US flag facts and handling etiquette

The United States flag was first imagined after the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. The Continental Congress authorized creation of the first national flag on June 14, 1777. It was decided that the flag should have 13 stripes, alternating red and white, to represent the original 13 colonies, and that the new union be represented by 13 white stars in a blue field to signify a "new constellation." Francis Hopkinson, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, is most often credited with the original design.

Today there are 50 stars on the flag to represent the 50 states, while the 13 stripes still represent the 13 British colonies that became the first states. While this may be common knowledge, Public Law 94-344, known as the Federal Flag Code, may not be as widely known. The code dictates that the flag is to be treated with respect and proper etiquette. The code is extensive, but the following guidelines can help private individuals interested in displaying their flags do so in accordance with the law.

Flags should only be displayed in public from sunrise to sunset, unless the flag can be properly illuminated during darkness. In this instance, it may be displayed at all times.

When displayed with other flags, such as on a single staff or lanyard, the U.S. flag should be above all other flags. If flags are displayed in a row, the U.S. flag goes to the observer's left.

State and local flags are

traditionally flown lower than the American flag.

During marching ceremonies or parades with other flags, the U.S. flag should be to the observer's left.

The flag should be displayed at every public institution and at schools during school days.

When displayed vertically and not on a staff, the union should be on the left when observed. It should be suspended so its folds fall freely as though the flag were staffed.

The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.

The flag is often displayed at half-staff on days of mourning, including Memorial Day. The flag should first be hoisted to the peak for an instant, then lowered to half-staff position, which is half the distance between the top and bottom of the staff.

On a vehicle, the U.S. flag should be displayed from a staff firmly fixed to the chassis. It should not be draped over the hood, top, sides, or back of a vehicle.

The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise. It also should never have anything placed on it.

A flag in poor condition should be destroyed with dignity, preferably by burning. Most American Legion posts and local Boy Scouts troops will have the resources to retire flags accordingly. Many will host annual flag retirement ceremonies on Flag Day.

5 years of data reveal higher profitability for Ag Water Quality Certified Farms

Farmers enrolled in the Minnesota Agricultural Water Quality Certification Program (MAWQCP) have higher profits than non-certified farms, according to five years of data from the Minnesota State Agricultural Centers of Excellence.

The “Influence of Intensified Environmental Practices on Farm Profitability” study examines financial and crop and livestock production information from farmers enrolled in the Minnesota State Farm Business Management education program. The 126 MAWQCP farms in the study saw more gross cash farm income and net farm income in 2023 than non-certified farms. Looking at five-year average data, the average net cash income for MAWQCP farms was over \$213,600 compared to nearly \$163,000 for non-MAWQCP farms. Other key financial metrics are also better for those enrolled in the MAWQCP, such as debt-to-asset ratios and operating expense ratios.

The five years of data serve as an indicator of a positive return on investment for whole-farm conservation management that farmers implement to become certified.

“We now have continuous data that shows the Minnesota Ag Water Quality Certification Program provides better economic outcomes on top of the benefits to our water and soil resources,” said Agriculture Commissioner Thom Petersen. “With so many advantages to the MAWQCP, I encourage all farmers and landowners to look into certifying their land and contact their local Soil and Water Conservation District for more information.”

“The MAWQCP producers participating in Farm Business Management can enhance farm profitability by benchmarking various aspects of their farm operations,” said Keith Olander, Executive Director of AgCentric, and Agricultural Partnerships. “This study shows that these producers operate with a higher level of efficiency compared to their peers.”

The MAWQCP puts farmers

in touch with local conservation district experts to identify and mitigate any risks their farms pose to water quality on a field-by-field basis. Producers going through the certification process have priority access to financial assistance. After being certified, each farm is deemed in compliance with new water quality laws and regulations for 10 years.

Since the program’s statewide launch in 2016, the 1,500 Minnesota Agricultural Water Quality certified farms have added more than 2,915 new conservation practices that protect Minnesota’s waters. Those new practices have kept over 48,250 tons of sediment out of Minnesota rivers while saving 144,125 tons of soil and nearly 60,375 pounds of phosphorous on farms each year. The conservation practices have also reduced nitrogen loss up to 49% and cut greenhouse gas emissions by over 58,250 tons per year.

Rydell NWR 2nd Annual Night Hike

On the evening of Tuesday, June 11, staff from Rydell National Wildlife Refuge and members of the Friends of Rydell and Glacial Ridge Refuges Association will jointly host a 2nd Annual Refuge Night Hike. This FREE event will begin at 9:15pm at the Refuge Visitor Center. A brief introduction and background on what participants can expect to hear or possibly see will be provided prior to a guided walk on the paved Refuge trails. The first portion of the hike will be on the 1.5-mile long Golden Pond Trail. At the conclusion of that trail hike, participants have the option to “call it a night” and return to the Visitor Center. Those who would like to continue and hike a second trail, can stick around for a guided hike on the 1.0-mile long Church Lake Trail. The second trail walk will also conclude at the Visitor Center.

This “after dark adventure” will provide visitors a firsthand experience of the wetlands, woods, and prairies when they come alive with the sounds of the night. Participants can expect to hear a variety of wildlife, including frogs, toads, birds, insects, and mammals.



As participants listen to night-time calls, guides will explain what they’re hearing and even why certain sounds and calls are being made.

Depending on the night sky, a little star gazing might also occur. Imagine the sounds of coyotes howling, tree frogs trilling, sora rails and loons calling, or a beaver slapping its broad tail on the water just a few feet from shore – all under the cover of darkness.

Since Refuge visitation normally ends at sunset, this is a special opportunity to experience your Rydell National Wildlife Refuge at night. If the evening of June 11th ends up being exceptionally windy (more than 20 mph) or it is raining, this event will be rescheduled to a later date. If, on June 11th, you think the weather might result in the event being rescheduled, please call or email the Refuge Manager that afternoon to check on the event status. With \$4.6 million in grants, MN supports family, friends and neighbors who provide child care

New state grants totaling \$4.6 million will support the important role played by family, friends and neighbors who provide child care for children in diverse communities across Minnesota.

The Family, Friend and Neighbor Grants will go to 20 organizations whose services cover the entire state, including 11 Tribal Nations that share geography with Minnesota.

With supports that vary by organization and prioritize the needs of individual communities, the grantees serve Somali, Latine, Hmong, African American, Oromo, American Indian, immigrant and refugee communities.

Many families turn to relatives, friends and neighbors to meet their child care needs, such as grandparents who care for a new grandchild once a week or a neighbor who provides after-school care. The child care they provide may be unpaid or paid, part-time or full-time. These informal arrangements often enable parents to work nontraditional hours.

Minnesota had 82,700 fami-

ly, friend and neighbor caregivers in 2019. However, many of these caregivers don’t consider themselves part of the child care workforce or know about the supports available to them.

“Family members, friends and neighbors make up a significant portion of our child care workforce,” said Human Services Commissioner Jodi Harpstead. “As we work toward being the best state for children, it’s critical to recognize and support the child care they provide.”

Family, Friend and Neighbor Grants became an ongoing part of the state budget in 2023, providing resources to help caregivers promote social-emotional learning and healthy development, early literacy, and other skills that help children thrive.

The grants are supporting caregivers and families with resources:

- **Culturally** and linguistically appropriate training, support and resources to improve and promote children’s health, safety, nutrition and learning
- **Community** resources to support families’ physical and mental health and their

economic and developmental needs

- **Connections** to early childhood screening programs and referrals to state and local agencies, schools, community organizations and medical providers
- **Information** about high-quality, community-based early care and learning programs, as well as financial assistance including the Child Care Assistance Program
- **Information** about registering as a legal nonlicensed child care provider and establishing a licensed family or group family child care program
- **Transportation** to educational and other early childhood training activities
- **Translating** materials and translation services

Juneteenth

is a State Holiday

Governor Walz signed legislation that establishes Juneteenth as a State holiday. Juneteenth recognizes the historical pronouncement of the abolition of slavery on June 19, 1865, when the Emancipation



Proclamation was said to have been first publicly read in Texas by Union soldiers.

As is the case with other holidays defined in Minnesota Session Laws 2023 Chapter 5, no public business can be conducted on this day. This means schools cannot hold classes or programs, school board meetings, athletic practices and competitions, and other school-associated events. Private entities can be held but no public business.

Well-child/teen visits are a great opportunity to review your child's health in all areas – growth, cognitive and social development, illness prevention, mental health and more.

"Summer is great for scheduling a well-child/teen visit, which can include a sports physical and immunizations," said Dr. Tanya Diegel, division chair of primary care at Essentia. "Summer can offer greater flexibility and doesn't require your child to miss school. These visits are an excellent way to ensure your child is healthy and allows us to engage children in their own health and well-being and answer any questions that they and parents have."

Well-child/teen visits are for anyone from birth to age 21 and are recommended annually. During a visit, your pediatrician or primary care provider will:

- Conduct a comprehensive physical exam.
- Take measurements like

cause state law does not allow a student to attend a Minnesota school, until their immunizations are up to date. According to Minnesota's School Immunization laws, a child entering Kindergarten should have dates for the following vaccines: 5 (DTaP/DTP) Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis, 4 (IPV) Polio, 3 (Hep B) Hepatitis B, 2 (MMR) Measles-Mumps-Rubella, 2 Varicella (chickenpox) 1(Tdap booster-7th grade only) and 2 Meningococcal (MCV) first dose at 7th grade, second generally at age 16. Win-E-Mac School along with all schools in Minnesota is required to make sure all students meet the criteria for immunization certification in Minnesota schools. If a parent has a question about immunizations, please call the school district. In order to remain in school, your student is required to be in compliance.

height and weight.

- Screen for any mental health concerns, such as anxiety and depression.
- Update all immunizations or vaccinations, including for HPV, meningitis and others.
- Talk about illness prevention, nutrition, physical fitness and other applicable health-related issues.

When it's age-appropriate, subjects like substance abuse, proper dieting and sexual health also are discussed at well-child/teen visits.

A sports physical, also known as a preparticipation physical evaluation (PPE), can also be completed as part of a well-child/teen visit. It is recommended that your child have their physical at least six weeks before their sports season begins so there is enough time to follow up on something if necessary.

Many insurance companies cover one well-child/teen visit per year; contact yours to check on coverage.
