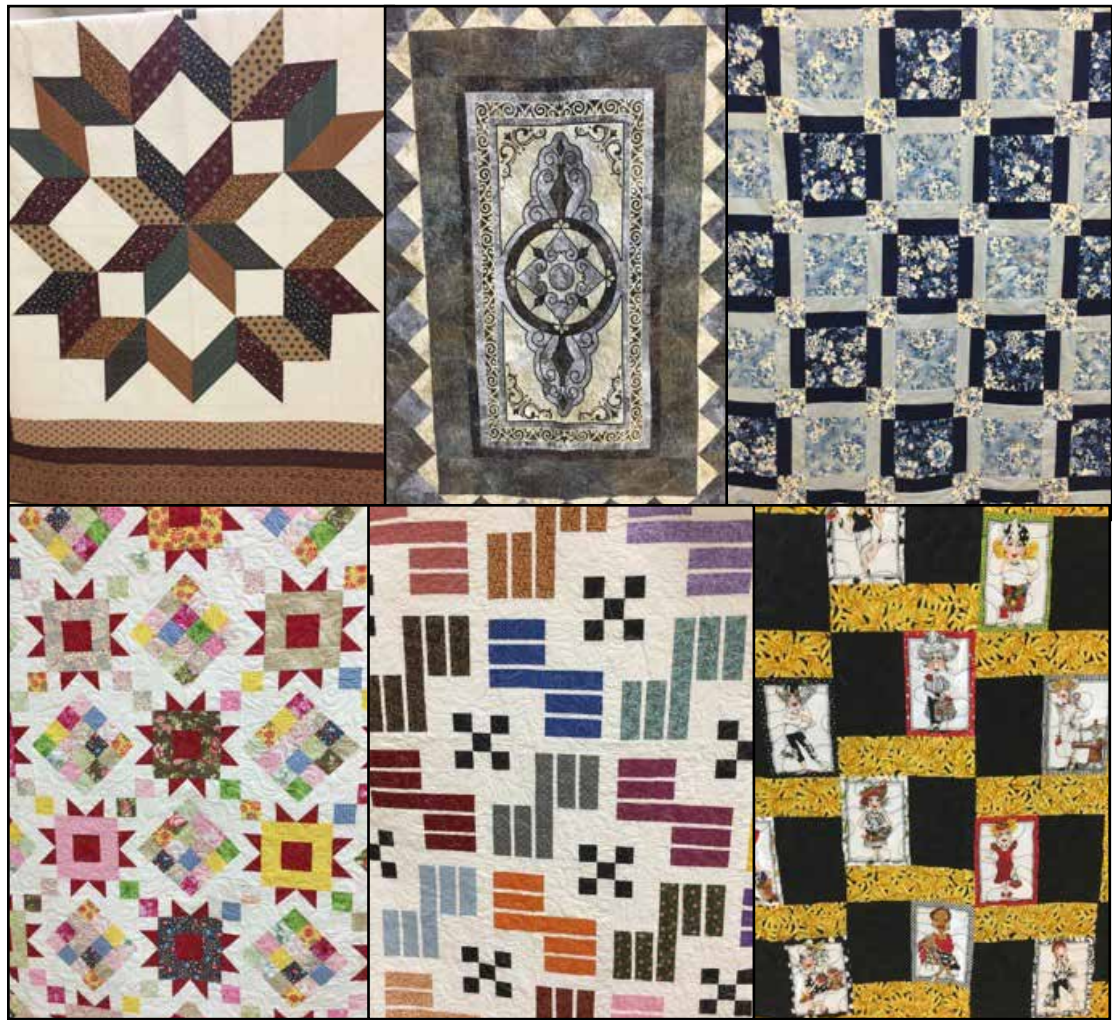

Governor Mark Dayton visits Red Lake County in his 87 Counties in 86 Days tour

The Governor of Minnesota, Mark Dayton stopped in Red Lake Falls on August 23rd to hold an event during his tour of all 87 counties in the state. The purpose of the tour and these meetings with local officials is a fact finding mission to see what the needs are of the local areas. Kevin Harmoning, Red Lake Falls' Mayor, welcomed everyone and had everyone introduce themselves around the table before starting.

Red Lake Falls, like many other communities in the state does not have the funding for replacing/fixing the infrastructure. Red Lake Falls has an old system built with lead pipes and is looking to fix that issue. Dayton replied that the request he made for grant funding was asked, which Extension Educator Curtis Nygaard commented on. Dan Juhl from Juhl Energy spoke about the project they are working on with Red Lake Falls as a sponsoring partner to create and sell power using

Dayton also said a few words about Senator Stumpf, who was in attendance, and is leaving at the end of his term and that he will be missed. The question of the crop outlook was asked, which Extension Educator Curtis Nygaard commented on. Dan Juhl from Juhl Energy spoke about the project they are working on with Red Lake Falls as a sponsoring partner to create and sell power using

wind and solar. Christopher Ingraham was asked how he is using his gained time since he now longer commutes 15 hours a week. He responded that he is enjoying the extra time with his twin boys and loves to see them explore and learn about the world around them. Ingraham went on to say that many would love to leave the big cities for rural living and it is now possible if the

broadband is in place to work remotely. Stumpf commented that issues that affect rural areas include lack of employees for local businesses, grain prices are low, and health care concerns. Especially the price of insurance and drugs. Governor Dayton said he felt that Obamacare was coming to a crisis point and he favors a single payer system. Allen Bertilrud brought affordable housing to the discussion and Stumpf commented that Granny Homes are gaining popularity, but many cities are passing rules

that exclude them from a solution to housing shortages due to the feeling it will bring values down. Stumpf feels they are a viable option for a family needing to help an elderly person in the family stay out of a nursing home which is very costly. Commissioner Dave Sorensen brought to the Governor's attention about the CPA funding decrease every years since 2009, which is causing the county to use up it's reserves to keep taxes resonable. Eventually, the reserves will be gone if this doesn't change.

Minnesota Sheriff's Association Scholarship Program

The Minnesota Sheriff's Association (MSA) announced today the commencement of the Law Enforcement Scholarship Program for 2016. The MSA Board of Directors have established a scholarship fund for the awarding of up to 15 - \$600 scholarships for this year. These scholarships are due to the coordinated efforts of the 87 Sheriffs of the State of Minnesota.

MSA gives special recognition to the financial needs of students attending the peace officer skills course, or one of the town or four year law enforcement degree colleges. "The Board of Directors fell peace officers in our democratic society have complex duties to perform" said Jim Franklin. MSA recognizes the importance of pre-entry training for people considering law enforcement as their career choice. MSA recognizes some students need outside help in meeting the costs of such training, even though they excel academically.

The Scholarship Committee, in making its selection of awards, intends on achieving representation from all geographical areas of the state. Scholarship awards will be announced at the 2016 MSA winter conference. Application forms and a statement of procedures are available at the student's local county sheriff's office. Scholarships are only available to students currently enrolled in one of the following three categories:

Mandated POST Skills Program

In their second year of a two year law enforcement program

In their third year of a four year college criminal justice program.

In order to qualify, students must have completed at least one year or the two year program or two years of a four year program. Students meeting these criteria are invited to obtain a scholarship application form from their local sheriff's office or online at www.mnsheriffs.org.

RLC Tobacco Compliance Checks

On August 23, 2016 the Red Lake County Sheriff's Office conducted tobacco compliance checks on tobacco retailers in Red Lake County. Underage youths were sent into these businesses and attempted to purchase tobacco products. Youths presented clerks with proper identification showing them to be under the age of 18 years old. No deception of their age is permitted. State Law requires Law Enforcement Agencies to conduct tobacco compliance checks on retailers within its jurisdiction at least once a year.

During these compliance checks, 13 tobacco retailers were checked in Red Lake

County. Of these 13 businesses, 2 of them failed to comply with State, County and City Law, which prohibits anyone from selling, giving, furnishing any cigarettes, cigars, chewing tobacco, tobacco snuff or tobacco in any form to a person under 18 years of age. The 2 failing businesses have been cited for violating the County's Tobacco Ordinance and they will have to pay an administrative fine of \$75 for this violation. Additionally, the individual employees who sold the tobacco product to the underage youth have been cited and they will each have to pay a \$50 administrative fine.

It is the goal of the Red

Lake County Sheriff's Office to increase the percentage of businesses that comply with this ordinance, thereby supporting our mission to make tobacco products less accessible to the youth of Red Lake County and reducing the number of youth who use tobacco products. The Red Lake County Sheriff's Office would like to thank all the businesses visited for their cooperation and teamwork as we work through this process. We would also like to thank all the businesses who complied with the tobacco laws and congratulate them for their continuing effort against underage tobacco use.

Pros and Cons of Alternative Grain Storage

The absolute cardinal rule that you should consider for all storage options is that "GRAIN SHOULD BE KEPT DRY AND HAVE ADEQUATE AERATION"; says Ken Hellevang, NDSU grain drying engineer! Grain can be stored in many types of containers, but it must be kept dry and cool (near the average outdoor temperature) when placed in alternative storage facilities because providing uniform airflow to dry grain or to cool grain coming from a combine or dryer is not feasible in these facilities.
There are several things that producers should consider when looking at the advantages and disadvantages of nontraditional storage methods!
Structural Issues
Grain pushing against the walls can damage buildings not built for grain storage. The walls must be anchored securely, and their structural members must be strong enough to transfer the force to the building poles or support structure without breaking or bending excessively. Typically, you will need additional poles and a grain wall to support the grain force in a pole building. In most situations, an engineer should be hired to complete a structural design or analysis, or contact the building company for guidance to prevent a structural failure.
Before placing grain in a building previously used for grain storage; it should be clean and you need to look for:
• Anything out of alignment, such as a bowing wall.
• Bowing or bending roof lines indicates the load on the building has exceeded the load the structure was built for.
• Examine all connections for separation or movement. A loose connector can lead to a building failure.
Storing In Bags
Poly bags is a good option, but it does not prevent insect infestations or mold growth in damp grain. A producer should:
• Place grain in bags

at recommended storage moisture contents based on the temperature of both the grain and out door temperature.
• Select an elevated, well drained site for the storage bags.
• Place the bags north and south so solar heating is similar on both sides. Sunshine on one side heats the grain so much that moisture accumulates on the cool side.
• Monitor the grain temperature at several place in the bags. Wildlife can puncture the bags, creating an entrance for moisture and smell yo attract wildlife.
Never enter a grain bag because is is a suffocation hazard. Unloading the bag with a pneumatic grain conveyor can "shrink Wrap" a person.
Grain Piles
Grain is often temporarily stored in outdoor piles; but rain is a severe problem in uncovered grain. A one inch rain will increase the moisture content of a one foot layer of corn by 9 percentage points. This typically leads to a two foot loss of grain on the pile surface. A one foot loss on the surface of a 25 foot high cone shaped pile is about 13 percent of the grain which would be a loss of \$39,000 if the grain value is \$4/bushel.
If You Use An Outdoor Aisle:
• Use a cover to keep off water. Aeration and wind will not dry wet grain enough to prevent spoilage.
• Prepare the ground surface where grain will be piled with lime or cement to prevent moisture from reaching the grain.
• Place the pile higher than the surrounding ground to minimize moisture transfer into the grain.
• Examine the entire area to assure that flooding will not occur during a heavy rain.
Grain Covers
A combination of restraining straps and suction from the aeration systems holds grain covers in place. Put perforated ducts on the grain under the

cover to provide a controlled air intake for the aeration system and airflow near the cover to lower condensation problems. Properly sized and spaced ducts also should be placed on the ground under the pile to pull air through the grain. If you use a perforated grain wall, the aeration ducts near the wall should not be perforated or the airflow through the grain will be limited to near the wall.
Cooling Stored Grain
Cool grain with aeration to reduce the insect infestation potential. Insect reproduction is reduced at temperatures below 60 F, insects are dormant below 50 f, and insects can be killed by extended temperatures below 30 F. Cooling grain as outdoor temperatures cool reduces moisture migration and condensation near the top of the pile. In addition, grain moisture content and temperature affect the rate of mold growth and grain deterioration, with the allowable storage time approximately doubling with each 10 degree reduction in grain temperature.
The grain should be cooled whenever the average outdoor temperature is 10 to 15 degrees cooler than the grain. It should be cooled to near or below 30 degrees for winter storage in our area. Aeration ducts need to have perforations sized and spaced properly for air to enter and exit the ducts uniformly and obtain the desired airflow through the grain. The maximum spacing for aeration ducts is equal to the grain depth to achieve acceptable airflow uniformity.
