Polk County Sheriff and 4th District Commissioner candidates answer the question: Why do you want the job?

On Wednesday, October 4th, the McIntosh Times hosted a candidate forum with the Polk County Sheriff candidates, Jim Tadman and Randy Sondrol, along with the 4th District Commissioner candidates from Polk County, Joan Lee and Dennis Boucher. The following quotes below are the responses given for the question of why each candidate is seeking their respective position.

Why do you want to be Sheriff?
Jim Tadman: "During my 30 years with the Sheriff's department, I have worked hard at making the Sheriff's Department the best that it can be. Through my years of training, working with patrol, investigations, as a supervisor and now as Chief Deputy, I strive to make Polk County a safe place to live and raise a family. In the last 5 years as Chief Deputy, appointed by Sheriff Erdman, I gained the knowledge and experience to continue to build our sheriff's office and with Sheriff Erdman retiring, I want to lead our office and continue to work hard for the Polk County residents."

Randy Sondrol: "In the last 28 years of my career, I have always strove for this position ultimately. Polk County, in the last 24 years, had given me a lot of opportunity, personally and professionally and throughout that time I have gained a lot of knowledge and skills from my law enforcement career, but I have also been a Badger Township Supervisor for the last 13 years and that has also given me a lot of experience and a lot of responsibility, administration wise, and along

with volunteering in the communities, through the Lion's Clubs and the Rydell Refuge, I want to take all that knowledge I have gained through the Township, the law enforcement and the volunteering in the community and basically giving it back to the communities the best way I know how, and that would be by being your Sheriff."

Why do you want to be a County Commissioner?
Joan Lee: "The reason that I would like to continue to be County Commissioner is that through these four years, I have really enjoyed being able to work for all the residents of Polk County. I have learned a lot and there are a lot of things I still want to learn. There are things that I have been working on, that I would like to continue to work on that are changes coming up in the County, and like I said, I just really enjoy doing this job and I enjoy having conversations with people and being able to help people when they have a question with some type a service from the County or a question, they are able to reach out to me and I can hopefully answer their question."

Dennis Boucher: "The reason I would like to be a County Commissioner is that I see a lot of work out there that needs to be done and we are kind of falling behind on it and we have to keep up with the infrastructure or we are going to be in trouble."

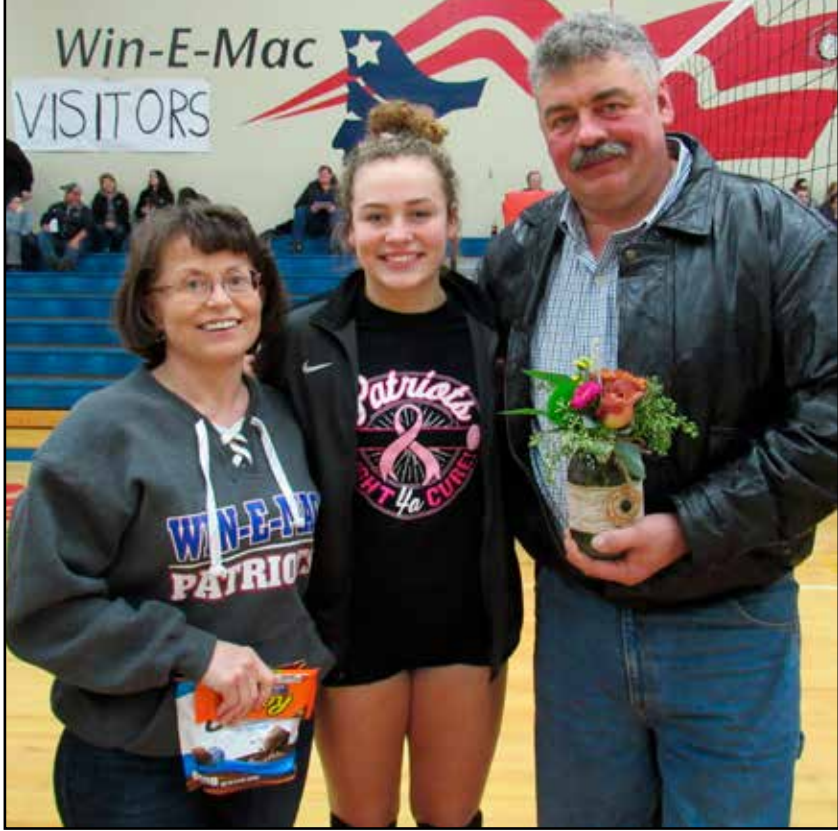

Perseverance

The apostle Paul was known for being a long-winded speaker and perhaps a little boring. In fact, some point to the fact that while he was teaching, a young man fell asleep in the window and tumbled out as an example. I had an instructor in Bible School who was a lot like Paul in this way. But you only have to do a little reading of Paul's letters to realize he was an expert on the human condition.

"For I do not understand what I am doing—for what I do not want, this I practice; but what I hate, this I do. But if I do what I do not want to do, then I agree with the Torah (the Law)—that it is good. So now it is no longer I doing it, but sin dwelling in me. For I know that nothing good dwells in me—that is, in my flesh. For to will is present in me, but to do the good is not. For the good that I want, I do not do; but the evil that I do not want, this I practice. But if I do what I do not want, it is not longer I doing it, but sin that dwells in me. with respect to the inner man, but I see a different law in my body parts, battling against the law of my mind and bringing me into bondage under the law of sin which is in my body parts. Miserable man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? Thanks be to God—it is through Messiah Yeshua (Jesus, salvation) our Lord! So then, with my mind I myself serve the Torah of God; but with my flesh, I serve the law of sin." Romans 7:15-25 TLV

A sweet and savory Halloween treat

Save the tricks for another time; this Halloween is all about the treats. Halloween parties are par for the course, and spooktacular hosts and hostesses want to serve their guests something special. Enter a dessert hybrid that layers various flavors to create a masterpiece that simply works.

This recipe for "Grilled Chocolate Chip Cookie Bacon S'mores," courtesy of the National Pork Board and Tiffany Edwards of Le Crème de la Crumb, is the Frankenstein's monster of the dessert world. You'd be hard-pressed to find a person who can pass up the salty swagger of smoked bacon paired with the creamy richness of chocolate and the crunch and sweetness of a chocolate chip cookie. Top it with marshmallow and this Halloween treat is alive with flavor!

Grilled Chocolate Chip Cookie Bacon S'mores
Yields 12
12 thick-cut slices bacon



(hickory smoked, Applewood smoked or maple)

12 large marshmallows
12 2-inch squares chocolate good quality
12 skewers
12 tablespoons butter, softened
3/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla
1 egg plus 1 egg yolk
2 cups flour
1 3.4-ounce box instant French vanilla pudding mix, dry, not prepared
1 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips

Make the cookies: In a bowl, cream together butter, sugar and brown sugar for 1 to 2 minutes until light and very fluffy. Add vanilla, egg and egg yolk, and mix well. In a separate bowl, whisk together flour, pudding mix, baking soda, and salt.

Add dry ingredients to wet ingredients and mix until incorporated and dough comes together. Stir in chocolate chips. Cover very tightly and chill for at least 1 hour.

Preheat oven to 350 F. Roll dough into balls (about 1 1/2 inch) and space 2 to 3 inches apart on a baking sheet. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes, until lightly browned on top. Allow to cool 5 to 10 minutes on baking sheet before transferring to a cooling rack to cool completely.

To grill the bacon: Heat a grill to medium-high heat. Thread bacon onto skewers in

Assemble s'mores: Flip one cookie over so it's upside down. Place a square of chocolate on top of the upside-down cookie, then top with grilled marshmallow, bacon and a right side-up second cookie. Serve immediately.

Your Legal Rights: Computer scams

Over \$21 million dollars. That is the amount of money consumers reported as lost to tech-support scams in the first nine months of 2017. In one variation of this scam, computer users receive a pop-up message on their screens telling them their computer has been hacked or infected with a virus and directing them to call a toll-free number for assistance.

In another variation, people receive phone calls from scammers who say that their computer has a serious problem and offer to help them fix it.

Either way, your computer is not really at risk, and the person on the other end is a scammer waiting to trick you into paying for computer support services you don't need, empty your bank account, or even steal your identity.

How the scheme works

Scammers make unsolicited phone calls or place misleading pop-up Internet advertisements to try to convince unsuspecting computer users that something is seriously wrong with their computers that must be fixed immediately. Scammers often pose as representatives of reputable, well-known computer or software companies.

Once a scammer has a person on the phone, the scammer often asks to remotely access the person's computer. Once inside, the scammer can download malware, steal passwords, or try to sell unnecessary services or products—including products that are available elsewhere for free—for non-existent problems.

Scammers often try to trick people into paying for services they don't need by opening a program on their computer that logs various activities, like error and warning messages. The scammers use these messages, which are usually harmless notations that occur when a computer is functioning normally, to convince people that something is seriously wrong

with their computer.

Tips to avoid computer scams

- If someone calls you offering technical computer support or claiming your computer has been infected with a virus or hacked, hang up.

- If you receive a pop-up message directing you to call a telephone number for assistance with your computer, take a picture of your entire screen, including, if possible, the universal resource locator (URL) of the web page, and include it in any reports you make to the Minnesota Attorney General's Office or other law enforcement agencies. Then press the "control" and "F4" keys to get rid of the pop-up. Do not click on the "x" in the upper right-hand corner of the window. If the pop-up remains after doing this, restart your computer.

- Be wary if a person asks for payment in an unusual form, such as through gift cards, wire transfers, or a check to be picked up by a courier.

- If your device has been infected by a computer virus or does not work, take it to a reputable local company to fix it.

- Make sure your computer has up-to-date antivirus, anti-malware, and anti-spyware software.

What to do if you've been scammed

- If an unknown person remotely accessed your computer, disconnect your computer from the Internet immediately, turn it off, and take it to a reputable computer technician for inspection.

- If you provided a credit card or bank account information to the scammer, contact your financial institution right away to notify it of the incident and dispute any inappropriate charges.

- If your personal information was compromised, consider taking steps to protect yourself from identity theft—such as placing a fraud alert on your credit report, freezing your credit report, and monitoring your credit report and financial accounts for unauthorized

activity.

One of those soldiers was Harold Shadduck, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Shadduck of McIntosh.

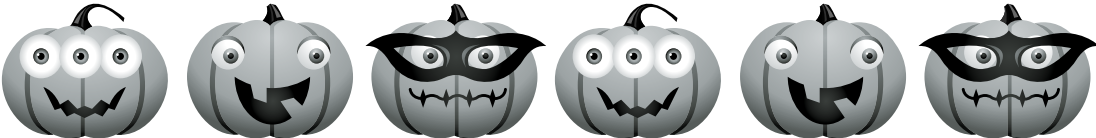
Harold was a 1914 graduate of McIntosh High School. He was homesteading in Montana when he entered the service. Corp. Shadduck was wounded October 3, 1918 in the Battle of Argonne Forest. He died October 13, 1918 - his 23rd birthday.

His commanding officer wrote, "I cannot say too much of the spirit of cheerful, intelligent readiness for his service which characterized Corp. Shadduck at all times. I knew him throughout his career in the army... I heard one of the shells burst in his direction. I went over and found that it had exploded in the shell



hole in which the Corporal and two of his men had taken over. Pvt. Thompson was already breathing his last, and Shadduck was doing what he could for him and looking very pale. He was wounded in the navel, but he wanted to keep on with his men, but was taken back to the hospital, where he died. Our whole company mourned him. To the men he had always been faithful, and a cheerful comrade! To the officers he was every loyal and an able assistant. His example was an inspiration to the rest of us. It always will be."

Corporal Harold Shadduck is buried in Arlington Cemetary.



Learn how to carve a better pumpkin

Toothy grins and a mesmerizing orange glow make jack-o'-lanterns captivating sights come Halloween. Pumpkin carving is an autumn tradition and runs the gamut of simple designs to more intricate artwork worthy of any medium. Although anyone can grab a pumpkin and get started, when done correctly, jack-o'-lantern designs can last for

several days.

- Start with a fresh pumpkin. Look for pumpkins that have a thick, green stem. These usually are fresh and haven't been handled much. A thick stem also may indicate fleshier pumpkin walls that can be carved more easily. Avoid pumpkins that are soft or full of blemishes, or those that have dried, shriveled

stems.

- Cut a hole in the back. Rather than impeding the structural integrity of the pumpkin by cutting off the top and the stem for interior access, cut a hole in the back of the pumpkin. This will still make it easy to reach inside and clean out the pumpkin.

- Scoop out the pulp and seeds. Be sure to thoroughly clean the inside of the pumpkin. Leaving the pulpy, stringy matter and seeds inside can cause the pumpkin to rot that much faster and produce a foul odor. Scoopers, spoons and even hand shovels can help.

- Keep it cool. Heat can adversely affect carved pumpkins, so work in a cool area and store the pumpkin in a cold garage or refrigerator if you need a few extra days before displaying it. Also, carving experts suggest using an electric light inside rather than a candle; by using a candle, you're essentially cooking the pumpkin from the inside.

- Work in your lap. When carving faces or intricate designs, looking down onto the pumpkin provides more control.

- Don't cut all the way through. Many pumpkin designers end up shaving or scraping off the outer rind of the pumpkin, but leave a delicate orange film underneath. Light can still shine through, but the design will not collapse on itself as easily if you were to cut straight through the pumpkin wall. Experiment with different tools to achieve the desired look.

- Maintain the freshness. Rubbing exposed areas of the pumpkin flesh with petroleum jelly may help keep the pumpkin moist. Some designs will last for a few days. However, since pumpkins are highly perishable, it's wise to wait to carve until a day or two before putting a pumpkin on display.

Avoid Areas with High Leaching Potential and Apply When Soil is Cooler Than 50 Degrees F.

The southern areas of the state are still a bit warmer and delaying fall application is advised.

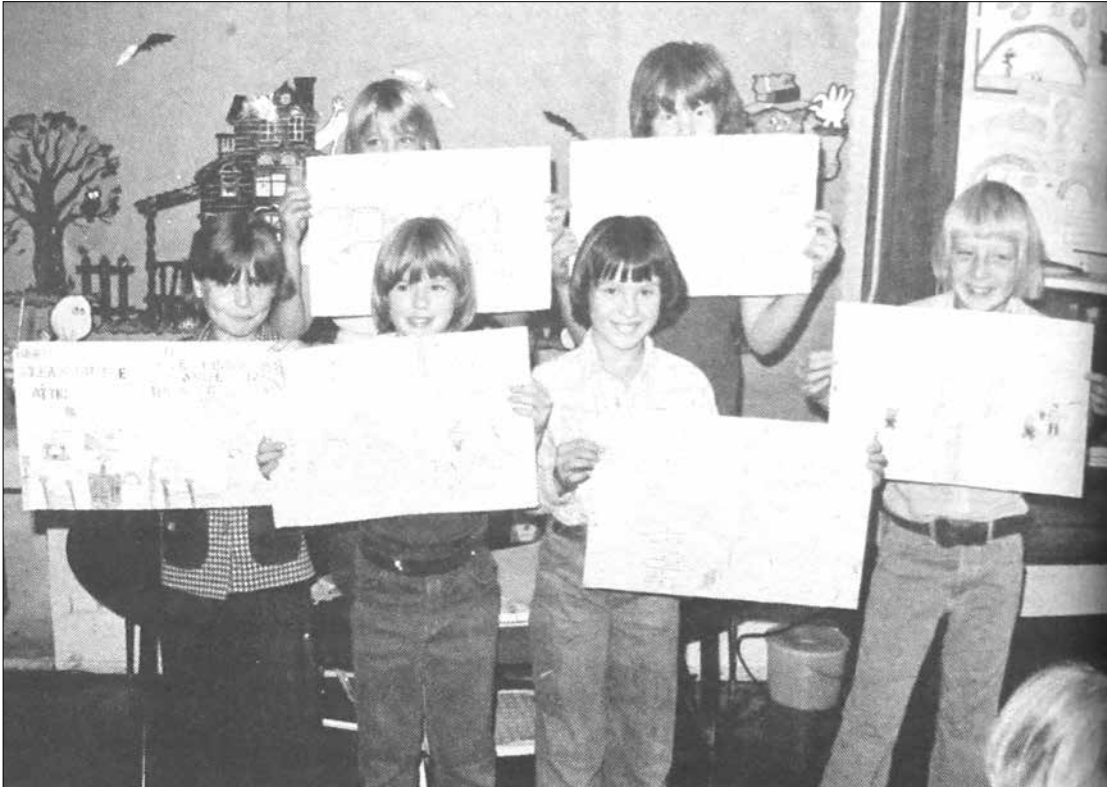

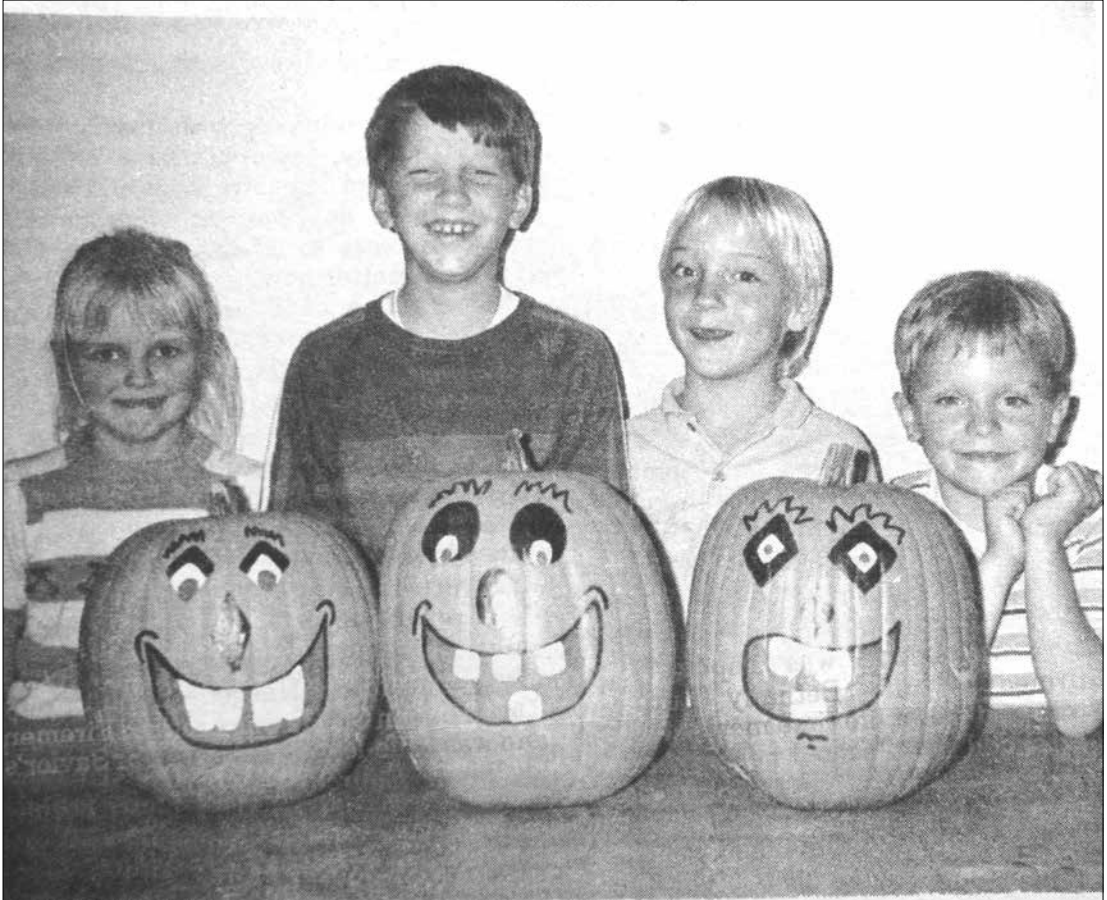

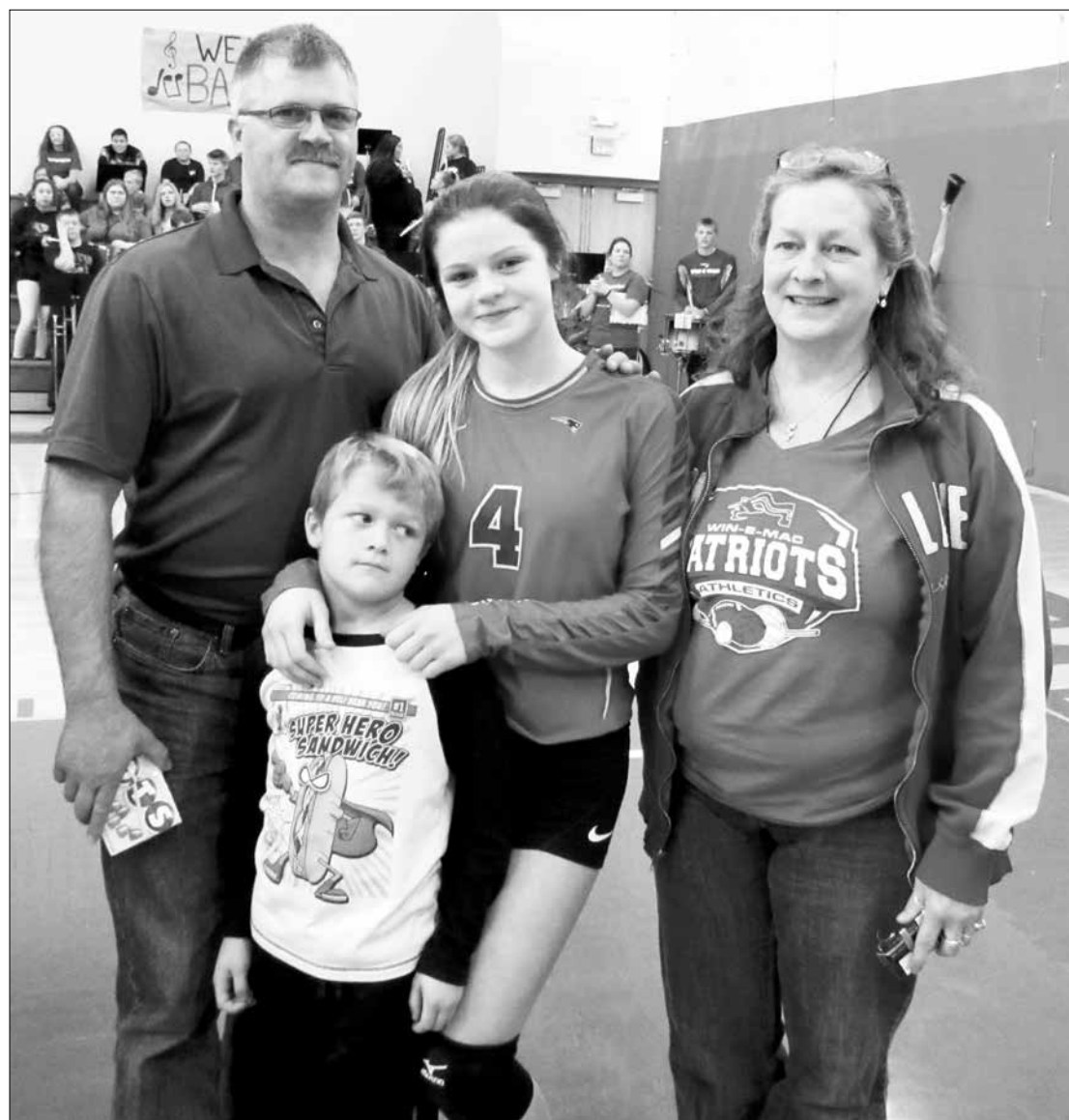

The MDA is urging farmers and applicators to check soil temperature and delay fall application of anhydrous ammonia and urea fertilizer until soil temperatures stay below 50 degrees F.

To assist tracking soil temperature, the MDA provides real-time soil temperatures at 25 locations across the state. The website includes a map with MDA sites with soil thermometers at a six-inch depth, North Dakota Ag Weather Network sites at four-inch depths, and research sites at various depths.

"There are areas of the state where fall application of nitrogen fertilizer is simply not rec-

ommended due to groundwater contamination concerns," said Bruce Montgomery, manager of the MDA's Fertilizer Management Section. "Those would be areas with coarse-textured soils that drain quickly or areas underlain by fractured bedrock karst geology. In other areas of the state where fall nitrogen fertilizer application is a recommended practice, the MDA encourages delaying application until soil temperatures cool down."

Waiting until soil temperature stays below 50 degrees F before applying anhydrous ammonia and urea increases the availability of nitrogen to next season's crop and decreases the amount of nitrate that could potentially leach into groundwater or tile drainage. Microbial activity in the soil

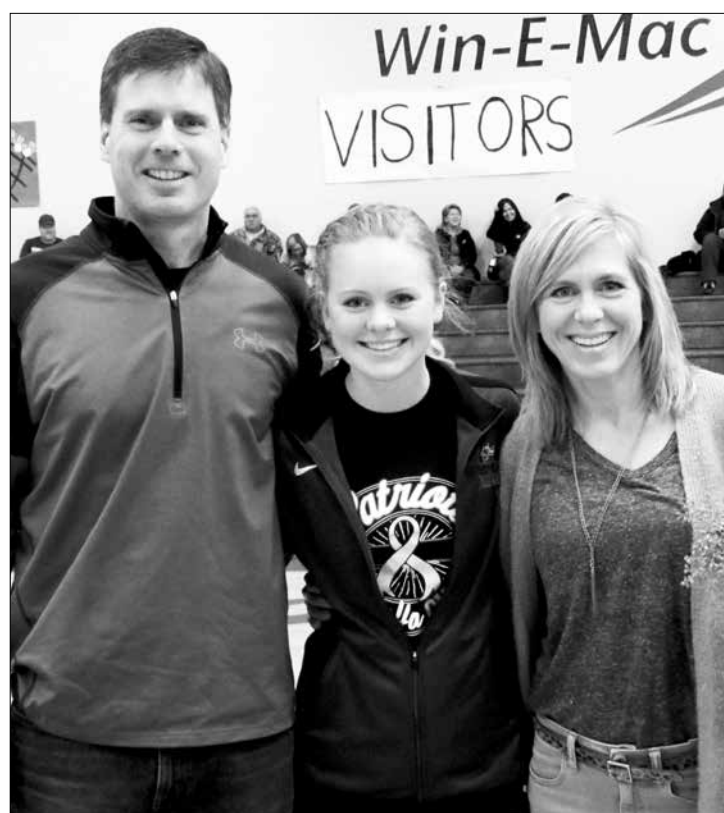

slows down at cooler temperatures, therefore slowing the conversion from ammonium to nitrate. Ammonium is stable in the soil whereas nitrate moves with water and may leach out of the root zone over winter and early spring.

Although the soil temperature network was established to support application of commercial fertilizer, it is equally useful for those applying manure in the fall. University of Minnesota Extension recommends delaying fall manure applications until soil temperatures at the six-inch depth are below 50 degrees F to prevent leaching losses. Research from the University of Minnesota at Waseca showed liquid dairy and hog manures injected in November produced yields 10 bushels per acre higher than manures injected in September and October.

The MDA has proposed the Groundwater Protection Rule that if approved will restrict fall nitrogen fertilizer application in areas vulnerable to groundwater contamination beginning in January 2020. The rule helps improve Minnesota's water quality by limiting the potential for nitrate leaching. The Groundwater Protection Rule is part of the state's Nitrogen Fertilizer Management Plan.
