City of Oklee Council meeting

On September 11, 2017 at 6:00 p.m., the City of Oklee met for their regular meeting in the Oklee Cafe. Present were Mayor George Burthwick, Paul Cyr, Matthew Genova, Lori Melby and City Clerk Derek Cross. Kaye Munt and Gale Schmitz were not present.

Mayor George Burthwick opened the meeting and explained to everyone he now has a gavel and if during the meeting he needs to use it, once means quiet, the second time, you will be asked to leave.

The minutes were looked over and Matthew Genova had a question of why in the portion of the minutes his conversation wasn't covered very well compared to Peterson's conversation regarding the handicap parking issue discussed at the last meeting. Genova stated that he feels Clerk Derek Cross is writing the minutes in his own version, which Genova called spearing. Cross replied he reports accurately. As Cross and Genova were debating this issue, Lori Melby made a motion to approve the minutes and Paul Cyr seconded. Genova voted no on the minutes. The minutes were approved and the debate ended.

Financial report was read by Cross since Schmitz was not able to be there. A few questions were asked about

the financials, but the main concern of Genova was Cross driving his own vehicle to do city business and how the city could be liable if he were to get into an accident in his own vehicle. Melby made the motion to accept the financials as read, Cyr seconded, carried.

Cyr made a motion to accept the bills and Melby seconded, carried.

Sheriff Mitch Bernstein gave his report to the council starting with everything has been very quiet except for last Friday when Deputy Brekke had to shoot a dog that was coming after him in self-defense. The dog has a history of being aggressive, is licensed and a few citations had been issued to the owner in the past.

Genova asked if a letter congratulating Julia Bernstein on her Australian competition this past summer should be done. She performed well and she should be recognized. Genova made a motion, Cyr seconded, a letter will be sent.

Maintenance report was given by Darrell Tougas. Tougas reported he has been busy mowing and other things. At the Sundrud Park, trees have been trimmed, the dock was not put in this year because the river is so low, in fact, even the ponds are low and he may not have to release any water this year. The sludge is still an issue, but is lower overall because of the special bugs he puts in to eat the sludge. Still need to move the sludge near the pipe and Don LaCoursiere has a pontoon he is willing to sell for \$500 which will be good for this purpose. Genova made a motion to purchase the pontoon, Cyr seconded. All in favor, carried.

The City needs a new skid steer and quotes had been gotten for two different ones. A New Holland and a John Deere. After going over the spec's for both machines, Cyr made a motion to buy the New Holland,

Genova seconded, carried.

Tougas also talked about the Water Tower which needs to be painted next year due to rust spots on the outside. This item needs to be added to the budget. Water rates were increased last year to help with the costs of maintenance of the water tower.

The next item discussed was the Prepay Propane from Cenex that needs to be approved. Cyr asked how much was used last year, after some discussion, which included possible changing services for cheaper price, but then tanks would have to be switched out, etc., it was decided to prepay 8000 gallons with Cenex this year with a motion by Cyr, seconded by Melby, Genova voted no.

Ambulance building was discussed because a new roof will need to be done next year. Bids were brought up, Genova asked if bids would be asked for and printed in the paper. Genova wants bids in the local and outside paper for next spring for this project.

It is the time of year that Cities have to set their initial Levy. The City of Oklee set it at a 11% increase, but this number usually goes down. The reason for this is you can move the Levy amount down, but you can't increase it, so everyone starts high and then adjusts. The motion was made by Genova and seconded by Cyr, carried.

Before the meeting was adjourned, Genova asked to make a statement to the council. He stated he feel the hostility from the council especially due to the employee meeting, since nothing was done after he was treated badly by the City Clerk. And he said it would take a little time to get over it.

Melby made a motion to adjourn, Cyr seconded, meeting adjourned at 7:45 p.m. The next meeting is scheduled for October 9, 2017 at 6:00 p.m. in the Oklee Café.

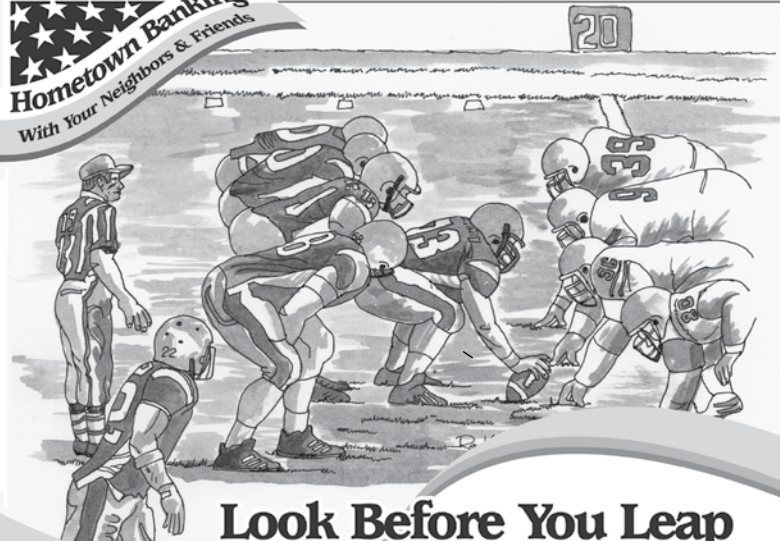

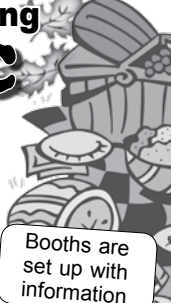

Centennial Recipe Corner

Poulet Uhlet Erin (Melby) Crawford

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
1/2 cup parmesan cheese
salt & pepper to taste
1/4 cup olive oil
2 Tbsp butter
2 Tbsp flour
1 cup chicken broth
1/2 cup whipping cream
1/2 cup sherry
1/2 tsp salt
1/2 tsp garlic powder
1/2 lb sliced mushrooms
2 Tbsp butter

Coat chicken with cheese, season with salt & pepper and brown in oil mixed with butter. Remove chicken when lightly browned. Blend flour into oil and butter, and add broth, cream, sherry and seasonings. Stir until it is smooth and simmering. Add chicken to sauce and simmer until tender, about 20 minutes. Saute mushrooms in butter and add to chicken at end of cooking. Serve with rice.

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Keep it simple when trying cover crops

In Minnesota, small grain harvest is complete and sugar beet, sweet corn, corn silage, and pea harvest is well underway. With these early harvested crops, producers have an opportunity to consider planting a cover crop this fall, a practice that has many benefits. This may be a particularly good year to try cover crops, since soil moisture in many parts of the region is ideal for germination.

Cover crop success stories have been shared in almost every local and national Ag magazine over the past five years. Cover crops have many benefits, including improving water infiltration, reducing soil erosion, scavenging excess nitrogen and phosphorus, providing nutrients, using excess moisture, extending the grazing season, improving soil health, and providing a food source for pollinators.

How and where should a producer get started with cover crops? The best approach is to keep it simple. In fields where wheat was just harvested, one option is to allow the wheat to reseed itself without tilling the land. As long as the soil is covered, this would be considered a cover crop. However, this may cause issues by creating a wet mat of plant residue on the soil

surface in the spring. A better option may be to seed cereal rye into the volunteer wheat, so the rye can utilize the extra moisture in the spring. When starting out, using one or two cover crops is an excellent way to get acquainted with their benefits. With lower commodity prices, expensive seed mixes are not necessary. The most popular choices are forage radish and cereal rye. Before choosing a cover crop, consider the following questions:

1. What is my crop rotation and harvest timing? If sugar beets have just been harvested, brassicas will not be needed in the cover crop mix (i.e. turnip, canola, or radish), as there isn't enough time for adequate growth to justify the cost. Instead, plant a small grain or grass. If the field is going to wheat next spring, then do not use cereal rye as a cover crop. Instead, choose oats, so that any volunteers that come up in the wheat crop can be killed.

If cover crops are planted after August 15, use cool season crops. These may include forage pea, barley, wheat, and triticale. In our northern climate, there may not be enough time to truly benefit from a legume's nitrogen credit when they are planted in late-summer.

Herbicide carryover and rotation restrictions are another

consideration when planting cover crops. Look at herbicide product labels or call your agronomist for exact restrictions. University of Wisconsin has a helpful, in-depth fact sheet that can be used as a guide: Herbicide rotation restrictions in forage and cover cropping systems.

2. Do I want a cover crop that will overwinter? A cover crop that overwinters will provide the best soil protection through the winter and into spring. However, it generally will need to be terminated before the cash crop is planted in the spring. A combination of cereal rye, which will overwinter, and radish (which will winter kill) is an example of a mix where the rye provides added soil protection, while the radish residue decomposes quickly. For a quick growing grain that does not overwinter, seeding barley in the fall is a good option. While typically winterkilled, it should be noted that turnips overwintered in parts of Minnesota and North Dakota in the 2015-2016 winter. However, if radish in the mix and there aren't grazing cattle, then another cover crop that serves the same purpose as radish isn't needed.

3. How should cover crops be seeded? There are several choices for seeding cover crops. They include a no-till drill, slurry seeded (keep manure agitated for a more even spreading of seed), broadcast and lightly incorporated for seed to soil contact, or by plane. If the soil is moist, all of these seeding methods are viable options. If the soil is dry, leaving the seeds on the soil surface will reduce germination and coverage during the fall. Oats are better equipped to be seeded a little deeper if soil moisture is a concern. Peas also need to be seeded deeper than most other cover crops. In general, when broadcasting or flying on cover crops, smaller seeds are a better choice: radish, turnip, flax, dwarf Essex rapeseed, cereal rye or barley. Larger seeded crops, like peas, sunflower, etc., should not be broadcast or flown on.

Producers are encouraged to consult with seed dealers and other sources for selecting the right mix and rates for specific field and crop rotation situations. Consider visiting U of M and NDSU Extension websites, Midwest Cover Crop Council, and NRCS publications for more information.

Cover crops can be an excellent addition to crop rotations as they improve water infiltration and reduce erosion. Trying one to two species of cover crops and planting them in the early harvested fields will set-up the fields for long-term success.
