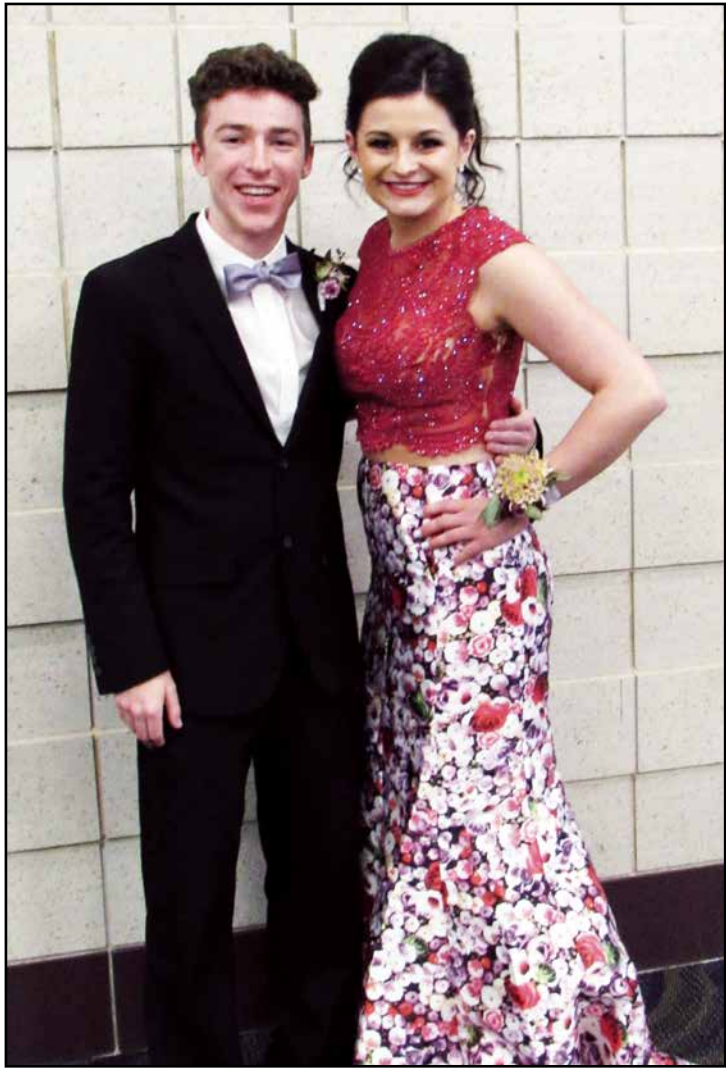

McIntosh Friends of Veterans meeting

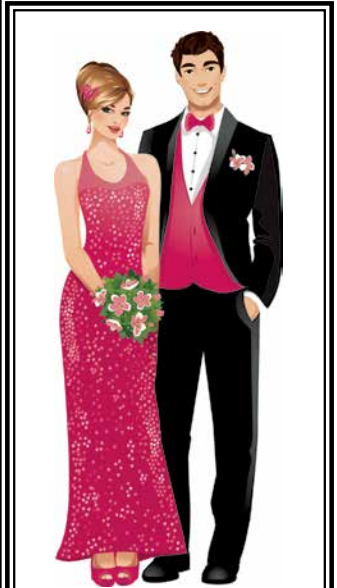

Compassion, Part 2

So how is the reflection on COMPASSION going? I've been very aware of this word and its application in the past few days. I think somehow I believed if I "measured" my compassion I was being ungodly but now I realize that godly compassion is measured. It's measured against my motivation. It's measured against what I want to provide and what the recipient really needs. It's measured against expectations and oh, here's the hard one. It's measured against HUMILITY. Yep. That was a fun realization.

True compassion is an attitude I need to exercise toward myself and for the benefit of others. It means knowing what I have the capability to provide and respect their unique situations. Rescuing people is God's job. Serving people is mine. It's focusing my compassion via the gifts He's given me. I'm a Bodyworker not a construction worker. Because He has called me to follow my hands to stress and injury, as they find His work, what I do is exactly what rejuvenates me. When I rely on Him, the oil in my jar does not diminish. It's continu-

ally available to be poured out. YAH is teaching me about the "passion" in my compassion; fervor to honor my making. How blessed am I, that my passion is both my earthly job and my spiritual calling? How many people have the opportunity to do what they love while earning their living? And as I step into His agenda He's teaching me marvelous truths about what relationship with Him can be.

Recently, I've been practicing being SILENT... for those of you that know me—take a moment to let that sink in. I've been choosing to LISTEN instead of speak. Good night! Not. Easy. But this has shown me the power of God. It's enabled me to rest in His provision. It's taken away the pressure to fix "it." It's given compassion the opportunity to genuinely grow in my spirit because I have not been impulsive or careless with it. I've been listening to the Ruach (Holy Spirit) saying "Trust me." Because you see, there is divine strategy in play. I'm only a small part. As I stay silent and tune into the rhythm of the Father's heart I experience peace, even in the midst of chaos. His strategy

becomes my agenda as I agree with His omniscience.

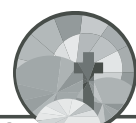
And then there is a fine line here that many never consider. Compassion has the ability to injure or cause harm. If the measure of my compassion overwhelms my recipient—I risk being disrespectful. If my compassion results from guilt—it's not a response it's a reaction. If I seek to shore up my identity with the act of my compassion—it's self-serving. My attitude of compassion needs to be purified, because if it's not then it has other names like: co-dependent, manipulative or passive-aggressive behavior.

My compassion needs to be a FOCUSED response. I need to clearly operate my compassion understanding it's not an expression of my needs but a response to the needs of the recipient. I must REGULATE my compassion with humility; testing myself. Ensuring I'm not seeking to draw attention to myself or polish the veneer of what I want people to believe about me. Easy-peasy, right? Sigh.

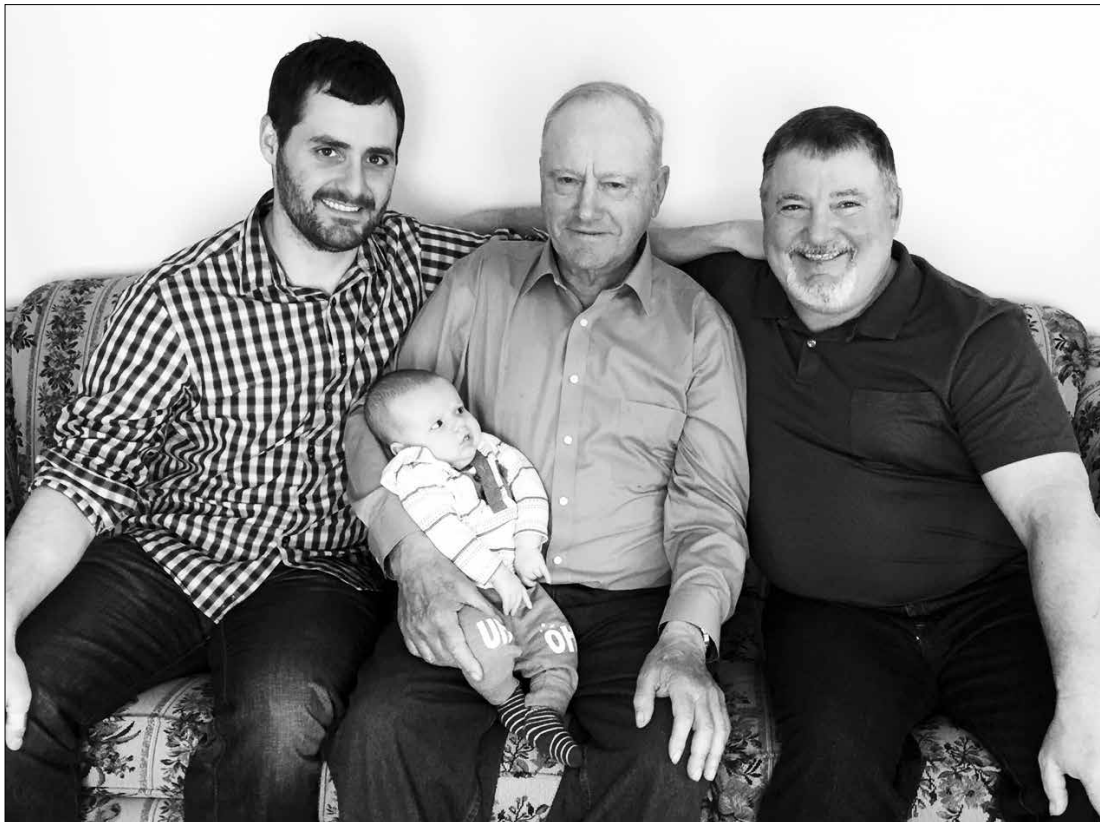

Productive ways to spend the summer after graduation

Graduation is a momentous day in the lives of college students. After years of schooling that dates all the way back to preschool or kindergarten, newly minted college graduates are finally ready to begin their professional lives.

That can be a scary prospect for some students, especially those who graduate without jobs lined up. Attend job fairs. While other graduates may be taking the summer off, enterprising grads looking for work should attend as many job fairs as possible. Graduates likely won't leave job fairs with employment offers in hand, but job fairs are a great way for grads to meet hiring managers and submit their résumés to potential employers.

Customize a résumé for every job. Be sure the curriculum vitae is not static. Write and refine résumés for each job you apply for, mildly tweak-

ing the wording or accomplishments to address the key phrases used in the job listing.

It can be tempting for recent college grads to spend the summers after graduation relaxing, but those who spend that time productively may lands jobs more quickly than those who do not.

Did you know?

According to an Experian College Graduate Survey conducted in 2016, 58 percent of soon-to-be graduates acknowledged they had a credit card, and 30 percent admitted they had credit card debt.

The average debt of the respondents was more than \$2,500, a substantial sum considering that much of it is likely consumer debt, and not the so-called "good debt" like car loans or mortgage payments that can help young people establish their credit histories.

A report from the Institute of College Access and Success indicated that the average member of the college class of 2015 graduated with \$30,100 in student loan debt. Student loans are often repaid over many years, with some repayment schedules extending more than a decade.

In addition, as long as students make their payments on time and in full, the amount of interest they will pay if their loans come with fixed rates will remain the same. Students' credit card debt is not the same, and students who can only afford to pay the minimum payments each month will see the amount of interest they're paying grow considerably until the balance is completely paid off.

That's one reason why students must learn the difference between consumer debt and student loan debt and how accumulating the former is far more detrimental to students' financial futures than accruing the latter.
