Spend Saturday rummaging around in Mac

This Saturday in McIntosh is the Citywide Rummage sales. You are sure to find some great bargains and have a lot of fun searching for a great deal and just visiting.

There is a listing of most of the sales on page 6 of this paper, but look around town because there will be more sales than just those listed.

There is also a Flea Market that will be set up on 1st St and Broadway, just south of the Community Center, with multiple vendors. Most sales start around 8:00 am, so plan to come early to shop, then stop by the local businesses to pick up a doughnut or dinner.

Some tips for successful rummage sale shopping are:
Plan your route.

You want to plan exactly which yard sales you're going to shop at before you even get in your car.

While driving around looking for yard sales can be fun, it can also mean you don't get the best bargains before the other yard sales do.

There are 2 kinds of garage sales. There are the ones where people want to make money and the ones where people want to get rid of stuff. The object is to find the ones where people want to get rid of stuff.

Decide what you want to buy ahead of time and make a list.

The worst thing you can do as a bargain shopper is to spend more money than you initially wanted to on things that you're never going to use.

Having a list means you only buy those things you truly want and will use. Be sure to make note of the sizes you need and the spaces where household items will go, and take along a tape measure!

Of course, there are always some exceptions. For example, items that you should always be on the lookout for at yard sales are:

- stainless steel bakeware
- bikes
- commercial grade cookware
- suitcases
- dog items (leashes, bowls, pet toys)
- games

Decide on a budget ...and don't go over it!

You can lose a lot of money shopping at yard sales, if you aren't careful.

Knowing how much you can

afford to spend (as well as what you want to buy) can make your yard sale shopping experience a positive one, rather than a regretful one.

You will undoubtedly see a lot of interesting and unique items. To avoid going broke, ask yourself, "Can I really use it? Where will it go the minute I arrive home? Will it fit in?"

Know right away how much you are willing to pay for a particular item. Stick to your guns and do not pay more.

And for goodness sake, don't buy things just because they're cheap or a good deal. That money can be better spent going toward items that you truly do need.

Look for multi-family yard sales.

You will usually have better success at multi-family yard sales and those that are hosted by an organization (like a church, a neighborhood, or a charity) rather than at single-family garage sales.

Not only are there lots more items to choose from (which means you'll be more likely to find what you are looking for), but by attending fewer larger yard sales you'll be able to cut down on the number of sales you actually have to visit.

This is most helpful if you are strapped for time, cash, or gas.

If you're visiting a community garage sale where there are several vendors in one location, start at the farthest point from the entrance. Why? Because most people start at the front. So if you're not there early, most of the best sale deals will be picked over by the time you get there.

Get an early start.

That old saying about the early bird getting the worm is true, so arrive early if you want the best sale deals!

Don't wait until 11 a.m. to get out of the house and head to your first yard sale! While you might still find some good deals when getting a late start, you will definitely find more deals (and better deals) if you get an early start.

Every savvy yard sale shopper knows that the really good stuff can be gone within the first couple of hours. Since you won't be able to be at all of the yard sales on your route early, you should pick one or two that you think will have the most of what you're looking for and

start there first!

Of course, you won't be able to buy everything you see (and you might find the same item cheaper at another yard sale anyway), so take a picture of any items you spot early in the day that you might want to go back and revisit later. Keep a running list of yard sales that might be worth going back to later.

Don't be afraid to ask for a lower price (or haggle).

Never settle for the price that's marked on an item. Instead, offer a little lower than that first. Odds are, they'll come back with a price a little higher than your offer. If you want it, you should take it! It's amazing to me how some people are intimidated to ask the person running a yard sale to lower their price on something, or to haggle in order to get a price that is acceptable to both of you.

The worst thing that can happen is they say "No." And if they do, then you just move on to the next yard sale where you may find exactly the same thing (or something similar... or even better!) at the price you are willing to pay.

Oklee man turns himself in on Saturday after two day search

On Thursday, June 11th, a standoff between law enforcement and a rural Oklee man began. Sheriff's deputies were called to the farmstead about 15 miles southeast of Thief River Falls around 10:30 a.m. Thursday morning. The man had an altercation with his wife and a 911 call was made to the Pennington County Sheriff's Department. The man was later identified as Eric Reinbold.

A neighbor had witnessed a man ramming a car with a woman and two children inside and also called in the incident. The woman and children were located a short time later and were unharmed.

A deputy approached the farmstead and found the house empty. Reinbold called the Sheriff's office again saying he would meet the deputy at the house. The deputy returned and Reinbold hollered to him that he had a gun and was not coming out of the woods.

Authorities continued attempting to make contact Reinbold, but were unsure if Reinbold was still in the house, or somewhere among nearby

shelter belts.

Law enforcement officers from three counties along with the SWAT team from Grand Forks and a helicopter from the U.S. Border Patrol participated in a search until 11 p.m. that evening. Sheriff Kuznia's main concern was to make sure this ended peacefully and that no one gets hurt.

The search continued Friday morning after the 12 hour standoff on Thursday. Law enforcement officers, along with family and friends continued the search for Eric Reinbold around his farmstead. Tracks were followed cross country and Reinbold had crossed a river as he tried to allude law enforcement.

On Saturday morning at 9:00 a.m. Reinbold turned himself in and is facing three counts of second degree assault. Second degree assault faces a maximum sentence of 7 years and/or \$14,000 fine.



Likewise, since yard sale hosts may not have a lot of change on hand, it's best if you start with plenty of one dollar bills and quarters. This will also come in handy since many items are priced 25-cents and 50-cents apiece.

Leave your kids with a babysitter.

It's going to be much easier to shop if young children aren't by your side asking you to buy every toy and book they see.

Unless your kids are exceptionally good at looking and not touching, then it's best to leave them at home when you're yard sale shopping.

Wear comfortable shoes & clothing.

There's nothing worse than wearing a pair of shoes that pinch (or binding clothing when it's hot) when you're going from sale to sale.

Make plans to attend the first annual Winger Appreciation Day on Saturday, June 27, 2015.

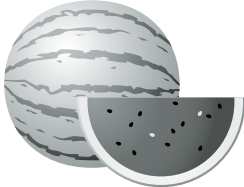
The festivities start at noon with an Antique Tractor Show, a Farmer's/Flea Market and a Craft Show.

You may be a robust male capable of chasing the boogeyman back under the bed with the ability to vanquish snakes and spiders from all corners of the house but you haven’t seen anything yet. Oh, you know about them. Everybody hears stories. In your youth you were known to actively seek them out—willingly even—but that thing? The thing—up ‘til now—that you thought only happened to someone else? It’s happening to you. Yep. YOU. It’s a teenage daughter.

Before you run for the garage or the hills—let me welcome you to the Daddy dance. You didn’t know it at the time but your RSVP was turned in about a dozen years ago. No one is going to show you the steps. You will dance whether you want to or not and the music will change. All. The. Time. You will need to be nimble on your feet and VERY careful about what you say out loud. You know it already, don’t you? You’ve already seen that cute darling who used to snuggle into your chest and make you feel like the best, biggest, strongest Daddy out there, stomp off to her room and shut you out. She thinks you can’t even figure out how to rub two sticks together to make a fire, okay yes, lighter fluid and a book of matches is a lot more fun but you get my point. You are no longer the champion, the defender, the man who can do anything in her life... or are you?

You see, Daddy, you have a once in a lifetime opportunity in front of you. Sure it may be colored with dark looks, rolling eyes and crossed arms at times. 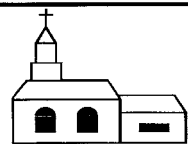

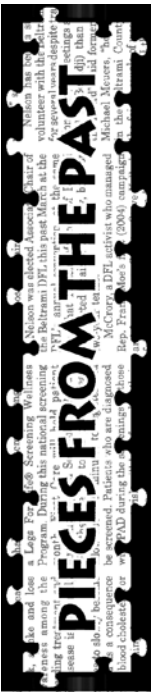
Annie Vesledahl and Terri Kaupang put on a delicious lunch for the crowd.

Farm Service Agency
Committee Nomination
Period Begins

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced that the nomination period for local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees begins on Monday, June 15, 2015.

"Through the county committees, farmers and ranchers have a voice. Their opinions and ideas get to be heard on federal farm programs," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "It is important for county committees to reflect America's diversity, so I encourage all eligible farmers and ranchers, including beginning farmers, to get involved in this year's elections. We've seen an increase in the number of nominations for qualified candidates, especially among women and minorities, and I hope that trend continues."

To be eligible to serve on a FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an agency administered program, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area where they are nominated.

Farmers and ranchers may nominate themselves or others. Organizations representing minorities and women also may nominate candidates. To

become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections. Nomination forms for the 2015 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 3, 2015.

FSA will mail election ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 9, 2015. Ballots will be due back to the local county office either via mail or in person by Dec. 7, 2015. Newly elected committee members and alternates will take office on Jan. 1, 2016.

While FSA county committees do not approve or deny farm ownership or operating loans, they make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs and other agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide, there are about 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. Committees consist of three to 11 members that are elected by eligible producers.

You can serve either of these a little warm with whipped cream or ice cream on top.

Rhubarb Dream Bars

2 cups all-purpose flour
3/4 cup powdered sugar
1 cup butter
4 eggs
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup flour
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
4 cups rhubarb, finely chopped

Combine 2 cups flour, powdered sugar and butter. Mix well and press into a greased 9" x 13" pan. Bake at 350 degrees until golden brown, 10 to 15 minutes.

Beat eggs, sugar, 1/2 cup flour and salt until well blended. Add rhubarb; mix. Spoon mixture onto baked crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes more. Cool and cut into bars

Rhubarb Crunch

4 cups rhubarb (chopped)
1 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
1 cup oats
1 1/4 cup light brown sugar (packed)
1/2 cup melted butter
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
Chop rhubarb and set

aside. Mix together the flour, oats, cinnamon, brown sugar and melted butter.

Press one-half of crumb mixture into a buttered 7"x11" or 8.5"x11" baking dish.

Sugar Sauce:

1 cup granulated sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1 cup cold water
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Whisk sugar, cornstarch and water together in a glass bowl.

Microwave until thick, clear, and bubbly, approximately 3-5 minutes. Remove from microwave and whisk in vanilla. Add chopped rhubarb atop pressed-in crumb mixture in the baking dish. Pour sugar sauce evenly over rhubarb.

Top with remaining crumb mixture.

Bake at 350 degrees until edges are bubbling and crumb topping is browned, about 30-40 minutes.

Note

If you're a little short on rhubarb, feel free to add in chopped apples or strawberries to get to 4 cups. However, you wouldn't want to completely replace the rhubarb, as it is a nice contrast to the sweetness of the crust and sugar sauce.

Fine Tuning Forage
Quality

Many factors affect forage quality. Forage maturity and harvest weather are the most obvious and have the greatest overall effect on the feeding value of forages. Another tool to fine tune the potential forage quality is selecting the time of day in which the forage is cut. Bear in mind, however, that maturity and weather are the sledge hammer adjustment, while time of day is the jewelers hammer.

Forage carbohydrates and sugars, collectively known as total nonstructural carbohydrates (TNC) are very important in ruminant diets. Increased TNC provide greater energy and digestibility improving animal performance. Previous research has shown that TNC levels fluctuate throughout the day and forage quality can be improved simply by cutting the forage during the morning or afternoon. However, there has been conflicting opinions as to which is better.

Much of this previous research was conducted in the mid and southern states suggesting that day length or other factors may be at play. Now a Canadian team of scientists recently published their findings on this issue.

Before going any further, it is important to understand that the research was conducted at Normandin, Quebec, in eastern Canada; far away from our hay fields – but in an area with similar day length. Thus, the results provide intriguing ideas and clues for experimentation and implementation, but shouldn't be viewed as conclusive for our environment.

These Quebec scientists compared total nonstructural carbohydrate (TNC) concentra-

tion in grass and legume forages, and how species TNC differences may relate to season, time of day, and other forage nutritive value parameters. Six grass and two legume species were cut at 9:00 AM and 2:30 PM in the spring growth and summer re-growth for 2 years.

Spring cuttings were taken when species were in early reproductive stages (e.g., early to mid heading/flowering). Summer cuttings were generally less mature. The TNC concentration was calculated as the sum of sucrose, glucose, fructose, pinitol, fructans, and starch.

Forage TNCs provide readily fermentable energy to rumen microbes, and their increased concentration in forages improves N-use efficiency in dairy cows. Forage TNC concentration has also been related to preference and performance in ruminant animals. Forage TNC is also the main source of fermentable substances during

ensiling.

Red clover and tall fescue forage had the greatest TNC concentration, averaging 9.4 %DM. Timothy, meadow brome grass, Kentucky bluegrass, alfalfa, and smooth brome grass forage had intermediate TNC concentrations, averaging 7.5 %DM. Reed canarygrass had the lowest TNC concentration, averaging 6.5 %DM.

Afternoon-cutting increased TNC concentration of all species, but the extent of the increase varied among species. Averaged over spring and summer, this increase ranged from 13% in smooth brome grass to 68% in reed canarygrass. More specifically, the increase associated with afternoon vs. morning cutting ranged from 8% in spring growth of alfalfa and tall fescue, to 87% in summer regrowth of tall fescue, to 98% in spring growth of reed canarygrass.

Increased TNC concentration with delayed cutting

during the day was due to a) increases in starch, sucrose, glucose, and fructose in grasses; and b) a large increase in starch in legumes. Afternoon cutting resulted in small decreases in crude protein, ADF, and NDF concentrations; and a small increase in digestibility.

The Quebec scientists concluded that forage TNC concentrations can be increased by cutting in the afternoon and by species selection.

Although this work suggests cutting time can affect forage quality, that impending rain cloud is often the overriding factor when hay gets cut. That said, this research does provide important insights into the differences between species which may be a far more practical and effective way to fine tune your forage quality.

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MN turtles now crossing roads to find a place to nest

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is reminding people that turtles crossing roads now are often moving to familiar nesting locations. Allowing turtles to cross the roads is vital to the preservation of regional populations.

"Many turtles and other

species are killed on Minnesota roads each year, especially during the nesting season," said Carol Hall, DNR herpetologist. "In fact, roadway mortality is believed to be a major factor in turtle population declines throughout the United States."

In Minnesota, where all turtles are mainly aquatic, overland journeys usually occur: in connection with seasonal movements between different wetland habitats; during the annual early summer nesting migration of egg laden females; or when newly hatched youngsters seek out the backwaters and ponds for their permanent home. Turtles can travel many miles during a single year, and may even be found far from water.

Giving turtles a hand

The following points should be remembered:

- Think safety. Simply pulling off the road and turning on hazard lights may alert other drivers to slow down. Be aware of surroundings and traffic.
- Avoid excessive handling.

While wanting to inspect turtles closely is understandable, excessive handling can disrupt normal behavior.

•Allow unassisted road crossings. When turtles can safely cross roads unaided due to a lack of oncoming traffic, allow them to do so.

•Handle turtles gently. If necessary to pick them up, all turtles except Snappers and Softshells should be grasped gently along the shell edge near the mid-point of the body. Many turtles empty their bladder when lifted off the ground, so be careful not to drop them if they should suddenly expel water.

•Maintain direction of travel. Always move turtles in the same direction they were traveling in when encountered. Turtles should always be moved across roadways in as direct a line as possible. It may seem helpful to "assist" the turtle in its journey by moving them to a nearby waterbody, but, "If you care, leave it there."

Catching fireflies

Many people have fond childhood memories of running through their yards catching fireflies. Many people kept them in jars—sometimes a jar full of fireflies can produce enough light to read by. If you want to catch fireflies, here are a few tips that will help you along.

Fireflies are present on every continent except Antarctica, so there is a good chance you can find fireflies in your own yard, though they tend to congregate in long grasses and marshy areas around ponds, lakes and streams and, as a result, may be more populous in these areas.

In order to catch fireflies successfully, turn off the exterior lights of your home and have a container ready.

If you are having trouble getting near the fireflies in your yard, imitate one of them by shining your flashlight directly up and down, or by repeating the light patterns you

see fireflies emitting. Many scientists who study fireflies have better luck with LED lights than with battery-powered flashlights. Never shine a light directly at a firefly; it's likely to scare them away rather than attracting them.

Punch holes in the lid of a jar to allow air to penetrate and put in a damp piece of paper towel to make sure the fireflies will not dry out.

Use care when catching the fireflies, which are fragile. Working with a net is often better than bare hands, particularly for children who may not be so gentle.

Only keep the fireflies for a day or two before letting them go. Otherwise you're bound to find a jar of deceased fireflies. According to the Firefly Organization, firefly numbers are dwindling, largely due to light pollution and overdevelopment. Therefore, any fireflies that are captured should be promptly returned to the wild.

KID-APPROVED SUMMER FUN

Beginner Tricks (string should be double looped on Manta Ray)

Throwdown Throw your yo-yo in the direction the back of your hand is facing. Curl up your arm like you are making a muscle. Bring your elbow down with a snap



and release the yo-yo so it goes over the ends of your fingers. Then turn your hand over to catch the yo-yo when it returns.



Forward Pass Start with your arm straight, pointed slightly behind you, about waist high. With the back of your hand facing forward, let go of the yo-yo and



swing your arm forward. The yo-yo should go down and out. Turn your hand over, palm up, to catch the yo-yo when it returns.



Inside Loops Start as you would with a FORWARD PASS. When the yo-yo comes back to you, instead of catching it, let it pass by on the inside of



your arm and push it back out. The yo-yo will go out into another Forward Pass. Keep going, and see how many loops you can do.

Thumb Wind Many people want to learn how to wrap up the yo-yo quickly. Besides the traditional "pencil sharpener" winding method, you can do the THUMBWIND. When the yo-yo is at the bottom of the



string, grab it like the picture shows, and spin it. As you spin it, at the exact same time give it a tug up to your hand. This is a tough one, but well worth the hours of practice once you master it.

Twice during the year there were challenges between the Elementary Grades to see which class could bring in the most box tops/labels.

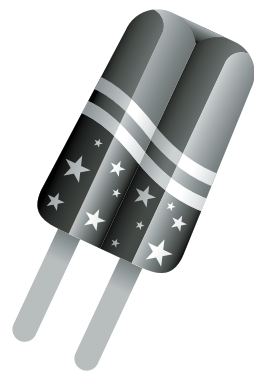

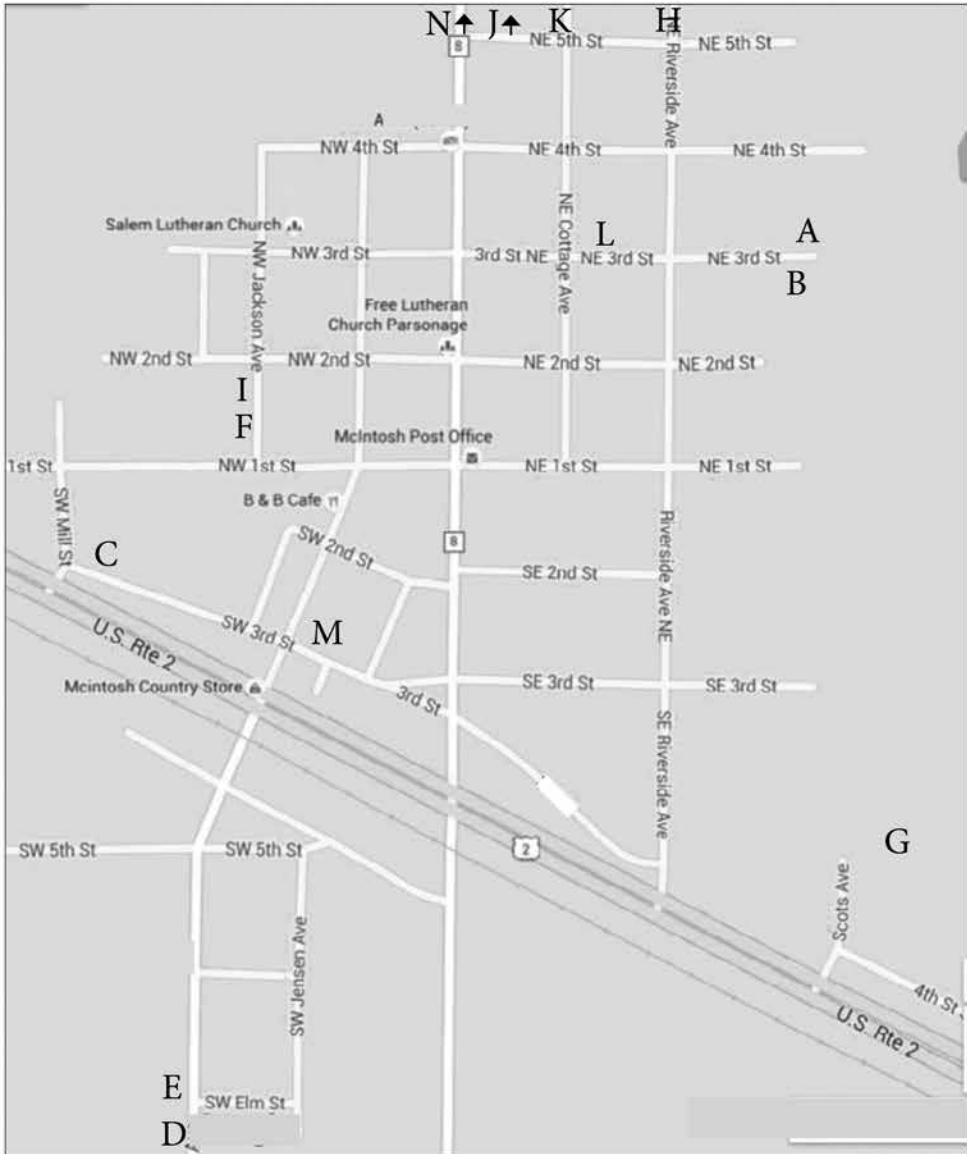
