagnosed with Stage III pancreatic cancer. After she died, Brian devoted himself to passing legislation to make sure other soldiers didn't suffer the same fate. We now honor Amie's memory with the PACT Act, legislation recently signed into law that is providing support for veterans who fought in Vietnam and the Gulf War as well as the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq.

So on Memorial Day, we remember and honor the legacies and sacrifices of our fallen heroes by recommitting ourselves to ensuring those still with us receive the gratitude and care they deserve. Not just on Memorial Day, but every day.

A 13-year-old boy, O'Rian Rude, was burned after an explosion while putting gas into an ATV last week at a gas station in Plummer.

No injuries have been reported, and CPKC noted the derailment did not happen near any bodies of water and that none of the wreckage had combusted.

The Minnesota Department of Transportation closed Highway 59 south of Lancaster

er due to a train derailment. Motorists will detour utilizing Highway 175 and Kittson County road 5. The highway will remain closed to allow local responders, rail inspectors and cleanup crews to continue their work, which could take into the weekend.

When a road is closed it is illegal to travel in that area. Motorists can be fined up to \$1,000 and/or 90 days in jail.

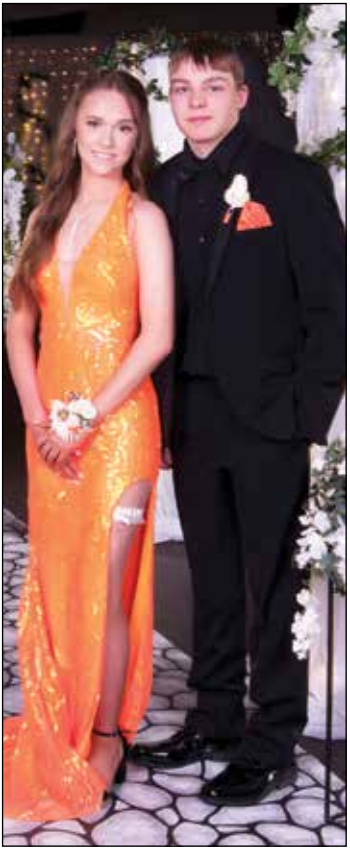

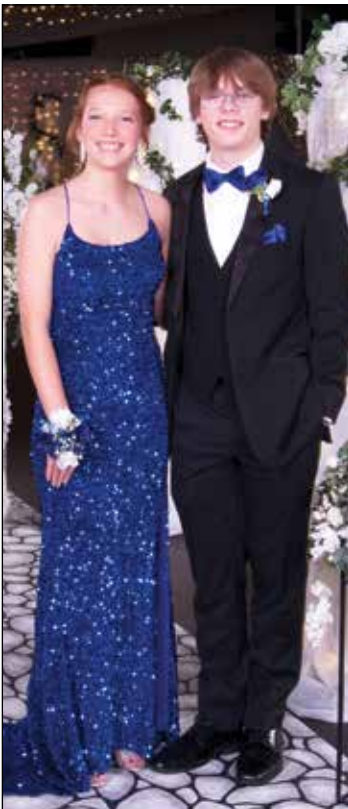

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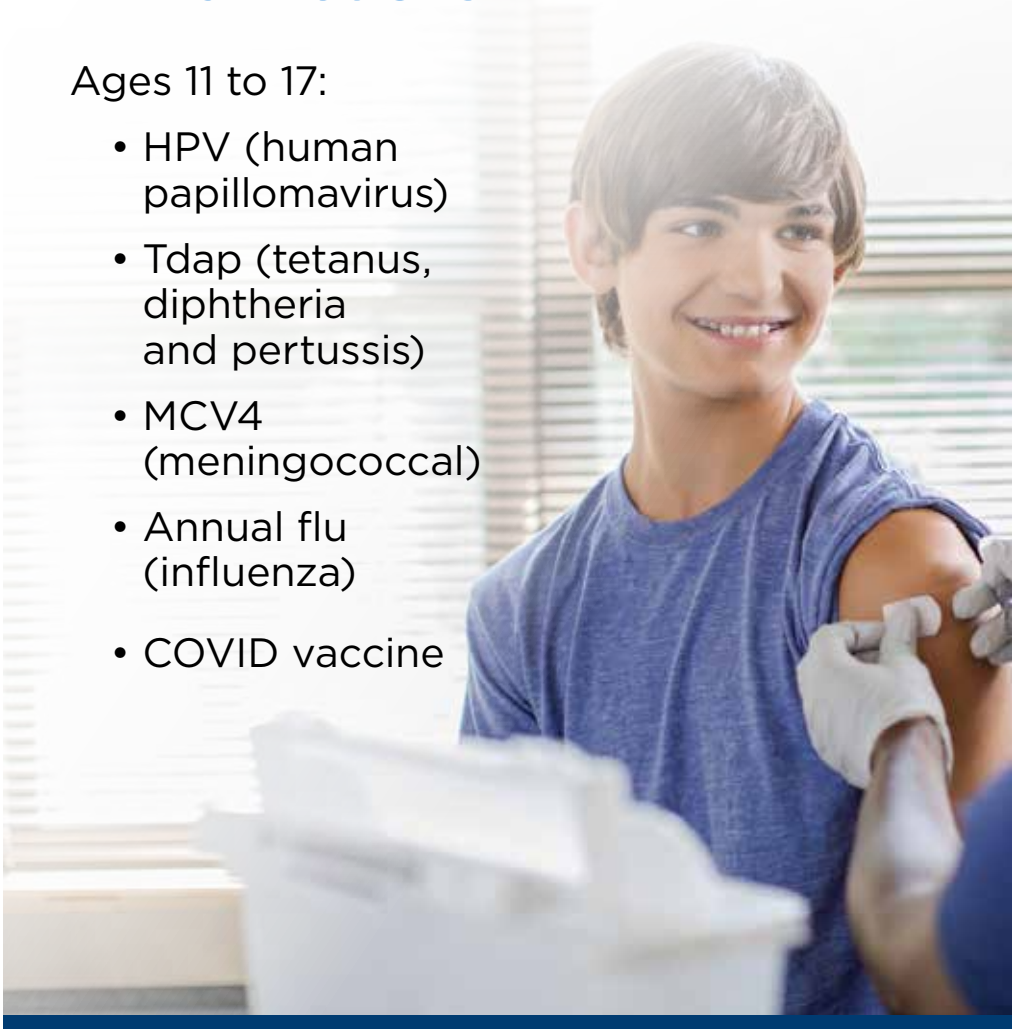
