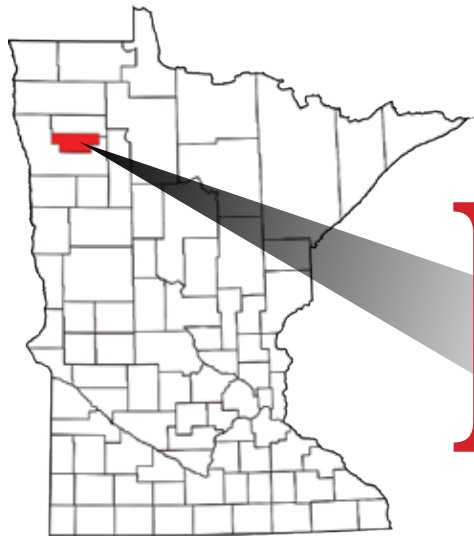

Bakke is Quadruple Gold Medalist

Lincoln High School senior Brookie Bakke, daughter of Joanie Bakke and the late Dennis Bakke, recently passed her Senior Free Skate Test to become a four time US Figure Skating Gold Medalist. These national tests are the highest test level a US figure skater can achieve.

Bakke is coached by Lisa Semanko and previously earned

Gold Medalist status by passing her Gold Dances, Senior Moves in the Field, and Senior Solo Free Dance.

Bakke is one of nine Thief River Falls Skating Club figure skaters in the history of the club to achieve US Figure Skating gold medalist status and joins only one other skater (collegiate club member Abigail Semanko) in achieving Quadruple Gold

Medalist standing.

Additionally, there are four single gold medalists (including teammate Natalie Novak); two double gold medalists, and one triple gold medalist (collegiate club member Emma Christianson).

Brookie Bakke is the granddaughter of Jeanie O'Neill of Oklee.

Damon Ferguson Appears in his 4th State Wrestling Tournament

Damon Ferguson, senior at Red Lake County Central and member of the Prowler Wrestling team earned his third trip to the Minnesota State Tournament in individual competition March 2 - 4 at the Excel Energy Center.

Last year, Damon went to State with his team, the Thief River Falls Prowlers for the first time in Team State Compe-

tition. Damon competes in the 170 lb weight class. He says it was a fun experience being able to bond with his teammates and wrestle down there, and it is something that he will never forget. Of course years of practice helped him prepare, but he also emphasized the importance of getting mentally prepared for every match. Some goals Damon achieved

this season were breaking the single-season win record. He nearly set another, but came up one win short for the all-time win record. One of his most memorable/biggest highlights was getting 5th at state as a team and him getting his 100th win. Damon Ferguson is the son of Troy and Nicole Fergeson.

Funding for K-12 Classrooms available for Local Teachers

Western Governors University Issues Call for K-12 Teachers to Apply for Grant Funding through "Fund My Classroom" Initiative.

K-12 teachers in Minnesota are encouraged to nominate their classroom projects for funding consideration by April 14; selected projects will be awarded during Teacher Appreciation Week in May.

To show appreciation for teachers across Minnesota, Western Governors University (WGU) today launched its "Fund My Classroom" initiative, issuing a call for K-12 teachers across the state to nominate their proposed classroom projects for the opportunity to receive full or partial funding. The fully online, non-profit university is pledging up to \$100,000 in grant money across Minnesota and three other Midwestern states for K-12 teachers who have innovative ideas that will further engage their students but need funding to help bring these ideas to life. Teachers can submit their proposed projects online at wgu.edu/fundmyclassroom through

April 14. Selected classroom projects will be announced during Teacher Appreciation Week, which runs May 8-12.

K-12 educators can request funding for any type of innovative classroom project they believe would provide an enriching classroom experience for their students – from books, supplies and equipment or technology, to classroom experiences and field trips. To be considered, proposed projects must include a description detailing how much funding is needed and how the proposed project will benefit students. Both public and private school teachers are encouraged to submit applications. Teachers do not have to be WGU students or alumni to apply.

"When it comes to expanding classroom curriculum and employing state-of-the-art techniques to engage and challenge students, K-12 teachers are often limited by the costs associated with providing impactful educational learning," said Dr. Terrance Hopson, Regional Vice President of Western Governors University. "That's why we

are proud to offer 'Fund My Classroom' as a way to help make a difference in classrooms across Minnesota and show appreciation for our teachers, who work tirelessly to educate young minds. We hope to be able to fund dozens of innovative projects that will play a role in setting up our children for success later in life."

This is the fifth consecutive year WGU is making the "Fund My Classroom" initiative available for teachers in the Midwest, but it is the first year the grant initiative has been extended to Minnesota. The program began in Missouri in 2019 and expanded in 2021 to include Illinois and Kansas. Last year, the university awarded more than \$58,000 in grant funding toward 85 classroom projects across the three states.

Anyone interested in nominating themselves, colleagues, family or friends can fill out the short application available at wgu.edu/fundmyclassroom. Nominees must reside in Minnesota, Illinois, Missouri or Kansas.

Celebrate newspapers and their efforts to record local history during Sunshine Week

Sandy Robinson and Ben Carlson were part of news reports in Minnesota's newspapers. Neither one was probably aware of the attention created by the event.

The names are fictitious, but the news – birth announcements – is regularly recorded in community newspapers. We expect to see more of Sandy and Ben in the coming years. Likewise, we hope the local newspapers become a part of their daily routines.

Newspapers pride themselves as recorders of local history. I encourage all Minnesotans to join in celebrating their local newspapers during Sunshine Week, March 12-18. At its foundation, the week underscores the importance of the free flow of information for an open, effective and accountable government. The press invests immense resources to ensure the public has a close-up view.

Strike up a conversation about press rights, and many individuals likely conjure editors and reporters demanding access to top-secret data from government officials. No doubt, that occurs more often than most people would like to believe.

Shedding light on information, however, is much broader than probing into government workings. Newspapers regularly strive to provide stories that people should read and like to read.

Readers may view many reports as routine, but chronicling the lives of Sandy and Ben often represents years-long initiatives to gain access to information. The items often find a spot on refrigerators or a permanent place in family scrapbooks.

The news may range from publishing vital statistics to capturing photos of winning scores to detailing presentations before a school board or

city council. The opportunity for anyone to collect a variety of data or enjoy ringside seats to many events is not happenstance. The press has a storied history of working to shed light on all aspects of everyday life.

Sandy and Ben's births will remain part of local history. Newspapers take pride in helping families spread news of special events in their lives.

As noted, we expect to be seeing a lot more of Sandy and Ben. The two are certain to be sharing many special moments as they grow up, and among them will be a neighborhood party or two. It's an opportunity for families to share a photo on many a newspaper's neighborhood section, website photo gallery, Facebook page and other social media avenues.

I predict Sandy and Ben will make names for themselves in a variety of youth clubs and leagues – maybe a pinewood derby or a YMCA sports championship. The achievements will be recognized.

Accomplishments will likely continue through high school extracurricular activities. They will understand the importance of academics and wind up on the honor roll, too. The benchmarks will be shared with their names in the newspaper. School days will pass quickly, and they be recognized with photos in graduation editions.

That covers the first 18 years of their lives. The relationship with their hometown papers is likely to continue including announcements of where they decide to continue their education and accompanying scholarships. It's a good bet more stories will be generated about their experiences and subsequent careers.

I expect Sandy and Ben may someday decide to start their own families. Where their newspapers once proclaimed the birth announcements, the

news pages will announce engagements and acknowledge weddings. The photos will be wonderful additions to family scrapbooks. An active citizenry is the lifeblood of so many communities. More than likely, Sandy and Ben will not sit idly. They will want to return some favors to the communities that gave so much to them.

Their names will be in the news some more – an officer in a civic organization, a youth leader at church, a volunteer at school. They might even start their own businesses, which will be recognized as well.

Then the families, along with older brothers and sisters, will be planning a special anniversary celebration for their parents. Once again, the event will make the paper.

Individuals are the essence of community newspapers. After all, people make the news. Today's media landscape is more fractured than ever, underscoring the value of community newspapers in providing a living history of our hometowns. Many stories are easily gathered; others are more challenging. They all represent the expense of time and resources by newspaper staffs.

During Sunshine Week, we pay tribute to the millions of readers who invite newspapers into their homes each day. I speak firsthand from many years sitting behind the editor's desk. We enjoy the relationships we've made, and we hope our readers do, too.

Red Lake County Rebels ended their 2022-2023 season in a heartbreaking loss on March 9, 2023, when they played the Goodridge/Grygla/Gatzke Chargers at the University of Minnesota, Crookston. The Rebels started the first quarter slowly but quickly caught up to the Chargers and were neck and neck at the first buzzer with a score of 24-25 with the Chargers in the lead. The second half started with solid action, with the Rebels and Chargers taking turns in the lead; however, in the game's last minutes, the Chargers outscored the Rebels with a

final score of 57-70. The Rebels had impressive statistics at the end of the game, with Gerald Melin leading with 22 points. Senior Chase Nelson picked up 13 points, 3 offensive rebounds, 2 rebounds, and 1 assist. Owen Chervestad had 10 points, 1 offensive rebound, 3 defensive rebounds, and 10 assists. John Powers had 6 points, 3 defensive rebounds, and 1 assist. Isaiah Philion picked a nice three-pointer. Will Gieseke scored 3 points, 5 defensive rebounds, and 3 assists.

Leading the Chargers with points was Blake Rychlock

with 26 points, 2 offensive rebounds, and 11 defensive rebounds. Rychlock would score his 1000th point in this game. Lewis Joans scored 19 points and had 1 offensive rebound, 3 defensive rebounds, and 5 assists. The #5 seed Chargers advanced to take on the #1 seed Sacred Heart Eagles at the Ralph Engelstad Arena on Monday, March 13th, in Thief River Falls.

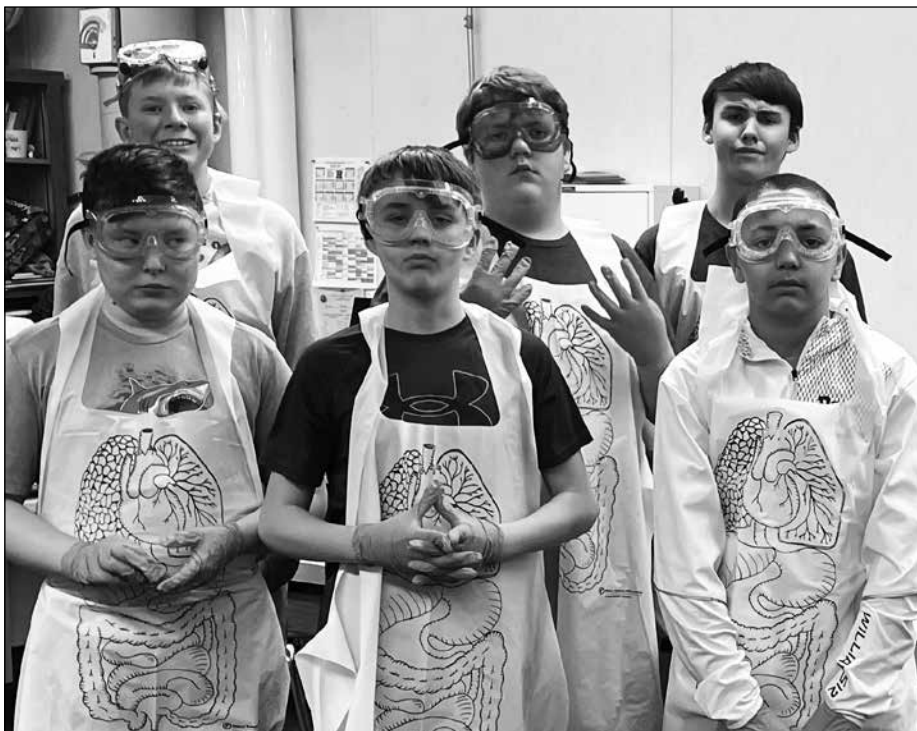

RLCC Seventh Grade Science Class Conducts an Eggcellent Experiment

Enbridge Energy is fined for Construction stormwater. The MPCA investigation found that Enbridge Energy violated a series of regulations and requirements during construction of the Line 3 pipeline replacement including discharging construction stormwater into wetlands and inadvertently releasing drilling mud into surface waters at 12 locations between June 8, 2021, and Aug. 5, 2021.

They are fined in the amount of \$5.02 million (includes \$2.625 million toward environmental projects).

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Public Health Points for March

Improving Oral Hygiene can Prevent Hospital Acquired Pneumonia

Hospital patients not getting their teeth brushed, or not brushing their teeth themselves, is believed to be a leading cause of hundreds of thousands of cases of pneumonia a year in patients who have not been put on a ventilator. Pneumonia is caused by germs that trigger an infection in a patient's lungs. Non-ventilator hospital-acquired pneumonia (NVHAP), a risk for virtually all hospital patients, is often caused by bacteria from the mouth that gathers in the scummy biofilm on unbrushed teeth and is aspirated into the lungs. Patients face a higher risk if they lie flat or remain immobile for long periods, so NVHAP can also be prevented by elevating their heads and getting them out of bed more often.

According to the National Organization for NV-HAP Prevention, which was founded in 2020, this pneumonia infects about 1 in every 100 hospital patients and kills 15% to 30% of them.

Cytomegalovirus (CMV) and Congenital CMV

Minnesota is the 1st state to add this testing to the newborn screening.

What is CMV?
Cytomegalovirus (CMV) is a common virus. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), in the US nearly 1 in 3 children have been infected with CMV by age 5, and over half of adults have been infected with CMV by age 40. Once CMV is in a person's body, it stays there for life and can reactivate.

CMV is usually harmless and doesn't cause symptoms

in healthy people. However, if you are pregnant and have an active CMV infection, the virus can pass through the placenta to your growing fetus. When a baby is born with CMV, the infection is known as congenital CMV (cCMV). This can be serious for some babies. About 1 out of every 5 babies born with cCMV will develop lifelong health problems, including hearing loss and developmental disabilities.

How is CMV transmitted?

CMV is passed from person to person by direct contact with body fluids containing the virus. High amounts of CMV can stay in a child's saliva and urine for months after infection. Children can pass the virus to others, including their parents and caregivers, during this time even if they don't seem sick. People who are around young children a lot are at greater risk of CMV infection.

How to reduce the risk of getting CMV?

Lower your chance of getting CMV by reducing contact with saliva and urine from babies and young children. Avoid touching your eyes or the inside of your nose or mouth after activities like wiping a child's nose or drool, feeding, changing a diaper, or handling toys until you wash your hands. Discuss CMV with your health care provider if you are pregnant or planning to become pregnant.

Parenting Tips

Now that it's that time of year for gun safety training, here is some information on gun safety in the home.

Store Guns and Ammunition Safely

- Store guns in a locked location, unloaded, out of the reach and sight of children.
- Store ammunition in a separate locked location, out of the reach and sight of children.
- Keep the keys and combinations hidden.
- When a gun is not being stored, it should be on your person and in your immediate control at all times. Otherwise, a gun should always be stored locked, unloaded and separate from ammunition.
- Make sure all guns are equipped with effective, child-resistant gun locks.
- If a visitor has a gun in a backpack, briefcase, handbag or an unlocked car, provide them with a locked place to hold it while they are in your home.
- Leaving guns on a nightstand, table or other place where a child can gain access may lead to injuries and fatalities.

It is estimated that about one third of households with children ages 17 and under have a gun in the home.

Grandpa's Barbeque Chicken Thomas Erlandson

- 12 Gold'n Plump chicken breasts
- 2 cups lemon-lime flavored carbonated beverage
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 1 cup soy sauce
- 1-1/2 tsp garlic powder

Marinade:

In a medium bowl combine the oil, lemon-lime beverage, soy sauce and garlic powder. Stir thoroughly until you have a good mixture. Put chicken and marinade together in a plastic container and marinate in the refrigerator for 12 to 18 hours (6 to 9 hours if using skinless, boneless chicken breasts) before barbequing. Barbeque slowly, don't overcook. Turn frequently, basting with the marinade with each turn. Cook until meat is longer pink in the center and juices run clear. A list of real property in Red Lake County on which delinquent property taxes and penalties are due has been filed with the District Court Administrator of Red Lake

County. This list is published to inform all persons that the listed property is subject to forfeiture because of delinquent taxes.

The property owner, taxpayer or other interested person must either pay the tax and penalty, plus costs or file a written objection with the District Court Administrator. The objection must be filed by April 25, 2023, stating the reason why the property tax or penalty is not due on the property. If no objection is filed, a court judgment will be entered against the property for the unpaid tax, penalty, interest,

and costs.

For property under court judgment, the period of redemption begins on May 8, 2023. The period of redemption means the time within which taxes must be paid to avoid losing the property through forfeiture. The period of redemption is three years, with a handful of exemptions. The redemption period is one year for most properties located in a targeted neighborhood, as defined in the Minnesota laws, and for municipal solid waste disposal facilities. The redemption period is five-weeks

for certain abandoned or vacant properties.

You may also enter into a confession of judgment as an alternative method to paying off the delinquent tax amount and avoiding forfeiture. This allows you to pay the delinquent balance in equal annual installments with a down payment due at the time you confess judgment. The length of the installment plan varies: 5 years for commercial-industrial/public utility property; 10 years for all other properties.

If you have homesteaded property,

you may be eligible for a Senior Citizen's Property Tax Deferral, which enables seniors to pay just 3% of their household income and allow remaining amounts to become a lien on the property that may be deferred for later payment (perhaps upon eventual sale of the property).

It should also be noted by property homesteaders that you are ineligible to receive the Property Tax Refund while you owe delinquent tax.
