During the day a Silent Auction was set up in the Tri-River Pioneer building and there were many nice items to bid on.

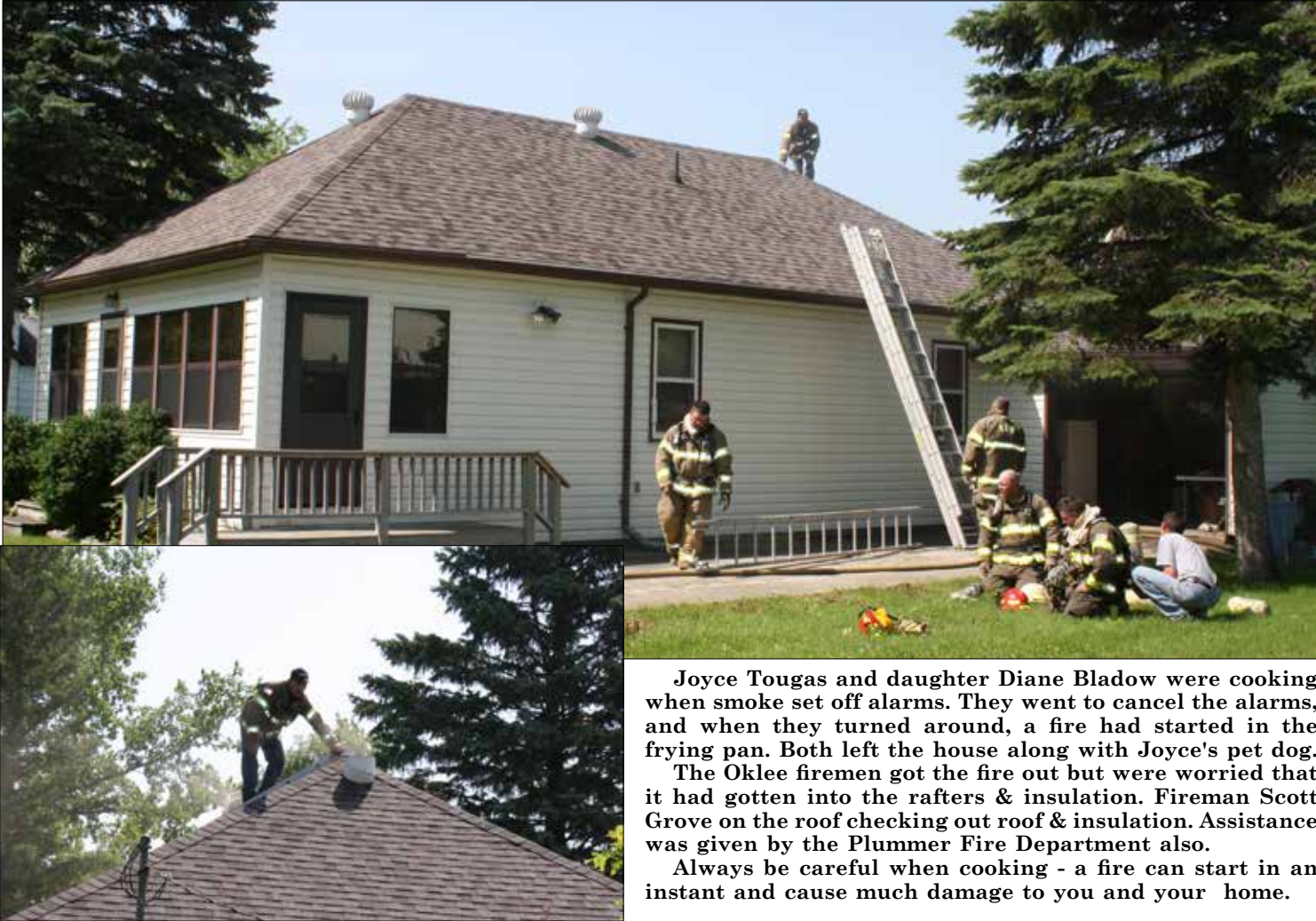

Summerfest Pageant to be held once again in Red Lake Falls

The Little Miss and Junior Miss Summerfest Pageants will return to Red Lake Falls Friday, July 24 at 7 p.m. at Community Hall.

The Little Miss division, which is open to girls ages 4 through 8, will be up first, followed by the Junior Miss division, which is open to girls ages 9 through 12. Both pageants are open to girls from all over the area, there are no geographical restrictions.

Entry fees are required for both pageants. The fees are used for costs associated with running the pageant and to purchase consolation prizes, which every contestant will receive.

In each division, one girl will be chosen as Little Miss or Junior Miss Summerfest. The girl chosen for this honor will be crowned and will receive the grand cash prize. Also in each division, a runner up will be chosen. They will receive a smaller cash prize.

The competition will consist of an introduction, answering an on-stage question and dressing in pageant attire.

Girls in the Junior Miss division will be required to perform a talent. Talents can be in any form and may include any of the following: singing, dancing, playing an instrument, skit, jokes, juggling, magic, readings or anything else the contestant desires. Talents should be limited to five minutes or less.

A changing area will be designated for girls who would like to wear a different outfit for their talent, though it is not required that they change. Any props or music that is needed for the talent must be provided by the contestant.

Contestants in both pageants will be rated by a panel of judges based on their poise, personality, appearance, speech and pageant attire. Girls in the Junior Miss division will also be rated on their talent. The highest overall score determines the winner.

The deadline to register a contestant in either division is Monday, July 13. There is a maximum of eight contestants allowed in each division, so early registration is recommended.

All contestants will be required to attend a rehearsal Thursday, July 23 starting at 7 p.m. at the Community Hall in Red Lake Falls. An ice cream social will follow. At this event, contestants will get the chance to meet each other and last year's winners, as well as enjoy free root beer floats.

Centennial Recipe Corner Cheeseburger Soup

1 lb ground beef
3/4 cup chopped onion
3/4 cup chopped carrots
3/4 cup chopped celery
1 tsp basil
1 tsp parsley
1/2 cup butter
14 oz American cheese
5 cups chicken broth
2-1/2 cups diced potatoes
1/2 cup flour
3-1/2 cup milk
1 Tbsp pepper
3.5 oz sour cream
1 Tbsp butter
Brown beef, drain and set aside. In a saucepan sauté onion, carrots, celery, basil, and parsley in 1/2 cup butter until tender. Add broth, potatoes and beef. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer for 10-15 minutes or until potatoes are tender. In a skillet melt 1 Tbsp butter and add flour, cook and stir 2-3 minutes. Add to soup, bring to a boil then reduce heat to low. Add cheese, milk and pepper. Cook and stir until cheese melts. Remove from heat blend in sour cream.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

To All Residents and Occupants of the City of Oklee.

The City of Oklee Utilities Department will be conducting smoke testing of the sanitary sewer system in the upcoming months. This testing will begin on 7-28-15. This study will involve the opening and entering of manholes in the streets and public utility easements. An important task of the testing will be to locate breaks and defects in the sewer system. The smoke will also reveal sources of where storm and other surface water enter the sewer system.

A special non-toxic smoke will be used in these tests. The smoke is manufactured for this purpose, leaves no residuals or stains, and has no effect on plant or animal life. The smoke has a distinctive, but not unpleasant, odor. Visibility and odor last only a few minutes, where there is adequate ventilation.

Because the plumbing appliances in your house or building are connected to the sanitary sewer system, some smoke may enter your home or place of business if the:

- Vents connected to your building's sewer pipes are inadequate, defective, or improperly installed.
- Traps under sinks, tubs, basins, showers, and other drains are dry, defective, improperly installed, or missing.
- Pipes, connections and seals of the wastewater drain system in and under your buildings are damaged, defective, have plugs missing, or are improperly installed.

All residents are advised that if traces of this smoke or its odor enter your house or building, it is an indication that gases and odors from the sewer also may enter. These can be both unpleasant and dangerous, as well as a health risk to the occupants. Should smoke enter your home or business, you may contact a member of the smoke testing crew working in your area.

The crew member will be able to help and check with you as to where the smoke has entered your building. Location, identification, and correction of the source of smoke that enters your building is urgently advised. Your cooperation will be appreciated.

The information gained from this testing will be used to improve your sewer services and may reduce the eventual cost to utility customers.

RED LAKE COUNTY Regular Meeting Held May 26, 2015

Pursuant to adjournment of its regular meeting the Red Lake County Board of Commissioners duly met in regular session at the courthouse in Red Lake Falls, MN on May 26, 2015 at 10:00 a.m. Chair Weiss called the meeting to order. All commissioners were present. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Commissioner Lerohl moved, seconded by Simpson and duly adopted to approve the agenda.

Commissioner Lerohl moved, seconded by Flage and unanimously carried to approve the expenditures for the period as follows:

Revenue Fund: \$3,438.60
Road & Bridge Fund: \$5,934.43
Total: \$9,373.03

The motion includes the following added bills: \$4,899.94 to Kurt Ellefson, and \$450.00 per diem to Dave Sorensen.

Commissioner Flage moved, seconded by Simpson and unanimously carried to approve the minutes from the regular board meeting held May 12, 2015 as presented.

HR Director Lundeen presented the proposed PTO (Paid Time Off) Policy for non-union county employees. Lundeen explained that the policy will replace the current sick leave and vacation portions of the current county policy. The PTO policy does not apply to elected officials as they are presently not eligible for sick leave and vacation under current county policy. Lundeen mentioned that one feature will allow employees to cash out a maximum of 40 hours of PTO per year after 3 years of employment once they accrue 140 hours. Commissioner Sorensen moved, seconded by Lerohl and

Weiss Quin County CHS discussing administrative criteria for the Director position and the WIC report; 1W1P meeting in Thief River Falls.

The board conducted bid opening at 11:00 a.m. for Project SP 063-602-010 CSAH #3 north to the county line. District Engineer Lou Tasa and County Engineering Tech Jeremy Johnson were also present. Three contractors submitted bids on the project as follows: \$983,170.60 from Knife River Materials; \$988,120.60 from Minn-Dak Asphalt; \$1,189,684.30 from Central Specialties. The apparent low bid is from Knife River Materials. Tasa informed that the bid specification must first be reviewed by County Engineering staff and the low bidder information sent on to MN DOT for final approval. The project is funded by approximately 70% federal funding with the balance state aid maintenance and local county funds and is scheduled to begin in mid-summer.

Bids were opened for CP 200-151, a 50,000 yard gravel crushing/stock pile project at the Oklee Pit. Three bids were submitted as follows: \$158,950.00 from Minn-Dak Asphalt; \$210,650.00 from Central Specialties; \$161,150.00 from Voit Dirt Service. Tasa mentioned that County Engineer Kleven will review within the next two weeks and make a recommendation at the next board meeting.

Tasa then briefed the board on the 2015 summer construction projects to be completed in the district.

The board reviewed information on a new carpet cleaner for the Courthouse and Social Services building. Dacotah Paper Company submitted a quote in the amount of \$2,725.00 for a Model X-17 including vac hose and scrub wand. Commissioner Sorensen moved, seconded by Flage and carried unanimously to approve the purchase as presented.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned until June 9, 2015 at 10:00 a.m.

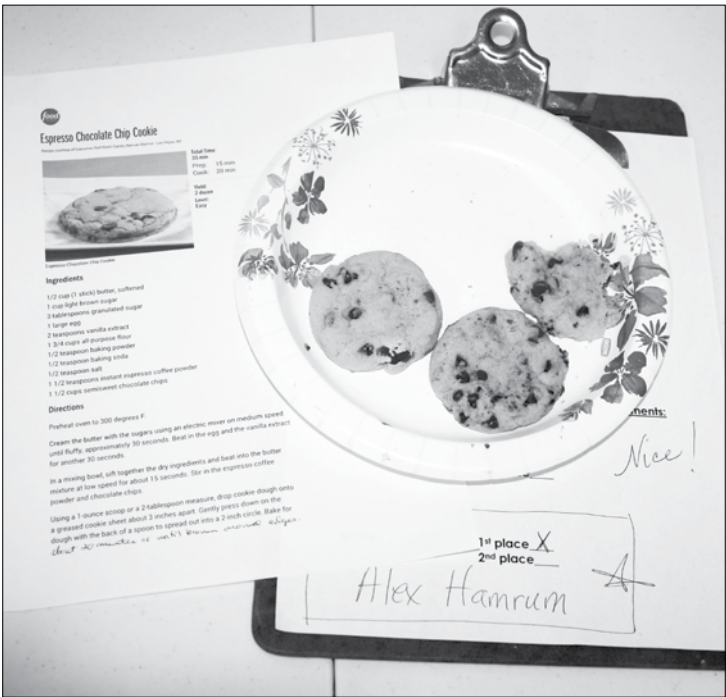

Sunscreen works best when used with shade or clothes, and it must be re-applied every two hours and after swimming, sweating, and toweling off.

Parenting Tips

Baby Sunburn Prevention

A baby's skin is more delicate and thinner than an adult's and burns and irritates more easily. Even dark-skinned babies may be sunburned.

Prevention Tips

Babies younger than 6 months should be kept out of direct and indirect sunlight because of the risk of heat stroke. Particularly, avoid having a baby out between 10 a.m and 2 p.m. when the sun's rays are strongest

Keep babies in the shade as much as possible.

Dress babies in lightweight cotton clothing with long sleeves and long pants and a sun hat with a wide brim.

Sunscreen may be applied to babies younger than 6 months to small areas of skin uncovered by clothing and hats.

Remember to cover all exposed areas of a baby's skin, including the face, back of the hands, back of the neck, tips of the ears, and tops of the feet.

Apply the protection 15 to 30 minutes before going out. Keep in mind that no sunscreens are truly waterproof, so reapply every one and a half to two hours. Read instructions on the bottle.

How to Soothe Mild Sunburn

Give your child water or 100% fruit juice to replace lost fluids.

Use cool water to help the child's skin feel better

Only use medicated lotions if your child's doctor says it is OK.

Keep your child out of the sun until the sunburn is fully healed.

When to Call the Doctor

If your baby is younger than 1 year and gets sunburn, call your baby's doctor right away.

For older children, call your child's doctor if there is blistering, pain, or fever.

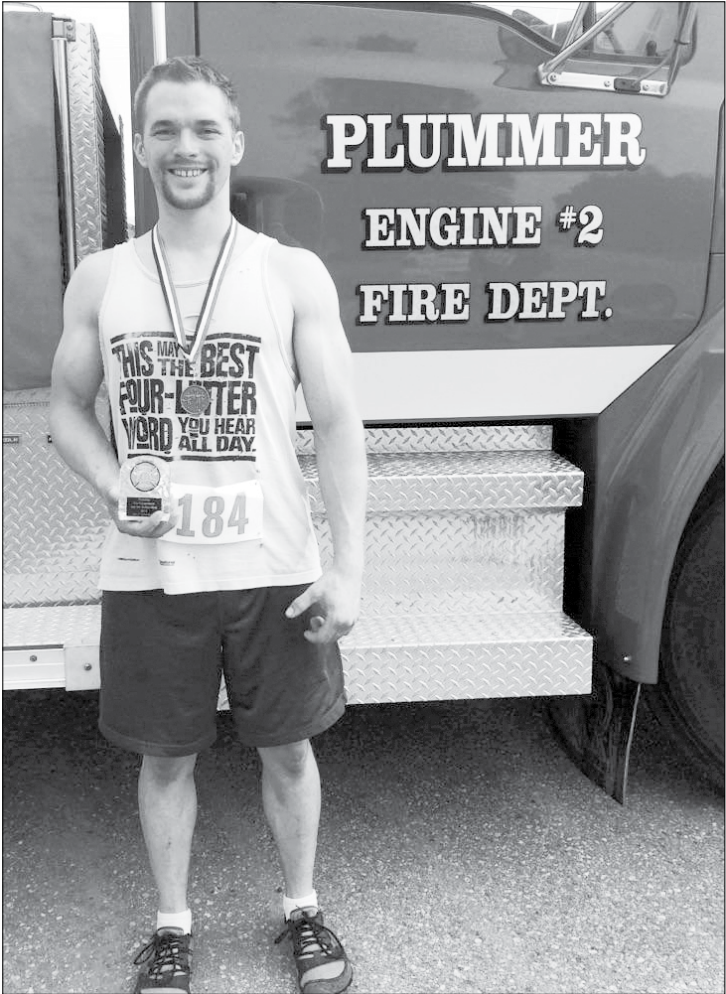

Two Legumes worth Consideration

In a recent article, I discussed how a severe winter can affect the survival of certain weeds that favor hayfields, pastures and roadsides. Weeds are not alone, this past winter also favored two desirable forage species as well; birdsfoot trefoil and red clover seem unusually abundant this spring providing an unexpected bonus to our forage mixture.

Birdsfoot trefoil is a perennial legume with showy yellow flowers that does well on poorly drained and low-pH soils. It can reseed itself, is resistant to Phytophthora root rot and numerous alfalfa insects, responds well to fertilization and does not cause bloat in animals. As a result, it is being grown more often in the northern United States where production of other forage legumes is limited.

Grown in well-drained, fertile soils, birdsfoot trefoil will not yield as well as alfalfa; yields usually are 50 to 80 percent that of alfalfa in these soils. But, birdsfoot trefoil quality is greater than that of alfalfa because of increased "bypass" protein and smaller stems. Loss of quality with maturity is less pronounced with trefoil than alfalfa as well. However, leaf loss during hay making may be greater than alfalfa, if harvested dry. When grazed, trefoil is more palatable than alfalfa and produces greater average daily gains and meat yield per acre, without the risk of bloat.

Trefoil is also well suited for stockpiling since it holds its leaves at maturity and after frosts, thus maintaining a relatively high level of quality. Stockpiling also allows root

reserves to accumulate during the fall, which improves plant survival and spring growth. Plus, hoof action during grazing allows stockpiled trefoil to replant itself, assuming some seed pots are present.

Birdsfoot trefoil yields less than alfalfa on well-drained, fertile soils but is superior to alfalfa on soils of marginal fertility and production capabilities. In areas where alfalfa production is not optimal, trefoil may be a viable alternative in forage production systems. Its excellent grazing potential and bloat-free advantages make trefoil ideal for pasture. While poor seedling establishment has been a major complaint, careful management at seeding can reduce this problem considerably. Careful harvest or grazing management is necessary, but when properly managed, birdsfoot trefoil will persist and will remain productive for several years.

The addition of trefoil to pastures may help reduce internal parasite load. Trefoil contains condensed tannins which has shown to reduce fecal egg counts on sheep. The tannins may also decrease the hatch rate of worm eggs and larval development in feces.

Birdsfoot trefoil may be one species worth adding to your pasture mix. Be sure to inoculate the seed with the proper strain of rhizobium.

Red clover is a legume that is also well adapted to poorly drained soils and lower soil pH and fertility than alfalfa. The yield potential of red clover is excellent and red clover varieties can have higher forage yields than alfalfa. Red clover is considered a short-lived legume, but new modern

varieties are productive for three full seasons after establishment. Plus, red clover is easier to establish with frost seeding.

Historically, red clover has not been favored for dry hay because of its nature to dry slowly. However, if you graze, make baleage or haylage, red clover is an excellent forage crop. Also, red clover contains enzymes that inhibit protein breakdown during fermentation providing greater bypass protein than alfalfa, which improves animal performance.

Red clover quality is comparable with alfalfa quality under similar harvest schedules. However, intake by the consuming animal is generally slightly greater for alfalfa than red clover. Red clover quality does not decline as rapidly with maturity as alfalfa. This means a longer period over which high-quality forage can be harvested. Indeed, red clover mixed with alfalfa and grass forages provides very high quality forage for most classes of livestock.

If your forage is harvested by grazing or as a wet forage (baleage or haylage), adding a few pounds of red clover with an alfalfa/grass mixture may be worthy of consideration to improve yield, reduce pest potential while increasing animal performance.

Alfalfa tends to be the queen for forage legumes, but birdsfoot trefoil and red clover are two high quality legumes that may fit in your forage mixtures.

Soybean plants have the ability to form a symbiotic relationship with nitrogen-fixing bacteria (Bradyrhizobium japonicum), which cause the formation of nodules (small swellings) on the root system. Fields that have no history of soybean production require inoculation with the soybean specific bacteria. Nodules on soybean roots can be found starting at the V2 or V3 (second or third trifoliate growth stage). The number of nodules formed increases until the R5 growth stage as does the nitrogen fixation. Nodules that are fixing nitrogen are pink or red inside. There are a few factors that can reduce the formation of nodules. Elevated levels of nitrogen in the soil may reduce the nodulation. Very wet conditions early in the season, or extremely dry soil conditions may lead to smaller number and size of nodules. The presence of

fungi causing root disease or iron deficiency chlorosis (IDC) may also negatively influence nodulation. Lastly, limited nodulation may occur in fields in which soybeans are being grown for the first time.

The beginning of July is a good time to check the roots for nodules. When digging up the plants be careful to gently remove the soil, possibly washing the roots in a bucket of water. In fields, with no previous soybean history, with low nodule numbers, and if the plants show a pale green color (make sure it is not IDC) a nitrogen rescue treatment should be considered. When nitrogen deficiency symptoms are beginning to appear nitrogen should be applied. If soil nitrate levels were high at planting time, then nodulation may be low due to high N level in the soil, and the crop should be able to utilize nitrogen from the soil. A trial was conducted at the Carrington Research

Extension Center to measure crop response with rescue post applied nitrogen treatments to soybean that was visibly yellow, with no detectable nodules, grown in a low N soil, and in a field with no prior history of soybean production. Nitrogen treatments included: untreated check, broadcast urea (46-0-0) at 50 and 100 lb N/acre soil applied at the R3 growth stage (early pod formation). About .85 inch of rainfall occurred 8 days after the urea application. Yield with 100 lb acre N yielded significantly more than the control. With good nodulation there is no reason to apply additional nitrogen.
