Devin Lambert’s Australia trip for Down Under Sports

Devin Lambert, a senior from Red Lake County Central, left July 7th to be a participant in the Down Under Sports Tournament for track and field in Australia. Lambert was one of the six selected to represent Minnesota. He spent seven days in Australia and three days in Hawaii and most of his trip he stayed at the Gold Coast near Brisbane. He later returned

to the United States on July 16th. The Stampede newspaper asked Lambert about his trip. When asked how he placed in the meet he said, “I did five events, but only placed in one. I did the 110 M, 300 M and 400 M hurdles, and also ran the 200 and 400 M races. I made it to the finals in the 110 M hurdles and got eighth place.” Lambert also stated, “It was a very memorable experience

and I made a lot of new friends. Another random fact of my trip was that I was terrified of our hotel room! I am scared of heights and we happened to be staying on the 30th floor, and there was a massive floor to ceiling window by my bed so that didn’t help.”

Some additional things Lambert did while on his trip were snorkeling in the Great Barrier Reef, seeing Australia wildlife, surfing in Hawaii, exploring the city in Australia, taking a helicopter ride, and going to see Pearl Harbor. He also said snorkeling in the Great Barrier Reef was his favorite thing he did on the entire trip.

Down Under Sports began in 1989 when George O’Scanlon of New Zealand started the Down Under Bowl for his love of American football. Later on the Down Under Hoops Classic and the Down Under International games were created. Athletes from around the world are selected to compete in the sport they excel in.

Down Under Sports mission “is to promote the growth, development, and self-esteem of the individual athlete through sport; to raise the level of awareness and competition to the benefit of both the host country and participating athlete; to forge friendships that bridge the gap of both distance and time, through mutual competition that promotes health and sportsmanship.”

Brian Engebretson of Clearbrook received a big surprise Monday

Monday, September 21 was a big day for Brian Engebretson as he was surprised with an “Action Trackchair” at Clearbrook. He thought he was going to attend a monthly meeting of Clear Waters Life Center and was totally surprised when he was presented with the new equipment.

The Action Trackchair and Trackstander comes equipped with power seat tilt as a standard feature making it the ultimate in off-road wheelchairs. You will go places you didn’t think possible. With the Action Trackchair he will be able to navigate mountain roads, campgrounds, woods, beaches, hiking trails, frozen lakes, shallow streams, muddy and snowy terrain and much more. Now he has the choice to stay on hard surfaces or go off-road.

On August 13, 2003, 21-year-old Brian Engebretson was helping his dad with farm-work. Brian was stacking straw bales from the baler onto a trailer when he slipped off the front of the trailer. He attempted to roll to safety but was caught under the trailer; his body doubled over as he went under the fully loaded trailer axle. His spine was crushed, and Brian was paralyzed from the waist down. Even though Brian was severely injured. God’s hand of protection was with him as he could easily have died in the accident.

After surgery to fuse his spine, Brian spent time in rehab, learning to live life without the use of his legs.

As Brian’s body healed and recovered from the trauma, he quickly learned how to navigate using his wheelchair and to drive a car with hand controls. With the help of his family, Brian had a successful deer hunt just three months after his accident.

In the ensuing years, Brian attended Northland Community College for Computer Assisted Drafting, worked occasionally for Tom Jones, a local architect, and independently designed several local homes and buildings. He also helped his dad on the farm, fixed small engines, and did some woodworking during this time. He was always busy with a wide variety of jobs. For the past several years he has worked full-time at Northwest Cabinets in Wilton.

Brian has been quietly, but actively involved in the community mentoring several youngsters, coaching youth basketball, teaching Sunday School and participating in other activities at Elim LB Church, serving on the Board of Directors of Clear Waters Life Center (CWLC) being a house parent for Mustard Seed Homes, and volunteering at the Youth Connection (an after school youth program). He has also visited classrooms at the local school on several occasions and shared stories about growing up in Africa.

Brian is an avid sportsman. He has remained very active: playing wheelchair basketball, riding his hand-powered bike, fishing, and hunting, especially deer hunting. Furthermore,

with various family members, as well as independently, Brian has continued to enjoy canoeing and camping, even in remote areas, such as the Boundary Waters Canoe Area.

Brian is very independent and active, but the Action Trackchair is going to give him even more freedom and independence. It will allow him to be more active in the outdoors, adding to this hunting, fishing and sporting adventures giving him the necessary mobility in difficult terrain.

A delightful sense of humor and his wonderful storytelling ability entertains and enlightens anyone who gets to know Brian. He is a quiet man that has accepted his injury with grace and dignity, reflecting his unceasing will to serve God and live out his faith.

Darien Northup Operations Executive Director at Clear Waters Life Center was very helpful in getting letters out about the project for Brian. Their goal was to raise money and to have the Action Trackchair by the middle of September as a surprise for Brian. They were able to get enough donations to make it a reality.

The Action Trackchair was manufactured by Action Sports a company out of Marshall, MN. Owner of that company is Tim Swenson, formerly of Oklee. They helped disabled people have the freedom of mobility to go hunting, hiking, fishing and more. See story inside this week on the Tri County Canary front page.

Red Lake County Commissioners Minutes

RED LAKE COUNTY Regular Meeting Held August 25, 2015

Pursuant to adjournment of
its regular meeting the Red Lake
County Board of Commissioners
duly met in regular session at the
courthouse in Red Lake Falls, MN
on August 25, 2015 at 10:00 a.m.
Chair Weiss called the meeting to
order. Commissioner Sorensen was
absent. The Pledge of Allegiance
was recited.

Kristi Hanson, Director of the
Northwest Regional Library Service
in Thief River Falls met with the
board to review the 2016 library
budget. Hanson is asking all coun-
ties and cities to increase their
library contribution an additional
3% (\$802.00 for Red Lake County)
over last year's amount to fund the
library services. The state requires a
minimum contribution of \$26,732.00
but the county can contribute addi-
tional funding annually. The board
discussed contributing the added
funds to the local Friends of the
Library organization as in the past.
The county contributed an additional
\$5,500.00 in 2015. Commissioner
Lerohl moved, seconded by Flage
and carried unanimously to allocate
the requested increase for 2016 to
the local Friends of the Library.

Commissioner Lerohl moved,
seconded by Flage and unanimously
carried to approve expenditures for
the period as follows:

26 Payments less than 2,000	\$9,981.79
Final Total	\$21,889.79

The motion includes the follow-
ing additional bills: \$93.33 to AT&T;
\$366.00 to Biermaier Striping.

County Engineer Kleven was
present to provide an update. Kle-
ven mentioned that Emardville Town-
ship will receive \$75,000.00 to close
a portion of road at a Railroad
Crossing area due to it being a safety
concern. The funding will be provid-
ed by MN DOT. Also discussed was
the intersection of State Highway

59 and County No. 1 by Plummer.
Kleven reported that the gasoline
pumps at the Highway Department
are not operable due to a broken
pipe in the main tank. A new line and
dispenser will have to be installed
and other code requirements com-
pleted before the state will approve
the permit. Costs could be as much
as \$20,000.00 to get in compliance.
The County Sheriff and Environ-
mental Departments also use the
pumps. Kleven questioned whether
some of the cost could be shared by
the other departments that use the
system. The board asked Kleven to
get more information on repair costs
before any decision is made.

Chairman Weiss asked Kleven
if he has any more information on
drainage near the county line by
No. 49, and mentioned that Red
Lake County is trying to schedule a
meeting with Polk County to continue
discussion of County Ditch 2.

HR Director Lundeen provided
an update on 2016 premium renewal
rates for employee health insurance.
The county will receive a 10% rate
decrease for next year due to lower
insurance claims. The county offers
three insurance plans: Major Medi-
cal, High Deductible, and a Minimum
Value Plan. Lundeen also explained
Wellness Program incentives being
proposed by the NW Service Coop-
erative for next year.

Lerohl Enbridge Energy
public meeting in Plummer regard-
ing the Line 3 Replacement Proj-
ect.

unanimously to approve the minutes
from the regular board meeting held
August 11, 2015.

There, being no further business,
the meeting was adjourned until
September 8, 2015 at 10:00 a.m.

Lemon Pepper Chicken Breasts on a Bed of Rice Sue (Olson) Smith

1 cup long grain white rice
14 oz can chicken broth
5 Tbsp lemon pepper
1/4 cup melted margarine
4 or 5 boneless skinless chicken breasts



Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Sprinkle lemon pepper
liberally to both sides of chicken breasts. Set aside.
Using a non-greased 9 x 13 glass baking dish, place the
chicken, margarine and chicken broth in dish.

Bake for 20 minutes. Take out of oven and remove
chicken from the dish. Add the rice in the pan and
distribute evenly. Place the chicken breasts back in
the dish. Cover! Put pan back in the oven and bake for
40-50 minutes; until chicken is done and rice is tender.

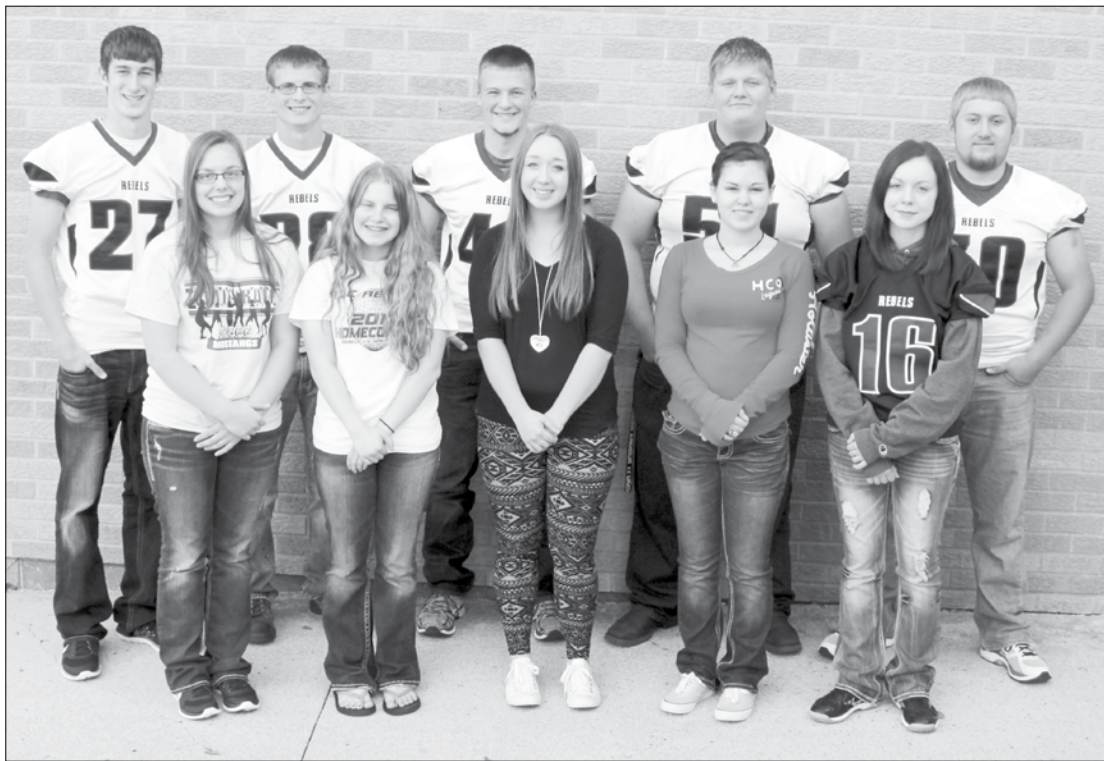

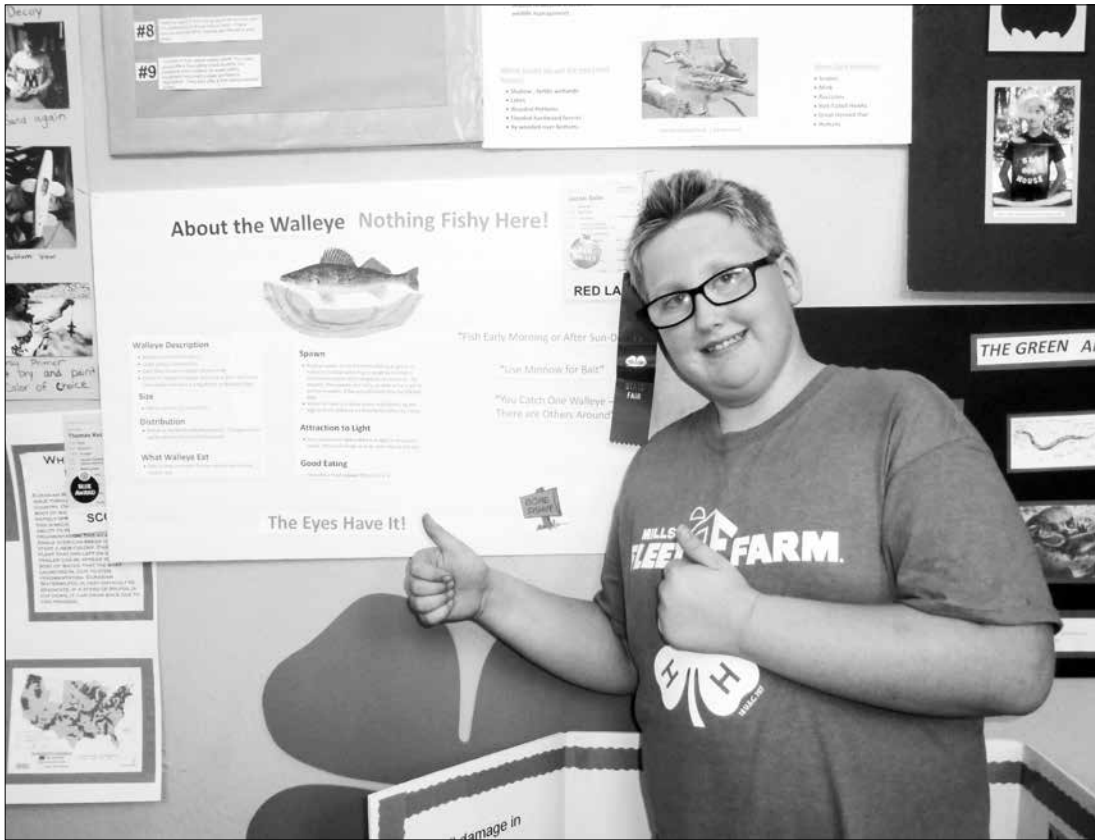

Plant Bulbs Now For Spring Beauty

Spring flowering bulbs will add beauty to any landscape! In Minnesota the best time to plant spring flowering bulbs is from mid-September through mid- October. Tulips can be planted until the soil begins to freeze.

When choosing bulbs make sure they are hardy for Northwest Minnesota. Bulbs listed as hardy in zone 3 or 4 should survive our northern winter. Bulbs are graded and priced accordingly based on bulb circumference. Always select the largest circumference bulbs to ensure stronger and larger flowers. Pick bulbs that are firm with crisp papery skins. A little mold on the skin of the bulb is not a concern as long as the bulb itself is free of mold. Check the root plate for any chips or scars which could result in poor root growth.

Bulbs should be planted in a location that receives six to eight hours of full sunlight per day and is free of standing water. Heavily shaded locations, low areas, or locations near downspouts should be avoided. In a shaded yard it may seem difficult to find an area that will receive enough sunlight. Remember that most spring bulbs bloom

before trees leaf out and as long as the foliage receives six weeks of good sunlight they should bloom the following year.

Before planting, call Gopher State One so buried utilities can be located. Dig or till the soil to a depth of 10 to 12 inches. This is also a perfect time to incorporate organic matter such as peat moss, compost, or shredded leaf mulch. As you are working the soil, add two to three pounds of a 5-10-10 fertilizer per 100 square feet. Follow the guidelines that came with the bulbs for proper planting depth and spacing. If guidelines are not available, a good rule of thumb is to plant the bulb two and one half times its height with depth being measured from the top of the bulb.

After planting, water bulbs thoroughly. Mulch the surface with three to five inches of leaf material, grass clippings, hay or straw. Mulch will insulate the bulbs and help keep the soil temperature more constant during late fall and early

spring. Rake back the mulch in the spring as the shoots begin to emerge, but keep a little of the mulch handy in case of hard frosts that may damage early emerging shoots. Proper post bloom care is necessary to allow plants to store food in the bulb to ensure good flowering next season. Deadhead plants after blooming by cutting the flower stalks as close to the leaves as possible. Fertilize lightly using a handful of 5-10-10 fertilizer or a bulb fertilizer as the flowers begin to decline. Do not cut leaves back until they are completely yellow or have started to dry. As long as the leaves are green, they continue to feed the bulb.
