A Christmas Classic

The U.S. Postal Service kicked off the holiday season by dedicating the Charlie Brown Christmas Forever Stamps Oct. 1. The booklet of 20 stamps features 10 still frames from the classic ode to the holiday season, which now airs annually on ABC. The 50th anniversary of “A Charlie Brown Christmas” is scheduled for Wednesday, Dec. 2 at 9 p.m. ET.

Work began on “A Charlie Brown Christmas” in the spring of 1965, when Schulz met with producer Lee Mendelson and animator Bill Melendez. Instead of hiring adult actors, the group decided to take the then-unusual step of having children provide voices for most of the characters.

Schulz insisted that the program should not have a laugh track, which he considered cynical and unnecessary. “Let the people at home enjoy the show at their own speed,” he said, “in their own way.” Composer Vince Guaraldi contributed a memorable jazz score. “Linus and Lucy,” a lively piano tune that plays in the film, is still synonymous with Peanuts.

Schulz's script focuses on Charlie Brown's search for the true meaning of Christmas. All around him, his friends are enjoying themselves, but

he is bothered by the season's commercialism.

At Lucy's request, Charlie Brown agrees to direct their school's Christmas play. The production is temporarily derailed when the other children laugh at him for choosing a small sapling — not a shiny aluminum replica — as a Christmas tree. After an exasperated Charlie Brown wonders if there's anyone who knows what Christmas is all about, Linus says that he does, and proceeds to recite a stirring rendition of the biblical Nativity story. When he's finished, he picks up his blanket and says, “That's what Christmas is all about, Charlie Brown.”

Encouraged, Charlie Brown rushes home to decorate his small tree, only to be disappointed again when it collapses under the weight of one ornament. His pals, however, come to the rescue, turning the sapling into a glimmering masterpiece.

Watched in more than 15 million American homes, “A Charlie Brown Christmas” was a smash hit. It won the George Foster Peabody Award and an Emmy Award.

Minnesota Winter Hazard Awareness Week - Nov. 9-13

Minnesota summers are cherished times. People spend every warm minute they can enjoying their lakes, cabins, sports, festivals and fairs. But as the season turns to fall, and the air turns crisp, we know a Minnesota winter is soon on the way. And as we get out the gloves and boots, it's time to refresh our winter safety knowledge and skills - and get prepared.

That's why the Minnesota Department of Public Safety division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (DPS-HSEM) in collaboration with the National Weather Service, sponsors the annual “Winter Hazard Awareness Week” public information campaign each year.

The week features an intense news and social media information campaign that highlights daily topics related to winter weather safety. The HSEM Winter Weather Safety website offers additional information, checklists, and resources to assist in local education efforts throughout the season. We encourage people, families, businesses, and organizations to use the information to review, refresh and share their winter safety knowledge and habits.

Injuries Related to Cold

- 50% happen to people over 60 years old
- More than 75% happen to males
- About 20% occur in the home

Extreme Cold

Extended exposure to extremely cold temperatures can cause frostbite or hypothermia and become life-threatening. Infants and elderly people are most susceptible. What constitutes extreme cold varies in different parts of the country and from person to person. Typically in Minnesota extreme cold usually means temperatures near or below zero degrees Fahrenheit. However even extended exposure to temperatures of 40°F or less can be hazardous to vulnerable people, especially if factored with wind chill.

Wind Chill

Wind chill is not the actual temperature but rather how wind and cold feel on exposed skin. As the wind increases, heat is carried away from the body at an accelerated rate, driving down the core body temperature. Animals are also affected by wind chill; however, cars, plants and other objects are not. A wind chill of -20° Fahrenheit (F) will cause frostbite in just 30 minutes.

NWS Wind Chill Chart

Frostbite is localized damage to body tissue caused by extreme cold. The condition

causes a loss of feeling and a white or pale appearance in extremities, such as fingers, toes, ear lobes or the tip of the nose. If symptoms are detected, get medical help immediately! If you must wait for help, slowly rewarm affected areas. However, if the person is also showing signs of hypothermia, warm the body core before the extremities.

Frostbite

Hypothermia is a condition brought on when the body temperature drops to less than 95°F. It can kill. For those who survive, there are likely to be lasting kidney, liver and pancreas problems. Warning signs include uncontrollable shivering, memory loss, disorientation, incoherence, slurred speech, drowsiness and apparent exhaustion. Take the person's temperature. If below 95°F, seek medical care immediately!

Hypothermia

If Medical Care is Not Available, warm the person slowly, starting with the body core. Warming the arms and legs first drives cold blood toward the heart and can lead to heart failure. If necessary, use your body heat to help. Get the person into dry clothing and wrap in a warm blanket covering the head and neck. Do not give the person alcohol, drugs, coffee or any hot beverage or food. Warm broth is the first food to offer.

Winter Driving

Everyone should be cautious about traveling in extreme winter weather. Cold, snow and ice are demanding on cars, drivers and passengers. Most importantly, extreme winter weather can threaten your life. Each year, hundreds of Minnesotans find themselves stranded on the roadside. Winter weather can kill in mere minutes an unprepared person exposed to the elements.

Winter Survival Survival Tips

Everyone should be cautious about traveling in extreme winter weather. Cold, snow and ice are demanding on cars, drivers and passengers. Cold affects metal, rubber and other materials in your car. It can reduce the effectiveness of your vehicle's battery by at least 50 percent.

It can freeze tires and keep them flat on the bottom for at least the first half-mile of travel. It can thicken your car's lubricants, making the engine work too hard.

Most importantly, extreme winter weather can threaten your life. Follow these tips to stay safe as you drive in Minnesota.

Plan Before You Travel

Simple planning can save

you trouble and even save your life. Prepare Your Vehicle

Be sure your vehicle is in good winter driving condition.

Take along the emergency equipment referred to in this booklet and keep it accessible.

Keep your gas tank at least one-half full.

Be Aware of the Weather

Listen to forecasts, road reports and storm warnings.

Dress appropriately. Pack extra scarves and mittens. Allow extra time for trips in severe weather.

Make Yourself Easy to Find

Tell someone where you are going and the route you will take. Report your safe arrival.

Use an empty three-pound coffee can or any similar container with a plastic cover to store the following items:

- Small candles and matches
- Small, sharp knife and plastic spoons
- Red bandanna or cloth
- Pencil and paper
- Large plastic garbage bag
- Safety pins
- Whistle
- Snacks
- Cell phone adapter to plug into lighter
- Plastic flashlight and spare batteries
- Booster cables
- Basic tools
- Sand, cat litter or other grit in a plastic milk carton
- Shovel
- Tow cables or chain
- Sleeping bag or blankets
- Road flares and reflectors
- Snowmobile suit and heavy boots

Reverse batteries in the flashlight to avoid accidental switching and burnout. Warm batteries before using them. Store safety items in the passenger compartment when severe winter weather threatens in case the trunk is jammed or frozen shut. Choose small packages of food that you can eat hot or cold.

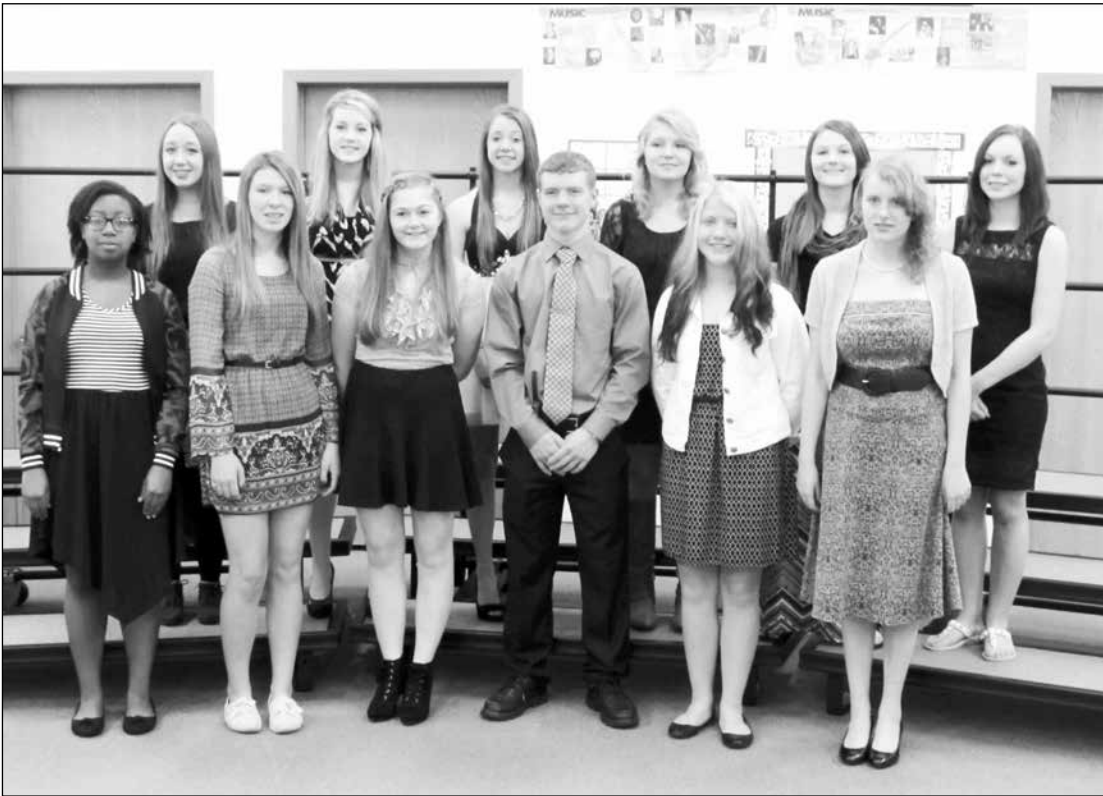

Keith and Debbie Bjerk were the speakers for Red Ribbon Week at Red Lake County Central High School. The Bjerks are from Grand Forks, North Dakota. They had three sons but they lost one who died of an overdose

from a synthetic drug called 25I-NBOMe or also called synthetic acid. Christian's body was found at 6:00 a.m. on June 11th, 2012.

That evening before Christian died, he told his dad that he was going to the gas station to get some pop. When he got to the gas station he ran into a friend who said that there was a party at a house and he should come. Christian thought nothing of it and went to the party. There were seven kids at this party ages 15-20, and the parents were home. Christian was offered a drug that is like a different type of LSD.

He took the drug and then got out of hand from the side effects so they kicked him and two others out of the house. Others saw him collapse on a sidewalk but did not call 911 because they did not want to get in trouble. The following morning he was found dead on the sidewalk.

Due to this death and another sudden death in the same week, the feds got involved. "Operation Stolen Youth" task force was formed made up of local, state, and federal officials. The investigation determined the drugs were imported from China and sold online. Within 60 days there were 15 people caught and arrested. They all got from 30 days to 16 years in jail.

The Bjerks said 25I-NBOMe is made from an industrial chemical and "is a poison." It can cause an increase in blood pressure and heart rate and kidney failure. Synthetic drugs are so dangerous they could kill you the first time you try it. "Two salt grain sizes can kill you, that is how potent it is." It was two grains that caused the death of their son.

The Bjerks were emphasizing that drugs are not okay. Keith warned that drug dealers are "merchants of death. You don't need to be a drug user, don't need to be an addict. You only need to be foolish one time in this life."

Concerns About Grazing Corn Residue

* Carefully consider the class of cattle allowed to graze cornstalks. Cattle new to eating corn (calves or yearlings) will take some time before they actively seek corn. Fruit fly traps (either store bought or homemade) generally do not eliminate fruit flies. While you may capture some individuals, like spraying, it is difficult to catch them fast enough to actually eliminate them. However, you could use traps to help narrow down where infestations are
