4-H Fishing Workshop held at Cross Lake

The Clearwater County 2016 4-H Fishing Workshop was held at the Cross Lake Campground on Saturday and Sunday, June 4th and 5th. Cross Lake has provided the perfect local venue for this event over the years with its expansive fishing pier and comfortable camping area layout. Camp Host Glenn welcomed the 4-H campers, parents and adult volunteers

Saturday morning to the now-familiar tent camping area on the south side of the campground. Campers enjoyed great weather for the duration of the event even with a short, refreshing sun shower. After a kickoff potluck, the campers gathered for the 4-H education that was planned. MN DNR Intern Nicholas Peterson presented hands-on and practical informational on fish families, including MN fishing regulations and good fishing sportsmanship. Nicholas monitored the afternoon's initial round of fishing, visiting with the 4-H'ers on the three piers and the shore, as well. Supper was fire-roasted hot dogs with more pot luck sides and dessert. The evening's fishing continued for some campers until sundown. The campsite filled up again for s'mores, desserts and campfire fellowship. Sunday morning dawned with picture perfect weather, with some campers down on the fishing pier a little after 5:00 a.m. A hot meal of breakfast sandwiches with country potatoes prepared the campers to break camp and head out for the final round of catch-and-release fishing before the traditional fish fry lunch. Prizes were given from local Bemidji business such as Northland Tackle, L&M Fleet Supply and Gander Mountain for fish catching and sportsmanship. Vernon's Custom Woodshop of Bagley provided four cartons of night-crawlers and four cartons of leeches for fishing bait, which kept the 4-H fishers' hooks and bobbers busy.

Dan Suavé, Clearwater County Engineer presented information on historic bridge in Greenwood

The Clearbrook City Council meeting was held on May 9, 2016 in the City Council Chambers and called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Mayor George Postier.

Present were: Mayor: George Postier; Council Members: Ryan Solee, Shawn Johnson, Dylan Goudge and Kevin Prosser. Others present: Lucie Thompson, Dan Gazelka, Danny Ulrich, Joy Walberg, Kristine Kobernic, Gary Prosser, Sam Anderson, Karvakko Engineering and Dan Suavé, Clearwater County Engineer.

Motion made and accepted for the April 11, 2016 regular council meeting minutes and the May 3, 2016 special council meeting minutes.

Presentation of Petitions and Complaints by Council Members and Citizens:

Dan Suavé, Clearwater County Engineer presented information in regards to a historic bridge in Greenwood Township of Clearwater County that needs to be relocated. The County has obtained a \$10,000 grant to move the bridge, but the bridge would require some repair work after it is moved. Mr. Suavé was inquiring if the City would be interested in the bridge and have

somewhere to place it.

Mr. Suavé also discussed 1st Street in Clearbrook. The street is in fairly bad condition. Options were discussed on how to improve the street with minimal cost, while the City awaits funding approval on the water and sewer project. The Council also discussed options with Mr. Suavé on the proposed bike/walking trail the City is working on.

Red Lake Watershed District focuses on Four-Legged and Pine Lake improvements

Les Torgerson, Board Member, and Myron Jesme, Administrator from Red Lake Watershed District (RLWD) were on hand at the Clearwater County Board of Commissioners meeting on June 14, 2016 to explain the highlights of accomplishments in the 2015 Annual Report. They especially wanted to bring attention to two projects within Clearwater County that are being worked on. One is in the Four-Legged Lake watershed; and the other in Pine Lake watershed.

Four-Legged Lake: Les Torgerson pointed out that in the Four-Legged Lake chain of lakes over the years, and most recently in 1999, that the raising of a culvert without Drainage Authority permission, is resulting in increased flooding to major county roadways and properties of upstream landowners.

"Raising a drainage system three feet is illegal, and there are damages from this," he stated.

"It used to be pasture, and now it is under water," stated some landowners.

They are now in the process of reconciling this with plans for a construction project likely to the previous level, three feet lower, which coincided with the County Engineer, DNR, and RLWD recommended elevation, with a probable gravity-fed system. This affects the southwest and the northwest areas of Four-Legged Lake. The RLWD will maintain the system for the whole district, they said.

Landowners are now paying

ditch tax. A hearing is in process to consider the flood damages to landowners.

Pine Lake: The Pine Lake Property Owners Association made a request to the RLWD to stabilize the water level in the lake, especially in late summer, for example, by making a flood reduction project when money is available.

Water can be stored, which improves water quality.

"Some want Pine Lake to be a duck versus a fish lake," said Myron Jesme. "There is resistance to that."

Nathan Nordlund, Clearwater County SWCD is working to stabilize the shoreline at Pine Lake with Gary Lane, a RLWD staff member. Landowners are offered \$1,500 per acre to establish the required buffer strip, otherwise there is no compensation.

"There are so many changes, that I believe the monitoring of the ditch projects is very important," Mr. Torgerson said. "The RLWD is required to provide data for applying for grants."

Clearwater Lake: They stated that Clearwater Lake is considered to be very clear, but one concern is sediment that goes in. Levels are maintained by a dam.

Commissioner Dan Stenseng stated that U.S. Fish and Wildlife are buying up many easements in the County, and wanted to know if RLWD gets involved in this, to which they answered not unless there is a request, as those are privately owned easements.

"Natural resources are among our most valuable re-

sources to preserve," Mr. Torgerson stated. He said he has seen what happens to watersheds that are not maintained.

Highway Department business at the meeting included paying of bills in the amount of \$47,524; and approval to purchase GPS related equipment in the amount of \$9,078 by Engineer Dan Sauvé. He brought the proposed Road and Bridge Program spanning from 2017 to 2021 for Board review and map indicating locations of the anticipated projects.

Land Commissioner Bruce Cox received approval for 2016 Tax-Forfeited Land Sales.

County Auditor-Treasurer Allen Paulson said the county has hit the low point of county revenue funds recently, and stated that the county is \$500,000 better off than last year at this time, because of the solid waste levy and savings on employees.

He received authorization to pay the submitted invoices of \$222,412 from the County Revenue Fund, and \$54,107 from Nursing Service.

One ambulance garage, which will be 40x60 feet, construction bid was opened, which will be sent to Seth Tram at Sanford. Commissioner John Nelson said no action can be taken at this time.

Commissioners present at the meeting were Daniel Stenseng, Dean Newland, John Nelson, Neal Illies and Arlen Syverson.

The Board of Commissioners adjourned to hold the Board of Equalization Meeting. (See separate article.)

Assessor explains requirements of Board of Equalization

The Clearwater County Board of Equalization met on June 14, 2016.

Assessor Jamie Freeman gave an overview of the equalization process. As county assessor, she has the challenge of determining the market values of properties here, which must fall between 90 and 105% of market, according to state mandates. The state will require changes of valuations which do not fit into this frame work. Six sales is considered a valid sample.

Minnesota Statutes dictate "that all property shall be valued at its market value, which

is the value determined by the assessor as the price the property would likely sell for on the open market." Another requirement is that the assessor must view each property at least once every five years.

Clearwater County new construction 2016 Assessments total \$6,662,900, including all classes of residential, seasonal residential recreational, agricultural, and commercial/industrial.

Countywide, agricultural land received a 10% increase, and Copley Township residential land and structures outside of Bagley City limits received a 5% increase for 2016.

State of Minnesota requires one board member be certified in the county for the Board of Appeal and Equalization, training for which can now be done on-line. Allen Paulson is certified until July 1, 2016; Dean Newland, Neal Illies, and Jamie Freeman are certified until July 1, 2017. On-line training will be available to all board members after July 1, 2016 and will remain available until Feb. 1, 2017. Anyone completing the training during that time period will be certified until July 1, 2020.

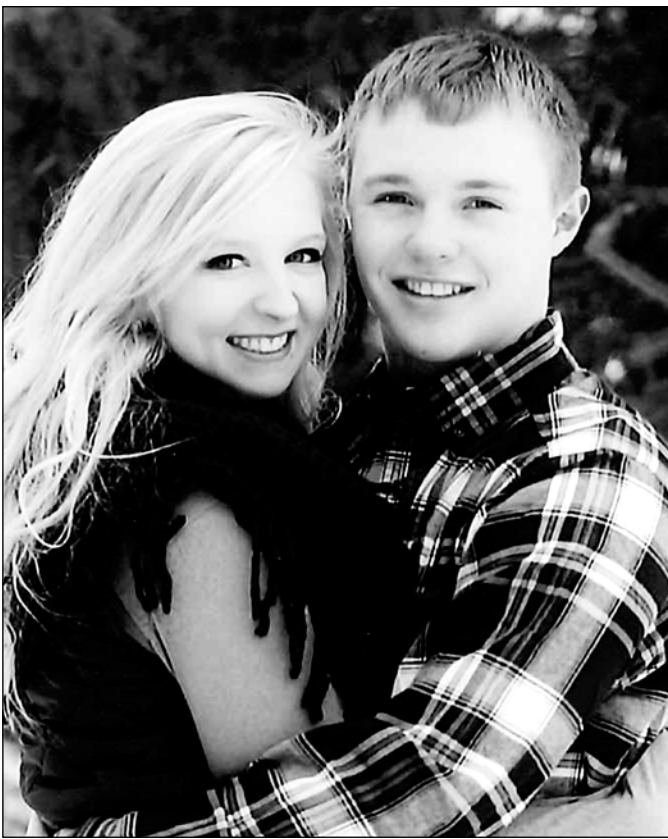

cost beneficial to replace the heater, rather than try to repair the current heater. One bid has been received, and we are waiting on the second bid. Shawn Johnson made a motion to replace the heater with the City Council approving the lower of the two bids, with the

second bid having until 4pm on Wednesday, May 11th to be received. Tentatively, the pool manager plans to open the pool on June 2nd depending on when the new heater can be installed. At this time, the pool will not be receiving an umbrella for the kiddie pool and deck chairs that were tentatively to be donated.

-Update on the playground project was given. A price comparison of the three quotes was done. A visual comparison was made of playgrounds in the area that were installed by the three companies submitting bids. Ryan Solee made a motion to accept the lowest of the three bids that were received; Dylan Goudge seconded the motion; Kevin Prosser was a Nay vote (he preferred another company's design); All others, excluding Kevin Prosser voted in favor; motion carried.

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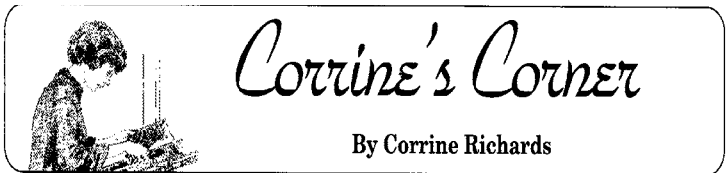

Laundering Clothes after Pesticide Applications

The spraying season is upon us and for the next several weeks, many farmers and pesticide applicators will be exposed to various toxic pesticides. The simple act of washing the applicators clothing can have an effect on the well being of others in the household. The following information is adapted from Montana State University Extension.

The use of pesticides may pose a direct risk to the applicator, but also may pose an indirect risk to his or her family. During pesticide application, clothing can pick up pesticide residues through spills and drift. Tossing contaminated garments into the washer or laundry basket with other clothes can transfer the residue to the other garments and unwittingly to other family members.

Ordinary laundry procedures won't rid the clothes of highly toxic and concentrated pesticide residues. Because pesticide absorption through the skin--not through the respiratory system--is the major risk for agricultural workers, textile researchers continue to study pesticide removal from clothing. Fabrics studied include those typically used by farm workers--heavyweight 100% cotton and 50/50% polyester-cotton blends. Research to date shows that fiber content makes no significant difference in the amount of pesticide removed. However, shirts and pants of 100% polyester allow more penetration of pesticides, and should not be worn during pesticide application.

Applicators can first lower the risk to their families by taking some precautions:

- Spray clothing should be changed and washed daily.
- Before entering the house, discard clothing saturated with highly toxic, undiluted pesticides, and discard any contaminated leather apparel. The pesticide can't be completely removed from these items.
- Pre-rinse other garments twice in a pail of hot water. Empty the prerinse water into the septic system, or use the water in following pesticide applications.

• If the clothing can be laundered, inform the person doing the wash about the pesticide-contaminated clothes and tell whether the pesticide was in a liquid or powder form.

Agricultural pesticides vary in toxicity so it's important to know which chemicals were used. Key words on all pesticide labels, called "Signal Words" identify the toxicity of the product. For example: Poison Danger signifies a highly toxic or highly concentrated product; Warning, moderately toxic; and Caution, slightly toxic.

Other factors which influence ease of removal are the formulation and concentration of the pesticide. Commonly used formulations are emulsifiable concentrates (EC), granulars (G), and wettable powders (WP). Water soluble formulations are easier to remove in laundering than oil based emulsifiable concentrates. Check pesticide label for formulation information.

Hazards are less pronounced in handling clothing exposed to low toxicity pesticides. The ease of pesticide removal through laundering does not depend on toxicity level; however, it depends on chemical class, solubility, and formulation of the pesticide. For example, 2,4-D amine is easily removed through laundering because it is soluble in water; 2,4-D ester is much more difficult to remove through laundering.

Clothing contaminated with highly toxic and concentrated pesticides must be handled most carefully, as these pesticides can be absorbed through the skin, and/or cause serious skin injury. In general, as the concentration of active ingredients (a.i.) in the pesticide increases, the removal of pesticide residue by laundering decreases.
