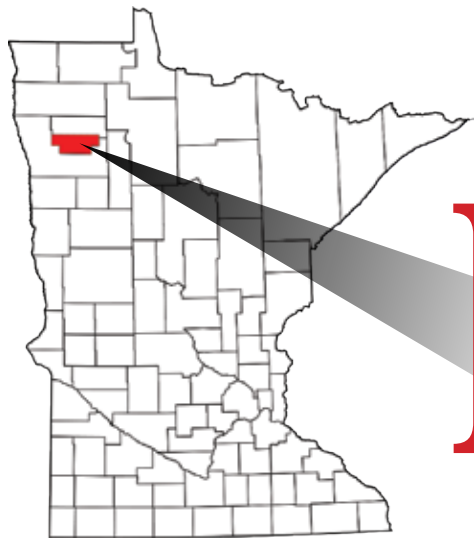

Red Lake County Central Open House held on October 14th

On October 14th, Red Lake County Central High School held an open house so anyone that wanted to see the new changes, could see them first hand.

There were staff on hand to answer any questions and an floor layouts to help the visitors find their way around the new layout.

The office is now located in the front of the building where the first few classrooms were part of what used to be the elementary wing are now the offices. Across from the entryway, where the boy and girls bathroom were located has now been changed over to an area where students can work on their assignments or just hang out. Next door in the multipurpose room/gym, is now the new library with windows for natural light and lots of space.

Going down the hallway toward the west, you will come to the area where the office used to be and the cafeteria eating area. Those areas have been changed into a concession stand and the new cafeteria/commons area that has tripled in size.

Farther down the hallway you will come to two doors on the north side of the hallway leading into the two new state-of-the-art science rooms. They are large and up to date. There is a storage room that can be locked up for keeping the lab supplies safe. Lab areas are along the side and back of the room with the desks in the middle facing the front desk for the science teacher.

The new gymnasium and locker rooms are on the west side of the building with a audio/visual room for broadcasting the game and filming for Garden Valley channel for Red Lake County Central.

There are also new bathrooms located which are easy to access and handicapped assessable. The building inside has been updated with fresh paint and soon the graduation pictures will be placed once again on the walls of RLCC. and updated areas around the school.

When school opened this fall, it was a surprise for everyone coming in the first days as no one was allowed in to the new building areas while the construction was being done. According to Principal Randy Pderson, "We literally were kept out of the building this past summer until a few days before the start of school. Our students couldn't believe their eyes upon their return."

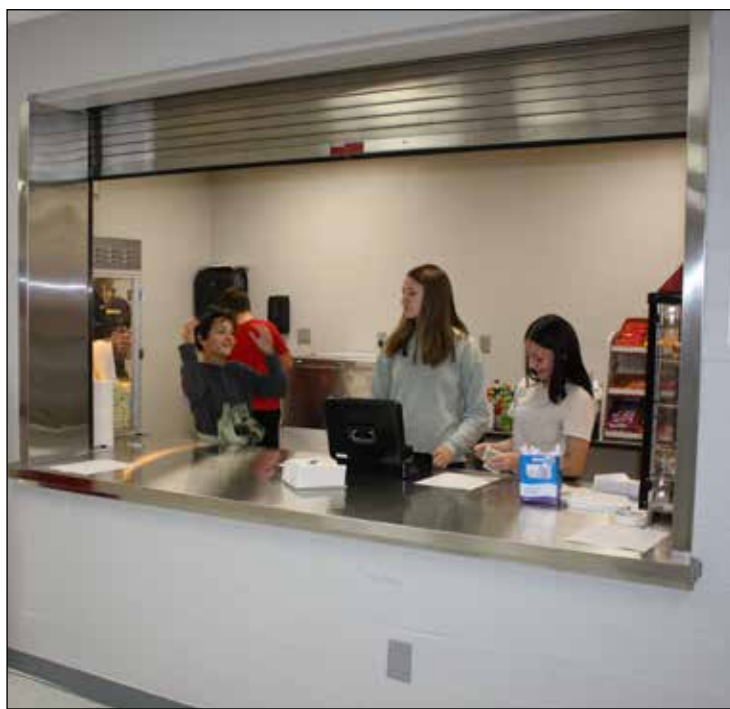


The office of RLCC High School is just inside the front doors in what was referred to as the old elementary wing.

Red Lake County Election Results

Most likely everyone knows who won the elections in the local area but here are the results listed with the number of votes received.

Brooks

Ernest Kolling was elected mayor with 64 votes in Brooks. Perry Morinville received 61 votes and Ray Vasend received 59 votes.

Oklee

Lori Gulseth was elected mayor with 122 votes. There were two seats open on the council. Elected to the council were Darrell Tougas with 109 votes, Paul Cyr with 95 votes. George Burthwick received 51 votes.

Plummer

James DuChamp was elected as mayor with 101 votes. Elected to the council were Tom Bray with 102 votes, and Thomas Braaten with 102 votes. Brent Hemly was running for a council seat but only received 90 votes.

Red Lake Falls

Allen Bertilrun was elected mayor with 546 votes. Running for Council member at large was Kyle Thibert who received 580 votes. Neil J. Knaack was elected as the Ward 2 council position with 161 votes. Cheryl Matzke was elected to the Ward 3 council position with 179 votes.

In the Red Lake County elections, County Commissioner position for District 1: Andy Moran received 343 votes. For District 5: Tony Gerardy (incumbent) received 402 votes.

Soil and Water District 3: Nathan Whalen (incumbent) received 1,784 votes. Soil and Water District 4: Mark La-Crosse (incumbent) received 1,780 votes. Soil and Water District 5: Jimmy Hagge received 1,742 votes.

Fastelavns Bøller (Mardi Gras Buns) Katie (Whalen) Tobiasen

- 1-1/2 cups milk (room temp.)
- 1 package yeast
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup butter (melted)
- 3 cups flour (add more if needed)

Mix all together and let raise for 30-45 minutes.

Cream filling:

- 1 cup milk
- 2 Tbsp sugar
- 2 Tbsp corn meal
- 2 egg yolks
- vanilla

Mix and cook all together in a small saucepan until boiling for 1 minute. Take off heat and add 2 tsp vanilla. When dough is ready, form into ball and flatten out. Put a tablespoon of cream filling into each piece of dough and seal up. Cook at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. When cooled, frost with purple, green or gold colored icing. Yummy!

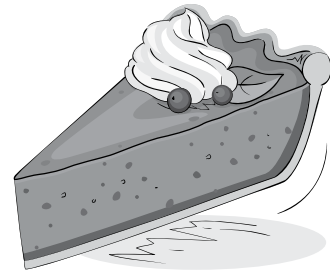

On the morning of 11/01/24, the Red Lake County Sheriff's Office received a report that a small child was walking around near the school in Oklee, and they were unsupervised. Red Lake County law enforcement officers responded to the school and located the child. Shortly after, the guardian arrived at the scene. The child was safely returned to the guardian, and they were counseled. Red Lake County Social Services was also notified about the incident for additional investigation.
On the afternoon of 11/01/24, a Red Lake Falls resident reported some damage to campaign signs. That report remains under investigation.
On the morning of 11/02/24, the Dollar General Store in Red

Lake Falls reported a theft. That report is still under investigation.
On the afternoon of 11/02/24, the Red Lake County Sheriff's Office received a report about an individual driving recklessly on an ATV in the city of Red Lake Falls. A Red Lake County deputy located and stopped the suspect vehicle. The driver was counseled.
Shortly after midnight on 11/03/24, a Red Lake County deputy stopped a vehicle on CR. #1 east of Red Lake Falls for unsafe driving conduct. Investigation during the stop revealed the driver, Elizabeth Danielle Peterson (35) of Erskine, was intoxicated. She was arrested, taken to jail in Crookston and was booked for gross misdemeanor DWI. Ms. Peterson appeared in Court in Crookston on 11/04/24 and she was ordered to pay \$700 cash bail to be released. The bail was posted, and she was released from custody and must also abide by court-ordered conditions. She had a 2nd hearing in Red Lake Falls on 11/06/24, and her next court appearance has been scheduled for 12/18/24 in Red Lake Falls.
On the afternoon of 11/04/24, a Plummer Juvenile was cited for illegal window tint on a motor vehicle on CR. #5 north of Oklee.
On the morning of 11/05/24, the Red Lake County Sheriff's Office received a report of illegal dumping in the city of Plummer. A Red Lake County deputy looked into the matter and was able to remedy the situation without the filing of any criminal charges.
On the evening of 11/05/24, Red Lake County deputies assisted a Plummer resident who was having issues with a family member. Some personal items were returned to the complainant, and the parties involved were counseled and advised.

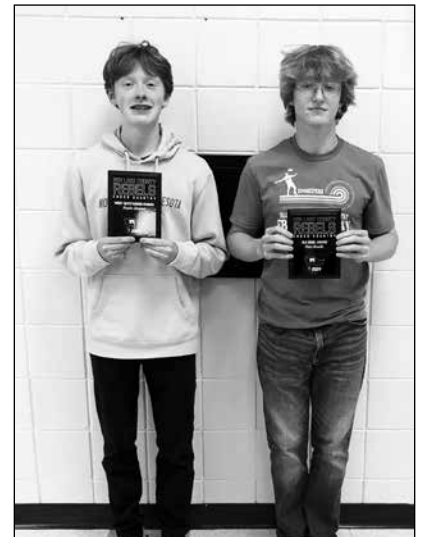

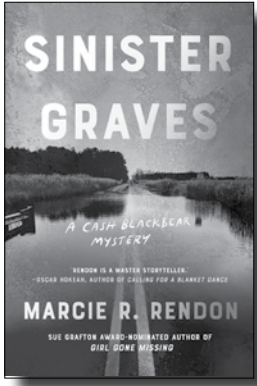

Sinister Graves offers in-depth character

Marcie R. Rendon reprises her fascinating character Cash Blackbear in Sinister Graves, third in a trilogy about a young Native woman whose special powers make her an invaluable sleuth for the local county sheriff. The trilogy follows Blackbear's exploits in North Dakota and Minnesota along the Red River region.

Rendon, an enrolled member of the White Earth Nation, lives in Minneapolis.

In her latest book of the trilogy, Cash is called by Sheriff Wheaton

for her assistance in solving a murder. At first glance, Cash would hardly seem an unlikely partner in solving crime. Product of an abusive foster system, Cash shatters the stereotype of a helpless female. A pool shark approaching the professional level, she has a take-him-or-leave-him approach to men, bouncing from her on-again off-again married lover Jim to Al, a Vietnam vet – not that Cash is free with her affections. She has merely taken on male values in a female body.

It seems though that even Cash has met her match when she begins to investigate a fundamentalist minister and his wife. She more she gets to know them, the stranger they seem, until Cash feels herself drawn into the pastor's charismatic yet deadly charms.

The appearance of an evil apparition tied to the pastor becomes even more frightening. When Cash seeks the help of Jonesy, a Native healer woman, she begins to cope with the evil around her.

Rendon's description at the novel's opening is absolutely mesmerizing. She takes us directly to the flooded Red River Valley and the hardy souls that inhabit it. Her pacing rockets us from incident to incident, making this the quickest read of the series.

Rendon reaches beyond the novel, though, and shows how brutal Native boarding schools once were and how the foster care system continues to be for Native children. Only with passage of the Indian Child Welfare Act of 1978 did the abuse begin to lessen.

Rendon also eloquently captures the essence of the Native spirit and humor that comes to light under the lamp of his-toric oppression of the Native people.

Sinister Graves goes beyond the crime genre to a rightful place in the literary genre. Rendon's understanding of Native issues and social challenges places her in the top tier of other talented Native writers such as Louise Erdrich and Sherman Alexie.

This is a great book, and impossible to put down.

Lung Cancer Awareness Month

Lung cancer is the most common cause of cancer death in the United States for both men and women. More men die of lung cancer than the next two most deadly types of cancer for men (prostate and colorectal) combined. More women die of lung cancer (an estimated 59,280 deaths in 2024) than breast cancer (an estimated 42,250).

Smoking is the most common cause of lung cancer in the United States. Cigarette smoking causes 80% to 90% of lung cancer deaths, according to experts. Other risk factors for lung cancer include being exposed to secondhand smoke; having a family history of lung cancer; being treated with radiation therapy to the breast or chest; exposure to asbestos, chromium, nickel, arsenic, soot, or tar in the workplace; and exposure to radon. When smoking is combined with other risk factors, the risk of lung cancer increases.

The U.S. government recommends annual screening with low-dose CT scan in adults aged 50 to 80 who have a 20-pack-year smoking history and currently smoke or stopped smoking within the past 15 years. Specifically, a pack-year is the number of packs of cigarettes smoked per day times the number of years smoking. Thus, someone who smoked one pack per day for 20 years has a 20-pack-year smoking history.

Steps you can take to reduce your risk of lung cancer include:

- *Don't smoke
- *Quit smoking if you do smoke
- *Get your home tested for radon
- *Follow health and safety guidelines to avoid carcinogens (things that can cause cancer) at home and at work

COPD Awareness Month

In 2021, COPD was the 4th

leading cause of death globally and the 6th leading cause of death in the United States. Millions remain undiagnosed and unaware that they have the disease.

COPD is (currently) incurable, but with the right diagnosis and treatment, there are many things you can do to breathe better, enjoy life, and live for many years.

What is COPD?

COPD, or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, is a term used to describe chronic lung diseases that include emphysema, and chronic bronchitis. The overarching symptom is difficulty breathing. Some people with COPD also experience tiredness and chronic cough with or without mucus.

TERMS FOR THE SALE OF TAX-FORFEITED LAND IN RED LAKE COUNTY

Public Sales: Basic Sale Price

All parcels are offered at public auction and sold to the highest bidder. The minimum bid acceptable is the basic sale price which is shown on the list of tax-forfeited land. The basic sale price is equal to the appraised value or the appraised value plus any extra charges for special assessments levied after forfeiture or for hazardous waste control. Bidding will be increments as determined by the Auditor and not less than \$100.

Extra Fees and Costs: In Addition to the Basic Sale Price

A 3% surcharge of the selling price for the state assurance account will be collected at the time of the sale. The following extra fees will be collected when the basic sale price is paid in full: a state deed fee of \$25, a deed filing fee of at least \$46.00, and a state deed tax of 0.33% (0.0033) of the sale price.

If an online bidding system is used, there may be additional fees such as a buyer's premium.

Special Assessments: Levied Before and After Forfeiture

The balance of any special assessments which were levied before forfeiture and canceled at forfeiture, and which exceed the amount of the basic sale price may be reassessed by the municipality. These special assessments are shown on the list of tax-forfeited land under the column entitled "Assessments Before Forfeiture." Any special assessments which were levied after forfeiture and certified to the county auditor have been added to the appraised value and must be paid by the purchaser as part of the basic sale price. These special assessments are shown on the list of tax-forfeited land with a special line entitled "Specials After Forfeiture."

Private Sales: Parcels Not Sold at Public Auction

Any parcel not sold at a public sale may be purchased after the public sale by paying the basic sale price. The basic sale price cannot be changed until the parcel is reappraised, and again offered at a later public sale.

Conditions: Restrictions on the Use of the Properties

Sales are subject to the following restrictions on the use of the properties:

1. Existing leases;
2. Easements obtained by a governmental subdivision or state agency for a public purpose;
3. Building codes and zoning laws;
4. All sales are final with no refunds or exchanges allowed; and
5. The appraised value does not represent a basis for future taxes.

Title: Proof of Ownership

The buyer will receive a receipt at the time of sale. The Minnesota Department of Revenue will issue a state deed after full payment is made. An abstract will not be provided.

Podipto-Bringing Back Memories

Jack Sundrud graduated from Oklee High School in 1967. Many Oklee citizens are aware that this Oklee graduate has used his musical talents and provided enjoyment to friends and fans for over 50 years.

After leaving Oklee School in 1969 Jack got together with some other musicians in Thief River Falls and formed a band called Back Street Journal. Moving on to Bemidji Jack became part of a group called Benson Obermier Fruit Stand Band. Shortly thereafter Jack joined with a group called Podipto.

Local Jack Sundrud group-ies are familiar with the band and Podipto sort of became a familiar word. The band formed in 1969. Podipto did what most musicians and bands want-they played original music! The band gained a good regional following and was considered by some one of the brightest acts in the Midwest. They were able to audition with management firm in Chicago and got a record deal! A record was recorded in Chicago in 1970. The group went on the road and opened from many national performers like James Taylor, Elton John, Linda Ronstadt, and many more. The band's unique sound came from a blend of three vocalists trading

lead and harmony. They played regionally until about 1974.

Jack then moved to Fargo and played solo, did night clubs, and was in a few bands. Eventually he ended up playing bass and doing vocals with the Johnny Holmes Band through the late 70's.

In 1981, Jack made the big musicians move and headed to Nashville. It was here he played with many "big" names such as Gail Davies, Vince Gill, Michael Johnson, Kathy Mattea, and others.

In 1985, he auditioned for a group called Poco. Poco was an American country rock band originally formed in 1968. In the 90s Jack played with a band called Great Plains who had a record deal with Columbia records, then he returned to Poco.

In 2021, Poco went to LA to record a tribute album for Rusty Young, a band member who had passed away. The tribute was called Cimarron 615 after the Rose of Cimarron (1976) that was a title track by Rusty Young, with a great melody that was almost impossible not to continue humming once you heard it. The song was later covered by Emmylou Harris and turned into the title track of her Cimarron album, and was also included on her Songs of the West compilation

in the 1990s.

Jack recently was asked to be part of a trip down memory lane by the Beltrami County Historical Society. The Podipto Musicians appeared for a special Historical Society Fundraising Event in Bemidji. Jack Sundrud, Dan Lund, and John Calder founding members of the Bemidji-based band appeared at the Rail River Folk School for an afternoon of questions, stories, and music. Podipto fans had the opportunity to hear band members reminisce, share stories, and even hear a little music.

I want to thank Jack for taking time to talk to me on the phone. It was fun for me to take a trip down memory lane through all of Jack's endeavors in the music world.
