Sarah Hoagberg calls it quits after twenty years

She attended the University of Minnesota at Duluth and received her degree from Bemidji State University. That included a Bachelor of Science degree in Elementary Education K-6, with Pre-Kindergarten, Family Ed/Early Childhood Educator, and Librarian endorsements.

Sarah was asked some questions and following is her response.

What were the most rewarding things about your career? Helping the children learn and the families have a good experience with the school. I loved getting to know the new families each year. Teaching is a very creative, fluid process. I loved helping children to achieve and do their best and to love knowledge and getting to know the wonders of

What will you miss most about teaching? The people: the children, the families, the staff at school.

AIS prevention plan moves forward

Board authorizes rumble strips at 41 county intersections

The Clearwater County Board of Commissioners met on June 9 and 16, 2015.

County Engineer, Dan Sauvé brought Rumble Strip Bids at the request of the Board at the last meeting. Bids ranged from \$53,710 for 41 rumble strips, \$32,200 for 23 strips, and \$7,950 for two locations.

A motion was presented for option 1 in the amount of \$53,710 to provide intersection safety improvements by upgrading the signing and pavement markings per the County Roadway Safety Plan at 41 intersections. In addition, the motion includes the installation of transverse rumble strips at these same intersections and to authorize Diamond Sur-

face Inc. from Rogers, Minn. to install the rumble strips.

Commissioner Dean Newland made the motion, which was seconded by Commissioner Arlen Syverson and passed unanimously by the Board. State aid and wheelage tax dollars previously collected in the County will be used to pay for the installation.

Sauvé reported that the Highway Department's Annual Financial Report is complete and now available for review at the Highway Department, Auditor's Office or via digital format that can be emailed. A summary statement of 2014 finances submitted to the State Aid Office to obtain the final 10% of maintenance funds was submitted to the Board.

A total of \$14,774 was approved for payment of recent bills from the Highway Department.

Maintenance Agreements for the years 2015-2019 for all those townships and government agencies that indicate a willingness to implement the agreement were authorized by Board Chairman Dan Stenseng.

Kathy Rasch from Soil and Water Conservation District brought information about the options and costs of available advertising methods being considered to promote the prevention of aquatic invasive species (AIS) in county lakes. Some are local television, radio and

There were six people for each crew with over 22 crews. They came from seven states. Teen-Serve is a division

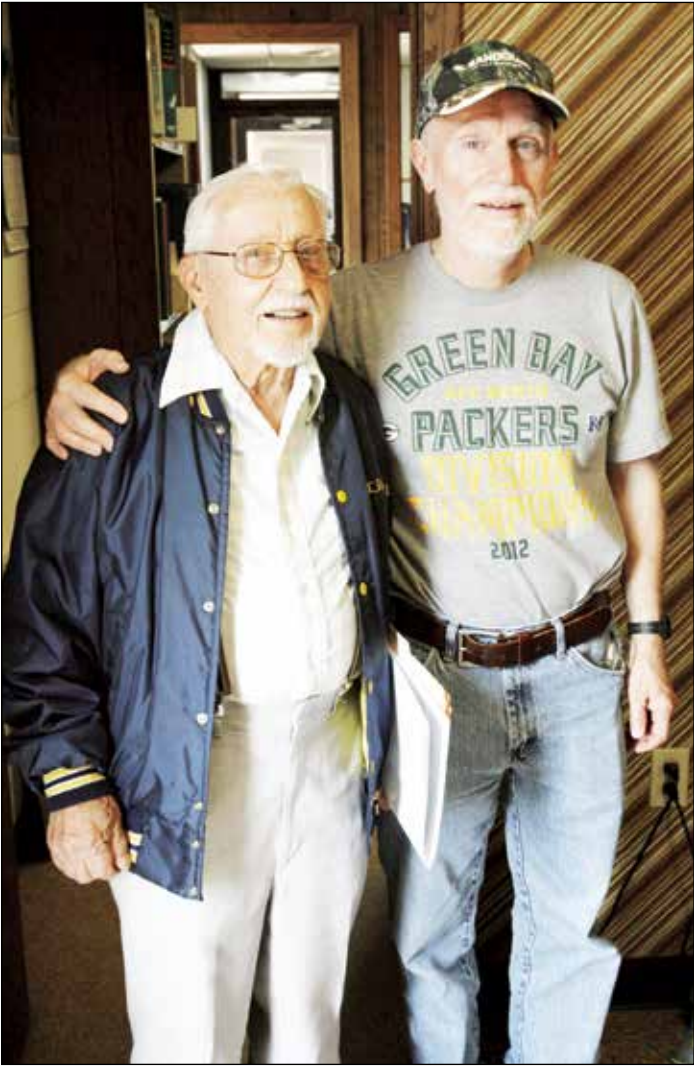

theater segments as well as websites, including the County website, and presentations to such organizations as Rotary Clubs and 4-H. Since other counties are also involved in doing AIS prevention, it was thought that they could pool ideas and resources to make the best use of the funds.

A motion to approve the expense of \$14,500 to Fishing the Wildside for the multi-media AIS awareness campaign, as stated in the County AIS Prevention Aid Fund from the State of Minnesota was made by Commissioner Newland, seconded by Commissioner John Nelson and passed by the Board.

This plan would include the following six lakes in Clearwater County: Lake Lomond, Pine Lake, Long Lake, Long Lost Lake, LaSalle Lake, and Clearwater Lake. (Lake Itasca was given some funds to do their own prevention program there.)

Commissioner Nelson said, "I think you have done an excellent job explaining the plan, and answering questions for us." He said they should go ahead and do what they think

A motion to approve utilizing RMBEL services to complete vegetation sampling on up to six lakes at a total cost of not more than \$9,500 from the AIS Prevention Aid for 2015 was made by Commissioner Neal Illies, seconded by Commissioner Nelson, and passed.

Commissioner Dan Stenseng said he would like to offer a railroad sign as an artifact to the museum in Clearbrook. He said the railroad right of way of Co. 14 where the sign is located is referred back to the County. The consensus among the commissioners was to go ahead with the offer.

Land Commissioner Bruce Cox brought the 2015 Land Sale Resolution stating many properties being offered for sale in Clearwater County for non-payment of taxes. These are non-conservation lands and comply with the provisions of Minnesota Statutes which require the withholding of tax-forfeited lands from sale. The resolution was approved by the Board, authorizing the appraisal of these lands.

Sheriff Darin Halverson received authorization to use funds from the vehicle forfeiture, drug and alcohol seizure fund to purchase a 2011 Dodge Ram Crew Cab pickup and to spend up to \$15,000 to acquire it.

County Auditor-Treasurer Allen Paulson received authorization to accept the bid from Glen's Carpet Service to remove and dispose of carpet and replace with carpet tile and rubber base installation in the amount of \$30,131. Funds will be used from the Building and Grounds account. A total of 1062 square yards will be installed per custodian Steve Faldet.

The Auditor-Treasurer received authorization to pay submitted invoices of \$67,316 from the County Revenue Fund and \$22,488 from Nursing service at the June 9 meeting; and \$74,990 from the County Revenue Fund and \$42,629 from the Nursing Service at the June 16 meeting.

The Board approved the payment of Clearwater County's portion of the matching funds to the Land of the Dancing Sky Agency on Aging in the amount of \$2,341 from the Commissioners Contingency Budget.

The Commissioners adjourned to conduct the Board of Equalization meeting to be held immediately following the regular Board meeting. (See separate article.)

Commissioners present at the meeting were Daniel Stenseng, Dean Newland, John Nelson, Neal Illies and Arlen Syverson.

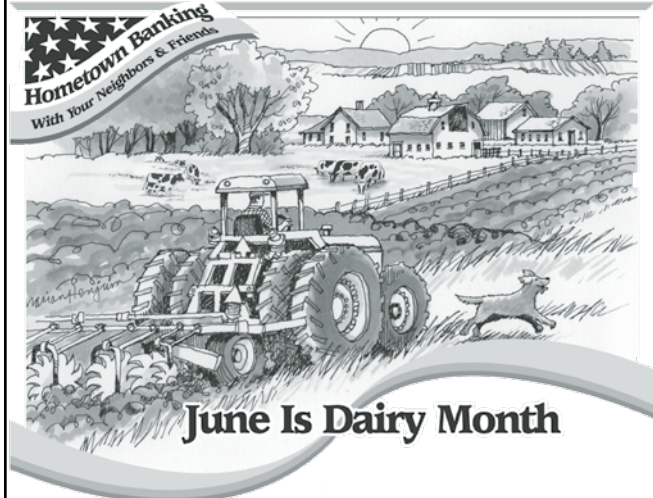

MEMORIAL DEDICATION: The Clearbrook Veterans Memorial will be dedicated on Saturday, June 27th, at 4:00 pm at the Clearbrook City Park. Among the features of the memorial are monuments to the veterans all war periods from all services, three flag poles, benches and individual memorial pavers. James Kloster will be in attendance to offer an introductory statement and the Benediction. Also, Rolf Anderson will address those gathered as well. The Clearbrook American Legion Honor Guard will present the Colors and a rifle salute, and Chris Holm will sing a musical tribute, "God Bless the USA".

GUN VS RIFLE SALUTES: At military funerals, one often sees three volleys of shots fired in honor of the deceased veteran. This is often mistaken by the layman as a 21-gun salute, although it is entirely different. In the military, a "gun" is a large-calibered weapon. The three volleys are fired from "rifles," not "guns." Therefore, the three volley firing isn't any kind of "gun salute", at all. The three volleys comes from an old battlefield custom. The two warring sides would cease hostilities to clear their dead from the battlefield, and the firing of three volleys meant that the dead had been properly cared for and the side was ready to resume the battle. Anyone who is entitled to a military funeral is entitled to the three rifle volleys, subject to availability of honor guard teams. As stated, this is not a 21-gun salute, nor any other type of "gun salute." There are simply three rifle volleys fired. The firing team can consist of any number, but one usually sees a team of eight, with a noncommissioned officer in charge of the firing detail. Whether the team consists of three or eight, or ten, each member fires three times (three volleys). The honor guard detail often presents three shell-casings to the family. Each casing represents one volley.

Wild Carrot in Hay and Pastures

Weather patterns clearly have an effect on plant survival. Over the past few years, our unique climatic pattern seems to encourage certain plant species, while others show decline. Hawkweed is one that comes to mind, but wild carrot is another tenacious plant that seems to enjoy our unique weather pattern.

Wild carrot can become problematic in pastures, hayfields and no-till cropping systems. Over time, a wild carrot infestation can become a significant problem. But, understanding the plant biology can help you plan successful control strategies.

Wild carrot, also known as Queen Anne's lace, is a biennial plant in the parsley family. It germinates and emerges in spring, developing a rosette of delicate, deeply lobed, feathery or fernlike leaves. The foliage is very similar to garden carrots and will smell similar when crushed. Some plants will flower and set seed during the first year of growth, but most will overwinter without flowering. When winter comes, these first year leaves will die back, but the strong taproot overwinters. The second year, plants send up a tall flower stalk and more leaves.

The flower, called an um-

bel, is a flat-topped cluster of small, white flowers, 2-5 inches across. Each plant can have several flowers. The flower heads face upward during the day and bend down at night. After fertilization, the flower head folds and has a "birds nest" appearance. Healthy wild carrot plants can produce as many as 1,000-40,000 seeds per plant, and seeds can live and germinate over a seven-year period or longer.

Wild carrot prefers well-drained to dry soils. A few wild carrot plants are considered a minor problem; and though not considered poisonous, excessive consumption by dairy cows may taint the milk. If left unchecked, plant population can build up over time in non-cultivated fields, competing with and replacing desired plants. Interseeding with desirable forage plants, along with proper fertilization will also help to eradicate it, or at least, keep it at an insignificant population. Indeed, the remove and replace weed control strategy is one that can be used successfully on many pesky weeds.

Wild carrot can easily be confused with its evil look-alike cousin, poison-hemlock. Poison hemlock is acutely toxic to people and animals and tends to grown in undisturbed ar-

eas. Poison-hemlock has hairless hollow stalks with purple blotches, while wild carrot (also known as Queen Anne's Lace) has hairy stems and no purple spots. Remember it this way: "The Queen has hairy legs!" Hemlock produces many

umbrella-shaped flower clusters in an open and branching inflorescence, while wild carrot has one dense flower cluster on a narrow, hairy stem.

Wild carrot can be managed by various means. Perhaps the simplest is biological; sheep, horses and cattle will graze wild carrot. Insects including lygus bugs, carrot rust fly maggots and certain nematodes will also attack wild carrot.

Tillage will also control wild carrot while mowing or clipping at late flowering stage reduces size and seed production. A single clipping in July has been shown to stop seed production.

Herbicide choices for hay and pasture fields are limited. The use of 2,4-D is discouraged in grass-legume mixtures because it will damage the forage legumes while increasing the risk of 2,4-D-resistant plants. Where 2,4-D is an option, the continued use of 2,4-D will lead to a resistance problem in as few as two or three years. Spring applications of labeled herbicides are effective in controlling wild carrot seedlings in other crops. However, once wild carrot becomes established, fall herbicide applications are more effective.

Herbicide application is probably not the best option for wild carrot control in hay fields and pastures. Careful grazing management and clipping plants before they set seed is likely to be more effective and economical. Keep in mind that viable seed will remain in the soil profile and the problem will take more than a single year to address. When an infestation is too severe, renovating

the field should be considered. Again, "Remove and Replace".

Oklee man turns himself in

On Thursday, June 11th, a standoff between law enforcement and a rural Oklee man began. Sheriff's deputies were called to the farmstead about 15 miles southeast of Thief River Falls around 10:30 a.m. Thursday morning. The man had an altercation with his wife and a 911 call was made to the Pennington County Sheriff's Department. The man was later identified as Eric Reinbold.

A neighbor had witnessed a man ramming a car with a women and two children inside and also called in the incident. The woman and children were located a short time later and were unharmed.

A deputy approached the

farmstead and found the house empty. Reinbold called the Sheriff's office again saying he would meet the deputy at the house. The deputy returned and Reinbold hollered to him that he had a gun and was not coming out of the woods.

Authorities continued attempting to make contact Reinbold, but were unsure if Reinbold was still in the house, or somewhere among nearby shelter belts.

Law enforcement officers from three counties along with the SWAT team from Grand Forks and a helicopter from the U.S. Border Patrol participated in a search until 11 p.m. that evening. Sheriff Kuznia's main

concern was to make sure this ended peacefully and that no one gets hurt.

The search continued Friday morning after the 12 hour standoff on Thursday. Law enforcement officers, along with family and friends continued the search for Eric Reinbold around his farmstead. Tracks were followed cross country and Reinbold had crossed a river as he tried to allude law enforcement.

On Saturday morning at 9:00 a.m. Reinbold turned himself in and is facing three counts of second degree assault. Second degree assault faces a maximum sentence of 7 years and/or \$14,000 fine.

Bagley Co-op has purchased property for building a truck stop in Bagley. Included in the plans is a Subway restaurant, the Assessor said.

Assessor Freeman said she is planning to have both Courtney Burford and Eric Beier eventually become certified as Minnesota Assessors. She said they are both a great asset to the Assessor's Office.

Board of Appeal and Equalization Training and Certification are available online beginning July 1. Jamie said

an active email address is required, or the county email address may be used, and that all commissioners are encouraged to get trained. At the present, Dean Newland is trained, and she is looking toward the future, that others will follow. She said there is a \$500 fine per parcel for not having properly certified individuals available for the Board of Equalization.

Recent 2015 Open Book Changes were shown on various properties throughout the County, also the sales ratio from 2014 property sales in the County.

The assessor said that Clearbrook will see a 5% decrease on residential properties; Gonvick will see a 5% increase on residential proper-

ties; and Copley Township will see a 5% increase on residential properties for next year.

She said the Department of Revenue comes in and does an official review to see that everything is being done right.

A new conversion of software process is coming in August. Commissioner Dan Stenseng said, "It will help to understand where the money is and where it is going - there is always something new coming. It is amazing what you can pull out." Assessor Freeman added, "It's really amazing what you can do."

The Board of Equalization was created to show how and why property is assessed as it is. No one from the public brought any property issues to the meeting.
