How Earth Day and environmental consciousness have evolved

Reduce, reuse, recycle is a mantra for many people. It's difficult to imagine that just 50 years ago awareness of the state of the environment was not part of the collective consciousness.

An emerging public consciousness about the planet began amid environmental issues like increased air pollution and massive consumption of fos-

sil fuels in the 1960s. The bestselling book "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson also raised public concern for living organisms and the links between pollution and public health.

The push for environmental reform gained even more momentum on April 22, 1970, when the first Earth Day was celebrated.

Then-Senator Gaylord Nelson from Wisconsin put Earth Day on the national stage following a large oil spill that struck off the coast of Santa Barbara, Calif.

Before this disaster, recycling was not a word in the popular lexicon. But when the disaster struck, people began to reason that changes would have to be made to save the planet.

Since the first Earth Day 50 years ago, many strides have been made in the environmental movement. This grassroots initiative gave rise to the establishment of the Environmental Protection Agency, the Clean Air Act and the Clean Water Act.

Environmental awareness has become much more mainstream and is a less polarizing issue than it was in the 1970s, although there are still debates about the reality of climate change and other risk factors.

Public demand for environmental safeguards grew in the second half of the twentieth century, and those demands have grown stronger in recent



years.

Legislation is continually evolving to protect the air, land and water. Sustainability has joined the buzzwords of the movement, and most industries now have a vested interest in changes that can minimize risk to human health and the environment.

Mitigating or avoiding environmental effects, proper waste disposal, reduction in water discharge, and emphasis on reducing, reusing and recycling have become important components of environmental wellness.

And people are being educated at earlier stages on the importance of environmental mindfulness. For example, core subjects of the environmental movement are increasingly covered in elementary schools.

Twenty million people turned out for the first Earth Day in the United States. Today, more than 190 countries are engaged and more than one billion individuals are mobilized for action every Earth Day, advises the Earth Day Network.

To mark the 50th anniversary, the most pressing topic for the year is climate change. Climate Action is the 2020 Earth Day theme to engage the global public. There is still work to be done, but great progress has been made since 1970.

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Radio series highlighting farmer stress expands reach

Linder Farm Network offers “TransFARMation” series to listeners. Prompted by the many sources of stress affecting farmers and ranchers, the Minnesota Department of Ag-

riculture (MDA), Linder Farm Network, and the Red River Farm Network (RRFN) have joined forces to expand a radio series called “TransFARMation” throughout the state. The series profiles people in agri-

culture who have coped with challenging situations and highlights sources of support. “Farming is a stressful business even during the best of times” said Linder Farm Network owner Lynn Ketelsen. “Right now, crop prices are surging, and the pandemic is waning, but many producers are experiencing high input prices, high feed costs, livestock disease, and challenges related to retirement and farm succession.”

The series was a big hit with listeners when it debuted on RRFN in 2019. Starting the week of April 18, 60-second prime time radio stories will be heard on all 40 Linder Farm Network stations in central and southern Minnesota, as well as RRFN’s 21 stations further north.

“Many people are struggling, and they need to know

Popular insect repellent plants

Homeowners choose plants for their properties based on a number of variables. Some may be into growing their own foods, while others desire their gardens to be an awe-inspiring mélange of bright colors and alluring scents.

There’s no wrong reason to plant a fresh garden, but some plants offer extra benefits, such as repelling insects.

Insects can be a nuisance and a threat to individuals’ overall health. According to the American Academy of Family Physicians, insect-borne diseases are viral and bacterial illnesses that develop from insect bites.

Mosquitoes, sand flies and fleas are some examples of insects that can pass on disease. Fever, chills, headache, and muscle soreness are just a few of the more common symptoms linked to insect-borne diseases.

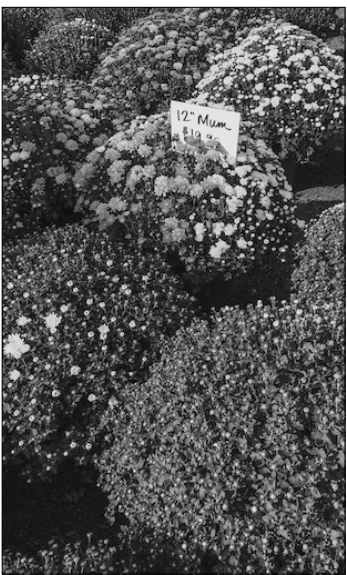
The good news for avid gardeners is that certain plants can help repel insects and provide the additional benefits like fresh food and aesthetic appeal that so many people love.

• **Basil:** The aroma of fresh basil is enough to compel any gardener to make a place for it in their garden. But there’s more to fresh basil than its scent, as the Farmers Almanac notes it can be used to repel mosquitoes and moths.

• **Lavender:** Fleas, flies, mosquitoes, and moths are not fans of this aromatic and colorful member of the mint family. Bees tend to be drawn to lavender, a durable plant that many garden centers recommend in areas prone to drought or hot summers without much precipitation.

• **Mint:** Mint is another plant that is instantly recognizable for its aroma. But mint lovers may not realize that it’s also great for keeping ants at bay. Mint also can be used to repel mosquitoes, but gardeners with no experience planting mint should plant it in pots. That’s because the Farmers Almanac notes mint is an especially aggressive spreader that can quickly take over a garden. Separating mint in pots can prevent it from bullying its way into other plants’ domains.

• **Lemongrass:** Lemongrass is a tropical grass that’s so fragrant it’s often used in perfumes. Lemongrass contains citronella, which many



people associate with repelling mosquitoes. A potted lemon-grass plant can repel these unwanted guests, keeping them away from decks, porches and/or patios all summer long.

• **Chrysanthemums:** The Farmers’ Almanac® recommends using chrysanthemums, which repel a range of insects from bedbugs to fleas to ants, as border plants around a home. That’s because they contain the natural insecticide pyrethrin, which can serve as something of an insect-repelling boundary around a home.

Insects are unwanted guests around a home each spring, summer and fall.

Certain plants can help repel insects and serve as an eco-friendly alternative to insecticides.

Hospice & Volunteerism: What roles do volunteers fill?

Dr. Debasish Mridha once said, "There is no greater duty in this world than to serve others with deep compassion and love."

We see these words come to life every single day at Hospice of the Red River Valley through our dedicated, compassionate volunteers who selflessly share their time and talents with our organization and those we serve.

Volunteers are embedded into every part of our organization, making a significant impact on the lives they touch every day. They come to us with many skillsets and passions, and there is a place for everyone who has a desire to give back at Hospice of the Red River Valley.

They make space and time for patients to share their life stories, histories and most profound thoughts.

Patient care volunteers provide companionship to patients, which may include reading, visiting and other one-on-one activities, and help with errands or light housekeeping. Their role allows caregivers to take a break, go to an appointment or run errands

without worrying about their loved one. We also have several volunteers with a more specialized skillset, including hairstyling, massage and pet therapy and many other self-care essentials.

Not all Hospice volunteers work directly with patients. There are other ways to share your time and talents with Hospice of the Red River Valley.

A common challenge for Hospice is getting supplies to and from rural communities. Courier volunteers drive many miles to deliver equipment, supplies and medications to patient homes. Office volunteers help with special projects and welcome guests at Hospice offices.

We have volunteers who sew Celebration Bears for families to memorialize their loved one. The special bears help bring joy and closure.

Marilyn Linsalata is one of Hospice of the Red River Valley's most prolific bear sewers, creating dozens each year. She doesn't often get to meet the people she sews them for—but simply knowing her creations are reminders of a life lived and a loved one held close is

enough to inspire her to continuing giving back.

Marilyn personalizes each project. Families don't always send her instructions for the creation of the bears so she will often wait until inspirations hits so that she can give the family the most special, meaningful bear.

COVID presented a difficult challenge for our hospice volunteers. As travel restrictions and nursing home regulations tightened, our patients found themselves without their family and friends.

Our volunteers stepped up to this challenge and were able adapt to the changing world and bring our patients to their families through video chats and virtual get-togethers. Many outdoor activities were introduced to keep patients in good spirits and allowed birthdays, holidays and special moments to happen.

Lee Roggenkamp, a Hospice volunteer, combatted COVID restrictions by recording personalized birthday songs and inspirational messages for patients.

"Hospice volunteers—we are social people. We enjoy being there talking to the patient or holding their hand. Everyone needs that kind of interaction, so this is my way of continuing that," Lee said.

What makes our hospice volunteers so versatile is that they come from all walks of life, career paths and have so many reasons why they chose to volunteer with us.

Some have experienced hospice services with their family or friends, others are retired health care professionals and for others, it is a serendipitous encounter that led them down this path.

Whatever the reason, we are so grateful to have every single one of them on our team. Without our volunteers we could not exist or function as we do.

Hospice of the Red River Valley provides training to all volunteers to help ensure you feel prepared and confident. Medical training is not required to be a Hospice volunteer.

As a Medicare-certified hospice program, our volunteers complete training outlined by Medicare, in addition to topics selected by Hospice of the Red River Valley.
