Mac & Winger residents deadline to register is Sept. 21st

Residents of the City of McIntosh and the City of Winger will need to register to vote via email or by visiting their City Clerks office or the Polk County Auditor's office in Crookston.

The deadline to register is Friday, September 21, 2018 for the 2018 General Election.

If you fail to register before this date, the only way City residents will be able to vote is by visiting the Polk County Auditor's Office in Crookston to vote in person.

Your ballot will not count if it is received after Election Day. Return your ballot by mail or package delivery service.

You can also return your ballot in person, no later than 3:00 pm on Election Day to the election office that sent your ballot. You can drop off ballots for up to three other voters.

You can apply for a ballot any time during the year, except the day of the election. Leave time for election officials to mail your ballot and for you to return it on or before Election Day.

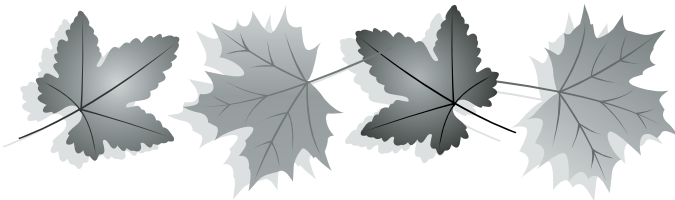

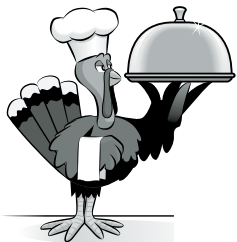
Books are \$2 per bag.

The First Pioneer Pastor of the Thirteen Towns

Reverend Nicolai Heierman from Blair, Wisconsin was the first pioneer pastor of the Thirteen Towns area. He was a Norwegian Lutheran minister associated with the general church body called "Konferensen". He was born in Trondhjem, Norway in 1850 and studied for the ministry at Augsburg Seminary in Minneapolis. When he first came to this area, he was classified as a missionary, with a very small salary. He home-

steaded on land in the southern end of Knute Township, later giving part of his property for a church yard and cemetery. Rev. Heierman is credited with being the first pastor of nine different congregations in this part of Minnesota.

The work of this pastor could fill many volumes. In the large territory he served, there were few roads; as a result he waded through snow and mud to serve his many congregations. The hardships he endured no doubt shortened his life for he died at the early age of 46. Rev. Heierman, his wife Ingeborg, and sister, Mrs. Anna Jonson, are buried in the Gosen Cemetery.

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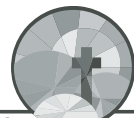

Relationships are always a challenge. They would be as easy as falling off a log if not for the "human" component. Dinah has been asking many questions now that we're home-schooling. One morning, as I was buckling her in the car she asked me why God made us. I said the first thing that came to mind: "He wanted to have relationship with us." You know how it goes by now, right? As I went about my week the Ruach Ha-Kodesh (Holy Spirit) kept me digging down on that reply.

There's a lot to be said about relationships by all kinds of people who hand out opinions and advice. Yet none of it can get to the heart of the matter if we don't have an understanding of our roles. Our key role is the one given to us by our Creator. Whether we are man or woman, we are the CREATED. Discovering our identity sets us apart from each other; providing framework for our lesser roles with other people.

How many times have we asked ourselves what the difference is between role and identity? The way most of us function; we lean heavily on "identity" and tend to ignore the importance of "role." We can define ourselves by what we do instead of "being" who we could be. I'm a mother and a bodywork therapist. In both instances I'm a caregiver. I can get swallowed by doing it instead of being it. Being a caregiver comes naturally to me. Why? Because a woman's DNA is uniquely combined to fulfill the ability to have a child. Whether or not we have children does not change the fact that every cell is imprinted with the potential. The role of woman from inception is as nourisher or nurturer. The choices we make shape our identity; whether we become wife, mother, care-giver, teacher, etc. Now this is where it gets tricky for me. If I'm the nourisher, where do I get something to nourish?

Well, I have to look at the Creation account. Elohim—the

Creator—made man from adamah (ah-dam-a), Hebrew for earth. Adam (ah-dam) was created with the breath of Elohim and dust. After man, Elohim used a rib from an already living, breathing being and made woman. So the very act of her creation informs us about the roles for man and woman. From Adam something was invested. With the breath of Elohim, what was invested was added to and crafted to become significantly more: woman. From the moment of her creation, nourishing was imprinted in woman's DNA. And the source of that DNA was man. YHWH does nothing without purpose.

So why is there so much confusion in our relationships? I believe I have work to do understanding my role. As I ask hard questions and find challenging answers, the next step is changing my behavior. Many of my relationships have soured or become black holes because I have striven to be both investor and nourisher. I imagine a few of you know what I mean, even if you haven't thought about it this way before. You can think of a relationship that drains you simply because it exists, right? What if correctly understanding our roles would allow us to experience the freedom to simply be?

I will avoid sharing my opinion or advice and simply exhort that seeking the Ruach Ha-Kodesh in prayer and through the Word of God is the best way to begin the journey of discovering our roles. For each it will be different, yet the core truth will remain the same. We are the CREATED. We are image-bearers of the God Most High, El Elyon.

How to Support the Troops without getting duped

Minnesota is home to more than 330,000 veterans and, according to a recent study, the third most generous state in the country for charitable donations. This is something to be proud of, but it also makes Minnesotans a target for sham veterans charities trying to raise a quick buck by exploiting people's goodwill. A few simple guidelines can help donors ensure that their gifts of money actually benefit our brave men and women in uniform and their families.

Programs of Little Value

Some bogus charities claim to provide things like medical services or shelter to needy veterans, when they may only give coupons for visits to chiropractors or hotels on the other side of the country. If a charity makes vague claims that it helps veterans, ask for specifics about how. Request examples of past assistance it provided to veterans, and ask how much of a donation will be used for charity versus overhead and fundraising expenses. Legitimate charities can and will answer these questions.

If you receive a call out of the blue from a supposed veterans charity, ask the caller whether they are employed by the charity or a fundraising company. Many questionable charities use fundraising companies that get paid 80 or even 90 percent or more of the donation that you make. Under Minnesota law, a fundraising company must identify itself as being a fundraising company, not a charity.

Phony Use of Military Insignias

Some phony veterans charities associate themselves with the military or veterans through the use of official military seals, emblems, logos, and other insignia. Military insignia are protected by law from unauthorized use, and are rarely licensed for use, even to charities. Their use by an unfamiliar charity can be a red flag to donors, as can use of emblems designed to "dress up" the charity to look more legitimate.

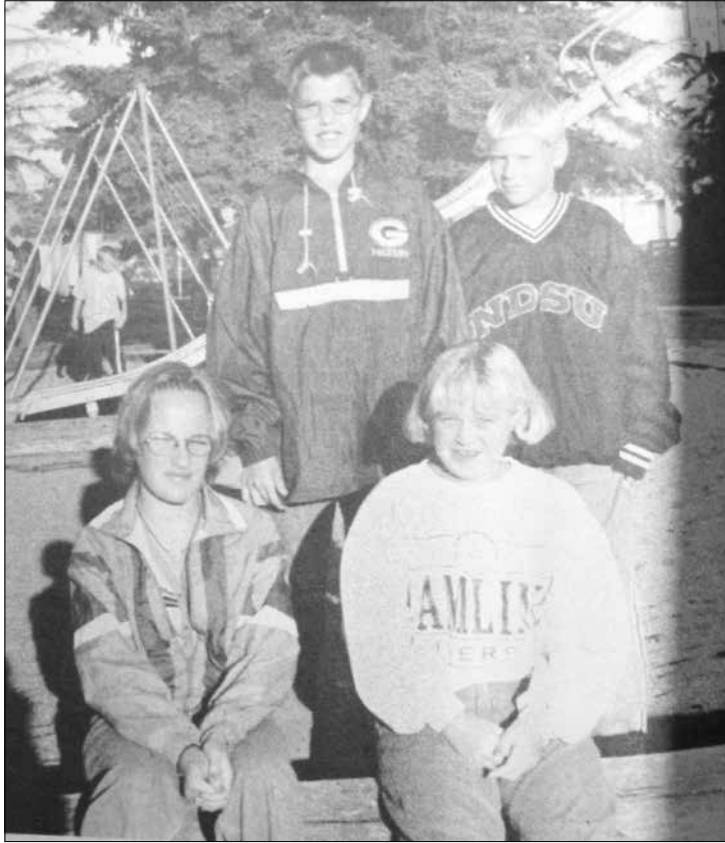
Copycat Veterans Charities

Questionable veterans charities sometimes use names and logos that are similar to those of legitimate organizations that you might have heard of or donated to in the past. Solicitors for these charities may even impersonate veterans to gain donors' trust. If something about the organization doesn't feel right to you, trust your gut. You can always call the charity to which you want to donate to find out if the solicitation was actually from that charity.

Donate Wisely

If you want to ensure your donation goes to a legitimate veterans charity, do some research beforehand. The Attorney General's website, www.ag.state.mn.us, allows you to research veterans charities by name, and provides basic financial information about such charities' activities, including what portion of your donation is actually spent on helping veterans.

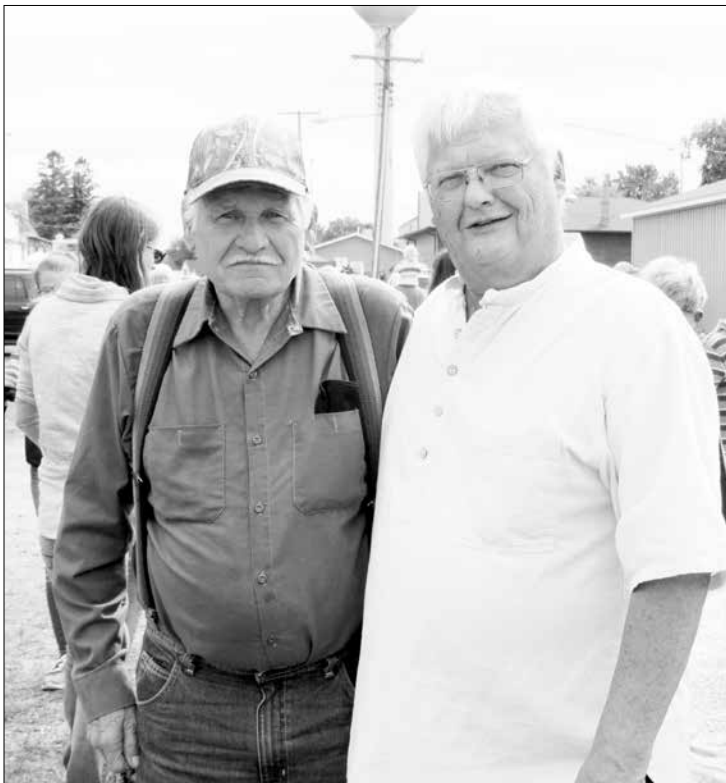
