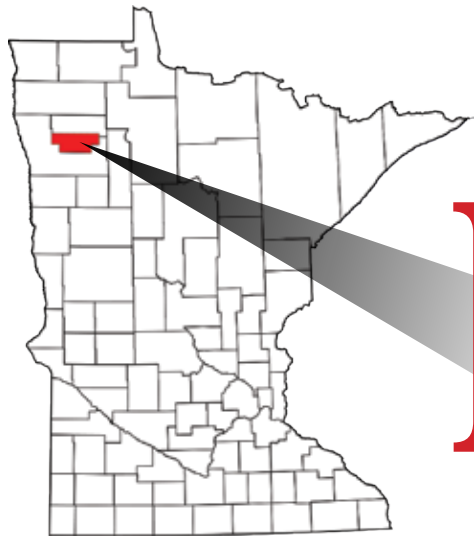

Plummer Memorial Day Service held at Veteran's Park last week

Plummer American Legion and Auxiliary held their 2023 Memorial Day Service on May 29 in the Russell Pahlen Memorial Park in Plummer. Despite the strong breeze, it was warm and a nice crowd filled the bleachers. Commander Jerome Bakke opened the program by welcoming everyone. Following the presentation of colors by the Plummer Legion Color guard commanded by Chuck Simpson, Chaplain Les Hofstad gave the invocation. Alice Jobe and Adam Gallant, the guest speaker, placed the wreaths in memory of those departed. Following the playing of the National Anthem, Commander Bakke gave an opening message in which he gave a history of the unknown soldiers and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Interestingly the unknown soldier from the Vietnam War was later identified by DNA after removal from the Unknown Soldier Tomb. Lt. Michael Blassie was then reburied in Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery in St. Louis, MO.

Sergeant Major Adam Gallant was the main speaker.

Gallant grew up in Plummer and has served with the National Guard since he was in high school. He spoke of what Memorial Day means to different people. To some it is the start of summer and cookouts and to others it's a solemn occasion to reflect and to remind each generation of the sacrifices made by those who came before us. It is not a day to celebrate war but to celebrate valor and patriotism, to decorate the graves as a reminder of the cost of war, and to commemorate the sacrifices by men and women, and to grieve for those left behind. He then gave a brief history of Memorial Day. He concluded that we will never be able to replace those whose lives were lost in service to our nation; we will never be able to repay those individuals and their families for their sacrifice. What we can do is remember and honor those who have stepped forward to serve their country so that we are able to continue to celebrate life and liberty.

Following Sgt Gallant's address, the Honor Roll was read

by Past Commander Clarence Gagner and Alice Jobe from the Auxiliary. After the Benediction by Chaplain Hofstad, the rifle salute was fired by the rifle squad followed by Taps. After

the colors were retired, the group reconvened at the bridge at the west end of Plummer. Here a prayer was given by the Chaplain; a wreath was tossed into the river in memory of

those who died at sea followed by the rifle squad's salute and Taps. Everyone was invited to the Legion for a lunch of sloppy joes, chips, salad, and brownies served by Auxiliary President

Deanna Eskeli and helpers.

RLC Rebels Compete at Section Track and Field Meet in Roseau

On Friday, June 2nd, members of the Red Lake County Rebel Track and Field team participated in the Section 8A meet at Roseau.

Hayden Shulstad ran the 3200 meter race and placed thirteenth. Elizabeth Lytle raced in the 1600 meter run and placed ninth. Caden Lee placed eighth in the 110 meter hurdles. The track and field season came to an end for those athletes on Friday.

For RLCC senior Gerald Melin, he will continue on at the MN State Track and Field meet at St. Michael-Albertville High School next week. Gerald competed in long jump, taking eighth place and 300 meter hurdles, taking twelfth place. Gerald's most anticipated event

was the high jump. He took second place with a jump of 6 feet and two inches, which earned him his trip to state.

Gerald has had a successful track and field career at RLC. For the third season in a row he was named Pine-to-Prairie conference champion, True North conference champion and is a three-time state qualifier in the high jump.

Gerald Melin will compete in the High Jump on Friday, June 9th 3:30 pm at St. Michael-Albertville High School in Albertville.

A send off for Gerald Melin will be at 8:45 am on Wednesday June 7th in front of RLCC High School with a short parade through town then onto Brooks Cenex.

CALL TO ORDER
Chairman Remick called the
meeting to order. Commissioners
present were Al Remick, Chuck
Flage, Tony Gerardy and Ron Weiss.
Others present were Kelsey Gervais,
Kyle Thibert, Tanner Holten, Randy
Konickson, and Angie Lundeen. The
Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA
Commissioner Weiss moved,
seconded by Commissioner Flage,
and carried unanimously to approve
the agenda.

ANNOUNCEMENTS
Randy Konickson from the High-
way Department met with the board
to propose the sale of a 2002 John
Deere 6420 tractor through Ron
McKercher Auctions in St. Hilaire.
Commissioner Gerardy moved,
seconded by Commissioner Weiss,
and carried unanimously to approve
the sale.

EXPENDITURES
Commissioner Weiss moved,
seconded by Commissioner Ger-
ardy, and carried unanimously to
approve the expenditures totaling
\$121,675.87. A detailed list is avail-
able in the auditor's office or on the
county's website.

MINUTES
Commissioner Flage moved,
seconded by Commissioner Weiss,
and carried unanimously to approve
the minutes from the regular meeting
on April 25, 2023.

AUDITOR ANNOUNCEMENTS
Auditor Kelsey Gervais met with
the board to provide an update on
the previously discussed issue of
inaccurate fund balances. It was
found that the cause was clerical
error and could be easily resolved.

Gervais presented the board
with a report stating that Recorder
Joyce Paquin was in compliance
with Minnesota State Statutes, and
her reports have been filed with the
State in a timely manner.

Gervais sought approval from
the board for the Recorder's office
to begin charging a marriage license
fee of \$20. It was brought to the
board's attention that Red Lake re-
mains one of the few counties that
does not charge for this service.
Commissioner Weiss moved, sec-
onded by Commissioner Flage, and
carried unanimously, to approve the
collection of marriage license fees.

Gervais informed the board that
multiple trees along the shared
property line between the courthouse
and Ella Mae Derosier's property will
need to be removed due to insta-
bility and rot. The board instructed
Gervais to receive quotes for tree
removal and present the next
board meeting.

The board was presented with a
quote received from Garden Valley
Technologies to upgrade the court-
house's phone system and install
panic buttons in offices. Commis-
sioner Gerardy moved, seconded
by Commissioner Flage, and carried
unanimously to approve the phone
system upgrade and installation of

panic buttons.

Gervais sought approval from
the board to change Chief Deputy
Auditor Kyle Thibert from a 35-
hour work week to a 40-hour work
week. Commissioner Flage moved,
seconded by Commissioner Weiss,
and carried unanimously to approve
the change.

The board was presented with
a quote from ArcaSearch for the
digitization of records within the
Auditor's office. Based on the price
of the quote, it was decided to not
proceed with utilizing their services.

Gervais proposed a meeting for
the upcoming roof and ventilation
projects on May 16th with Michael J.
Burns Architects and Equity Builders.
In addition to the building committee,
it was decided that Commissioners
Remick and Flage would attend.

HR ANNOUNCEMENTS
HR Manager Angie Lundeen met
with the board to request additional
phrasing be added to the county's
PTO payout policy which states:

"A non-union employee can
choose to have the 50% balance that
would be paid to them, deposited into
the employee's deferred compensa-
tion account in which they have set
up through Red Lake County. If the
50% is less than \$500.00, the entire
Severance Bank and PTO balance
would be paid out to the employee."

Commissioner Weiss moved,
seconded by Commissioner Gerardy,
and carried unanimously to approve
the revision.

ADJOURNMENT
A motion was made by Commis-
sioner Gerardy, seconded by Com-
missioner Flage and unanimously
carried to adjourn the meeting at
11:33 a.m. The next regular meeting
of the board is scheduled for Tues-
day, May 23, 2023 at 10:00 a.m.

RLC SWCD and invasive weed species

Red Lake County SWCD has
Cost-share Assistance avail-
able for the Chemical Removal
of Invasive Weed Species as
well as Manure Testing Kits
available at the office!
Red Lake County SWCD
received a \$15,000.00 grant in
2022 from the Board of Water
and Soil Resources for the Co-
operative Weed Management
Program.
The main species that the
program targets includes: Purple
Loosestrife, Leafy Spurge,
Absinth Wormwood, Wild Pars-
nip, and Spotted Knapweed.
Bull and Canadian Thistles are
also two species that have re-
ceived attention because of the
increased population through-
out the county. These targeted
invasive species were selected
by the partners because of
their confinement in certain
areas and the belief that the
County still has the ability to
control them from spreading
throughout the entire county.

Signup for the RLC SWCD Cover Crop Cost-Share Program

Red Lake County SWCD
started a Cover Crop Cost-
Share Program in 2019.
The District developed a
Cover Crop Cost-Share Pro-
gram Policy. The District also
submitted a Nonstructural
Land Management Practice
Implementation Plan to the
Board of Water & Soil Resour-
ces, which was approved.
The Red Lake County
SWCD Cover Crop Cost-Share
Program was created to provide
funds for individuals that are
interested in using cover crops
in their farming operation,
and to promote the long-term
adoption of cover crops in the
farming operation. The purpose
of this policy is to provide clear
guidelines for the implemen-
tation of funds appropriated to
Red Lake County SWCD
associated with local capacity
services grant.
Funds are allocated to Red
Lake County SWCD by Board
of Soil & Water Resources
(BWSR) from the SWCD local
capacity grant. The Red Lake
County SWCD board sets,
through a work plan approved
by the BWSR Board Conserva-
tionist, the amount from the
SWCD local capacity grant that
is used for the Cover Crop
Cost-Share Program.
The Red Lake County
SWCD Board has established
the maximum rate to a land

occupier for installation of the
cover crop practice is: \$30 for
a single species Cover Crop
i.e. Cereal rye or oats, \$80
for a multiple species Cover
Crop which means it must
include one grass and one
broad leaf species, or \$100 for

How to Be Prepared for Summer Storms

STORMS, HAIL AND LIGHTNING

Thunderstorms affect relatively small areas, compared with most other storms. The typical thunderstorm is 15 miles in diameter and lasts for 30 minutes — but whatever their size, all thunderstorms are dangerous.
Severe thunderstorms produce large hail or winds of at least 58 mph. Some wind gusts can exceed 100 mph and produce tornado-like damage. That's why many communities will sound their outdoor sirens for damaging straight-line winds.
When a severe thunderstorm threatens, stay inside a strong structure. Mobile home occupants should go to a more permanent structure.
Thunderstorm Winds
Thunderstorms can produce straight-line winds that exceed 100 miles per hour. For this reason you should treat severe thunderstorms just as you would tornadoes. Move to an appropriate shelter if you are in the path of the storm.
The strong rush of wind from a thunderstorm is called a downburst. The primary cause is rain-cooled air that accelerates downward, producing potentially damaging gusts of wind.
Strong downbursts can be mistaken for tornadoes, and they're often accompanied by a roaring sound similar to that of a tornado. Downbursts can easily overturn mobile homes, tear roofs off houses and topple trees. Campers are especially vulnerable because trees can fall into campsites and onto tents.
Minnesota's strongest thunderstorm gust was 85 mph on June 19, 2007, near Goodridge.
Hail
Hail is product of thunderstorms that causes nearly \$1 billion in damage every year. Most hail is about pea-sized. Much of it is the size of base-

balls, and it can reach grapefruit-size. Large hail stones fall faster than 100 mph and have been known to kill people.
Lightning
Every thunderstorm produces lightning!
Lightning kills an average of 47 Americans each year. Hundreds more are severely injured.
Lightning Safety Tips
NO PLACE outside is safe when thunderstorms are in the area!
If you hear thunder, lightning is close enough to strike you.
When you hear thunder, immediately move to safe shelter: a substantial building with electricity or plumbing or an enclosed, metal-topped vehicle with windows up.
Stay in safe shelter at least 30 minutes after you hear the last sound of thunder.
Indoor Lightning Safety
Stay off corded phones, computers and other electrical equipment that put you in direct contact with electricity. Avoid plumbing, including

sinks, baths and faucets.
Stay away from windows and doors, and stay off porches.
Do not lie on concrete floors, and do not lean against concrete walls.
Last Resort Outdoor Risk Reduction Tips
If you are caught outside with no safe shelter anywhere nearby the following actions may reduce your risk:
Immediately get off elevated areas such as hills, mountain ridges or peaks
Never lie flat on the ground
Never shelter under an isolated tree
Never use a cliff or rocky overhang for shelter
Immediately get out and away from ponds, lakes and other bodies of water
Stay away from objects that conduct electricity (barbed wire fences, power lines, windmills, etc.)
Myths and Facts About Lightning
Myth: If it is not raining, there is no danger from lightning.

Fact: Lightning often strikes away from rainfall. It may occur as far as ten miles away from any rainfall.
Myth: Rubber soles on shoes or rubber tires on a car will protect you from being injured by lightning.
Fact: Rubber provides no protection from lightning. However, the steel frame of a hard-topped vehicle provides some protection if you are not touching metal.
Myth: Heat lightning occurs on very hot summer days and poses no threat.
Fact: What is referred to as heat lightning is actually lightning from a thunderstorm too far away for thunder to be heard. However, the storm may be moving in your direction.
