The City of McIntosh Council would like to promote a clean and healthy community by designating the first full week of May as CITY OF MCINTOSH CLEAN UP WEEK. Property owners within city limits may bring items to the lift station site on 1st St SE (area south of the baseball field).

Please throw items in the proper bins. This service is free of charge, but donations would be greatly appreciated to help defray costs.

Be prepared to show proof you own property or reside within the city limits of McIntosh. Having a McIntosh mailing address does not necessarily mean you live within city limits. This service is provided solely to MCINTOSH CITY TAXPAYERS. If you are unsure, please call the city clerk's office: 218.563.3043.

Pick-up service is available for those unable to bring in their own items. Items must be piled near the street no later than 8 a.m. on May 2nd. If further help is needed with removing items from property, please call the city office and help will be scheduled. If interested in volunteering to pick up items and/or use of your truck and/or trailer, please call the City Office.

- Dry Paint Cans

- Computers or Monitors

Please note that we are not accepting yard waste: branches, leaves, grass clippings, etc. These items can be taken to the green dump on the south end of town. If you need assistance, please contact the City Office.

Don't let this happen to you!

It's that time of year when folks are doing extra cleaning around the house and trying new products to make those jobs easier. We strive to make sure the sewer system stays clear and doesn't back up into buildings. You can help us (and your neighbors) by not flushing:

- grease or oil down drains. Grease such as cooking oils, tallow, bacon grease, etc. will harden in the lines, and on the float switches, causing the pumps not to work.
- non-biodegradable items down drains. Items such as cigarette butts, dental floss, Q-tips, disposable diapers, sani-

tary napkins, tampons or condoms can clog the pump and pipes.

- flushable manufactured wipes. Even if product states it is flushable it does not disintegrate like toilet paper, so it clogs and tangles in the rotors of the pumps and lines.

- rigid or gritty materials down drains such as cat litter, coffee grounds, chicken bones, eggshells, fish scales, etc. Limit the materials you put through a garbage disposal to edible food products only.

- flammable or volatile liquids down drains such as gas, waste oil and thinners. It is illegal to dispose of these items in the sewer system.

- household chemicals down drains, such as paint, pesticides, herbicides, strong cleaning products, or other toxic chemicals.

Manufacturers list many things as flushable, but the only thing that belongs in a toilet is toilet paper and human waste.

On behalf of your neighbors and friends, thank you for helping to keep clogged sewer lines at a minimum!

Remember it's a toilet, not a trash can

Water lines will be flushed every Thursday throughout the summer.

If you notice water is rusty and discolored discontinue use during this time and let water run until clean in lines.

How Earth Day and environmental consciousness have evolved

Reduce, reuse, recycle is a mantra for many people. It's difficult to imagine that just 50 years ago awareness of the state of the environment was not part of the collective consciousness.

An emerging public consciousness about the planet began amid environmental issues like increased air pollution and massive consumption of fossil fuels in the 1960s. The bestselling book "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson also raised public concern for living organisms and the links between pollution and public health.

The push for environmental reform gained even more momentum on April 22, 1970, when the first Earth Day was celebrated. Then-Senator Gaylord Nelson from Wisconsin



put Earth Day on the national stage following a large oil spill that struck off the coast of Santa Barbara, Calif. Before this disaster, recycling was not a word in the popular lexicon. But when the disaster struck, people began to reason that changes would have to be made to save the planet.

Since the first Earth Day 50 years ago, many strides have been made in the environmental movement. This grassroots

initiative gave rise to the establishment of the Environmental Protection Agency, the Clean Air Act and the Clean Water Act.

Environmental awareness has become much more mainstream and is a less polarizing issue than it was in the 1970s, although there are still debates about the reality of climate change and other risk factors.

Public demand for environmental safeguards grew in the second half of the twentieth century, and those demands have grown stronger in recent years. Legislation is continually evolving to protect the air, land and water. Sustainability has joined the buzzwords

Youth come through in a big way

The Grace Community Food Shelf owes a big debt of gratitude to the young people of our area for conducting two very successful food drives to benefit the Food Shelf!

Cub Scout Pack 3089 brought in 211 pounds of food from their drive.

The Win-E-Mac National Honor Society, with John Eckman as their advisor, brought in 1,514 pounds of food in their drive. The National Honor Society members really out did themselves in this year's drive! Previous years drives brought in 700 pounds each year. This year's 1,514 pounds represents a 216% increase in food brought in.

Thank you to the young people, their parents, grandparents, friends, and neighbors that donated food to make these drives such a success.

The Grace Community Food Shelf brings food in to distribute to families in need in three ways; 1) purchase of food from the North Country Food Bank,



2) purchase of food from local grocery stores, and 3) donations of food from groups and individuals.

We depend on all three sources to come up with the 2,600 pounds of food that we distribute out to 30 needy families each month. Purchasing food from the Food Bank has a cost of \$.32 per pound and purchasing from local stores has a

cost of \$2.00 a pound. The combined youth food drive brought in the equivalent of \$3,450 in monetary donations!

The Grace Community Food Shelf is open the 2nd and 3rd Thursday's of each month in the rear parking area of Grace Lutheran Church at 332 Vance Avenue in Erskine. Our hours of operation are from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM. If you and your family are experiencing nutrition challenges please give us a chance to help out!

Hospice care vs. home health

What's the difference?

There are often misunderstandings about the difference between hospice care and home health.

While there are some general similarities, there are many differences, particularly regarding who can receive each service, what type of care is provided, and what the goal of care is for each service. What follows is a brief overview of home care and hospice care.

Home health care:

Who is eligible for home health?

Home health care is available to those who have a need for short term skilled nursing that is normally provided at a clinic or hospital. Patients must be homebound to receive home health.

Who is on the home health care team?

In addition to nurses, home health care professionals may include physical therapists, occupational therapists, social workers, speech pathologists and physicians.

What type of care is provided by home health?

Services typically include physical therapy, occupational therapy or wound care following a hospital stay or surgery.

What is the goal of home health?

With home health, the focus is on patient improvement with a goal to return to independent functioning. Patients must be making progress to continue with services. Once patients are no longer homebound, they would be expected to receive these services in a clinic or hospital setting; this care is not provided in nursing homes. Spiritual care, 24/7 access to medical providers, nurses, and medications are not usually part of home health care.

Hospice care:

Who is eligible for hospice care?

Hospice care focuses on quality of life for those who have been diagnosed with a terminal illness and have a prognosis of six months or less. Hospice care includes specialized care by a team of professionals who are trained to manage physical, emotional and spiritual comfort for those who are in the last stages of chronic illness. Patients do not need to be homebound to be on hospice care.

Who is on the hospice care team?

The hospice team includes a medical director, nurses, chaplain, social worker, certified nursing assistants, volunteers and grief specialist. They make visits to a person's home, wherever that may be, including private residences, assisted living or skilled nursing facilities. They are specially trained and sensitive to the tender nuances of end-of-life care.

What type of care is provided by hospice care?

The hospice team cares for the whole person and attends to physical, emotional and spiritual comfort of the patient,

and provides grief support and resources for family members. Hospice staff also teach, guide and empower family caregivers to best care for their loved ones.

Hospice also covers the cost of medications and equipment necessary for someone to be comfortable, including medications related to the terminal diagnosis as well as any supplies that are needed, such as incontinence supplies, wound care supplies, a shower chair, oxygen, walker or even a hospital bed if or when it may be needed.

Hospice services are covered by Medicare, medical assistance and most private insurance.

There is no outside cost to patients regardless of how often they receive visits, how many supplies are used, or how much equipment is needed.

What is the goal of hospice care?

With hospice, the goal is to achieve comfort and have the best quality of life through the end of life.

The hospice team walks alongside patients and their loved ones to help navigate those last month's so they can

Essentia Health to pause J&J vaccines

Following a recommendation from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the United States Food and Drug Administration, Essentia Health will pause administration of the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine.

Six reported cases of severe blood clotting in individuals who'd recently received the Johnson & Johnson vaccine are under review by the CDC and FDA. Those cases — all of which were in women between 18-48 years old — have occurred since April 12; over that same time period, more than 6.8 million doses of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine have been distributed.

According to a joint statement from the CDC and FDA: "Right now, these adverse events appear to be extremely rare. COVID-19 vaccine safety is a top priority for the federal government, and we take all reports of health problems following COVID-19 vaccination very seriously."

People who have received the J&J vaccine who develop severe headache, abdominal pain, leg pain, or shortness of breath within three weeks after vaccination should contact their health care provider."

It's important to note that this pause is not related to the effectiveness of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine. Nor does anyone who has received a Johnson & Johnson shot need to be revaccinated.

Essentia will continue to administer the Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna vaccines to anyone aged 16 and older in the communities we serve. Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna vac-

live comfortably and in the way that is most meaningful to them.

Often people wait until the last days or weeks of life to seek out hospice care because they are worried that starting hospice care means they only have days to live. Many people receive hospice care services for much longer.

Hospice care doesn't mean "giving up," rather it's choosing to focus on quality of life, spending time with family and doing things that are important to you with the time you have left instead of spending time in and out of the clinic/hospital getting tests and treatments that are no longer helping.

Anyone can reach out to Hospice to see if they or their loved one to learn more about the care available or to learn if they qualify to start using their hospice benefit. You do not need a referral from your doctor.

MDA reminds Minnesotans to use pesticides and fertilizers with care

Many Minnesotans are thinking about their lawns, trees, and gardens this time of year.

Whether you do it yourself or hire a professional, the Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) urges everyone to safely use pesticides and fertilizers on your property by following all label directions.

Pesticide and fertilizer labels specify how to use products safely and effectively. In Minnesota, it is unlawful to apply products without following label instructions. The label is the law.

If you hire a professional lawn care provider, do your homework. State law requires pesticide applicators and their company to be licensed by the MDA in order to commercially apply pesticides and fertilizers, including weed and feed product. Licensed applicators know and understand state and federal regulations regarding all aspects of pesticide and fertilizer handling, application, and disposal. The following are helpful tips for a safe spring season.

If you do it yourself:

- Test your soil to determine fertilizer needs.
- Carefully read and follow all label directions.
- Do not apply pesticides in windy or adverse weather conditions. High wind can cause products to drift and potentially harm people, pets, or plants.
- Do not apply if heavy rain is expected.
- Do not over water following application.
- Sweep sidewalks and hard surfaces of any dry or granular product after you apply the product to the intended site. Pesticides or fertilizers left on hard surfaces easily wash into our water supply.
- Place signage after the treatment.
- Buy only what you need. Unused products must be stored according to the label, can lose effectiveness over time, and be difficult to dispose of safely.

If you hire a lawn care professional:

Professionals applying pesticides must be licensed by the MDA and carry their pesticide applicator license with them. The company they work for must have a fertilizer license to apply fertilizer. Check the MDA website at mda.state.mn.us/licensesearch for fertilizer license verification. Also ask to see a pesticide applicator's license before they apply pesticides.

- Be cautious of people who claim their products are completely safe or pressure you to sign a service contract.
- Recognize posted warning flags in areas that have been chemically treated. Make sure your hired professional places warning signs after your lawn treatment.

If you believe the value or classification of your property is incorrect, please contact your assessor's office to discuss your concerns. If you disagree with the valuation or classification after discussing it with your assessor, you may appear before the local board of appeal and equalization. The board will review your assessments and may make corrections as needed. Generally, you must appeal to the local board before appealing to the county board of appeal and equalization.

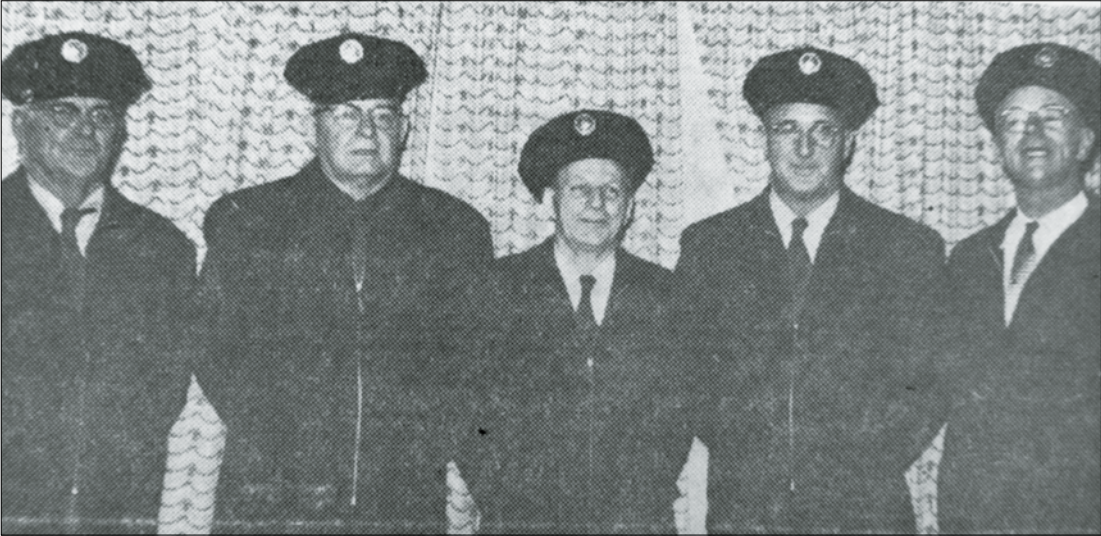

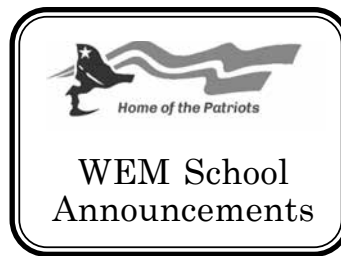

of the movement, and most industries now have a vested interest in changes that can minimize risk to human health and the environment.

Mitigating or avoiding environmental effects, proper waste disposal, reduction in water discharge, and emphasis on reducing, reusing and recycling have become important components of environmental wellness. And people are being educated at earlier stages on the importance of environmental mindfulness. For example, core subjects of the environmental movement are increasingly covered in elementary schools.

Twenty million people turned out for the first Earth Day in the United States. Today, more than 190 countries are engaged and more than one billion individuals are mobilized for action every Earth Day, advises the Earth Day Network. To mark the 50th anniversary, the most pressing topic for the year is climate change. Climate Action is the 2020 Earth Day theme to engage the global public. There is still work to be done, but great progress has been made since 1970.

will be hosting a fun night of food, games, and prizes for the prom attendees and we are looking for contributions to make this a memorable event for our kids.

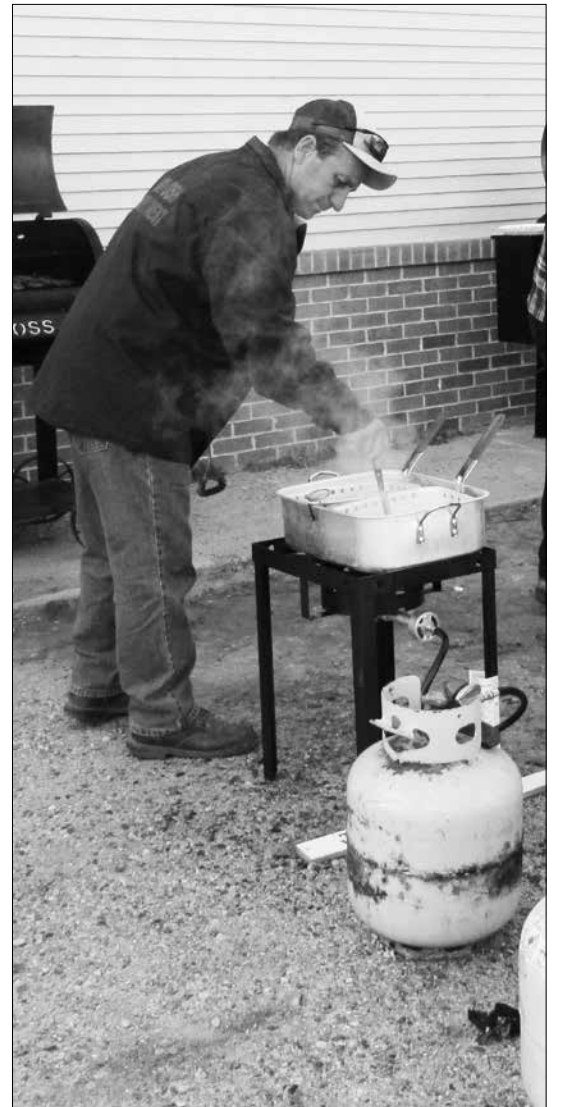

Did you know?

Strong communities are able to thrive thanks to the efforts of their residents, including those who give up their free time to volunteer with local charitable organizations. Though the impact of volunteers is often seen through the lens of the projects they help to initiate and complete, there's no denying just how valuable volunteers are from an economic standpoint.

In its 2018 "Volunteering in America Report," AmeriCorps, an organization dedicated to

strengthening communities and fostering civic engagement through service and volunteering, reported that Americans volunteered nearly 6.9 billion hours worth an estimated \$167 billion in 2017.
