The news is that there is a buyer, waiting for the powers that be, to approve the sale of D & R Grocery. But as of this printing nothing final has been heard that the sale is complete. So everyone should do what they do, to wish this business to continue with new owners, do a dance, pray, wish upon a star, whatever, send your thought to whatever powers that be, to keep our little store up and running.

It will be a great loss to the City of Oklee if the grocery store does close. We have quite a few people living in town that do not drive so no groceries locally will be a hard change for them. Rick and Debbie Sherman have been an indispensable and beneficial business to the Oklee community, even delivering groceries when needed.

After 35 years in business, Rick and Debbie are looking forward to retiring. And who can blame them, none. They have dedicated 35 years of their life, seven days a week, year after year, good weather and bad, to offer Oklee a great little grocery

store. They have a nice selection of meat and fresh vegetables, in addition to all the other staples we need to feed ourselves and families.

There is going to be a Retirement Party for them on Friday, August 27th at the Oklee Gazebo across the street from D & R Grocery. Everyone is welcome to attend and wish them a happy retirement. D & R Grocery celebrated its 35th anniversary of being

in business on July 1st, 2021.

In the summer of 1986 Rick and Debra Sherman purchased



Dale's Grocery from Dale and Elm Kolseth. They changed the name to D & R Grocery and leased the building from Edith Heden.

One of the first improvements was to convert one of the storage rooms into a study and playroom for their 4 children,

Conway, Nicosia, Ryan and Jesse. D & R Grocery's first two part-time workers were Deb's mom Lorraine Cote and Clara Radniecki. Before you knew

it, Conway and Nicosia were helping with stocking shelves and running the till.

After a few years the building was purchased from Mrs. Heden which included the upstairs apartment and storage shed out back. In 1997 Errol and Geri Rustan agreed to sell Rustan's Grocery to Rick and Deb. This was the original site of the Melby Bros. Store built in 1910.

After 30 days of remodeling D & R Grocery was ready to re-open at it's new location. The original building D & R started in, was sold to Loretta Flatgard and became part of Oklee Quilting.

A full generation has passed now since first turning the key as most customers can testify. With grown children & grandchildren popping in and out of the store at various times, D & R Grocery has truly become an "old-fashioned" mom and pop store.

So many friends, family and employees have helped make D & R Grocery a success over the years.

Red Lake County Commissioners Minutes

RED LAKE COUNTY Regular Meeting Held July 27, 2021

Pursuant to adjournment of its last meeting the Red Lake County Board of Commissioners duly met in regular session at the Courthouse in Red Lake Falls, MN on July 27, 2021 at 10:00 a.m. Chairman Flage called the meeting to order. All Commissioners were present. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

HR Director Lundeen met with the board to review the job description that was compiled for the Extension Office Manager position. Also present was Frankie Latimer the current 4H Program Coordinator. Latimer commented on the various aspects that encompass the description. The board members concurred that the HR Director submit the job description to the compensation consulting firm to complete a rating for the position.

County Engineer Erik met with the County Board seeking approval of a County Resolution to establish an extension of CSAH 5 (old TH 222). The State has provided a notice to Red Lake County that Trunk Highway No. 222 will be transferred to the County effective September 1, 2021 as per the agreement approved by the County Board on January 26, 2021. Hove informed that once the County accepts the new mileage it is then eligible to be placed on the State Aid System as an extension of CSAH 5. And, to establish an extension of CSAH 5 requires an approved Resolution from the County Board. The new segment of road will run from TH 92 to the intersection of CSAH 53 and 1st Avenue in the City of Oklee. The total segment length is approximately 1.4 miles. Commissioner Dudydcha moved, seconded by Remick and carried unanimously to approve Resolution No. 07-01-21 "Establishing an Extension of CSAH No. 5". A complete copy of the document is available at the County Highway Department.

Commissioner Weiss moved and seconded by Gerardy to approve the minutes of the regular board meeting held on July 13, 2021. The motion carried unanimously.

Commissioner Dudydcha moved, seconded by Weiss and carried unanimously to approve the following expenditures for the period:

Flage: -County Economic Development; met with Norman County regarding the Social Services joint agreement, and a Inter County Nursing Service meeting.

Myron Jesme, Red Lake Watershed District Administrator and County Representative Al Page met with the board to present the 2020 annual report of the district. Jesme reviewed a list of projects that were completed the past year and of any new construction projects. Jesme informed that there has been \$18 million of construction activity in the past 2-years, the most during his tenure as administrator.

Al Page representing the Huot Park Board provided an update on the construction process involved to install the historical sign at the Old Treaty Crossing at the park. The sign is scheduled to arrive and be installed during the second week of August.

Auditor Schmitz informed that County Social Services has had discussion with the county's independent auditing firm on setting aside some of the Social Services Fund Balance in the county's financial records. Commissioner Weiss moved, seconded by Dudydcha and carried unanimously to Commit \$500,000.00 of the Social Service Fund Balance for "New Programming".

The board acknowledged the 2020 Annual Tax Increment Financing and Disclosure Report for the City of Oklee.

Notice of Sale of Tax Forfeited Lands

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on Friday the 27th day of August, 2021 at 10:00 a.m. at the Red Lake County Courthouse in Red Lake Falls, MN, I shall sell to the highest bidder those parcels of land described in the list contained herein, which have been classified as non-conservation lands and appraised as provided by law. This sale will be governed by the provisions of Section 282.01 of Minnesota Statutes and by the resolution of the Red Lake County Board of Commissioners authorizing such sale, which resolution reads as follows:

“BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that the parcels of land forfeited to the State of Minnesota for nonpayment of taxes, appearing on the list filed with the County Auditor, which have been classified and appraised as provided by Minnesota Laws, 1935, Chapter 386, as amended, shall be offered for sale by the Red Lake County Auditor, said sale to commence at 10:00 a.m. on the 27th day of August, 2021 as provided by law.”

“BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the terms of the sale shall be for **CASH ONLY.**”

In addition to the sale amount, 3% of the sale price shall be added pursuant to Minnesota Statutes 292.28, Minnesota Title Assurance Fund. Also, a \$25.00 fee shall be paid at the time of the purchase to cover the cost of the state deed, pursuant to M.S.A. 282.014. A recording fee of \$46.00 per deed shall also be collected and retained for the recording of the state deed before it can be presented to the purchaser, M.S.A. 282.301. Deed tax based on the amount of sale shall also be paid at the time of sale.

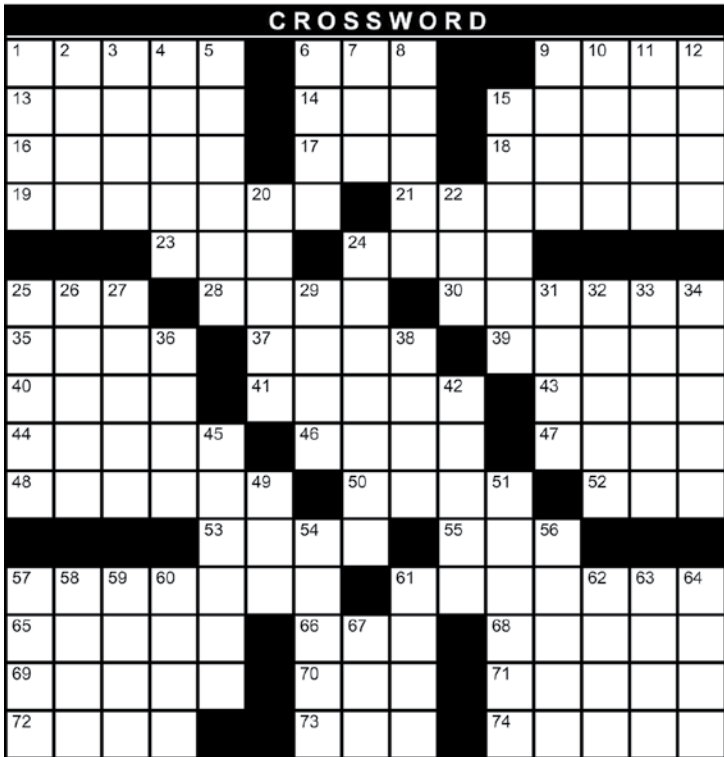

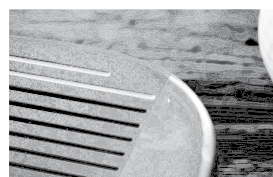

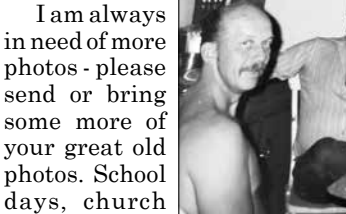
