Extension recognizes leaders Program graduates its 36th class



Benjamin and Mikayla Tabert have completed the Emerging Leadership Program for Red Lake County.

Benjamin and Mikayla Tabert, Red Lake Falls, received special recognition on June 30th, during an online recognition event for the Emerging Leadership Program. They, along with individuals from 15 other counties in northwestern and west central Minnesota, were honored for completing the leadership program and for their commitment to leadership in their community.

The event, broadcast as a Facebook LIVE event, was held after the class met monthly for Friday evening educational sessions for four months to complete their program. Extension Educator Jody Horntvedt explained that after the fourth session and annual Recognition Banquet, canceled back in

March due to COVID-19, the class committed to finishing online. "I was impressed by the participants' commitment to connecting via technology to maximize their opportunities for learning as part of the program," added Horntvedt. The class hopes to be together in person for a final wrap-up event in November provided Extension in-person programming is an option at that time.

This year's theme, 2020: Focus on Leadership, encouraged participants to use vision and perspective when striving to be effective leaders. During the event, Extension Program Leader Holli Arp addressed the class, highlighting the importance of looking back at what they've learned, being

okay with uncertainty, and taking time to re-envision what is possible for themselves and their communities into the future. She ended her comments with this quote from Eleanor Roosevelt, "You gain strength, courage and confidence by every experience in which you really stop to look fear in the face."

The recognition event concluded with an announcement of the 2021 Ambassadors for the program. Andy and Stephanie Maier (Barnesville, MN) were selected for that honor from among other current participants in the program, based on nominations from program participants and interviews with program alumni. Andy and Stephanie will put their leadership skills to work in public relations, recognition, and community leadership as they work with Extension staff to develop and deliver the educational program in 2021.

The Emerging Leadership Program is a program of the University of Minnesota Extension. Created in 1985, it builds skills in individuals while creating and sustaining a network of community leaders in the northwest and west central regions of Minnesota, to focus on rural issues.

The Emerging Leadership Program, led by Extension Educators Jody Horntvedt, Lisa Hinz and Brian Fredrickson, is a partnership with over 1,200 alumni throughout the region. Alumni are now recruiting and selecting participants for the next class to begin this fall. 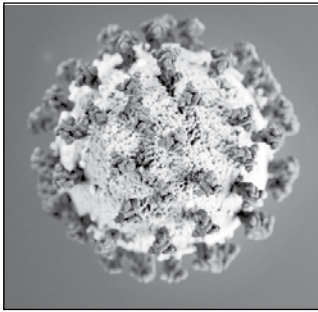
The two largest groups with confirmed cases are the 20-29 year old age group and the 30-39 year old group.

RED LAKE COUNTY Regular Meeting Held June 22, 2020

Pursuant to adjournment of its last meeting the Red Lake County Board of Commissioners held its regular board meeting on June 22, 2020 at 10:00 a.m. All Board Members were present. Chairman Remick called the meeting to order. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Commissioner Simpson moved and seconded by Weiss and carried unanimously to approve the following expenditures for the period:

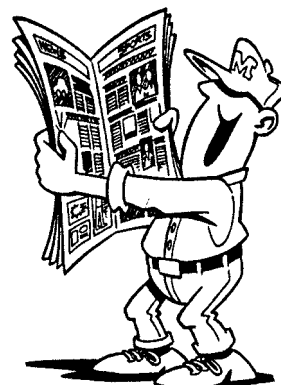

The motion included the following additional bills: \$183.50 Dacotah Paper; \$111.78 Quill; \$2,568.39 Seachange; \$280.60 expenses and \$80.00 per diem John Dudycha; \$3.45 expenses and \$320.00 per diem Al Remick.

The board reviewed a quote from Lenex Sand & Gravel, Inc. of Fosston to remove an underground fuel storage tank located next to the Social Services building. The quote included all costs for tank removal, disposal, permits, soil testing, filling excavated area to grade, and seeding. Commissioner Flage moved, seconded by Simpson and carried unanimously to approve the quote as presented in the amount of \$3,475.00 to Lenex Sand & Gravel, Inc.

Commissioner Flage moved and seconded by Simpson to approve the minutes of the regular board meeting held on June 9, 2020. The motion carried unanimously. Commissioner Weiss moved and seconded by Dudycha to approve the minutes from the County Board of Appeals held June 17, 2020. The motion carried unanimously.

 Dudycha: -Met with the County Engineer regarding the City of Oklee Sidewalk-Lighting Project.

Weiss: -None
 Flage: -Participated in the AMC District 3 teleconference meeting. Topics were elections, finance, and county reports. -Inter County Nursing: several safety protocols in place dealing with Covid-19.

Remick: -Attended meetings of NW Emergency Services, County Personnel, and the NW Mental Health Center. The Center is seeing an increase in mental health issues.

The board discussed a request from County Assessor Michelle Nelson for direction on whether she attend a meeting with her State Supervisors at MN Department of Revenue (DOR) in St. Paul, and if so, would she be required to quarantine for the 14 days before returning to work. A quarantine would leave the Assessor's office closed as Nelson is the only employee. The DOR requires in-person meet & greet meetings with any new County Assessor. Due to Covid-19 the option was also offered for a teleconference meeting but Nelson's supervisors preferred the in-person meeting. Nelson also commented that she felt uncomfortable to attend the in-person meeting due to Covid-19 concerns. The County policy does not specifically address quarantine if an employee traveled to higher risk areas, etc. Board members felt the teleconference option be utilized rather than in-person. Commissioner Simpson moved, seconded by Dudycha to inform the DOR that the County Board will not allow County Assessor Michelle Nelson to attend the in-person meeting session with the DOR, but rather participate utilizing teleconference. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

Sheriff Bernstein reported on the Covid-19 issue. The county has remained stable at 3 positive tests with no additional cases to report. Bernstein also provided an update on staffing in his department.

County Attorney Lacoursiere informed that County Court will now be held every other Wednesday using a 3-judge rotation.

The County Board acknowledged a letter received from the County Recorder of compliance with MN Statutes 357.182 sub.3 thru 7.

Chairman Remick informed that Kurt Casavan is eligible for a step increase. Commissioner Weiss moved, seconded by Flage and carried unanimously to approve a step increase for Environmental Officer Kurt Casavan from a Grade 21-Step 6 (\$34.12 hourly) to Grade 21-Step 7 (\$35.10 hourly).

There being no further business the regular board meeting was adjourned to July 14, 2020 at 10:00 a.m.

Lemon Cream Poppy Seed Delight Carol Bachand

Mix together in bowl:
 2-1/4 cups flour 1 tsp soda
 2 tsp baking powder 1/2 tsp salt

Combine in a large bowl:
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup lemon juice
 1/2 cup oil
 1 Tbsp lemon zest
 4 drops yellow food coloring
 5 egg whites or 3 eggs
 1 - 2 Tbsp poppy seeds
 1 pkg instant Lemon pudding mix
 1 cup sour cream

Mix together for at least 3 minutes. Add to the combined dry ingredients. Stir only until moistened. Batter will be lumpy. Pour into sprayed bundt pan. Bake 40-45 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool and drizzle with icing.

Icing:
 1-1/2 Tbsp lemon juice
 1 cup powdered sugar
 1 - 2 drops yellow food coloring

Add a bit of water if needed

West Nile Virus

West Nile virus (WNV) is the leading cause of mosquito-borne disease in the continental United States. It is most commonly spread to people by the bite of an infected mosquito. Cases of WNV occur during mosquito season, which starts in the summer and continues through fall. There are no vaccines to prevent or medications to treat WNV in people. Fortunately, most people infected with WNV do not feel sick. About 1 in 5 people who are infected develop a fever and other symptoms. About 1 out of 150 infected people develop a serious, sometimes fatal, illness.

Protect yourself and your family from mosquito bites

Use Insect Repellent
Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellents with one of the active ingredients below. When used as directed, EPA-registered insect repellents are proven safe and effective, even for pregnant and breastfeeding women.

DEET
Picaridin
IR3535
Oil of lemon eucalyptus (OLE)
Para-menthane-diol (PMD)
2-undecanone
We do not know the effectiveness of non-EPA registered insect repellents, including some natural repellents. Choosing an EPA-registered repellent ensures the EPA has evaluated the product for effectiveness.

Tips for babies and children

Dress your child in clothing that covers arms and legs.
Cover strollers and baby carriers with mosquito netting.
When using insect repellent on your child:
Always follow label instructions.
Do not use products containing oil of lemon eucalyptus (OLE) or para-menthane-diol (PMD) on children under 3 years old.
Do not apply insect repellent to a child's hands, eyes, mouth, cuts, or irritated skin.
Adults: Spray insect repellent onto your hands and then apply to a child's face.

Tips for Everyone

Always follow the product label instructions.
Reapply insect repellent as directed.
Do not spray repellent on the skin under clothing.
If you are also using sunscreen, apply sunscreen first and insect repellent second.
Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants

Treat clothing and gear

Use permethrin to treat clothing and gear (such as boots, pants, socks, and tents) or buy permethrin-treated clothing and gear. Permethrin is an insecticide that kills or repels mosquitoes. Permethrin-treated clothing provides protection after multiple washings. Read product information to find out how long the protection will last.
Do not use permethrin products directly on skin.

Take steps to control mosquitoes indoors and outdoors

Use screens on windows and doors. Repair holes in screens to keep mosquitoes outdoors.

Use air conditioning, if available.

Stop mosquitoes from laying eggs in or near water. Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out items that hold water, such as tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpots, or trash containers.

One important plan to have in place is what to do if a parent or guardian becomes sick or hospitalized due to the virus. We encourage you to develop a plan for how you, your family, and caregivers will respond to a potential illness or hospitalization. Parenting Tips

Why It Can Be So Hard to Communicate with Teens

Look, defiance and annoying behavior is par for the course when you're parenting teens. I'm not talking about abusive behavior; I mean those little everyday acts of defiance. This is when your child tunes you out, rolls their eyes, and refuses to speak clearly in whole sentences. Do you know why teens do this? They do it because they CAN!

The trick here for parents is not to engage in the battle of inattention. As with any power struggle, the more you try to *make* your teen behave the way you want, the more your child will resist.

1. Keep Your Eyes on the Prize
 2. Don't Take It Personally
 3. Don't Debate Your Rules
- If holding your child accountable routinely devolves into your teen saying "But I didn't hear you!" you could have a brief discussion about paying attention and how she might listen differently next time. Remember, if you keep your cool and stay focused, everything is teachable.

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Signup for the Red Lake County SWCD Cover Crop Incentive Program

Red Lake County SWCD started a Cover Crop Incentive Program in 2019.

The District developed a Cover Crop Incentive Program Policy. The District also submitted a Nonstructural Land Management Practice Implementation Plan to the Board of Water & Soil Resources, which was approved.

The Red Lake County SWCD Cover Crop Incentive Program was created to provide funds for individuals that are interested in using cover crops in their farming operation, and to promote the long-term adoption of cover crops in the farming operation. The purpose of this policy is to provide clear guidelines for the implementation of funds appropriated to Red Lake County SWCD associated with local capacity services grant.

Funds are allocated to Red Lake County SWCD by Board of Soil & Water Resources (BWSR) from the SWCD local capacity grant. The Red Lake County SWCD board sets, through a work plan approved by the BWSR Board Conservationist, the amount from the SWCD local capacity grant that is used for the Cover Crop Incentive Program.

The Red Lake County SWCD Board has established the maximum rate to a land

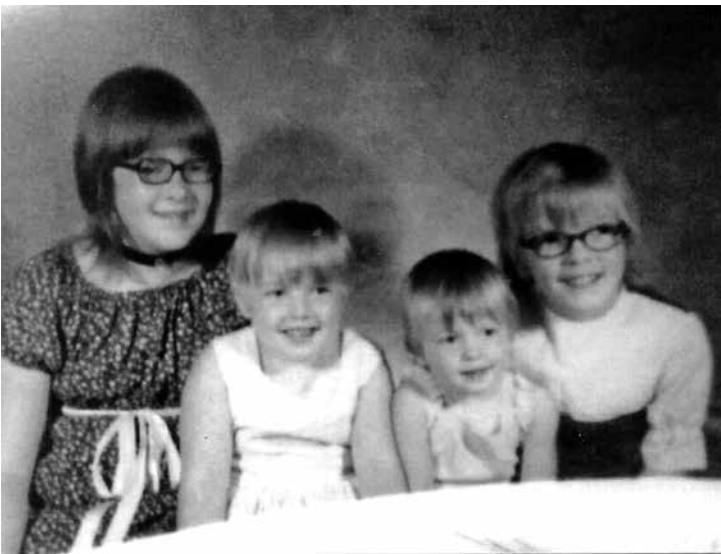
