Angel Pie Jeanie O'Neill

4 egg whites
1/2 tsp cream of tartar
1 cup sugar

Beat egg whites until foamy. Add cream of tartar and sugar and beat until mixture forms very stiff peaks. Spread in a buttered pie pan and bake 50 minutes at 300 degrees. Cool.

Filling:
4 egg yolks
2 tsp grated lemon rind
1 cup of cream, whipped
3 Tbsp lemon juice
1/2 cup sugar

Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored (this is very important). Beat in sugar gradually. Add lemon juice and rind. Cook in a double boiler or microwave until thick. Watch custard closely so it doesn't cook too long. Cool. Fold in whipped cream and pour into cooled shell and cool overnight. **Don't let custard cool too long before adding cream or it may become lumpy.
