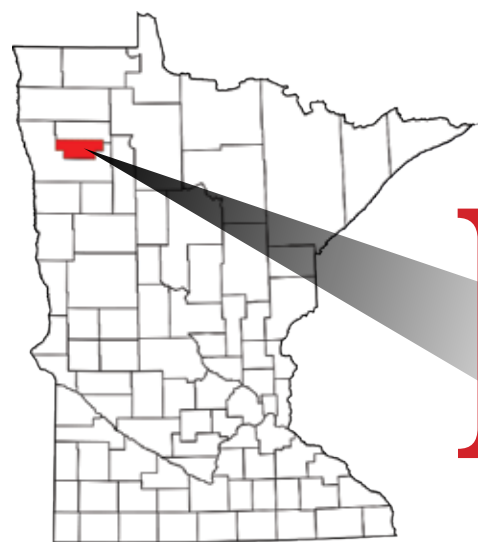

Pandemic Assistance Revenue Program and Emergency Relief Program Deadline extended

The deadline to apply for PARP and ERP has been extended to July 14, 2023. View a webinar with ABM Educator Ryan Pesch for more information.

There are two new FSA programs that provide financial assistance to producers who experienced losses due to the COVID-19 pandemic or from eligible natural disasters. Producers have until June 2 to apply for both the Pandemic Assistance Revenue Program (PARP) and the Emergency Relief Program (ERP) Phase Two.

Pandemic Assistance Revenue Program (PARP)

The Pandemic Assistance Revenue Program (PARP) provides direct financial assistance to producers of agricultural commodities who suffered at least 15 percent loss in gross revenue in calendar year 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Payments to eligible producers will be based upon a comparison of the producer's gross revenues

from 2020 compared to either 2018 or 2019, as elected by the producer. If the producer is new enough to not have a look-back comparison, applications will be accepted in those cases too. The comparison from 2020 to previous years will be done on a spot check basis.

Emergency Relief Program Phase 2 (ERP 2)

Producers are eligible to apply for the Emergency Relief Program (ERP) Phase Two if they experienced revenue losses from eligible natural disasters in 2020 and 2021. Historically, FSA programs have been designated to make direct payments to producers based on a single disaster event or for a single commodity loss. However, the ERP Phase Two and PARP take a much more holistic approach to disaster assistance, ensuring that producers not just make it through a single growing season and have the financial stability to invest in the long-term well-being of their operation

and employees.

ERP Phase Two payments are based on a comparison between the allowable gross revenue between a benchmark year and the disaster year. This is designed to target the remaining needs of producers impacted by qualifying natural disasters and to avoid duplicate payments. The Emergency Relief Program Phase 2 (ERP 2) is a revenue-based program that relies on tax and financial records instead of production history like FSA programs usually require.

All producers are eligible to apply for ERP Phase Two benefits, even if a producer has received ERP Phase One benefits. If you received ERP Phase One benefits, there is also a possibility that your Phase Two payment may be offset.

Schindler Family Farms named 2023 Farm Family of Red Lake County of UMN Program

Val and Dolores Schindler married in 1961. They raised their 11 children on the dairy farm east of Red Lake Falls in Gervais Township. They used bucket milkers to milk cows. Their oldest son, Joe Schindler, took over the dairy farm in the fall of 1993 after working in Alaska as a welder for 10 years. He put in a pipeline to replace the bucket milkers. The Schindlers' youngest son, Carl, joined his brother after he graduated from the University of Minnesota Crookston with a bachelor's degree in agronomy in 2000. Since then they have operated as Schindler Dairy.

In 2010, Carl married Brenda and bought a neighboring farm where they currently raise their two boys, Isaac and Jacob. As an outlet for poor-quality hay, Carl and Joe started a cow-calf operation at Carl and Brenda's farm. To allow for more family time, the brothers switched to once-a-day milking.

They milk around 130 Holstein cows with a 12-unit flat barn walk through at Joe's. They grow alfalfa and corn for silage.

Carl and Joe milk the cows along with all the daily operations of cleaning, feeding, bedding, and raising calves. Isaac and Jacob help their dad and uncle around the farm. They also help their mom raise laying hens for eggs. Brenda runs errands for parts, and assists with AI cattle breeding, calving, cleaning, and record keeping. Between the two farms, everyone helps with growing three vegetable gardens with Brenda and her mother-in-law, Dolores, preserving and canning over 300 quarts of tomato juice and pickles. Everyone also pitches in to help pick chokecherries for syrup.

Carl and Brenda are members of Saint Joseph Catholic Church in Red Lake Falls. Isaac is an altar server and Brenda

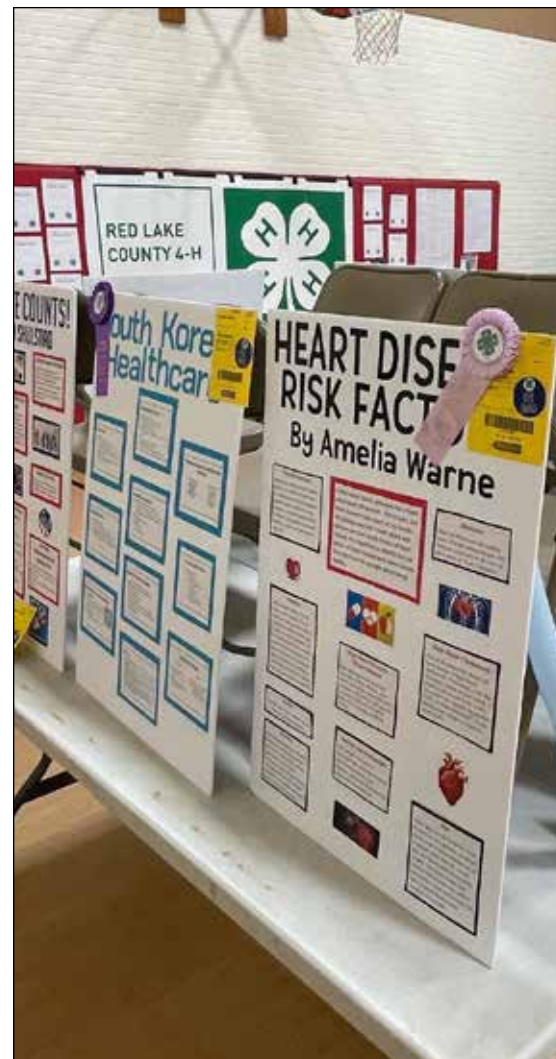
has volunteered with Vacation Bible School and Eucharistic Ministry. The family is new to 4-H and the Huot Hustlers Club. Isaac and Jacob were in the after-school program last year and attended the Engineer Design Challenge Event in April this year.

The University of Minnesota Farm Family Recognition Program honors farm families from throughout Minnesota for their significant contributions to the agriculture industry and their local communities.

The Farm Family Recognition Program has honored Minnesota farmers since 1979. It is coordinated by University of Minnesota Extension, the College of Food, Agricultural, and Natural Resource Sciences and the College of Veterinary Medicine.

Farm Families for 2023 will be recognized at Farmfest, to be held in Redwood County, August 1-3, 2023.

Red Lake County Commissioner's Minutes

Pursuant to adjournment of its last meeting, the Red Lake County Board of Commissioners duly met in regular session at the Courthouse in Red Lake Falls, MN on June 13, 2023, at 10:00 am.

CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Remick called the meeting to order. Commissioners present were Al Remick, Chuck Flage, Tony Gerardy and Ron Weiss. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA
Commissioner Gerardy moved, seconded by Commissioner Weiss, and carried unanimously to approve the agenda.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Northwest Regional Development Commission Transportation Manager Tim Finseth met with the board to introduce himself and offer assistance to the County with grant writing and planning of upcoming road projects.

Randy Konickson from the Highway Department met with the board to present a quote for a new motor grader. The quote included the trade-in value of one of the older motor graders currently owned by the County. Commissioner Weiss moved, seconded by Commissioner Gerardy, and carried unanimously to approve the trade-in and purchase of a new motor grader.

Tanner Holten of Harbott, Knutson, Larson & Holten PLLP met with the board to be sworn in as the acting attorney for Red Lake County.

Paul Hajduk with the Minnesota Counties Insurance Trust met with the board to present their annual report to members as well as describe the services that are available to Red Lake County.

Red Lake County Soil and Water Conservation District Manager Tanya Waldo met with the board to discuss Wayne Vettleson's planned expansion to his dairy operation. The expansion would require the issuance of a permit by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency with approval from the board of commissioners. Commissioner Gerardy

moved, seconded by Commissioner Weiss, and carried unanimously to approve the permit.

Polk County resident Merle Kolstad met with the board to discuss the ongoing issue of water on his property. Kolstad believes a culvert that Red Lake County installed in 1991 is causing water to back up onto his property. The board encouraged Environmental Officer Kurt Casavan to investigate the situation.

HUOT PARK

Peter Mattson met with the board to express his concern over the discontinuation of camping at Huot Park. Others present were: Dann Hoffman, Bray Hoffman, Nichole Larson, Virgil Benoit, Hugh Stadem and Harlan Casavan. It was agreed that the Park Board would hold a meeting at a future date to come to an agreement that would be satisfactory to all interested parties.

EXPENDITURES

Commissioner Flage moved, seconded by Commissioner Gerardy, and carried unanimously approve commissioner warrants totaling \$424,827.58. A detailed listing is available in the auditor's office or on the county's website.

MINUTES

Commissioner Weiss moved, seconded by Commissioner Flage, and carried unanimously to approve the minutes from the regular meeting on May 23, 2023.

HR ANNOUNCEMENTS

HR Manager Angie Lundeen met with the board to seek approval for Kurt Casavan's annual step increase from step 9 to 10. Commissioner Weiss moved, seconded by Commissioner Flage, and carried unanimously to approve the step increase.

Lundeen discussed Minnesota's decision to observe Juneteenth as a State holiday effective 2023. It was confirmed that no public business can be transacted on the Juneteenth holiday, except in cases of necessity. Commissioner Weiss moved, seconded by Commissioner Gerardy, and carried unanimously to close County offices on Monday, June 19th in observance of Juneteenth.

Lundeen discussed Treasurer Nick Knott's request to change Dep-

uty Treasurer Carmen Harmoning from 35 to 40-hour work weeks. Harmoning remains the only employee in the courthouse working 35 hours per week and due to the increasing business in the Treasurer's office the change in hours was strongly recommended. Commissioner Gerardy moved, seconded by Commissioner Flage, and carried unanimously to change Carmen Harmoning from 35 to 40-hour work weeks.

Auditor Kelsey Gervais met with the board to discuss the condition of the hedges in front of the courthouse along Main Street. It has been determined that the hedges are mostly dead and in need of being removed. Commissioner Flage moved, seconded by Commissioner Gerardy, and carried unanimously to approve removing the hedges.

Gervais updated the board of the total cost of the upcoming courthouse cooling and ventilation project as provided by the architect. Gervais also mentioned that she will be submitting a capital grant through the State of Minnesota to secure additional funding for the project.

ADJOURNMENT

A motion was made by Commissioner Gerardy, seconded by Commissioner Flage, and unanimously carried to adjourn the meeting at 1:37 p.m. The next regular meeting of the board is scheduled for Tuesday, June 27, 2023, at 10:00 a.m.

MUSTANG STAMPEDE

100 Years Ago This Month: Historical events from July 1923

The month of July has been home to many historical events over the years. Here's a look at some that helped to shape the world in July 1923.

- A law banning Chinese immigrants from coming to the Dominion of Canada goes into effect on July 1. The Chinese Immigration Act remained in effect until May 14, 1947.
- Roughly 20,000 people attend a July 4 boxing match between champion Jack Dempsey and challenger Tommy Gibbons in the small Montana oil town of Shelby. Estimates indicated only around 35 percent of those in attendance paid to see the bout, which proved to be a financial punch to the gut for the promoters.

- The Cleveland Indians set an American League record on July 7 by scoring in every inning of a game they eventually win 27-3. The offensive onslaught includes a 13-run inning in which all 13 runs are charged to Boston Red Sox pitcher Francis "Lefty" O'Doul.
- On July 9, U.S. Army Lieutenant Russell Maughan lands his plane in a cow pasture in

St. Joseph, Missouri, marking an end to his first attempt to make a dawn-to-dusk trans-continental flight across the United States. Maughan made a second unsuccessful attempt 10 days later.

- The Paraguayan Civil War ends on July 10, with former President Manuel Gondra and his supporters declaring victory.

- Harry Frazee, perhaps best known as the owner of the Boston Red Sox who traded Babe Ruth to the New York Yankees, thus beginning the alleged Curse of the Bambino, sells the team for \$1.25 million on July 11.
- The Hollywood Sign is officially dedicated on July 13.

- Retired Mexican guerilla leader Pancho Villa is shot

dead alongside many members of his entourage on July 20. Reports at the time suggest the assassination is retaliation for executions Villa had ordered during the Mexican Revolution.

- On July 22, the American oil tanker SS Swiftstar explodes and sinks after passing through the Panama Canal. Investigators later conclude a bolt of lightning had hit the tanker and caused the explosion.

- The Treaty of Lausanne is signed on July 24 in Switzerland. The treaty formally ends hostilities between the Allies and the Ottoman Empire.

- On July 29, Italian Prime Minister Benito Mussolini receives tens of thousands of missives from people across Italy wishing him a happy fortieth birthday.

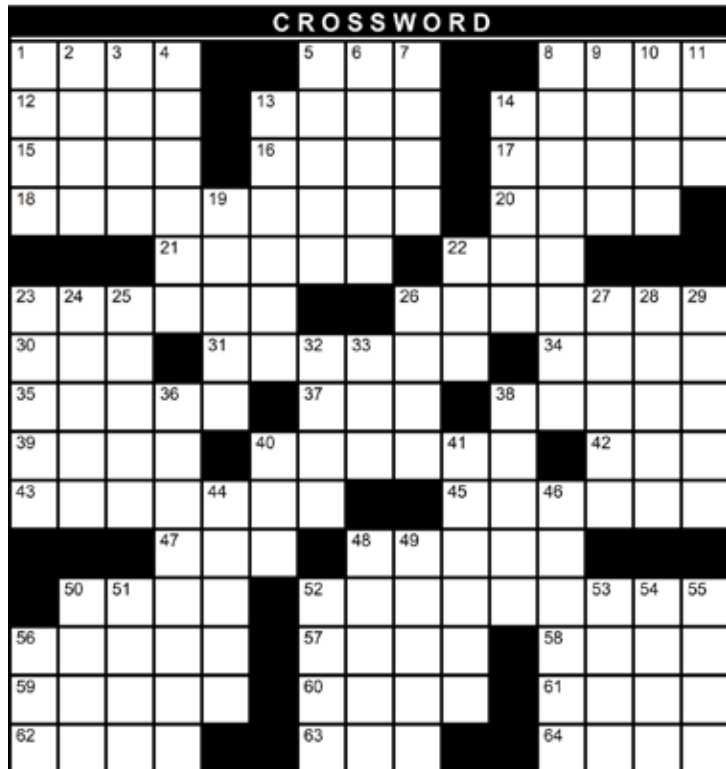

Oklee Herald Early Files

Vegetables Au Gratin Jan Dulka

1/4 cup butter
3/4 cup green pepper, 1" dice
1 clove garlic, minced

Sauté until soft. Stir in 1/4 cup flour until well mixed.

Add:

2/3 cup milk
3/4 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper
1/4 tsp basil
1/4 tsp oregano
1/4 tsp sugar

Heat and stir until thickened. Remove from heat. Stir in 1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese and 1 can whole tomatoes, drained. Heat until thickened.

Add:

1 (9 oz) pkg frozen corn
2 (1 lb) cans pearl onions, drained. Mix well. Sprinkle top with 1/2 cup (2 oz) grated cheddar cheese. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 50 minutes.
