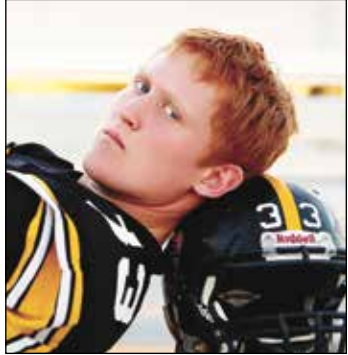

Kailey donates to Locks of Love

Locks of Love was formed to help children with several conditions that cause hair loss, including alopecia, burn trauma, and cancer treatment. Many people have donated their hair for the company.

Kailey Klema of Gonvick had her hair donation with Bobbie Dyrdahl at The Hair Repair in Gonvick. Bobbie carefully measured out the 10 inches that are required for the cut. She then has to braid the hair and send it to West Palm Beach, Florida.

- There are certain guidelines for an acceptable donation.
- Hair that is colored or permed is acceptable.
 - Hair that has been bleached (usually this refers to highlighted hair) is not usable.
 - They cannot accept dreadlocks.
 - Layered hair is acceptable if the longest layer is 10 inches.
 - Layered hair may be divided into multiple ponytails.
 - Curly hair may be pulled straight to measure the minimum 10 inches.
 - 10 inches measured tip to tip is the minimum length needed for a hairpiece.

After Kailey had her 10 inches cut off Bobbie then styled her hair the way she wanted it done.

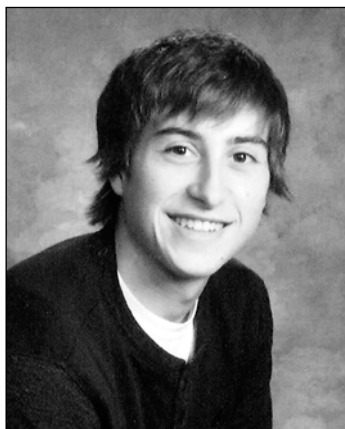

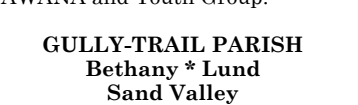

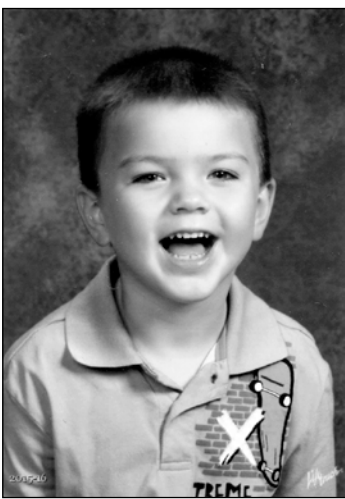

Reducing Ash Content in Forages

Dan Undersander, Wisconsin Extension Forage Specialist, recently posted an article about reducing ash content in hay crops. He points out that the typical ash content, primarily minerals in a hay crop, runs about 8% in alfalfa and 6% for grass. Higher levels of ash indicate contamination from soil.

A summary of haylage samples from the University of Wisconsin Forage Lab averaged 12.3%. Dry hay samples averaged 10.3% (from 8.8% to 17.6%). At 18%, this would mean that animals would be consuming almost 1 pound of dirt with each 10 pounds of hay or haylage!

Dr. Undersander suggests looking at the following opportunities for minimizing excess ash content in forages.

1. Raise the cutter bar of a disc mower. You will be giving up a little bit of yield, but gaining quality. Research suggests you can cut as short as 1.5 inches for alfalfa to maximize yield. Many grasses will regrow better with a 3 to 4 inch cutting height.

2. Use flat knives on the

disc mower. Knives are angled or curve to create some lift for picking up down hay. Ash is more of an issue with dry soil. Think about your situation.

3. Avoid harvesting lodged forage. That can be tough to do because we can't control the weather. There might be opportunities to select varieties that stand better and still provide suitable quality. Some people lean toward cutting early with a good weather opportunity to avoid getting delayed by weather having more lodging.

4. Watch ground speed, especially on rough fields, to reduce header bounce that shaves the ground.

5. Keep the windrow off the ground, which can be a challenge. Cutting a little taller might help. Laying a wide swath on dense stubble might help. Some people prefer to cut to the same swath width they chop for haylage, hoping that raking won't be necessary for chopping.

Some people don't like to lay hay in a swath so wide that they have to drive on it when soil conditions are wetter because they find that they pick

up more dirt in the hay if they need to drive on it in raking it together again.

6. Keep rake tines from touching the ground. This has to do with height adjustments and ground speed. You can think about baler and chopper pickup teeth the same way. You might figure out whether leaving a few spears of hay in the field is a suitable trade-off for better quality.

7. Use a windrow merger or inverter rather than raking. Your own experience counts.

8. Store bales off the ground. Consider storing dry hay bales on concrete in a shed with a plastic sheet under the hay to prevent it from picking up moisture from the concrete.

9. Put piles and bags on a concrete or asphalt surface to minimize soil picked up during feeding. If not on a hard surface do what you can to reduce muddy conditions

10. If combining 3 swaths, move two swaths on top of a third in the middle rather than moving all three swaths.

Good observations skills and common sense in the field are keys to looking for ways to operate equipment to make the best of forage quality.

County Engineer, Dan Sauve` received authorization from Greenwood Township officials for the removal of the bridge and culvert by Clearwater County Engineer, at no cost to the township. The township wants the bridge to be donated to the Itasca Pioneer Farmers so it will have a home.

County Auditor-Treasurer Allen Paulson received authorization to pay the submitted invoices of \$52,420 from the County Revenue Fund, and \$34,023 from Nursing Service.

What to do with the Greenwood Bridge

The county highway department has been looking into taking down the bridge in Greenwood Township. The bridge was built in 1905. It's a rare kingpost type bridge. It is one of two remaining in the state. This one is older than the other bridge (located near Luverne, MN) by about 3 years. The Luverne bridge is listed on the national registry of historic places.

Access to the bridge has

The Greenwood Town Board voted at last evening's meeting (May 16th) to remove the bridge from its current location and re-locate the bridge to the Lake Itasca Pioneer Farmers site. The Supervisors authorized Dan Sauve to make the arrangements.

been closed for several years. Lee Berget Clearwater County Highway Department had sent a letter in 1994 to the Minnesota Historical Society concerning the project that they would be doing. They were looking at reconstruction to the Township Road 70, 48 and County Road 69 and closing Bridge L-1297 in Greenwood Township. Britta Bloomberg sent a letter back to Berget commenting on the project. She went to say, "It has been reviewed pursuant to the responsibilities given the Minnesota Historical Society by the Minnesota Historic Sites Act and the Minnesota Field Archaeology Act. There are no reported archaeological properties in the project area, and we feel that the probability of any unreported archaeological properties is low. However, we do feel

that bridge L-1297 meets the criteria of the National Register of Historic Places. You have indicated that you do not intend to destroy the bridge as part of this project. However, we do have a concern about the future of the structure, since it will apparently be unused after this project is completed. We would ask that you develop a management strategy for the bridge. Although we usually prefer that historic properties are left in place, there are times when locating a historic bridge to a new location where it can fulfill a useful function is a wise choice. There may be other options for management as well."

The highway department left the bridge in place and closed it off to traffic for safety concerns.

The highway department is looking at doing away with the bridge and there are some concerned citizens that would like it to stay. Residents of Greenwood Township discussed the issue at their meeting on Tuesday, April 12.

Tamara Edevold with the Clearwater County Historical Society, stated that "the historical society's position is that it's always the first choice to leave an historic property like this bridge in its original location, especially if its eligible for the national registry, which this one is. If it must be moved, then the next best choice is to have it reused as a bridge in a similar setting- perhaps in a park where it can be interpreted and people can appreciate it for what it is. The worse thing would be to have it end up as scrap."

Edevold had written to Denis P. Gardner with the Minnesota State Historic Preservation Office concerning Re: Bridge No. L1297, Greenwood Township, Clearwater County, Minnesota. His reply, "This letter is confirmation that Bridge No. L1297 is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. In 1994, Britta Bloomberg, the Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer, sent a letter to Lee H. Berget at the Clearwater County Highway Department in Bagley, Minnesota, noting
