Small Grains Disease and Pest Update

This past week's hot and humid weather continues to be forecasted for the next five to seven days. Both the National FHB Risk model as well as the NDSU Small Grain Disease Forecasting Model are, and will likely continue, to indicate moderate to high risk for for spring wheat varieties that are rated as very susceptible and susceptible to Fusarium head blight varieties and moderate risk for the spring wheat varieties that are rated as moderately susceptible and moderately resistant across Minnesota and eastern North Dakota.

Meanwhile, there are a few confirmed reports of leaf rust in wheat and crown rust in oats. I suspect that most oat cares are past the window of a fungicide application. If, however, you find your combine turn

an orange/brown color during harvest a fungicide would have been an input with a high return in investment. And while hindsight might be the rear end of a cow, remember it for next year's oat crop.

Bacterial leaf streak (BLS) is starting to show in barley and wheat. The easiest way to confirm BLS is to look for the disease when there is still dew on the leaves. If you suspect BLS lesions, simply out your finger behind the leaf and pull the leaf over your finger BLS lesions will almost be transparent and you can see your finger through the leaf tissue. Understand that fungicides do not control BLS and that you can find BLS in field treated with a fungicide.

Finally, a fourth flight if armyworm into NW Minnesota was reported by Dave Grafstrom at the Magnusson Research Farm near Roseau. With the recent storms there is now plenty of lodged grain that would be

very attractive to armyworms. If you see feeding on leaves, check not just for grasshoppers

and armyworms, especially in those areas that have lodged.

Wild Rice Casserole Linda Whalen

My mother, Norma Champagne gave me this recipe. When we have guests from overseas Tim takes them to see the rice paddies northeast of Oklee while I prepare this casserole. We usually send a bag of wild rice home with them as a gift. When our girls come home from Denmark, this meal is a must.



1 cup wild rice
1/4 cup butter
1 lb hamburger
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 can mushroom soup
1 can cream of chicken soup

Soak rice overnight, changing water often. Boil rice and 1/4 cup butter, add water as needed, about 40 minutes. Brown hamburger together with celery and onion. Stir together cooked rice, hamburger mixture and soups. Bake in a covered casserole for 1 hour at 350 degrees. Add a little milk if dry.

RED LAKE COUNTY Regular Meeting Held June 28, 2022

Pursuant to adjournment of its last meeting the Red Lake County Board of Commissioners duly met in regular session at the Courthouse in Red Lake Falls, MN on June 28, 2022 at 10:00 a.m. Chair Weiss called the meeting to order. All members were present. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Commissioner Flage moved, seconded by Dudycha and carried unanimously to approve the agenda. Janelle Wald, Executive Director of NW Private Industry Council was present to discuss the JPA (Joint Powers Agreement) for the NW Workforce Service Area. Wald commented that the JPA is an important governance document that allows for funding to offer job training, help displaced workers find jobs, and assist individuals in career changes. The JPA covers a 7-county area and must be updated every two years. Commissioner Flage moved, seconded by Dudycha and carried by unanimous vote to approve the JPA as presented. The Board Chair and Auditor signed the document.

Commissioner Dudycha provided comment regarding services available to Veterans through the local Social Service agencies and Veterans Service Officers in each county. Dudycha also reported on his concerns with the care of some animals at the local County Fair.

Commissioner Gerardy moved, seconded by Remick and carried unanimously to approve minutes from the May 24, 2022 regular meeting and minutes of the June 22, 2022 Board of Appeal and Equalization.

Commissioner Remick moved, seconded by Gerardy and carried unanimously to approve the following expenditures for the period:

Flage: Inter-County Nursing-discussion on forming a committee to administer funding received from the National Opioid Settlement, and that COVID vaccine shots are still being issued.

Gerardy: Highway Department Road Committee and AMC District 3 meeting in Lake Bronson.

Remick: Red Lake County Affordable Housing meeting, and AMC District 3 meeting.

Weiss: Highway Department Road Committee meeting.

Commissioner Remick informed that the Mn Department of Health tested the well at the upper park area at Huot Park and it has tested positive for coliform bacteria for the second consecutive year. Two consecutive years with a coliform positive will trigger a well to be placed on monthly monitoring for the park to remain open. A County Park Board member told Remick that there appears to be a crack in the well casing allowing water to pour out when being pumped. Options were discussed but significant cost is involved. Commissioners agreed that since there is a second well available at the park that the upper park well be taken out of use. The Park Committee will be instructed to remove the pump so visitors cannot use.

Commissioner Flage moved, seconded by Dudycha and carried unanimously to approve Mortgage Satisfaction Document No.125218 for Dean Hesse regarding a NW Mn Multi-County HRA loan through the county.

The County Board acknowledged a letter from the Mn Board of Peace Officer Training informing that the Red Lake County Sheriff Department passed a comprehensive review of records concerning legislative mandated training and department policies.

There being no further business the regular board meeting adjourned to July 12, 2022 at 10:00 a.m.

I think the few wild cats that

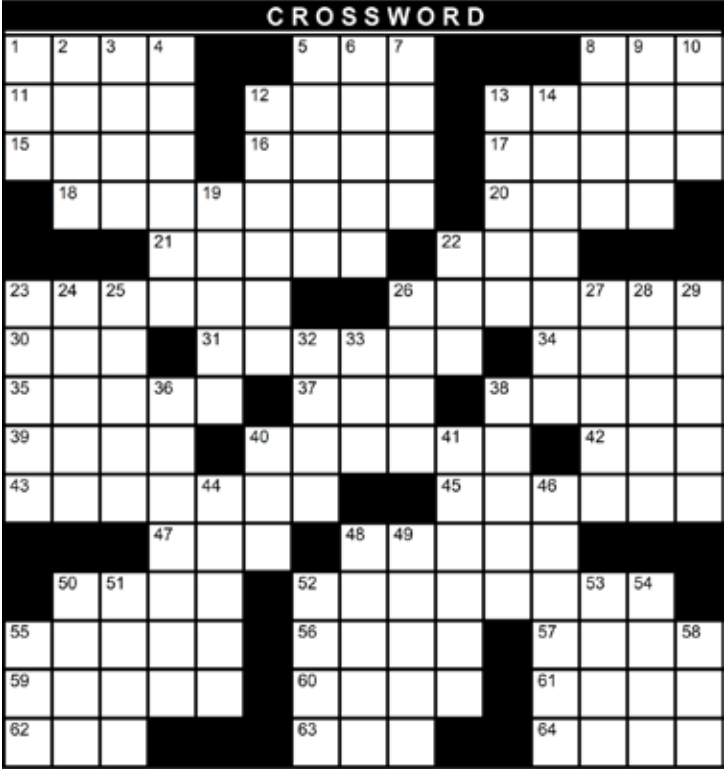
we feed are telling all animals that we are easy targets. HaHa.

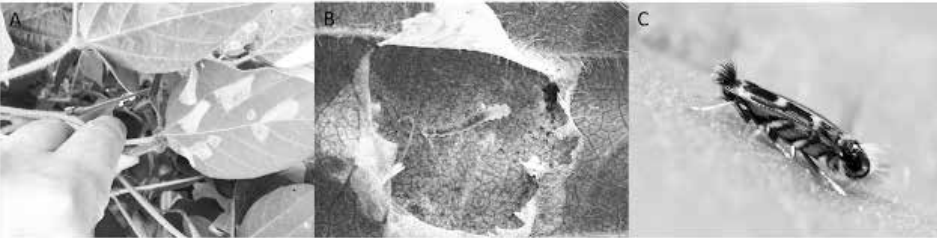
Keep an eye out for a potential new soybean pest: a small leaf-mining caterpillar

A leaf-mining caterpillar called the hog-peanut leaf miner (Macrosaccus morrisella), was found for the first time infesting soybean fields in Minnesota in Saint Paul and Rosemount in 2021. Over the last couple weeks this year, we have found this insect again in Rosemount and also Morris, MN. This is a small insect, with the larvae reaching only 4.7 mm in length and the adults reaching about 6-7 mm in length. The hog-peanut leaf minder is a native species previously known to feed on two native plants called American hog peanut and slickseed fuzzybean. In soybean, injury

from this insect can be easily detected on the lower surface of the leaves as white-colored blotch-type leaf mines.

In a recent paper in the Journal of Integrated Pest Man-

feeding by this new leaf miner was less severe than in Québec, where infestations had more than 10 mines on individual leaflets.

The feeding injury (mines) from the hog-peanut leaf miner could be confused with mines

mines are often white on the underside of the leaves. On the upper surface of the leaves, the mines may be unnoticeable or be slightly raised and with numerous small light-colored spots. In contrast, mines caused by beetles, like the soybean leafminer, are brown-colored blister-like mines that expand crossing larger leaf veins.

The actual impact of the hog-peanut leaf miner to soybean production remains unknown. Further research is needed to assess the potential impacts to soybean yield, how widespread infestations in soybean occur, and the general biology of the insect in the crop. To perform such research, we will need to find fields with infestations. Please contact us (koch0125@umn.edu) if you suspect an infestation by the hog-peanut leaf miner in soybean this summer.
