2018 RED LAKE COUNTY ROAD RESTRICTIONS STARTS Concurrent with MN/DOT Limits

The effective dates of road restrictions on all Red Lake County roads will be concurrent with the placement of restrictions on Trunk Highways in the North Central Zone of Minnesota. MNDOT's Road Restrictions announcements are published at www.mrr.dot.state.mn.us click on Seasonal Load Limit Restrictions.

Restriction limits are based on gross axle weights and includes weight of both the vehicle and the load it carries. The erection of signs on any highway governs the effective date of the restriction. As long as signs remain in place, restrictions are in effect. No permit for overweight axle loads exceeding legal or posted axle weights will be issued.

During the period when signs are in place any county or town road is restricted to 10,000 pounds gross weight per axle. If signs are erected, the restrictions as indicated on the sign shall govern. If no signs are erected, the 10,000 pound gross weight provision shall apply.

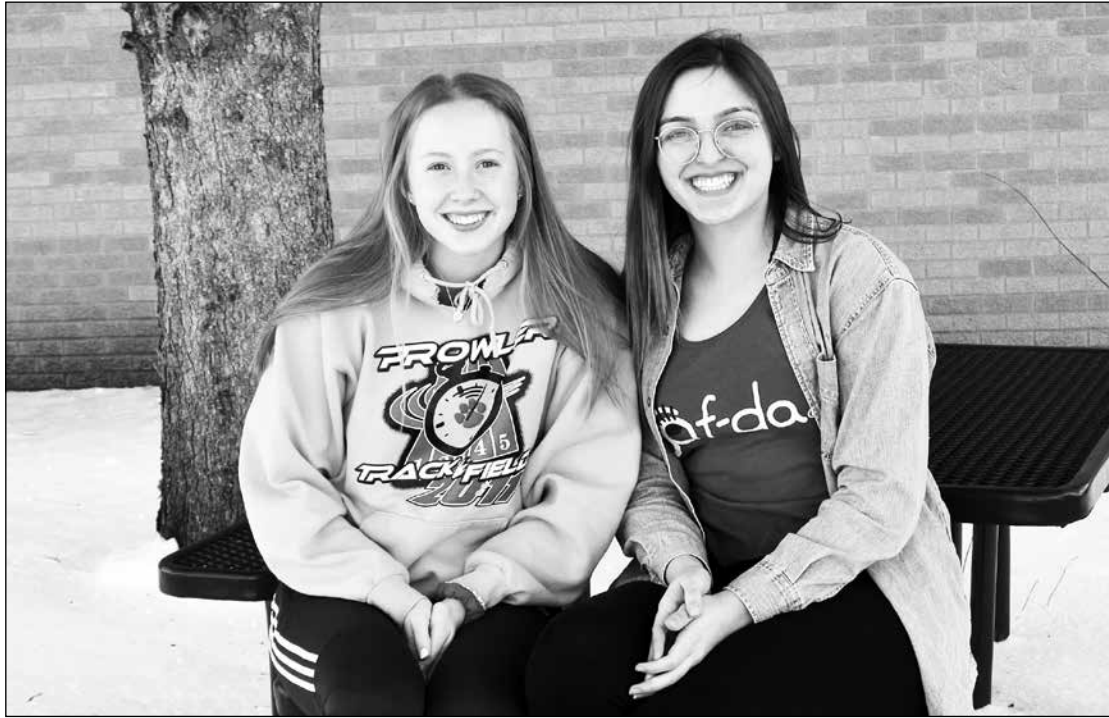
The two top scorers for WAO Ponies were Jackson Steer with nine points, eight rebounds, and two steals. Following was Mason Wang with six points and nine rebounds.

At the Red Lake County Central High School Gymnasium on March 3, 2018, there was a presentation about healthy and unhealthy relationships. Kelly, Michelle, and Stacy from the Violence Intervention Project spoke to the RLCC students and staff about abusive relationships and consent. The VIP works in the Kittson, Marshall, Pennington, Roseau, and Red Lake County areas. February was Teen Dating Violence Awareness month.

Healthy signs of a relationship can include: Trust, mutual respect, equal partners, independence, compassion, and loyalty. Signs of an unhealthy relationship with your dating partner include: Jealousy, controlling behaviors, explosive temper, isolating you, and violence or force.

They also shared some statistics. One in ten of all high school students is purposely hit or slapped by their dating partner. One in three will be in relationships that are unhealthy. Only one in three victims notify someone of their problem. Eighty percent of girls abused by their partner stay with them.

"Sexting" is a term for sending inappropriate messages to someone. Thirty-eight percent of all high school students have sent a sext, 48 percent have received one. Sexting can result in a dissemination of child pornography and is a felony. Kelly from VIP said, "Just because you delete something doesn't mean it's gone."

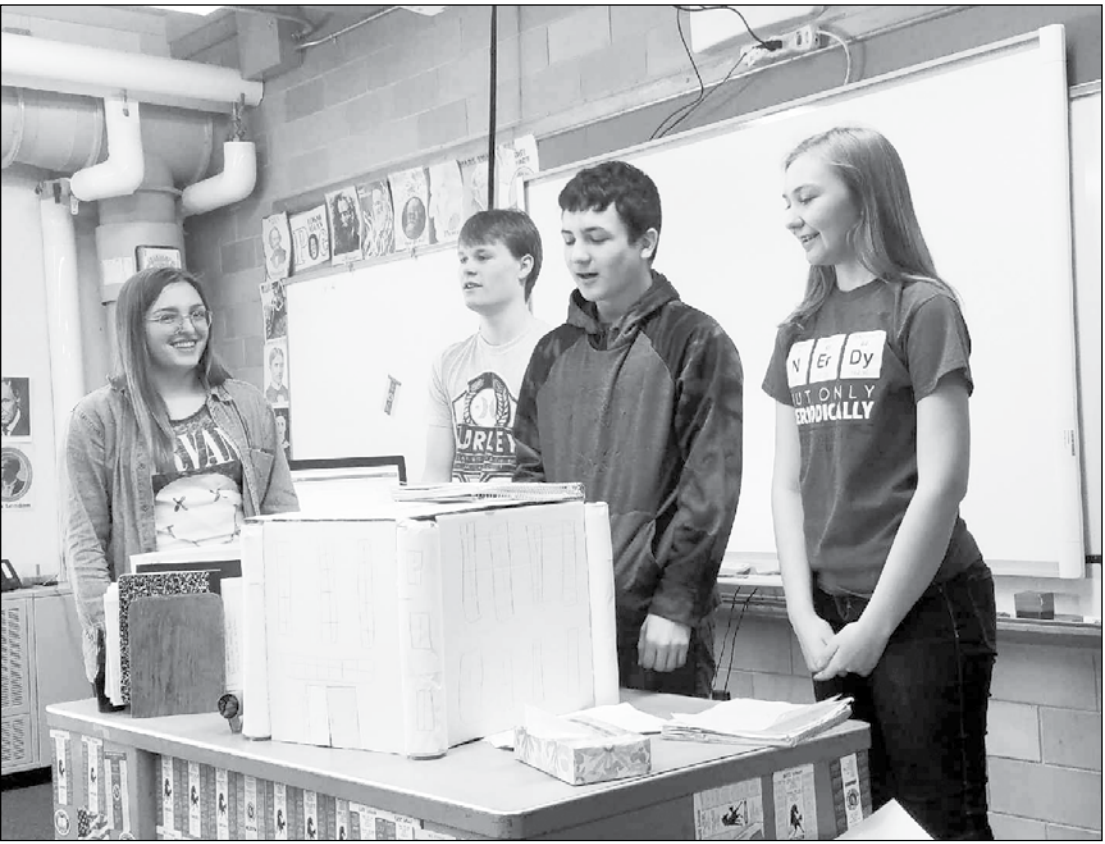

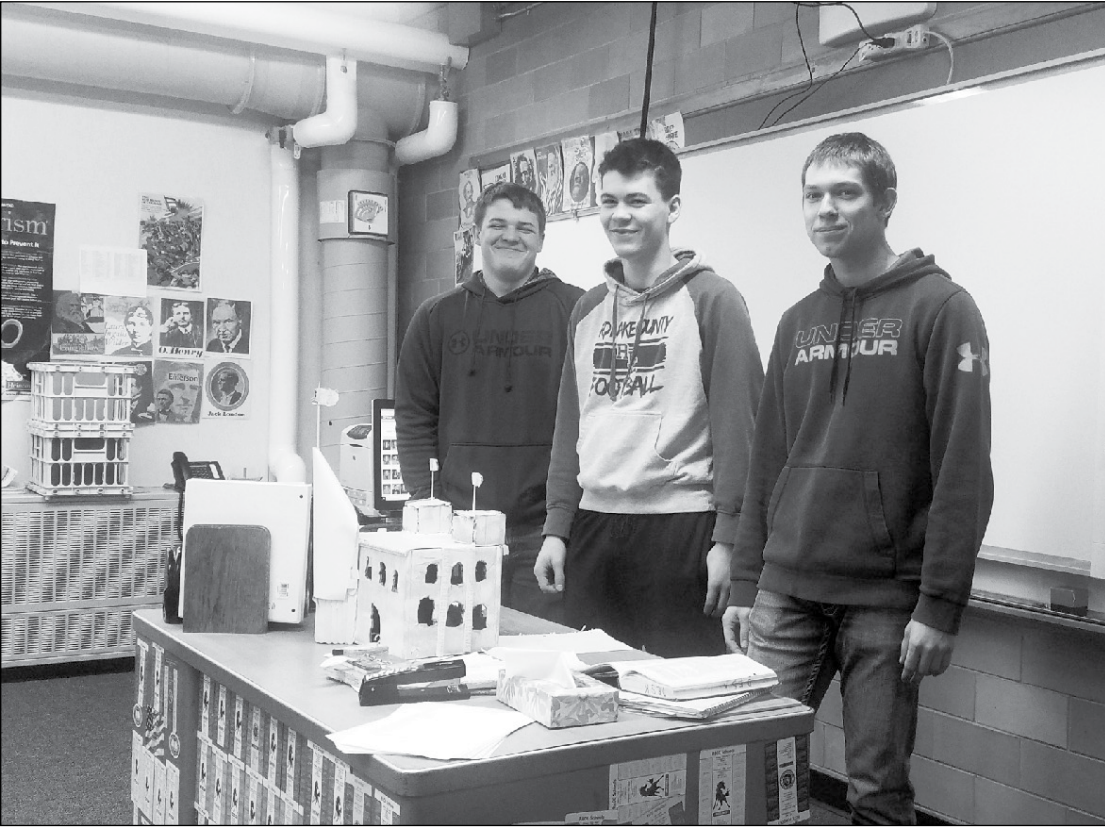

Most people with kidney disease don't know they have it. Often, people with early kidney disease feel fine and do not have any symptoms. The only way to know for sure whether you have kidney disease is to get blood and urine tests.

Youth e-cigarette use is at its highest point ever recorded.

The rapid uptake of e-cigarettes and other vaping devices has quickly reversed a long-term trend of declining teen tobacco use in Minnesota, according to new results from the Minnesota Youth Tobacco Survey. The new data show one in five high school students use e-cigarettes, a nearly 50 percent increase since the data were last collected in 2014. At the same time, youth cigarette smoking has reached an all-time low. Less than 10 percent of high school students now smoke cigarettes – a 70 percent drop since 2000.

Nearly all e-cigarettes contain nicotine, which can harm brain development as teens grow... Evidence also suggests that nicotine primes the adolescent brain for addiction, increasing the risk of future addictions not only to tobacco, but other substances like illicit drugs.
