Black Friday Shopping doesn't have to take over Thanksgiving celebrations

With ads for discounts on items ranging from air pods to cars already filling our mailboxes and TV screens, shoppers might wonder if Black Friday, the traditional kick off to the holiday shopping season, is still the best time to grab the best deals.

But while sales kicked off as far back as early October, the week culminating with Black Friday is still prime time for the deepest discounts, retail watchers say.

Target began offering week long Black Friday deals, as well as daily discounts on particular items, weeks before Halloween. Walmart and other retailers are also already offering bargains. **Is Black Friday still a one day event?**

No, Black Friday, the shopping bonanza that officially occurs the day after Thanksgiving, has been a days-long event for several years as retailers try to maximize buzz and shopping traffic.

Are items cheaper on Black Friday?

The week leading into Black Friday and the tech focused deal day of Cyber Monday, are still

likely your best bet to find the deepest discounts, experts say.

What items are worth buying on Black Friday?

Whether you're wanting some new headphones, or a mega sized TV, Black Friday is the sweet spot for the best bargains.

The hottest gifts this year: It's time to start holiday shopping—these are the products likely to sell out this year

Holiday shopping and inflation: The best holiday shopping gift? Inflation relief. Why you may get it — and deep discounts.

Electronics in general, especially smaller consumer electronics like headphones, earbuds go really low on Black Friday, with consumers seeing some of the lowest prices of the year.

Also look for great prices and even package deals on smart home products like speakers, thermostats, and doorbells. TVs will also likely be a good buy, but instead of going for the biggest doorbuster, be on the lookout for sales that offer a higher quality TV for perhaps a few dollars more.

Last year's hottest toys might prove to be a money saver this holiday season.

Toy shipments delayed by supply chain bottlenecks during the height of the pandemic, now need to be moved off shelves to make way for new merchandise, so things that were really tough to get in 2021, might see clearance promotions to clear that inventory out.

How should you shop Black Friday?

Check out ads and start making your list.

Right now, shoppers should start looking at retailers' official Black Friday ads which are dropping now. This tells you the deals you're going to see for Black Friday, so you can compare deals ahead of time and make your game plan.

There are also ways to save a few extra dollars on top of the main discount by looking for special promo codes and additional savings offers in retailers' Black Friday ads as well as on their websites.

For example, Kohl's offers extra Kohl's Cash on specific products during its Black Friday sale. If you can make



a point to spend that Kohl's Cash, those offers might make their prices 'better' than other retailers.

If the price drops, can you get money back?

Probably not. While most retailers have policies where they'll match the cheaper price of a product you've already bought, they typically won't do that for items bought during a Black Friday sale because prices are already so low.

Check out smaller, local retailers for deals

Even before Black Friday, consider checking out local businesses.

Big box retailers aren't the only place you can get great toys and gifts. Your local stores are a great way to beat the crowds.

In addition to supporting your local community, you can get a more personalized experience.

And even if they don't have a specific Black Friday sale, the sales person may give you a head's up about a price

markdown coming later in the holiday season.

Set in-stock alerts

When there's a gadget, toy or accessory that you've just got to have, consider signing up for a retailer's in-stock alerts. That way you'll get a message when the item is available.

But when you get the notification, act fast. Supplies of popular items will go quickly, and you may need to try more than once to nab what you want.

Get the facts about the cold and flu

The common cold and influenza are two contagious viruses that many people may be all too aware of. Although colds and flu can be contracted any time of the year, winter tends to be a prime time for cold and flu outbreaks, as more time spent indoors in close proximity to others provides an easy way for viruses to pass from one person to another.

Despite how common these illnesses can be, there seems to be no shortage of misinformation concerning prevention and treatment of the viruses. Those who think they know all about a cold or the flu can still benefit from a refresher course, which may even debunk some prevailing myths about both ailments.

Cold

Colds are relatively minor infections of the throat and nose that are caused by more than 200 different viruses. Rhinovirus is the most common cause, which accounts for between 10 and 40 percent of infections, advises the American Lung Association. Adults get an average of two to four colds per year, while children suffer six to eight colds annually. In fact, in the United States, colds account for more visits to the doctor than any other condition, says the ALA.

The Cleveland Clinic states colds are contracted from inhalation of microscopic particles in the air or from contact with contaminated surfaces. Symptoms can include runny nose, sneezing and nasal congestion, often with sore throat, mild cough, mild aches/fatigue, and fever in youngsters.

Influenza

The flu is a contagious re-

spiratory illness that is caused by the influenza virus. It infects the throat, nose and sometimes the lungs, advises the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Like colds, the flu also can be spread through tiny droplets made when infected individuals cough, sneeze or talk, or by touching infected surfaces.

One common misconception about the flu is that it can be contracted from the flu vaccine. This is not true. Harvard Medical School says the flu shot is made from an inactivated virus that can't transmit infection. People who get sick after receiving a flu vaccination were going to get sick anyway, as it takes a week or two to get protection from the vaccine. Many people assume that because they became sick after getting the vaccine, the flu shot caused their illness.

Even though the flu and colds share some symptoms, such as runny nose, sneezing, hoarseness, and cough, the flu is not just a bad cold. While very few people have landed in the hospital with a cold, the flu can be so severe as to require hospitalization.

Steering clear of people who are sick, frequently washing hands, sterilizing common surfaces, and getting the flu shot are ways to prevent illness. Antibiotics are not effective against the cold and flu, and antiviral medication can lessen the effects and shorten the duration of flu but may not be able to prevent it.

The ALA notes that herbal and mineral products have received a lot of publicity as cold and flu remedies, but insists that such claims are not solidly supported by science. If symptoms do not abate, see a doctor.

• Stay on designated roads. Avoid short cuts off main highways, as they may not be plowed or patrolled.

• Before leaving town, fill your gas tank. While traveling, stop frequently to refill your tank.

• Assemble an emergency kit and keep it in the vehicle throughout the season.

• Keep essential items in the car. Include:

- o Boots, coat, gloves
- o Blankets
- o Flashlight and batteries
- o Maps (even if you have GPS)
- o Cell phone with charger
- o Shovel
- o Windshield scraper

- o Booster cables
- o Reflector or bright cloth to use as a distress signal

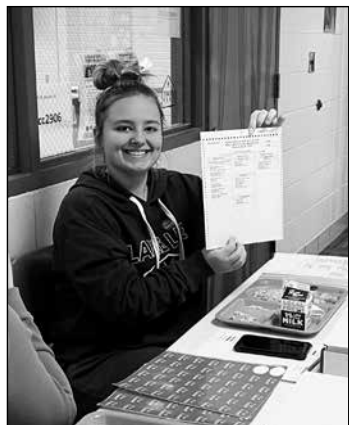

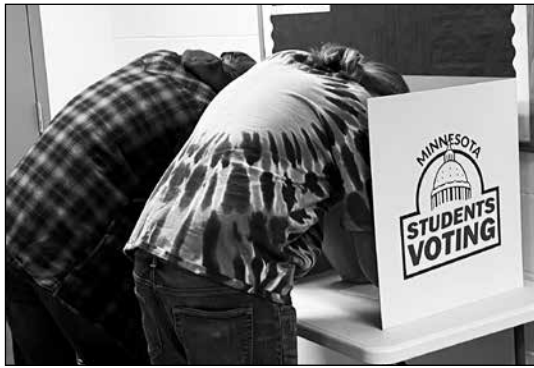

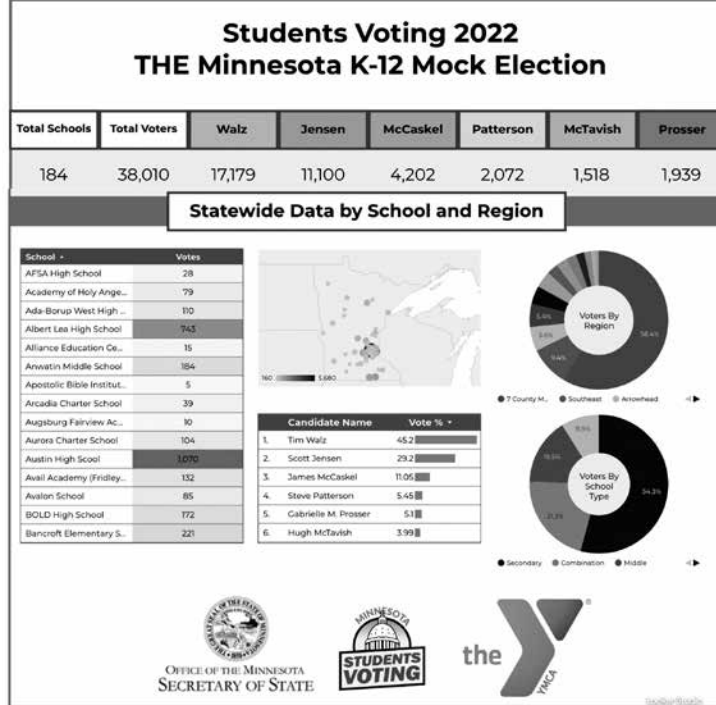

2 unique ways to cook a Thanksgiving turkey

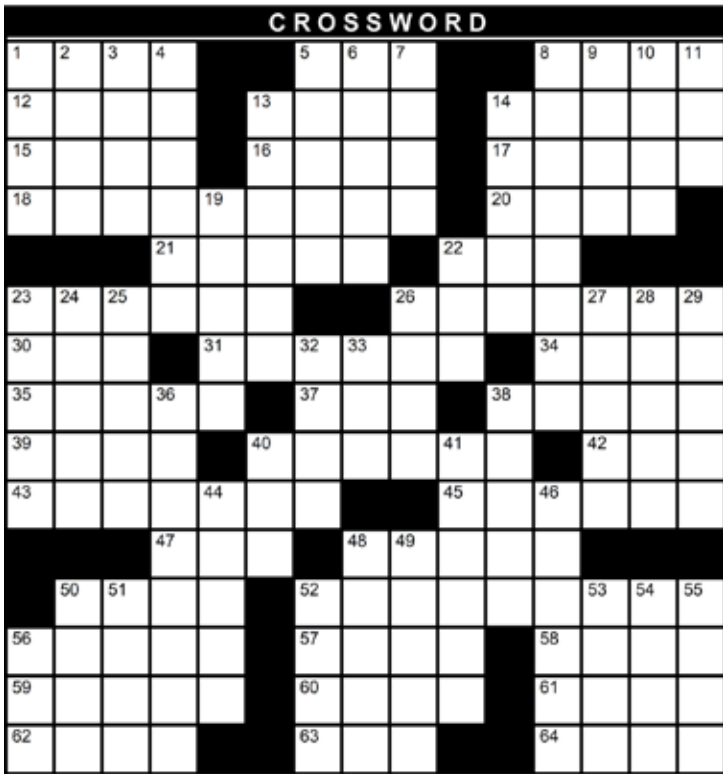

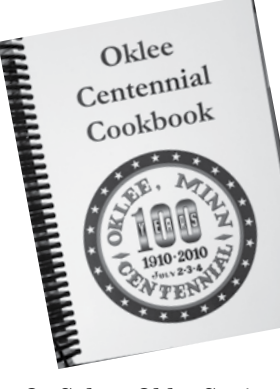
