Who is running? That is a good question

I have wondered that myself and so I went looking for this information. Some came from the State General Election Ballot for Oklee, the ballot for Polk County and the rest I gathered from the Secretary of State website.

Voting in elections is a very important responsibility of every citizen of the United States. If you haven't registered, it isn't too late. In Minnesota you can register on the day of the election. If your county or city votes by mail, you need to get registered as soon as possible so they can mail you a ballot or you will have to pick one up.

As far as I know, only felons are not allowed to vote unless the courts have given them their right back to vote. Check with your County Auditor's office or the Secretary of State's

website for the information you need to see if you qualify.

Whether you lean right or left, you need to vote. It is your right and your obligation. If you don't vote, you shouldn't have the right to complain if things don't go the way you want.

Also many people feel their vote doesn't count. That is absolutely false. Your vote counts. We are a democracy and that gives you the right to elect people to represent you. Now you may not always get the person or party you wanted into office, but you can say you tried. You can try again at the next election if your party or person didn't get in. But not to vote or make excuses for not voting is basically putting your head in the sand.

Get your voice heard! It is your right! Vote!

Influenza season is upon us and now is the time to protect yourself, your family and the community by getting vaccinated. The flu vaccine is recommended for people six months and older, including people with compromised immune systems and chronic medical conditions.

Buffer Law Compliance Deadline: November 1, 2018

The deadline for buffer strips along public ditches, November 1, 2018, is fast approaching. If you have not yet signed up for buffer cost-share assistance please do so at the Red Lake County SWCD office.

To be in compliance with the Buffer law along public ditches, a landowner must have a 16.5 foot minimum width continuous buffer as provided in section 103E.021, subdivision 1 by the deadline. Along public waterways a buffer strip with an average of 50 feet, and a minimum of 30 feet must be in place. However, there are alternative practices available for use. Red Lake SWCD staff are available to provide technical assistance regarding these alternative practices if you would like to make an appointment with our office.

2 cups sugar
1 cup butter
2 cups flour
2 tsp soda
pinch salt
1 tsp nutmeg
2 tsp cinnamon
2 eggs
6 cups apples - cut up into small pieces
1/2 cup nuts

Cream together sugar and butter. Add the other ingredients. Mixture will be stiff. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes.

1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup white sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup cream

Bring to a boil. When warm drizzle over cake and top with whipped cream when served.

RLC would receive the opening kick-off. Using their running game the Rebels would move the ball down the field. Connor Lambert would finish the drive from 19 yards out and a Lambert PAT would give RLC an 8-0 lead.

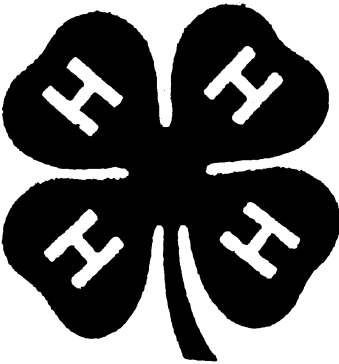

Oklee Herald Early Files

One Hundred Years Ago October 17, 1918

The infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thom Christofferson died from an attack of gripple.

Because of the great number of cases of sickness prevailing people were advised to avoid public gatherings.

Tillie Sannes died of pneumonia following an attack of influenza.

Halvor Nesland, a young man in the draft age, died of pneumonia following an attack of influenza. A few days later his older brother died of the same complications.

School was closed because of an influenza epidemic, over 40 cases were reported in Oklee. The great forest fire that swept over northern Minnesota was reported to be under control.

Seventy Years Ago October 14, 1948

Minnesota's 1949 automobile license plates went on sale October 1 and must be purchased before the November 15 deadline. The new plates will be slightly larger than in the past. They are made of aluminum with black figures on a background of aluminum white. The bottom of the plate reads "1848 Centennial 1948" commemorating the state's 100th anniversary as a territory. Application are being handled locally by the Security State Bank.

The Oklee Bobcats played on even terms with the conference co-champion, Gonvick Bulldogs, last Friday, but lost 18 – 14. The game was played on the local gridiron.

Five young children of Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Gagner, all under seven years of age left their burning home 5 ½ miles southwest of Plummer recently when the flames were discovered by the children in the home, according to the Red Lake Falls Gazette. An overheated stove is believed to cause the blaze. The home burned to the ground. Mr. and Mrs. Gagner had gone to the Leo Bruneau auction near Oklee and left the children at home. Eugene Carpenter, Plummer school bus driver, was the first to discover the fire. When he drove past the place he noticed the residence had been completely destroyed and found the children huddled together along the road.

Sixty Years Ago October 16, 1958

The Oklee Village council this week hired Ed Nelson as constable to succeed Tom Toulouse, who resigned effective October 15. Mr. Nelson began his new duties on Wednesday.

Bowlers from Oklee and surrounding communities have been "warming up" this week in preparation for the beginning of league play next Monday night at Oklee's new six-lane bowling center.

The Plummer Homecoming festivities got off to a booming start when Plummer Cardinals dumped the Goodridge Huskies in Friday's game by a score of 26-0. The Homecoming dance in the evening began with the coronation. The queen was Jan Lafevvre, king was James Jolly. The attendants from the junior class were Lorna Peterson and Warren Martell. From the sophomore class were Marilyn Pederson and Wesley Myhre.

Sharon Johnson was crowned Oklee High School Homecoming Queen at festivities in the school auditorium Friday night. Her attendant was Vincent Austad. Junior and sophomore attendants

were Douglas Remick, Marlene Olson, Betty LaJambe and Gary Radniecki.

There are 28 employees working 45 hours a week at the present time.
