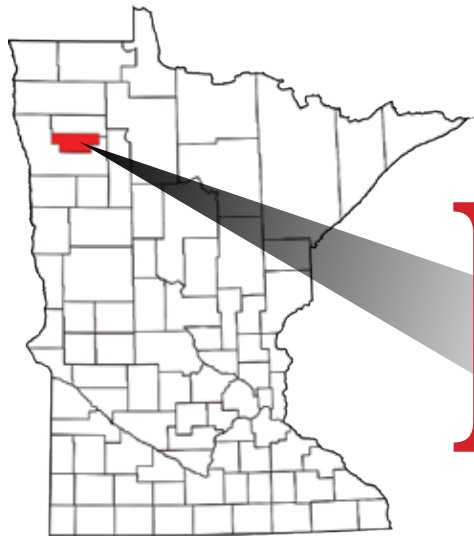

The green flag waves this weekend for the Goodridge-Grygla 500

On every terrain racer's bucket list, the I-500 is an iconic race that even trail riders often dream of completing. Sled reliability and durability has to do a lot with this race as the high speeds for 500 miles can put a lifetime of wear and tear on any snowmobile. For 95% of all entrants, it's about finishing the race not just winning it.

Especially in the earlier years of the I-500 when race sleds were separated from a really good consumer trail sled with some reinforcements and shock packages. The I-500 is the only race over 500 miles that racers are not racing as a team of two sleds or a few racers sharing the work load on one sled. The original I-500 three-day race had racers start in Winnipeg, Manitoba and finishing in St. Paul, Minnesota. It has gone through a few changes over the years but it is still a race that is demanding and riders always trying to stay focused as the miles roll down to the days end. Today's version of the I-500 is the Goodridge-Grygla 500, which takes place over two days covering 500 miles filled with the same treacherously rough ditches, deep holes, rivers, woods and fields. The 500 continues to thrive in huge part to the support of former racers, club members, and enthusiasts from the area snowmobile clubs.

Go time is set for 9am this Saturday and Sunday morning in Goodridge for the anticipated Goodridge-Grygla 500 snowmobile race! As of press time, the official race maps hadn't been approved yet, but please make note that the routes are similar to last year, but with one big change: The TRF loop will be taking place on SATURDAY with the Grygla loop happening on SUNDAY due to the Knights of Columbus Fishing Derby in TRF on Sunday. Maps will be shared on the Goodridge-Grygla 500 Facebook page mid-week!

Racers will put on 250 miles each day, Saturday and Sunday, February 11th & 12th, for a total of 500 miles. The staging area and starting point will be in Goodridge again, which is where a lot of action will be taking place over the entire weekend, starting Friday evening.

Volunteers from both the Goodridge and Grygla communities have been busy with meetings and planning, along with crews signing and running the track over the weekend, making sure everything is ready to go.

The race being broadcasted on 94.1 "The Falls" like previous years. Baker Street will

be doing all the food over the weekend, starting Friday the 10th, and running through Sunday the 12th. The Goodridge Municipal Liquor Store will also have a bar set up on site.

KC Pro West will be racing the mini 500 in Goodridge that weekend also. They are included each day and will have awards in the evening; lots of kids will be racing in that this year.

Red Lake County Commissioner's Minutes

The Board of Commissioners of Red Lake County, Minnesota met in the Courthouse in the City of Red Lake Falls, Minnesota on Tuesday, January 3, 2023 at 10:00 a.m.

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by Board Chair Commissioner Ron Weiss. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Commissioners present were Chuck Flage, Tony Gerardy, Allen Remick and Ron Weiss. Others present were Mitch Bernstein, Kurt Casavan, Michael LaCoursiere, Nick Knott, Angela Lundeen, and Joyce Paquin.

SWEARING IN CEREMONY

Deputy Court Administrator Melissa Sletten administered the Oath of Office to the following re-elected county officials: Commissioners Anthony (Chuck) Flage (District 1), Allen Remick (District 4), Sheriff Mitch Bernstein, Attorney Michael Lacoursiere, Treasurer Nick Knott, Joyce Paquin appointed Recorder and Kelsey Gervais appointed Auditor.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Board Chair Weiss turned the meeting over to Auditor Gervais, who then called for nominations for Chair of the Red Lake County Board for 2023. Commissioner Gerardy nominated Commissioner Remick as Chair, seconded by Commissioner Flage, and carried unanimously. Auditor Gervais called for further nominations three times, and there were none. A motion to cease nominations and cast a unanimous ballot for Commissioner Gerardy to serve as the 2023 Board Chair was made by Commissioner Gerardy, seconded by Flage, and carried unanimously. Auditor Gervais then turned the meeting over to Chair Remick. Board Chair Remick called for nominations for Vice-Chair. A motion to nominate Commissioner Gerardy as Vice-Chair was made by Commissioner Flage seconded by Commissioner Weiss, and carried unanimously. Board Chair Remick called for further nominations three times, and there were none. A motion to cease nominations and cast a unanimous ballot for Commissioner Gerardy to serve as the 2023 Board Vice-Chair was made by Commissioner Flage, seconded by Commissioner Weiss, and carried unanimously.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

A motion to approve the agenda was made by Commissioner Gerardy, seconded by Commissioner Flage, and carried unanimously.

COMMENTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Environmental Officer Kurt Casavan met with the board to request approval for the purchase of an Elkay water fountain for the court house using score funding. Casavan received a bid from St. Hilaire Supply Co of \$1,850.21. Commissioner Weiss moved, second by Gerardy to approve the purchase of the water fountain. Casavan also had a bid from Wilcox Plumbing and Heating and a quote from Kruchowski Plumbing for the installation of the water fountain. After conversations with the board Kruchowski was

chosen to install the fountain with the lower quote.

MEETING DATES

Commissioner Gerardy moved, seconded by Flage and duly adopted to establish the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 10:00 am. as the 2023 regular board meeting dates and times with the exception of Tuesday, January 10th as the board concurred to cancel. The next regular meeting will be held on Tuesday, January 24, 2023.

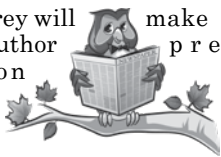


Pictured above: Ciara Mitzner received a ribbon for her humor piece at the DGF speech meet. Ciara is a senior at RLCC.

Combine mashed potatoes, butter, sugar, milk, salt & lemon rind. Scoop out about 1/4 cup. Place marshmallow in center and mold into center with additional potato while shaping into balls. Roll in cornflakes. Place in buttered baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees for about 10 minutes. Serves 8.
